A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the vigilance of 1 individual citizens can keep communities safe through the 2 3 reporting of witnessed criminal conduct to law enforcement. However, the legislature also finds that in certain 4 circumstances, individuals have misused the ability to summon 5 law enforcement officers against persons of protected classes 6 7 without reason to suspect a crime is being committed. The purpose of this Act is to give any person injured by 8 9 discriminatory reporting to a law enforcement officer recourse 10 through civil action. SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 11 12 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read 13 as follows: 14 "CHAPTER DISCRIMINATORY REPORTING TO A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER 15 -1 Discriminatory reporting; law enforcement officer; 16 S civil remedy. (a) Any person who knowingly causes a law 17

1 the action, the court finds that the defendant is violating or
2 has violated subsection (a), the court shall enjoin the
3 defendant from a continuance thereof. It shall not be necessary
4 that actual damages to the plaintiff be alleged or proved in
5 order to obtain the injunction.

6 (c) If the judgment is for the plaintiff, the plaintiff
7 shall be awarded damages of no less than \$1,000 plus attorneys'
8 fees and costs.

9 \$ -2 Guidance. The department of law enforcement, in

14 SECTION 3. Section 368-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows:

16 "\$368-1 Purpose and intent. The legislature finds and 17 declares that the practice of discrimination because of race, 18 color, religion, age, sex, including gender identity or 19 expression, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, 20 <u>place of birth</u>, ancestry, or disability in employment, housing, 21 public accommodations, or access to services receiving state
