A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many low-income
 households struggle to purchase food due to Hawaii's high cost
 of living and food prices. The supplemental nutrition
 assistance program (SNAP), formerly known as the food stamp
 program, is crucial to providing necessary food assistance to
 some of Hawaii's most economically disadvantaged residents.

7 The legislature further finds that SNAP is the most 8 effective anti-hunger initiative in the country. In Hawaii, 9 SNAP supports over one hundred thirty thousand individuals, 10 bringing more than \$630,000,000 into the State's economy each 11 year. These benefits help economically vulnerable households 12 meet their basic nutritional needs without sacrificing their 13 financial security.

14 The legislature additionally finds that a study co-authored 15 by the university of Hawaii economic research organization and 16 Hawaii Public Health Institute found that eliminating the net 17 income limit criteria for SNAP beneficiaries would provide an

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1 additional \$45,000,000 in benefits to struggling families across 2 the State and expand eligibility for thirteen thousand to 3 fourteen thousand more households, with each household receiving 4 an average of \$3,200 annually in food assistance. In September 5 2024, Governor Josh Green subsequently announced that the State 6 would remove the net income limit criteria to strengthen 7 Hawaii's social welfare system for working-class families. 8 The legislature also finds that SNAP access and 9 participation rates are hampered by understaffing at the 10 department of human services. Improvements to SNAP in the 11 State, including elimination of the net income limit, will only 12 be effective if they are able to be fully implemented, which 13 will require additional staffing for the department of human 14 services. Moreover, since SNAP benefits are federally 15 reimbursable, increasing staff to increase the State's SNAP 16 program's participation rate could generate hundreds of millions 17 of dollars in federal revenue to combat food insecurity in local 18 communities.

19 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate20 funds to the department of human services to enhance access to

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and participation in the supplemental nutrition assistance
 program.

3 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,100,000 or so much 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 7 2026-2027 to strengthen access to the supplemental nutrition 8 assistance program by:

- 9 (1) Authorizing differential pay increases for positions
 10 related to the facilitation of the supplemental
 11 nutrition assistance program;
- 12 (2) Establishing new positions to improve access to the13 supplemental nutrition assistance program,
- 14 particularly for economically disadvantaged
- 15 communities; and
- 16 (3) Undertaking any other programs or initiatives the
 17 department of human services deems effective in
 18 improving supplemental nutrition assistance program
 19 participation rates.
- 20 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department21 of human services for the purposes of this Act.

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1 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
