#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 235

Honorable Members Thirty-Third Legislature State of Hawai'i

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 235, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Traffic Safety."

The purpose of this bill is to improve traffic and pedestrian safety along the North Shore of Oahu. To achieve this, the bill requires the Department of Transportation to expand the use of photo red light imaging detector systems and automated speed enforcement systems to locations on the North Shore, following public education efforts by the City and County of Honolulu about the traffic enforcement systems.

This bill is objectionable because by selecting unidentified locations on the North Shore of Oahu for expansion of the use of photo red light imaging detector systems and automated speed enforcement systems, the bill ignores that the Department of Transportation (DOT) has established a statewide methodology for selecting the communities and expansion areas within which to implement these types of traffic safety systems. The criteria in the DOT's methodology include the number of crashes caused by drivers who disregarded traffic signals, volume of traffic, and traffic citations for disregarding signals. The DOT stresses the importance of consistency when selecting a location for implementation of the traffic safety systems. DOT's methodology ensures communities are chosen based on need and potential for greatest impact. Disregarding the DOT's criteria for location selection threatens the integrity of the photo red light imaging detector system and automated speed enforcement system programs.

# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that traffic safety is a 2 significant and growing concern across the State. The North 3 Shore of Oahu, particularly Kamehameha highway, has long been 4 recognized as a high-risk corridor for collisions involving 5 pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers. The legislature further finds that the use of photo red light imaging detector systems 6 and automated speed enforcement systems has demonstrated success 7 8 in improving safety outcomes. Additionally, the safe routes to 9 school advisory committee plays a key role in addressing school-10 adjacent infrastructure needs to protect keiki and their 11 families.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to improve trafficand pedestrian safety along the North Shore of Oahu by:

14 (1) Requiring the department of transportation, after the
15 city and county of Honolulu educates the public and
16 expands its systems, to broaden implementation of the



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1	automated traffic enforcement systems to locations in
2	the North Shore of Oahu; and
3	(2) Authorizing the safe routes to school advisory
4	committee to prioritize infrastructure safety projects
5	at schools adjacent to Kamehameha highway.
6	SECTION 2. (a) Notwithstanding section 291J-3, Hawaii
7	Revised Statutes, the department of transportation shall expand
8	the use of photo red light imaging detector systems, pursuant to
9	chapter 291J, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and automated speed
10	enforcement systems, pursuant to chapter 291L, Hawaii Revised
11	Statutes, to locations on the North Shore of Oahu.
12	(b) Before expanding the use of photo red light imaging
13	detector systems and automated speed enforcement systems to
14	locations on the North Shore of Oahu pursuant to subsection (a),
15	the city and county of Honolulu shall educate the public and
16	adjust any systems necessary to carry out the purposes of this
17	Act.
18	(c) The department of transportation may seek input from
19	the judiciary and the surrounding community when selecting
20	locations for implementation.



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(d) The department of transportation shall submit a report
 about its progress in implementing subsection (a) to the
 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
 the regular session of 2026.

SECTION 3. The safe routes to school advisory committee
may work with appropriate stakeholders to develop and prioritize
up to three safe routes to school projects serving schools
directly adjacent to Kamehameha highway.

9 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
