A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii has the
3	highest homelessness rate per capita in the nation. The 2024
4	Point In Time Count showed a total of 6,389 people experiencing
5	homelessness in the State. The majority of the homeless are on
6	Oahu with 4,494, followed by Hawaii with seven hundred eighteen,
7	Maui with six hundred fifty-four, and Kauai with five hundred
8	twenty-three homeless individuals. Between 2023 and 2024, there
9	was a twelve per cent increase in the number of people
10	experiencing homelessness on Oahu. Sixty-two per cent of Oahu's
11	homeless were unsheltered, and thirty-eight per cent were
12	sheltered.
13	The legislature under Act 209, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018,
14	established the ohana zones pilot program, which initially
15	appropriated \$30,000,000 to fund nonprofit and county government
16	programs aimed to reduce homelessness. Act 128, Session Laws of
17	Hawaii 2019, expanded the use of ohana zone funds to include

1 private lands and appropriated \$2,000,000 for the construction 2 of modular temporary units, renovation of existing structures on 3 public lands, or creation of infrastructure to make land 4 suitable for temporary housing. The ohana zones pilot program was extended from 2021 to 2023. The legislature finds that in 5 6 addition to the six mandated housing sites in the ohana zones 7 pilot program, fourteen additional programs were established. 8 Act 235, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, further extended the 9 ohana zones pilot program through June 30, 2026, and provided an 10 additional \$15,000,000 to fund services. In 2023, the 11 legislature also set aside \$5,000,000 to fund a supportive 12 housing pilot program designed to address individuals with 13 special housing needs, including individuals with alcohol or 14 drug addiction; individuals transitioning from incarceration; 15 youth aging out of foster care; domestic violence survivors; 16 veterans; individuals with intellectual, developmental, physical 17 disabilities, or mental illness; frail elderly; and chronically 18 homeless individuals. In 2023, the legislature also set aside 19 \$25,000,000 to fund the kauhale initiative to create deeply 20 affordable spaces for housing and healing the houseless. At 21 that time, kauhale was defined as "communal living spaces, with

- 1 modest housing units for individual households and shared space
- 2 for cooking, eating, recreation, growing food, and engaging in
- 3 group activities". As proposed, kauhale was envisioned as
- 4 "prefabricated homes, or other modest, low-cost housing unit",
- 5 but "could also be created in an existing apartment, dormitory,
- 6 or office building, so long as there is communal space and an
- 7 investment in building communal responsibility." Over time, the
- 8 kauhale initiative has evolved to a range of responses for
- 9 homeless individuals and families and those at risk of
- 10 homelessness. Kauhale now include temporary, time-limited
- 11 options such as emergency shelter, medical respite, and mobile
- 12 outreach and navigation, as well as long-term solutions such as
- 13 supportive housing and affordable housing targeting extremely
- 14 low-income households.
- 15 The legislature further finds that among the important
- 16 principles of the State's kauhale initiative is building
- 17 partnerships between government and community, providing
- 18 affordable spaces for housing and healing, and fostering
- 19 belonging and responsibility. Every kauhale is a partnership
- 20 between government and community with flexible state funding

3	The	legislature also finds that to ensure there is capacity
4	within th	e State to meet the needs for long-term solutions to
5	homelessn	ess and the risk of homelessness, it is necessary for
6	the State	to develop the capacity of its affordable housing
7	financing	and development agency to work with developers to
8	create ad	ditional supportive housing units.
9	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
10	(1)	Appropriate funds for the continued implementation of
11		the kauhale initiative;
12	(2)	Create the supportive housing special fund to assist
13		the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation
14		to facilitate the development of mixed-income rental
15		housing projects in which some or all the units are
16		targeted to special needs individuals or families who
17		require supportive services; and
18	(3)	Appropriate funds to assist the statewide office of
19		homelessness and housing solutions to implement the
20		kauhale initiative.
21		PART II

1	SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
4	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
5	year 2026-2027 for the continued operation of the kauhale
6	initiative, including expenses related to the development and
7	operation of kauhale, provision of project-based rent supplement
8	payments, provision of support services for qualified
9	individuals and families in kauhale, and staffing and related
10	costs to administer the kauhale initiative.
11	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of
12	the governor for the purposes of this Act.
13	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the governor
14	may transfer all or a portion of the appropriation in this part
15	to the governor's designated executive branch departments or
16	agencies, including the statewide office on homelessness and
17	housing solutions, for expenditures incurred to implement the
18	program.
19	The governor's designated executive branch departments or

agencies may expend any appropriation transferred pursuant to

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- 1 this part for the performance of their duties under the kauhale
- 2 initiative.
- 3 PART III
- 4 SECTION 3. The legislature finds that combining affordable
- 5 housing with access to services to help special needs
- 6 populations, such as individuals with alcohol or drug addiction;
- 7 individuals transitioning from incarceration; youth aging out of
- 8 foster care; domestic violence survivors; veterans; individuals
- 9 with intellectual, developmental, physical disabilities, or
- 10 mental illness; frail elderly; and chronically homeless
- 11 individuals, live more stable and productive lives.
- 12 The legislature further finds that the Hawaii housing
- 13 finance and development corporation administers various programs
- 14 to finance mixed-income rental housing developments. Creating a
- 15 new financing tool specifically for supportive housing will
- 16 enable the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation to
- 17 facilitate the development of supportive housing units in stand-
- 18 alone projects or integrated in mixed-income rental housing
- 19 projects.
- The purpose of this part is to:

1	(1)	Establish a supportive housing special fund to be
2		administered by the Hawaii housing finance and
3		development corporation;
4	(2)	Appropriate funds to support the development,
5		operation, and maintenance of supportive housing, as
6		well as the provision of supportive services; and
7	(3)	Establish, within the Hawaii housing finance and
8		development corporation, one full-time equivalent (1.0
9		FTE) housing finance specialist I position to help
10		with the administration of the supportive housing
11		special fund.
12	SECT	ION 4. Chapter 201H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by	y adding a new subpart to part III to be appropriately
14	designate	d and to read as follows:
15		" . Supportive Housing Special Fund
16	§201	H- Supportive housing special fund. (a) There is
17	establish	ed a supportive housing special fund to be administered
18	by the co	rporation for the purpose of developing, operating, and
19	maintaini	ng affordable, permanent housing and the provision of
20	supportive	e services for individuals or families with special
21	needs.	

1	(b)	Moneys in the fund may be used to:	
2	(1)	Make loans to finance the development, pre-	
3		development, construction, acquisition, preservation,	
4		or substantial rehabilitation of supportive housing	
5		projects;	
6	(2)	Make project-based rental assistance payments;	
7	(3)	Make payments for supportive services for households	
8		residing in the supportive housing projects; and	
9	(4)	For other housing services or activities as provided	
10		in rules adopted by the corporation without regard to	
11		chapter 91.	
12	(c)	The fund may include sums appropriated by the	
13	legislatu	re, private contributions, proceeds from repayment of	
14	loans, in	terest, fees, other returns, and moneys from other	
15	sources.		
16	(d)	An amount from the fund, to be set by the corporation	
17	and authorized by the legislature, may be used for		
18	administra	ative expenses incurred by the corporation in	
19	administe	ring the fund; provided that moneys in the fund shall	
20	not be use	ed to finance day-to-day administrative expenses of the	
21	projects a	allotted moneys from the fund.	

- (e) The corporation shall consult with the counties and
 community-based organizations to leverage funds and obtain input
 on selection of projects.
- 4 (f) The corporation may contract with other executive 5 branch departments or agencies, the counties, or private or 6 nonprofit organizations as necessary for the provision of 7 supportive housing and services. The corporation shall be
- 8 exempt from chapter 103D in selecting a qualified private or9 nonprofit organization to assist with the development and

maintenance of supportive housing and provision of rental

- 11 assistance and supportive services. The corporation may,
- 12 without regard to chapter 91, establish rules and qualification
- 13 standards for participants of the supportive housing program.
- 14 (g) The corporation may establish, revise, charge, and
- 15 collect a reasonable service fee, as necessary, in connection
- 16 with its financing, services, and approvals under this subpart.
- 17 The fees shall be deposited into the supportive housing special
- **18** fund.

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- 19 (h) The corporation shall submit a report to the
- 20 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of

- 1 each regular session describing the projects funded using moneys
- 2 from the supportive housing special fund.
- 3 §201H- Additional powers. The powers conferred upon
- 4 the corporation by this subpart shall be in addition and
- 5 supplemental to the powers conferred by any other law, and
- 6 nothing in this subpart shall be construed as limiting any
- 7 powers, rights, privileges, or immunities conferred."
- **8** SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 11 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 12 year 2026-2027 to be deposited into the supportive housing
- 13 special fund.
- 14 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the supportive
- 15 housing special fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof
- 16 as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the same sum
- 17 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027
- 18 to be expended as follows:
- 19 (1) \$ for the financing of the development,
- 20 operation, and maintenance of affordable, supportive
- 21 housing projects and the provision of supportive

1		services for households with special needs who reside
2		in the supportive housing projects; and
3	(2)	\$ for the establishment and hiring of one
4		temporary full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) housing
5		finance specialist I within the Hawaii housing finance
6		and development corporation to help with
7		administration of the special fund.
8	The s	sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
9	Housing f	inance and development corporation.
10		PART IV
11	SECT	ION 7. The legislature finds that the statewide office
12	on homeles	ssness and housing solutions is responsible for working
13	with State	e, county, and community agencies to develop solutions
14	to prevent	and end homelessness in the State through
15	transition	nal and permanent housing and supportive or assisted
16	services,	or both. As such, the statewide office on
17	homelessne	ess and housing solutions has taken the lead in
18	implement	ing the kauhale initiative that offers a range of
19	short- and	d long-term responses to provide affordable spaces for
20	housing ar	nd healing and fostering belonging and responsibility

- 1 in partnership with other governmental entities and the
- 2 community.
- 3 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to assist
- 4 the statewide office on homelessness and housing solutions in
- 5 implementing the kauhale initiative.
- 6 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 8 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 9 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 10 year 2026-2027 to assist the statewide office on homelessness
- 11 and housing solutions in implementing the kauhale initiative.
- 12 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 13 the governor for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 PART V
- 15 SECTION 9. New statutory material is underscored.
- 16 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on June 29, 3000;
- 17 provided that sections 2, 5, and 6 shall take effect on July 1,
- **18** 3000.
