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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>§461-</u> Registered pharmacy technicians; certificate of
5	registration required. (a) Beginning January 1, 2026, no
6	person shall act as a pharmacy technician without first
7	obtaining a valid certificate of registration issued by the
8	board pursuant to this section.
9	(b) Each certificate of registration shall be valid
10	through December 31 of each odd-numbered year, upon which the
11	registration shall lapse and a new registration shall be
12	required.
13	(c) Beginning January 1, 2026, a pharmacy shall only
14	employ registered pharmacy technicians to perform pharmacy
15	technician duties. The pharmacist-in-charge shall verify that
16	the person is a registered pharmacy technician and that the
17	board has issued a certificate of registration for the pharmacy

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1	technician before the registered pharmacy technician performs
2	any tasks identified in this chapter or rules adopted pursuant
3	to this chapter. The supervising registered pharmacist shall be
4	responsible for the actions of the registered pharmacy
5	technician.
6	(d) The certificate of registration shall be prominently
7	displayed in an area accessible to the public in the workplace
8	where the registered pharmacy technician is employed or
9	practices.
10	(e) If the registered pharmacy technician is suspected to
11	have violated any law or rule regarding the practice of
12	pharmacy, legend drugs, or controlled substances, or if there is
13	evidence that a registered pharmacy technician may have violated
14	any such law or rule, the pharmacist-in-charge shall notify the
15	board, in writing, within ten days or immediately if any danger
16	to the public health or safety exists. Any registered
17	pharmacist, whether or not practicing in the same pharmacy, who
18	has knowledge or suspicion of a registered pharmacy technician
19	who is in violation of any law or rule regarding the practice of
20	pharmacy, legend drugs, or controlled substances shall notify



1	the board	l, in writing, within ten days or immediately if any	
2	danger to	the public health or safety exists."	
3	SECT	ION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
4	amended b	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately	
5	inserted	and to read as follows:	
6	" <u>"</u> Au	xiliary pharmacy personnel" means a person who works in	
7	a pharmacy assisting a registered pharmacist or registered		
8	pharmacy	technician and who may perform the following:	
9	(1)	Retrieval tasks, such as retrieving prescriptions or	
10		files;	
11	(2)	Clerical tasks, such as data entry, typing labels, and	
12		maintaining patient profiles;	
13	(3)	Tasks such as selling prescriptions, telephoning,	
14		filing, and typing;	
15	(4)	Accounting tasks, such as recordkeeping, maintaining	
16		accounts receivables, third-party billing, and	
17		posting;	
18	(5)	Inventory control tasks, such as monitoring, pricing,	
19		dating, invoicing, stocking pharmacy, and preparing	
20		purchase orders; and	



1	(6) Custodial tasks, such as helping maintain a clean and		
2	orderly pharmacy.		
3	"Registered pharmacy technician" means a person, exclusive		
4	of pharmacy interns and auxiliary pharmacy personnel, with a		
5	certificate of registration issued by the board pursuant to		
6	section 461- , who may, in addition to the tasks of an		
7	auxiliary pharmacy personnel, perform filling, packaging,		
8	manipulative, repetitive, or other nondiscretionary tasks, and		
9	tasks specified in section 461-11.4, only while assisting and		
10	while under the supervision and control of a registered		
11	pharmacist.		
12	"Supervision" means the direction and oversight of a		
13	registered pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern by a		
14	responsible registered pharmacist at all times when the		
15	registered pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern performs acts		
16	specified in this chapter or rules adopted pursuant to this		
17	chapter."		
18	SECTION 3. Section 461-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
19	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:		
20	"(a) In addition to any other powers and duties authorized		
21	by law, the board:		

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1	(1)	Shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules pursuant to
2		chapter 91, as it deems proper for the purposes of
3		this chapter, Public Law 100-293, and title 21 Code of
4		Federal Regulations part 205;
5	(2)	Shall examine, license, reinstate, and renew the
6		licenses of qualified applicants for registered
7		pharmacists and wholesale prescription drug
8		distributors[$_{ au}$]; issue certificates of registration
9		for registered pharmacy technicians; and issue and
10		renew permits to operate pharmacies;
11	(3)	May require the inspection of any wholesale
12		prescription drug distributor premises in the State to
13		ensure compliance with this chapter and rules adopted
14		under this chapter, or may require an applicant for a
15		pharmacy license to submit a statement that the
16		premises, including but not limited to security and
17		sanitation, are in conformance with the board's
18		requirements and that the applicant possesses the
19		reference materials and technical clinical equipment
20		and supplies as may be specified in rules adopted
21		under this chapter;

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May fine, suspend, or revoke any license, 1 (4) 2 registration, or permit for any cause prescribed by this chapter, or for any violation of the rules 3 4 adopted under this chapter, and refuse to grant or 5 renew any license, registration, or permit for any cause which would be ground for revocation or 6 7 suspension of a license, registration, or permit; May deny a license to any applicant who has been 8 (5) 9 disciplined by another state or federal agency. 10 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a final order 11 of disciplinary action taken pursuant to this 12 paragraph shall be a matter of public record; and 13 (6) May approve pilot and demonstration research projects 14 for innovative applications in the practice of 15 pharmacy; provided that the projects shall not include 16 therapeutic substitution or substitution of a medical 17 device used in patient care; provided further that 18 nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to expand 19 the definition of "practice of pharmacy" [as defined] 20 under section 461-1. The board may also:

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1	(A)	Approve a provision that grants an exception to
2		any rule adopted under this paragraph;
3	(B)	Extend the time an exception to a rule is
4		granted, as may be necessary for the board to
5		adopt an amendment or modification to the rule;
6	(C)	Condition approval of a project upon compliance
7		with this section and any rules adopted under
8		this section; and
9	(D)	Rescind approval and terminate a project if, at
10		any time, a project fails to protect public
11		health or welfare."
12	SECTION 4	. Section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by ame	nding its title to read as follows:
14	"§461−5	[Qualifications] Registered pharmacists;
15	qualifications	for license."
16	SECTION 5	. Section 461-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by ame	nding subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
18	"(a) All	licenses and permits issued by the board, except
19	temporary lice	nses issued under section 461-7, shall be renewed
20	biennially on o	or before December 31 of each odd-numbered year.
21	Failure to pay	the biennial fee and[, beginning with the renewal

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1	for the licensing biennium commencing on January 1, 2008,] to
2	satisfy the continuing education requirement on or before
3	December 31 of each odd-numbered year, shall constitute a
4	forfeiture of the license as of the date of expiration. <u>Failure</u>
5	to pay the biennial fee on or before December 31 of each
6	odd-numbered year shall constitute a forfeiture of the permit as
7	of the date of expiration.
8	(b) Any license or permit forfeited pursuant to subsection
9	(a) may be restored within three years upon payment of any
10	penalty fee, the current biennial fees, and the renewal fee for
11	the next biennium, if applicable, upon submission of proof of
12	compliance with the continuing education requirement for the
13	prior biennium, and upon meeting any other requirements
14	specified in rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91."
15	SECTION 6. Section 461-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
17	"(b) No person shall practice as a pharmacy intern without
18	having first obtained a permit from the board. The board shall
19	adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 defining the functions of a
20	pharmacy intern, establishing the requirements to be met by an
21	applicant for a pharmacy intern permit, and specifying the

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1	duration of the permit and the procedures for the immediate		
2	supervision of the pharmacy intern by a registered		
3	pharmacist[-]; provided that the supervising registered		
4	pharmacist shall supervise the actions of the pharmacy intern.		
5	(c) A <u>registered</u> pharmacy technician may be employed to		
6	[assist the] perform filling, packaging, manipulative,		
7	repetitive, or other nondiscretionary tasks, and tasks specified		
8	in section 461-11.4, only while assisting and while under the		
9	supervision and control of a registered pharmacist and under		
10	rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91 [that define		
11	the qualifications and functions of the pharmacy technician and		
12	provide the procedures for control and supervision by a		
13	registered pharmacist]."		
14	SECTION 7. Section 461-11.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
15	amended by amending subsections (a) to (d) to read as follows:		
16	"(a) A pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or <u>registered</u> pharmacy		
17	technician under the direct supervision of a <u>registered</u>		
18	pharmacist may administer a vaccine to a person three years of		
19	age or older; provided that:		
20	(1) The vaccine is authorized or approved by the United		
21	States Food and Drug Administration;		





1	(2)	The vaccine has been ordered by a <u>registered</u>
2		pharmacist and administered in accordance with the
3		recommendations of the Advisory Committee on
4		Immunization Practices of the United States Department
5		of Health and Human Services;
6	(3)	The pharmacy intern has completed a practical training
7		program approved by the Accreditation Council for
8		Pharmacy Education that includes hands-on injection
9		technique, clinical evaluation of indications and
10		contraindications of vaccines, and the recognition and
11		treatment of emergency responses to vaccines;
12	(4)	The registered pharmacy technician has completed a
13		practical training program approved by the
14		Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education that
15		includes hands-on injection technique;
16	(5)	The registered pharmacy technician has a Certified
17		Pharmacy Technician certification from either the
18		Pharmacy Technician Certification Board or National
19		Healthcareer Association;

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1	(6)	The registered pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
2		registered pharmacy technician has a current
3		certificate in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation;
4	(7)	The registered pharmacist or registered pharmacy
5		technician has completed a minimum of two credit hours
6		in immunization-related continuing education courses
7		during each licensing biennium;
8	(8)	The registered pharmacist is in compliance with all
9		applicable recordkeeping and reporting requirements,
10		including complying with adverse events reporting
11		requirements;
12	(9)	The registered pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
13		registered pharmacy technician has reviewed the
14		patient's vaccination records before administering the
15		vaccine;
16	(10)	The registered pharmacist has informed the patient and
17		the patient's primary guardian or caregiver of the
18		importance of a well-child visit with a pediatrician
19		or other licensed primary care provider and has
20		referred the patient as appropriate; and

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7 (b) After the vaccination is administered, the <u>registered</u>
8 pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or <u>registered</u> pharmacy technician
9 under the direct supervision of a <u>registered</u> pharmacist shall
10 immediately provide to the patient a vaccination record
11 including the following information:

12 (1) The patient's name and date of birth;

13 (2) The type of vaccine administered; and

14 (3) The date and location that the vaccine was15 administered.

(c) The <u>registered</u> pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
<u>registered</u> pharmacy technician under the direct supervision of a
<u>registered</u> pharmacist shall make a good faith effort to provide
within seventy-two hours to the medical home and within five
business days to the department of health immunization registry

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1	the same	information provided to the patient pursuant to
2	subsectio	n (b) as well as the following:
3	(1)	The name of the vaccine product that was administered,
4		including the manufacturer, lot number, and expiration
5		date;
6	(2)	The method of administration; and
7	(3)	The anatomical site of administration.
8	(d)	All pharmacy interns or registered pharmacy
9	technicia	ns who administer vaccines to persons three years of
10	age or ol	der shall complete the training program required by
11	subsectio	n (a) and submit the completion certificate for the
12	training	program to the board before administering any vaccine
13	to person	s three years of age or older."
14	SECT	ION 8. Section 461-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended t	o read as follows:
16	"§46	1-21 Disciplinary action. (a) In addition to any
17	other act	ions authorized by law, the board may deny, revoke, or
18	suspend a	ny license, registration, or permit applied for or
19	issued by	the board, in accordance with this chapter, and fine
20	or otherw	ise discipline a licensee, registrant, or permit holder



1	for any o	cause authorized by law, including but not limited to
2	the follo	owing:
3	(1)	Procuring a license or registration through fraud,
4		misrepresentation, or deceit;
5	(2)	Professional misconduct, gross carelessness, or
6		manifest incapacity;
7	(3)	Permitting an unlicensed or unregistered person to
8		perform activities that require a license <u>or</u>
9		registration under this chapter;
10	(4)	Violation of any of the provisions of this chapter or
11		the rules adopted pursuant [thereto;] to this chapter;
12	(5)	Violation of any [state or] federal <u>or state</u> drug,
13		controlled substance, or poison law;
14	(6)	False, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising;
15	(7)	Any other conduct constituting fraudulent or dishonest
16		dealings;
17	(8)	Failure to comply with a board order;
18	(9)	Making a false statement on any document submitted or
19		required to be filed by this chapter, including a
20		false certification of compliance with the continuing
21		education requirement;



1	(10)	Habitual intemperance or addiction to the use of
2		habit-forming drugs;
3	(11)	Administering a vaccine, including a human
4		papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis),
5		meningococcal, or influenza vaccine, without complying
6		with section 461-11.4; or
7	(12)	Prescribing or dispensing contraceptive supplies
8		without complying with section 461-11.6.
9	(b)	Any person who violates any of the provisions of this
10	chapter o	r the rules adopted pursuant [thereto] <u>to this chapter</u>
11	shall be	fined [not] <u>no</u> less than \$100 [nor] <u>and no</u> more than
12	\$1,000 fo	r each violation.
13	(c)	All proceedings for denial, suspension, fine, or
14	revocatio	n of a license, registration, or permit on any grounds
15	specified	in subsection (a) shall be conducted pursuant to
16	chapter 9	1, including the right of judicial review."
17	SECT	ION 9. Section 26H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall
18	not apply	to this Act.
19	SECT	ION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.



1 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Board of Pharmacy; Registered Pharmacy Technicians; Certificate of Registration; Pharmacists-in-charge; Supervision

Description:

Beginning 1/1/2026, requires pharmacy technicians to be registered with and obtain a certificate of registration issued by the Board of Pharmacy. Imposes a duty on pharmacists-incharge to report violations by registered pharmacy technicians to the Board of Pharmacy. Specifies that supervising registered pharmacists are responsible for the actions of registered pharmacy technicians and pharmacy interns. (CD1)
