A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NEONICOTINOIDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that neonicotinoid
insecticides are neurotoxic insecticides that permanently bind
to, and subsequently overstimulate and destroy, insect nerve
cells. Neonicotinoids are the most widely used class of
insecticides worldwide.

6 The legislature further finds that research overwhelmingly 7 shows that neonicotinoid pesticides have destructive impacts on 8 essential pollinator populations, killing bees, butterflies, and 9 birds, and pose a serious threat to food systems, ecosystems, 10 and public health. Growing scientific evidence also suggests 11 that exposure to neonicotinoids can cause serious negative 12 health consequences for humans.

13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

14 (1) Classify neonicotinoid pesticides as restricted use15 pesticides;

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1	(2)	Establish a non-exhaustive list of chemicals that	
2		shall belong to the neonicotinoid class of chemicals	
3		to be included under this classification;	
4	(3)	Prohibit the sale or use of any seed coated or treated	
5		with a neonicotinoid pesticide; and	
6	(4)	Require the department of agriculture to adopt rules	
7		that identify and regulate the most harmful	
8		neonicotinoid pesticide formulations and develop	
9		guidelines for safer alternatives to neonicotinoid	
10		pesticides.	
11	SECT	ION 2. Section 149A-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
12	amended a	s follows:	
13	1.	By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted	
14	and to re	ad:	
15	" <u>"Ne</u>	onicotinoid pesticide" means any pesticide containing a	
16	chemical	belong to the neonicotinoid class of chemicals,	
17	including	but not limited to acetamiprid, clothianidin,	
18	dinotefuran, imidacloprid, nitenpyram, nithiazine, thiacloprid,		
19	thiamethoxam, or any other chemical designated by the EPA as		
20	belonging to the neonicotinoid class of chemicals.		
21	"Neonicotinoid pesticide" does not include any wood preservative		



1	pesticides or wood preservative products that contain			
2	neonicotinoid, other similar pesticides used to treat wood			
3	products, or pesticides used by the structural pest control			
4	industry for household pests in and around residences."			
5	2. By amending the definition of "restricted use			
6	pesticide" to read:			
7	""Restricted use pesticide" means:			
8	(1) A pesticide or pesticide use classified by $[the]$:			
9	(A) The Administrator $[\tau]$ of the EPA $[\tau]$ for use by			
10	certified applicators or competent persons under			
11	their direct supervision and so designated on its			
12	label; or			
13	(B) The board for use by certified applicators or			
14	competent persons under their direct supervision;			
15	or			
16	(2) A [pesticide or pesticide use classified by the board			
17	for use by certified applicators or competent persons			
18	under their direct supervision.] neonicotinoid			
19	pesticide."			
20	SECTION 3. Section 149A-31, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
21	amended to read as follows:			

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1	"§14	9A-31	Prohibited acts. No person shall:
2	(1)	Use	any pesticide in a manner inconsistent with its
3		labe	l, except that it shall not be unlawful to:
4		(A)	Apply a pesticide at any dosage, concentration,
5			or frequency less than that specified on the
6			label or labeling; provided that the efficacy of
7			the pesticide is maintained; provided further
8			that when a pesticide is applied by a commercial
9			applicator, the deviation from the label
10			recommendations shall be with the consent of the
11			purchaser of the pesticide application services;
12		(B)	Apply a pesticide against any target pest not
13			specified in the labeling if the application is
14			to a crop, animal, or site specified on the label
15			or labeling; provided that the label or labeling
16			does not specifically prohibit the use on pests
17			other than those listed on the label or labeling;
18		(C)	Employ any method of application not prohibited
19			by the labeling;



1		(D) Mix a pesticide or pesticides with a fertilizer
2		when the mixture is not prohibited by the label
3		or labeling; or
4		(E) Use in a manner determined by rule not to be an
5		unlawful act;
6	(2)	Use, store, transport, or discard any pesticide or
7		pesticide container in any manner that would have
8		unreasonable adverse effects on the environment;
9	(3)	Use or apply restricted use pesticides unless the
10		person is a certified pesticide applicator or under
11		the direct supervision of a certified pesticide
12		applicator with a valid certificate issued pursuant to
13		rules adopted under section 149A-33(1); provided that
14		it shall be prohibited to use or apply a restricted
15		use pesticide for structural pest control uses for a
16		fee or trading of services, unless the user or
17		applicator is a pest control operator or is employed
18		by a pest control operator licensed under chapter
19		460J;



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1	(4)	Use or apply pesticides in any manner that has been
2		suspended, canceled, or restricted pursuant to section
3		149A-32.5;
4	(5)	Falsify any record or report required to be made or
5		maintained by rules adopted pursuant to this chapter;
6	(6)	Fill with water, through a hose, pipe, or other
7		similar transmission system, any tank, implement,
8		apparatus, or equipment used to disperse pesticides,
9		unless the tank, implement, apparatus, equipment,
10		hose, pipe, or other similar transmission system is
11		equipped with an air gap or a reduced-pressure
12		principle backflow device meeting the requirements
13		under section 340E-2 and the rules adopted thereunder;
14		[or]
15	(7)	Beginning January 1, 2019, use or apply any pesticide
16		containing chlorpyrifos as an active ingredient;
17		provided that:
18		(A) The department shall grant to any person, upon
19		request, a temporary permit authorizing the
20		person, until December 31, 2022, to use or apply

1			a pesticide containing chlorpyrifos as an active
2			ingredient; and
3		(B)	Any person who violates this paragraph shall be
4			subject to a penalty pursuant to section 149A-
5			41[-] <u>; or</u>
6	(8)	Begin	ning January 1, , sell or use in the State
7		any s	seed coated or treated with a neonicotinoid
8		pesti	cide."
9	SECT	ION 4.	Section 149A-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended t	o read	as follows:
11	"§149A-33 Rules. The department shall have the authority		
12	to carry	out an	d effectuate the purpose of this chapter by
13	rules, in	cludin	g but not limited to the following:
14	(1)	To es	tablish fees, procedures, conditions, and
15		stand	lards to certify persons for the use of restricted
16		use p	pesticides under section 4 of FIFRA;
17	(2)	To es	tablish limitations and conditions for the
18		appli	cation of pesticides by aircraft, power rigs,
19		mist	blowers, and other equipment;
20	(3)	To es	stablish, as necessary, specific standards and
21		guide	lines which specify those conditions which

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1		constitute unreasonable adverse effects on the
2		environment;
3	(4)	To establish, as necessary, record keeping
4		requirements for pesticide use by applicators; and
5	(5)	To establish, as necessary, procedures for the
6		issuance of guidelines to specify those conditions
7		that constitute use of a pesticide in a manner
8		inconsistent with its label.
9	The depar	tment shall adopt rules that identify and regulate the
10	most harm	ful neonicotinoid pesticide formulations and develop
11	guideline	s for safer alternatives to neonicotinoid pesticides."

DOA; Neonicotinoid Pesticides; Restricted Use Pesticides; Prohibition; Seeds; Rules

Description:

Classifies neonicotinoid pesticides as restricted use pesticides and establishes a list of chemicals that shall belong to the neonicotinoid class of chemicals. Prohibits the sale or use of seeds coated or treated with neonicotinoid pesticides. Requires the Department of Agriculture to adopt rules that identify and regulate the most harmful neonicotinoid pesticide formulations and develop guidelines for safer alternatives.
