A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO RESTORATION OF BEACH LANDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the 2 Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the world's leading 3 authority on climate science, in its Assessment Report 6 (2021) 4 stated that it has high confidence that global sea level is 5 committed to rise for centuries to millennia, regardless of 6 whether humans slow carbon emissions into the atmosphere. 7 The legislature also finds that the state climate change 8 mitigation and adaptation commission, created by Act 32, Session 9 Laws of Hawaii 2017, stated in its 2022 report to the 10 legislature that Hawaii is projected to likely experience 11 between 3.9 and 5.9 feet of sea level rise by the year 2100. 12 The legislature finds that sea level rise poses a serious and 13 imminent threat to Hawaii's coastal communities and residents 14 and to Hawaii's natural resources, primarily beaches and coastal 15 ecosystems. The legislature recognizes that the State has an affirmative duty to preserve beaches as a public trust resource 16 **17** for the people of Hawaii, and that beaches are both culturally

8	amended by amending the definition of "beach restoration" to

12	outside source such as offshore sand deposits, streams,	
13	chann	els or harbor mouths, or an upland sand quarry. an
14	activity undertaken to:	
15	(1)	Maintain and improve beaches and dune systems through
16		management of sand and native dune vegetation;
17	(2)	Place sand on an eroded beach from an approved outside
18		or adjacent source, with or without stabilizing
19		structures; or
20	(3)	Remove abandoned remnant materials from beaches and
21		dunes that pose a risk to public health and coastal
22		ecocystems "

Description:

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESTORATION OF

BEACH LANDS.

PURPOSE:

To amend the definition of beach restoration to expand the types of activities the State recognizes as restorative and beneficial to beach lands in response to increasing threat

of sea level rise and beach loss.

MEANS:

Amend section 171-151, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

JUSTIFICATION:

The current definition of "beach restoration" in section 171-151, HRS, is limited to the placement of sand on eroded beaches. The Department recognizes that other activites, such as sand management, native vegetation management, and removal of abandoned materials from public beaches are restorative and beneficial to the public trust resource. This amendment will enable the Department to support county agencies and non-governmental organizations seeking to conduct dune restoration and other beneficial projects.

Impact on the public: The bill will support proactive and ongoing management and care for the public trust beach resources through a variety of nature-based measures.

Impact on the department and other agencies: This bill will provide the Department with flexibility in maintaining and managing beach resources.
