A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that most of the State's
- 2 kupuna would prefer to live in their own homes for as long as
- 3 possible. In-home services are key to ensuring kupuna and
- 4 people with disabilities stay in their own homes. These
- 5 services include helping with activities of daily living such as
- 6 meal preparation, cleaning, bathing, mobility support, and other
- 7 forms of personal care. In a 2021 quantitative research study
- 8 among Hawaii residents forty-five years of age and older,
- 9 sixty-five per cent were extremely or very concerned about being
- 10 able to age in place, and eighty-three per cent of those
- 11 surveyed said it was extremely or very important to them to stay
- 12 in their homes as they get older. Helping individuals remain in
- 13 their own homes instead of in institutional nursing facilities
- 14 is also far less costly.
- The legislature further finds that reimbursement rates that
- 16 do not have medicare rates for equivalent services, such as
- 17 in-home care services, are reviewed and determined by the



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- 1 department of human services at least every five years. The
- 2 last review of home and community-based reimbursement rates for
- 3 residential services by the department of human services'
- 4 med-QUEST division was conducted through a third-party study by
- 5 the actuarial firm Milliman, and reported on December 30, 2022.
- 6 The study developed benchmark comparison rates for in-home
- 7 services, including "homemaker/companion/chore (PA1)," "personal
- 8 care/personal assistance/attendant care (PA2), " and private duty
- 9 nursing by a registered nurse or a licensed practical nurse.
- 10 The rate studies found tremendous wage pressure for direct
- 11 care workers in home settings, given the highly competitive
- 12 labor market in the State for similar-paying jobs. For all
- in-home provider types included in the study, current median
- 14 direct care wages paid by the operators fell below the United
- 15 States Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics
- 16 twenty-fifth percentile for those occupation codes and titles,
- 17 except for licensed practical nurses, who fell just below the
- 18 fiftieth percentile.
- 19 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make an
- 20 appropriation to increase funding of medicaid in-home services.
- 21 The corresponding federal matching funds will also increase,



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- 1 resulting in a larger impact on reimbursements received by
- 2 service providers.
- 3 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
- 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 7 2026-2027 to increase funding for medicaid in-home services;
- 8 provided that the department of human services shall obtain the
- 9 maximum federal matching funds available for this expenditure;
- 10 provided further that the department of human services shall
- 11 pursue all funding sources known to the State, including private
- 12 grants, prior to expending any general revenues appropriated
- 13 pursuant to this Act.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 15 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
