A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO COMMUTING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State's policy
- 2 of providing highly subsidized parking for state employees
- 3 limits the employees' choices, does not reduce traffic
- 4 congestion or greenhouse gas emissions, and contradicts state
- 5 policies to encourage alternative modes of transportation.
- 6 According to the department of accounting and general services,
- 7 four thousand and seventy-six subsidized parking stalls are made
- 8 available to state employees on O'ahu, not including stalls
- 9 located at the university of Hawai'i or the department of
- 10 education buildings. An additional two hundred forty-three are
- 11 made available on Hawai'i island, two hundred seventy-eight on
- 12 Maui, and one hundred fifty-one on Kaua'i.
- 13 The legislature further finds that for many years the State
- 14 has offered the limited option to employees to pay for monthly
- 15 parking privileges at the department of accounting and general
- 16 services' controlled lot located at or near the employee's
- 17 workplace through pre-tax payroll deductions. In addition to

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- 1 the savings for purchasing parking pre-tax, the parking
- 2 privileges are offered at a rate of approximately one-third of
- 3 the public rate. For example, employee parking rates in the
- 4 Honolulu downtown area range from \$20 to \$60 per month before
- 5 any pre-tax savings, which is a fraction of the cost to park in
- 6 a nearby private lot.
- 7 Comparatively, the cost of a monthly adult bus pass on O'ahu
- 8 is \$80 and the State does not provide a comparable bus pass
- 9 benefit to its employees nor offer to all employees the ability
- 10 to purchase a bus pass on a pre-tax basis. State employees who
- 11 travel to work by bicycle, foot, wheelchair or other mobility
- 12 aid, or private car sharing also do not receive any
- 13 transportation benefit or support even though their commuting
- 14 modes reduce the number of cars driven in the State and parked
- 15 in state lots.
- 16 The legislature also finds that other jurisdictions, such
- 17 as Washington, D.C., have enacted equitable transportation
- 18 benefits laws and policies. Various options, such as offering
- 19 an equivalent transportation benefit that employees could select
- 20 to apply to the cost of their preferred mode of transportation,
- 21 could be implemented to increase parity.

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1 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the 2 director of human resources development, in consultation with 3 the Hawai'i climate change mitigation and adaptation commission, 4 state energy office, and department of accounting and general services, to develop and implement a commuting choice benefit 5 program for all state employees regardless of mode of 6 7 transportation. 8 SECTION 2. (a) The director of human resources development, in consultation with the Hawai'i climate change 9 10 mitigation and adaptation commission, state energy office, and department of accounting and general services, shall develop and 11 implement a comprehensive commuting choice benefit program for 12 all state employees regardless of mode of transportation. 13 program shall include walking, rolling using a wheelchair or 14 other mobility aid, car sharing, biking, and using public 15 transportation, and shall encourage the use of healthy, safe, 16 economically sound, and environmentally sustainable commuting 17 18 modes. 19 The director of human resources development shall (b)

submit a report on the progress made toward implementing the

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- 1 program to the legislature no later than forty days prior to the
- 2 convening of the regular session of 2026.
- 3 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
