### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOBACCO PRODUCTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that according to the
- 2 department of health, tobacco use is the leading cause of
- 3 preventable death and disease in the State. Tobacco use in
- 4 Hawai'i kills 1,400 adults and contributes to 21,000 premature
- 5 deaths in children and youth annually. Tobacco use also costs
- 6 each Hawai'i resident household \$849 in state and federal taxes,
- 7 while state health care costs directly attributable to smoking
- exceed half a billion dollars each year. Despite these harms, 8
- 9 three per cent of high school students in the state smoke
- cigarettes, and nearly fifteen per cent report using e-10
- cigarettes, according to the Truth Initiative's 2023 Hawai'i 11
- 12 factsheet.
- 13 The legislature further finds that many jurisdictions are
- 14 responding to the lifelong health risks posed by nicotine
- products by enacting "nicotine-free generation" policies. 15
- 16 Brookline, Massachusetts, became the first local government in
- **17** the United States to impose such a restriction in 2021, a number



- 1 of other municipalities have followed suit. Similar legislation
- 2 has been proposed in several states as well. In the United
- 3 Kingdom, a bill seeking to impose such restrictions at the
- 4 national level is currently making its way through Parliament.
- 5 The legislature also finds that a prohibition based on a
- 6 person's date of birth is fair to everyone -- those who have not
- 7 yet attained the age of twenty-one and cannot presently purchase
- 8 tobacco will never be able to buy it, while the right to
- 9 purchase tobacco will remain available to those who are legally
- 10 permitted to do so and who may have already formed addictive
- 11 habits as a result. This approach is also fair to tobacco
- 12 vendors, as the gradual nature of the prohibition provides them
- 13 time to adjust their business models to account for declining
- 14 tobacco sales.
- Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to create an
- 16 incremental prohibition on tobacco products and electronic
- 17 smoking devices by restricting their sale, possession,
- 18 furnishing, or consumption in a public place to people born
- 19 after January 1, 2005.
- 20 SECTION 2. Section 245-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

18			an externally visible and easily legible notice
19			located on the same side of the shipping
20			container as the address to which the shipping
21			container is delivered stating as follows:

1	"CIGARETTES: HAWAIT LAW PROHIBITS THE SALE OF				
2	CIGARETTES TO INDIVIDUALS [UNDER TWENTY-ONE YEARS				
3	OF AGE BORN ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2005, AND				
4	REQUIRES THE PAYMENT OF ALL APPLICABLE TAXES.				
5	YOU ARE LEGALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL APPLICABLE				
6	UNPAID TAXES ON THESE CIGARETTES.""				
7	SECTION 3. Section 321-212, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
8	amended to read as follows:				
9	"[+]\$321-212[+] Tobacco products; possession or				
10	consumption prohibited. Possession or consumption of a tobacco				
11	product by a person [under twenty one years of age] born on or				
12	after January 1, 2005, in a public place shall be prohibited."				
13	SECTION 4. Section 321-213, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
14	amended to read as follows:				
15	"[+]§321-213[+] Exemptions. This part shall not apply to:				
16	(1) Any person [under twenty-one years of age, with				
17	parental authorization, born on or after January 1,				
18	2005, who is participating in a controlled purchase as				
19	part of a law enforcement activity or a study				
20	authorized by the department of health under the				
21	supervision of law enforcement to determine the level				

1		of incidence of tobacco sales to persons [ <del>under</del>			
2		twenty-one years of age;   born on or after January 1,			
3		2005; provided that if the person is under eighteen			
4		years of age, the person shall have parental			
5		authorization to participate in the law enforcement			
6		activity or study; or			
7	(2)	Possession of tobacco products by a person [under			
8		twenty one years of age] born on or after January 1,			
9		2005, in the course of delivery, pursuant to the			
10		direction of the person's employer lawfully engaged in			
11		business necessitating the delivery."			
12	SECT	ION 5. Section 712-1258, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
13	amended t	o read as follows:			
14	<b>"§71</b>	2-1258 Tobacco products and electronic smoking			
15	devices;	persons [ <del>under twenty-one years of age.</del> ] <u>born on or</u>			
16	after January 1, 2005. (1) It shall be unlawful to sell or				
17	furnish a	tobacco product in any shape or form or an electronic			
18	smoking d	evice to a person [ <del>under twenty one years of age.</del> ] <u>born</u>			
19	on or afte	er January 1, 2005.			
20	(2)	All persons engaged in the retail sale of tobacco			
21	products	or electronic smoking devices shall check the			

- 1 identification of tobacco product or electronic smoking device
- 2 purchasers to establish the [age] date of birth of the purchaser
- 3 if the purchaser reasonably appears to be [under twenty seven
- 4 years of age. born on or after January 1, 1999.
- 5 (3) It shall be an affirmative defense that the seller of
- 6 a tobacco product or an electronic smoking device to a person
- 7 [under twenty one years of age] born on or after January 1,
- 8 2005, in violation of this section had requested, examined, and
- 9 reasonably relied upon a photographic identification from the
- 10 person establishing that person's [age as at least twenty one
- 11 years of age prior to] date of birth as before January 1, 2005,
- 12 before selling the person a tobacco product or an electronic
- 13 smoking device. The failure of a seller to request and examine
- 14 photographic identification from a person [under twenty-one
- 15 years of age prior to] born on or after January 1, 2005, before
- 16 the sale of a tobacco product or an electronic smoking device to
- 17 the person shall be construed against the seller and form a
- 18 conclusive basis for the seller's violation of this section.
- 19 (4) Signs using the statement, "The sale of tobacco
- 20 products or electronic smoking devices to persons [under twenty-
- 21 one] born on or after January 1, 2005, is prohibited", shall be

- 1 posted on or near any vending machine in letters at least one-
- 2 half inch high and at or near the point of sale of any other
- 3 location where tobacco products or electronic smoking devices
- 4 are sold in letters at least one-half inch high.
- 5 (5) It shall be unlawful for a person [under twenty one
- 6 years of age] born on or after January 1, 2005, to purchase or
- 7 possess any tobacco product or electronic smoking device, as
- 8 those terms are defined in subsection (7). This provision does
- 9 not apply if a person [under the age of twenty-one, with
- 10 parental authorization, born on or after January 1, 2005, is
- 11 participating in a controlled purchase as part of a law
- 12 enforcement activity or a study authorized by the department of
- 13 health under the supervision of law enforcement to determine the
- 14 level of incidence of tobacco or electronic smoking devices
- 15 sales to persons [under-twenty one years of age.] born on or
- 16 after January 1, 2005; provided that if the person is under
- 17 eighteen years of age, the person shall have parental
- 18 authorization to participate in the law enforcement activity or
- 19 study.
- 20 (6) Any person who violates subsection (1) or (4), or
- 21 both, shall be fined \$500 for the first offense. Any subsequent



- 1 offenses shall subject the person to a fine not less than \$500
- 2 nor more than \$2,000. Any person [under twenty-one years of
- 3 age] born on or after January 1, 2005, who violates
- 4 subsection (5) shall be fined \$10 for the first offense. Any
- 5 subsequent offense shall subject the violator to a fine of \$50,
- 6 no part of which shall be suspended, or the person shall be
- 7 required to perform not less than forty-eight hours nor more
- 8 than seventy-two hours of community service during hours when
- 9 the person is not employed and is not attending school. Any
- 10 tobacco product or electronic smoking device, as those terms are
- 11 defined in subsection (7), in the person's possession at the
- 12 time of violation of subsection (5) shall be seized, summarily
- 13 forfeited to the State, and destroyed by law enforcement
- 14 following the conclusion of an administrative or judicial
- 15 proceeding finding that a violation of subsection (5) has been
- 16 committed. The procedures set forth in chapter 712A shall not
- 17 apply to this subsection.
- 18 (7) For the purposes of this section:
- "Electronic smoking device" means any electronic product
- 20 that can be used to aerosolize and deliver nicotine or other
- 21 substances to the person inhaling from the device, including but

- 1 not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar,
- 2 electronic cigarillo, or electronic pipe, and any cartridge or
- 3 other component of the device or related product.
- 4 "Tobacco product" means any product made or derived from
- 5 tobacco that contains nicotine or other substances and is
- 6 intended for human consumption or is likely to be consumed,
- 7 whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, or
- 8 ingested by other means. "Tobacco product" includes but is not
- 9 limited to a cigarette, cigar, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco,
- 10 snuff, snus, or an electronic smoking device. "Tobacco product"
- 11 does not include drugs, devices, or combination products
- 12 approved for sale by the United States Food and Drug
- 13 Administration, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food,
- 14 Drug, and Cosmetic Act."
- SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 15
- 16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2026. 17

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#### Report Title:

Tobacco Products; Electronic Smoking Devices; Incremental Prohibition; Date of Birth Restriction

#### Description:

Creates an incremental prohibition on tobacco products and electronic smoking devices by restricting their sale, possession, furnishing, or consumption in a public place to people born after 1/1/2005. Effective 1/1/2026.
