## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STRONGLY URGING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO MAINTAIN ALL REFERENCES TO THE  $100^{\text{TH}}$  INFANTRY BATTALION AND  $442^{\text{ND}}$  REGIMENTAL COMBAT TEAM ON ITS WEBSITES FOR THE PUBLIC.

1	WHEREAS, during the second world war, the United States
2	government incarcerated more than one hundred twenty thousand
3	residents of Japanese ancestry in internment camps throughout
4	the continental United States; and
5	
6	WHEREAS, more than half of the people of Japanese ancestry
7	who were forcibly detained without charges or the right to an
8	appeal were American citizens; and
9	
10	WHEREAS, thousands of Japanese Americans lost their homes,
11	rights, and freedom during this time as a direct result of
12	systemic anti-Asian racism in the United States; and
13	
14	WHEREAS, second-generation Japanese American men who were
15	born and raised in the United States were still encouraged to
16	join and were even drafted into the United States military to
17	fight for their country that classified them as "enemy aliens"
18	on the basis of their race; and
19	
20	WHEREAS, altogether, more than thirty thousand Japanese
21	Americans served with distinction in the United States military
22	in segregated units during the second world war; and
23	
24	WHEREAS, the most renowned group of Japanese Americans to
25	fight for the United States in this war was the 100 <sup>th</sup> Infantry
26	Battalion which led to the formation of the 442 <sup>nd</sup> Regimental
27	Combat Team; and
28	
29	WHEREAS, the $100^{th}$ Infantry Battalion and $442^{nd}$ Regimental
30	Combat Team were the most decorated units for their size and

1 length of service during the entire history of the United States 2 military; and 3 WHEREAS, in total, approximately fourteen thousand men 4 5 served in the 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion and 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team, the vast majority of whom were Nisei, or children of 6 Japanese immigrants born in the continental United States or the 7 Territory of Hawaii; and 8 9 WHEREAS, two-thirds of the 100th Infantry Battalion and 442nd 10 11 Regimental Combat Team were Hawaii-born Nisei, including Medal of Honor recipient and late United States Senator Daniel K. 12 13 Inouye; and 14 15 WHEREAS, Hawaii historically played a crucial role in the Indo-Pacific theater and continues to provide critical resources 16 17 to the United States military; and 18 19 WHEREAS, recognizing the history of the 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion and 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team is of vital importance 20 to acknowledging the contributions of the people of Hawaii to 21 22 securing the freedoms enjoyed by Americans today; and 23 WHEREAS, recognizing the history of the 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry 24 Battalion and 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team is fundamental to 25 26 sustaining the memory and honoring the sacrifices of the brave Japanese Americans who substantially contributed to the war 27 efforts of the United States while many of their families were 28 incarcerated by the American government on the basis of their 29 race; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, on or about March 5<sup>th</sup>, 2025, the Pentagon removed information pertaining to the 100th Infantry Battalion and 442nd 33 Regimental Combat Team from the United States Army's official 34 website amid a federal purge of content identified as being 35 related to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI); and 36 37 38 WHEREAS, Hawaii is a state composed of an extremely diverse 39 population that celebrates and respects cultural diversity, 40 equity, and inclusion; and 41

1 WHEREAS, the Legislature does not support the removal of historical references to intersectional minorities and holds 2 that the selective erasure of history is a dangerous act that 3 facilitates the repetition of horrific injustices of the past; 4 now, therefore, 5 6 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 7 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, the 8 House of Representatives concurring, that the United States 9 Department of Defense is strongly urged to maintain all 10 references to the 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion and 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental 11 Combat Team on its websites for the public; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of 14 Defense is strongly urged to maintain all references to 15 intersectional minorities in its media as the recording of 16 17 history involving those individuals who happen to be characterized as minorities is not an act of elevating 18 minorities above non-minorities; and 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Senate, with 21 the House of Representatives concurring, remain vigilant in 22 support of social justice, civil rights, equal protection, and 23 upholding the rule of law; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 26 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the United States 27 Secretary of Defense; Chief of Staff of the United States Army; 28 Chief of the National Guard Bureau; Lieutenant Governor; each 29 member of Hawaii's congressional delegation; Governor; Adjutant 30 General; Chair of the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission; Executive 31 Director of the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women; 32 President of the Japanese American Citizens League of Honolulu; 33 Office Administrator of the 100th Infantry Battalion Veterans 34 Club; President of the 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team Veterans 35 Club; Director of ACLU of Hawai'i; President of the National 36 Asian Pacific American Bar Association, Hawaii Chapter; 37 Executive Director of The Legal Clinic; and President of Hawaii 38 39 Women Lawyers.
