#### RELATING TO THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURE AND THE ARTS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill. House Bill (H.B.) No. 1378, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

- Amends Chapter 9, HRS, by adding a section to Part I to allow the State Foundation
  on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to acquire any property or interest in property to
  hold, maintain, use, and operate; and to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose to support
  SFCA's mission and for maintenance, security, operations, or renovations of
  facilities controlled by SFCA.
- Establishes the Performing Arts Grants Program (PAGP) within SFCA to provide grants for the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events.
- Establishes the Performing Arts Special Fund (PASF) to be administered by SFCA
  to be used for the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of
  performing arts events.
- Amends Section 9-1, HRS, to define "performing arts."

- Amends Section 9-21, HRS, to amend the purpose of SFCA to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events.
- Amends Section 9-22, HRS, to amend the funding source of the State Art Museum from the Works of Art Special Fund (WOASF) to appropriations from the Legislature, federal grants and subsidies, voluntary contributions, and funds received pursuant to Section 9-3(7), HRS.
- Amends Section 103-8.5, HRS, to: establish a cap on the amount transferred into the WOASF; amend the allowable use of the WOASF to only costs related to the acquisition, planning, design, and construction of works of art; require agencies receiving capital improvement appropriations to calculate their proportionate share of the total annual amount transferred into the WOASF; and establish a cap on the unencumbered fund balance of the WOASF.
- Appropriates or authorizes 17.50 full-time equivalent (FTE) permanent positions and \$4,028,811 in general funds and 4.50 FTE permanent positions and \$283,962 in federal funds for FY 26 and FY 27 for SFCA.
- Appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds in FY 26 and FY 27 to SFCA to provide grants under the PAGP.

B&F supports the general intent of the bill to establish a tax compliant process on the utilization of bond proceeds to support the WOASF, and to create funding stability for SFCA general operations. However, implementing a cap on transfers into the WOASF will be very difficult to implement because currently, capital improvement program (CIP) appropriations <u>do not</u> specify the amount of the total appropriation that is for construction. Further, the proposed amendments seem to imply that works-of-art

allocations are to be made from each project regardless of whether the CIP project is implemented or not.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special fund, which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work, and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Regarding H.B. No. 1378, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, it is difficult to determine if the PASF would be self-sustaining.

Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

This bill (1) establishes the Performing Arts Grants Program within the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to support performing arts, (2) expands SFCA's responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events, (3) amends the permitted uses of the Works of Art Special Fund (WASF) and the amounts required to be transferred by agencies into the WASF, (4) amends the fundings sources for the State Art Museum, and (5) allows SFCA to acquire, hold, and own property.

The WASF, established by section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), consists of one percent of the cost element of all state fund appropriations for the construction and renovation of state buildings. The WASF is generally funded by tax-exempt general obligation bonds. To maintain the tax-exempt status of the general obligation bonds, WASF moneys must be used in a manner that is consistent with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. **Using the tax-exempt general obligation bond proceeds for operating purposes may jeopardize the tax-exempt status of the bonds.** See Treasury Regulations, 26 C.F. R § 1.148-1(c)(4)(iii) (definition of replacement proceeds), and 26 C.F. R § 1.148-10(a)(4) (overburdening the tax-exempt market).

This bill amends section 103-8.5(a), HRS (page 8, line 18, through page 9, line 8), by putting a cap on the total amount transferred to the WASF per fiscal year. However, the bill does not specify how the caps on transfers into the WASF are implemented and how the Comptroller will segregate the excess funds in a way that the tax-exempt general obligation bonds are not calculated or transferred along with the excess funds. If the Legislature intends to transfer moneys from the WASF to the general fund, this could negatively impact the tax-exempt status of the general obligation bonds.

Additionally, the bill amends section 103-8.5(c), HRS (page 10, line 20, through page 11, line 10), by establishing a maximum unencumbered balance for the WASF in the previous fiscal year to prevent additional transfers of the one percent of appropriations. This bill further amends section 103-8.5(e), HRS (page 11, line 12, through page 12, line 2), requiring agencies receiving capital improvement appropriations to calculate their "proportionate share of the total annual amount" to be transferred into the WASF. Currently, the Comptroller provides each user agency receiving capital improvement appropriations with criteria to determine which appropriations are subject to the one percent assessment. The user agencies then request, on an allotment basis, the transfer of one percent of the construction costs to the SFCA.

Because the bill does not clarify how the Comptroller or agencies should calculate the total amount and their proportionate share of the WASF, user agencies would not be able to determine when the WASF reaches its cap on transfers. Because there are no cost elements for capital improvement appropriations when appropriations bills are signed into law, it is not possible to calculate both the total amount to be transferred into the WASF or a user agency's proportionate share at that time. The bill also does not explain how the cap will be monitored; therefore, it will be difficult to find an equitable implementation of the cap on transfers into the WASF to determine which capital improvement projects will be subject to the WASF transfer.

We recommend that the Committee work with the Department of Budget and Finance and the Department of Accounting and General Services to resolve the

implementation problems in the bill, both to prevent jeopardizing the tax-exempt status of general obligation bonds and to clarify how agencies would calculate their share of transfers to the WASF. We note that the House Draft 1 version of the bill does not present such implementation difficulties.

Further, the Senate Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts added an amendment in Senate Draft 1 (S.D. 1) that would allow for SFCA to acquire, and hold, and own property (page 3, line 17, through page 4, line 6). The original "purpose of the [bill was] to: (1) [e]stablish the Performing Arts Grants Program under the [SFCA]'s existing grant program, to support performing arts in the State; (2) [c]larify the scope of [SFCA]'s responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events; and (3) [a]ppropriate funds to provide grants under the Performing Arts Grants Program. H. Stand. Comm. Rep. No. 681. The amendment made in S.D. 1 appears to be related to neither the Performing Arts Grants Program nor the clarification of the scope of SFCA's responsibilities and may give rise to a germaneness challenge under article III, section 15, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. See League of Women Voters of Honolulu v. State, 150 Hawai'i 182 (2021). To address this issue, the Department suggests deleting the amendment, or in the alternative, if the Committee passes this bill as currently drafted in S.D. 1, then three new readings in each house be given on this bill.

Chair Dela Cruz and members of the Committee.

The SFCA **OPPOSES** H.B.1378 H.D.2 S.D.1 which amends the Works of Art Special Fund and shifts much of the Art in Public Places program funding to a General Fund appropriation for the following reasons:

- With the current Federal cuts to Hawaii programs, we are concerned if the Art in Public Places program and positions are moved from Special Fund to State general funds and there is a State general fund shortfall, there will be no alternative funding source to support the SFCA and therefore the agency will cease to function.
- Regarding the works of art special fund and proceeds from G.O. bonds we are in discussion with Budget and Finance and believe any changes can be addressed in the Operational Expenditure Plan and with a Comptroller Memorandum by tracking the source of the bond proceeds and monitoring its use rather than cutting programs and amending 103-8.5, which would destabilize arts and culture funding in the state.
- Rather than limiting the use of the Works of Art Special Fund as outlined in HB1378HD2 SD1, the 2014 legislative audit and many Senators have proposed expanding the use of the works of art special fund. We should consider exploring that option in this time of Federal financial uncertainty.
- Since the inception of the Works of Art Special Fund in 1989, the fund has supported staff services. If there is concern over its use for salaries, the positions financed through the Works of Art Special Fund can be supported through the general fund in the state budget bill without amending 103-8.5.
- Regarding H.B.1378 H.D.2 S.D.1 SECTION 6 which amends the Works of Art Special fund 103-8.5 HRS, the SFCA is grateful for the support of the legislature to fund the Art in Public Places Program though a General Fund appropriation in the State's budget, yet the SFCA **OPPOSES** amending 103-8.5 HRS by lining out much of section (b).
  - o (b) The works of art special fund shall be used solely for [the following purposes:
- Costs] costs related to the acquisition of works of art—
  including any consultant or staff services required to carry
  out the art in public places and relocatable works of art—
  programs; (2) Site modifications, display, and interpretive work
  necessary for the exhibition of works of art; (3) Upkeep—
  services, including maintenance, repair, and restoration of
  works of art; (4) Storing and transporting works of art]

Based on these issues, we do not see how H.B. 1378 H.D.2 S.D.1 will benefit the people of Hawaii and question its intent. This dedicated funding source if dismantled, would eliminate the assurance of culture and arts funding for generations to come.

As Chair of the Board of Commissioners for the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, I write to express my strong opposition to House Bill 1378 SD1 (HB1378). This bill is reckless, short-sighted and destructive. It would eliminate the only dedicated and sustainable funding source for the arts in Hawai'i, dealing devastating blow to sector that is essential to our economy, cultural heritage and community well-being.

Economic Consequences: HB1378 will rip funding away from a proven economic driver. The Works of Art Special Fund fuels a thriving creative economy, providing jobs, supporting local businesses, and ensuring that state dollars stay in Hawai'i to benefit its people. Eliminating it will mean lost jobs, shuttered programs and a diminished cultural sector that will negatively impact tourism, education, and commerce.

Any changes to arts funding should be approached with transparency, collaboration and a clear understanding of the broader consequences.

HB1378 is a deeply flawed and harmful piece of legislation that must be stopped. I urge you to reject this bill and preserve the Works of Art Special Fund, ensuring that Hawai'i's culture, economy, and communities continue to thrive.

The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) provides comments on HB1378, HD2, SD1, which establishes a new Performing Arts Grants Program and Special Fund, and makes various amendments to Section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, modifies the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' (SFCA) responsibilities and methods of financing.

DBEDT supports the establishment of a Performing Arts Program and Special Fund and the intent of the bill to establish a compliant process on the utilization of the bond proceeds and create stability within the SFCA. However, as respectfully covered by Budget and Finance, utilization of bond proceeds are subject to specific tax regulations of the Internal Revenue Service and could have unintended consequences when expenditures to not align.

DBEDT understands there are concerns raised by SFCA and community in Section 6 of the bill, regarding amending the Works of Arts Special Fund, which would alter the method of financing (MOF) of current positions funded through Section 103-8.5 to general funds.

We encourage continued dialogue between the SFCA, state agencies, the arts community and lawmakers to strike a balance, amend where necessary, while sustaining the intent and purpose of the one percent law passed by the Legislature in 1989. In uncertain economic times, it is crucial to maintain this valuable resource for the preservation of Hawai'i's arts and cultural community and its legacy, today and in the future.

Dear Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, and Members of the Committee,

The Chamber of Sustainable Commerce represents over 460 small businesses and entrepreneurs across the state that strive for a triple bottom line: people, planet and prosperity. As small business owners who believe we can strengthen Hawaii's economy without hurting workers, consumers, communities or the environment, we ask Committee members to oppose HB1378 which dismantles the Works of Art Special Fund and the percent-for-art law, the cornerstone of our state's investment in the arts. By slashing arts funding, HB1378 would crumble the state's commitment to cultural and economic sustainability in Hawaii, and have long-term reverberating effects.

#### The Arts as an Economic Engine

Recent data published by the ASPCSA shows that the arts and cultural nonprofit sector in the US grew at more than twice the rate of the total economy between 2022 and 2023, contributing more than \$1.2 trillion to the economy. Cutting arts funding weakens local business, reduces tourism revenue and eliminates jobs in sectors that support Hawaii's unique identity.

#### The Arts are Essential to Mental and Emotional Wellbeing

The arts are far more than an aesthetic pursuit—they are a vital part of maintaining and improving mental and emotional well-being. From providing therapeutic outlets for self-expression to reducing anxiety, depression, and trauma, the arts offer powerful tools for healing, resilience, and social connection. Support for the arts is not just about enriching culture, but also about fostering healthier, more connected communities. Investments in the arts are investments in the overall well-being of individuals and society as a whole.

#### Improved Academic Motivation and Achievement

The Arts and Achievement in At-Risk Youth: Findings from Four Longitudinal Studies (Catterall, 2013) study revealed that students with a high level of involvement in the arts performed better on standardized tests in reading and mathematics compared to students with limited arts involvement. The study emphasized that arts education plays a crucial role in closing the achievement gap for underserved students. The Arts and Achievement study also found that students involved in arts

A 2010 report by the Wallace Foundation titled "The Impact of Arts Education on Workforce Preparation" emphasizes that arts education programs help students build important non-cognitive skills, such as perseverance, time management, and teamwork, which contribute to improved academic and social outcomes. The NEA's Creativity Connects report in 2018 highlights the relationship between arts education and long-term career outcomes, noting that students with a strong background in the arts tend to have higher earnings and greater career satisfaction.

Public investment in the arts leads to better educational outcomes by improving academic performance, enhancing student engagement, fostering social and emotional development, and increasing graduation rates. The evidence from numerous studies underscores the importance of supporting arts education as a means to not only enhance students' academic experiences but also to prepare them for successful futures in the workforce and society. Investing in the arts is not just a cultural expenditure, but a strategic investment in the future success of students and communities. So... Why does the state consistently show intent to reduce its investment in the arts?

#### Colonization and Cultural Erasure

Given Hawaii's history of colonization, the cutting of arts education can be viewed as a form of cultural erasure that perpetuates a colonizing mindset. Reductions in funding for the arts disproportionately affect schools in low-income and minority communities, where arts programs often provide opportunities for cultural expression and identity reinforcement.

In Education and the Arts: Towards a Colonizing Mindset, the author explores how educational policy decisions that cut arts funding are directly linked to historical practices of cultural assimilation and erasure, particularly for Indigenous populations. The reduction of arts education limits the ability for students to engage with their heritage and cultural practices, thereby perpetuating the dominance of mainstream (often Western) cultural values. Arts education plays an important role in affirming cultural identity, especially for minority and Indigenous students. The removal of funding for these programs often reflects and contributes to a broader colonial agenda that undervalues non-Western cultures and ways of knowing. Studies show that when arts education is marginalized, it deepens the sense of alienation for students from historically oppressed groups.

At a time when federal funding uncertainties loom, economic hardships skyrocket and mental and emotional wellbeing continues to decline, not is not the time to cut essential arts funding. We ask committee members to protect our future and protect the Works of Art Special Fund.

The Hawai'i Community Foundation (HCF) strongly opposes House Bill 1378 HD2 SD1 regarding the works of arts special fund (Section 6). HCF has a long history of partnering with the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to increase access to arts education at public and charter schools through the Artists in the Schools program. This educational program is supported by this fund and restricting use of the fund will greatly reduce access to arts education for keiki throughout the state. Philanthropy does not have sufficient resources to address the potential shortfall.

If enacted, HB 1378 HD2 SD1 will restrict the use of this fund to costs related to the acquisition, planning, design, and construction of works of art. Capping the revenue and shifting State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' operating funding and funding for interpretive work which includes arts education away from this dedicated source, risks stability to SFCA and the greater community which benefits from many programs that are supported by this special fund.

HCF believes that when opportunities to practice and participate in arts and culture are inclusive and accessible to everyone, from keiki to kūpuna, we will have a healthier community in Hawai'i. HCF is committed to increasing access to arts and culture as one of the six essential sectors of the CHANGE Framework.

While HB 1378 HD2 SD1 provides that general and federal funds can be appropriated to finance positions and other costs of SFCA, these funds are not guaranteed over time and jeopardizes stable funding for arts and culture. With the uncertainty of federal funding and the need to address many priorities in the state, it is essential to maintain funding to provide stability to the arts and culture community which contributes significantly to the well-being of our whole community.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair, and Committee Members:

The Hawai'i Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) strongly opposes HB1378-HD2, which threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding in Hawai'i by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund. While we recognize the bill includes some positive provisions, the loss of a dedicated funding source for the arts will have severe and lasting consequences for our communities.

HHHRC has been privileged to work alongside the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and Capitol Modern, which has served as a safe haven for our local LGBTQIA+ community. Through their support, Capitol Modern has hosted events like Rainbow Prom, Transgender Day of Visibility, and World AIDS Day, creating a space where our LGBTQIA+ community can celebrate, find support, and build resilience. These events are more than just gatherings, they are lifelines for many individuals who often feel unseen and unsupported.

#### HB1378 Puts Hawai'i's Arts Sector at Risk

- 1. **No Permanent Funding** The bill offers only a temporary \$4 million allocation for fiscal years 2026 and 2027, with no long-term commitment. Without a dedicated source of funding, the future of arts and cultural programs remains uncertain.
- Unstable and Competitive Funding Sources By shifting arts funding to general funds and federal grants, this bill forces the arts sector to compete with other essential services like housing, education, and healthcare—sectors that already struggle for adequate resources.
- 3. Loss of a Critical Safety Net The Works of Art Special Fund has ensured that Hawai'i's arts sector remains resilient, even during economic downturns. Eliminating this fund leaves arts organizations vulnerable to budget cuts and shifting state priorities.
- 4. **A False Trade-Off** While short-term financial allocations may seem beneficial, sacrificing a dedicated funding source ultimately weakens the arts ecosystem rather than



strengthening it. A thriving arts sector contributes to economic growth, community engagement, and overall well-being.

At HHHRC, we see firsthand how the arts provide healing, connection, and a sense of belonging, especially for marginalized communities. We also see at the federal level how programs and services for our queer communities are increasingly under attack. Now is not the time to weaken support for the very institutions that protect and uplift us. The arts do more than preserve culture; they provide safe spaces for expression, advocacy, and social change.

The arts are not a luxury, they are a necessity. They preserve our cultural heritage, promote public health, and provide a platform for marginalized communities to share their stories. As an organization committed to harm reduction and community wellness, we urge lawmakers to protect the Works of Art Special Fund and reject HB1378-HD2.

We respectfully ask the committee to **OPPOSE HB1378-HD2** and seek alternative solutions that do not jeopardize long-term arts funding.

I'm writing on behalf of Creative West, a regional arts service organization serving 16 states and jurisdictions including Hawai'i, to respectfully oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1. This bill introduces major concerns—especially the restriction of the Works of Art Special Fund and lack of clarity around its governance and funding with new unplanned proposals to amend its focus.

Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts is one of Creative West's participating state arts agencies and we believe an exceptional partner in providing much needed support and leadership for the arts community in the state. The State Foundation is distinctive, among peers nationally, in its expansive arts in public places programming, innovative arts education programs, and support of traditional and contemporary arts in a cross-cultural context.

The Works of Art Special Fund is a critical component of the State Foundation's mandate overall and has been particularly important in supporting the Foundation's efforts to expand support of Native Hawaiian artists. From 2020 to 2023, \$2,902,653.61 from the Works of Art Special Fund has been allocated to support acquisitions, contracts, exhibitions, social media, and conservation related to Native Hawaiian works of art. Because of the staff services required in deepening relationships with the Native Hawaiian artists and curators, it is vitally important that the State Foundation retain latitude in the use of Works of Art Special Fund resources for costs related to the acquisition of works of art, including any consultant or staff services required to carry out the art in public places and relocatable works of art programs.

Therefore, the lack of clarity surrounding HB1378-HD2-SD1's unplanned proposals to amend its focus, poses a significant threat. These ambiguities not only jeopardize recent gains in support of Native Hawaiian artists but also create instability for essential programs like

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
Artists-in-the-Schools and Art in Public Places, potentially disrupting the established and effective support systems that are crucial for Hawaii's cultural and educational well-being.

#### Why We Strongly Oppose SB1378:

#### 1. The Bill Threatens Long-Term Arts Funding

Senate Bill 1378 proposes restrictions to the Works of Art Special Fund—the only consistent, dedicated, and sustainable source of public funding for arts and culture in Hawai'i. Eliminating or weakening this vital fund would have devastating consequences: significant cuts to already underfunded programs, loss of jobs, and diminished opportunities for artists, organizations, and communities across the islands. Rather than scaling back, we must reinforce our investment in Hawai'i's cultural future.


### 2. Arts & Culture Are Integral to Hawai'i's Identity and Economy

The arts are not ancillary—they are essential. They preserve and amplify our cultural heritage, strengthen education, and contribute substantially to the state's economic and social well-being. Hawai'i's identity is deeply intertwined with its artistic and cultural expression; removing dedicated support would erode this core part of who we are and who we present to the world.

#### 3. General Funds Are Neither Stable Nor Reliable

While SB1378 proposes a temporary general fund appropriation, it fails to offer a sustainable long-term solution. General funds are vulnerable to shifting priorities and economic fluctuations. With ongoing uncertainty surrounding federal funding, there is a high risk that the arts will be deprioritized in future budgets—leaving cultural programs without the support they need to survive, let alone thrive. Any dilution of the percent-for-art law would disproportionately impact Native Hawaiian and local artists, galleries, and nonprofits.

Hawai'i Contemporary is a direct beneficiary of the Works of Art Special Fund. With support from the SFCA, the Hawai'i Triennial has expanded its reach, now spanning 14 sites across three islands. The 2025 edition (HT25), which opened on February 15, exemplifies the transformative potential of this investment—not just in exhibitions, but in community engagement, education, and economic impact.



The Triennial draws over 100,000 visitors each cycle, generating significant economic activity across the islands. The 2022 Hawai'i Triennial, with a budget of \$3.6 million, yielded an estimated economic impact of \$1.7 million from local attendees and a remarkable \$60.82 million from out-of-town visitors, according to data from AmericansForTheArts.org.

HT25 elevates Hawai'i's global profile as a hub for creativity, innovation, and cultural exchange. It attracts culturally engaged travelers, fosters international partnerships (e.g., the Art Summit), and boosts local visibility through strategic media collaborations. This level of impact would not be possible without stable, dedicated funding.

Investing in the arts is not only culturally enriching—it is economically smart. The arts fuel tourism, stimulate local business activity, and create jobs across sectors. A vibrant arts ecosystem enhances Hawai'i's appeal to skilled workers, entrepreneurs, and investors, serving as a powerful engine for economic diversification and long-term resilience.

Artists and creative professionals are also drivers of innovation. Their ideas, ventures, and collaborations spark new industries and solutions, positioning Hawai'i to lead in an increasingly creative global economy.

Senate Bill 1378 puts Hawai'i's cultural future and economic potential at risk. The Works of Art Special Fund is not merely a budget line—it is a lifeline for our creative community and a catalyst for statewide prosperity. I urge you to reject SB1378 and stand with the artists, educators, cultural leaders, and communities who make Hawai'i a place of enduring creativity and innovation.

On behalf of the board of directors, staff, and 450 members of the Donkey Mill Art Center, I respectfully submit this testimony **in continued strong opposition to HB1378 HD2-SD1.** 

While the original intention of this bill—to establish a performing arts grant program—is welcomed and supported by many, HB 1378 HD2-SD1 has turned into a vehicle to restructure a committed funding source for HSFCA, which we strongly oppose. As a visual arts and culture center, the Donkey Mill Art Center deeply respects and supports all forms of artistic expression, including the performing arts, often incorporating them into our youth programs. However, the proposed changes, including restrictions on the Works of Art Special Fund, and shift to general fund appropriations are deeply concerning and pose a significant threat to the arts and culture ecosystem across our state.

Since its establishment in 1967, the Works of Art Special Fund has been a cornerstone of Hawai'i's creative and cultural community and has provided an incredible amount of security to the sector. Altering its structure or imposing limitations jeopardizes the sustainability of organizations like ours and undermines our ability to effectively serve our community. For these reasons, we oppose HB1378 HD2-SD1 in its current form.

#### Why Now Is the Wrong Time for This Change

#### 1. HB1378 HD2-SD1 Jeopardizes Long-Term Funding for the Arts.

The bill restricts the Works of Art Special Fund, which is the only dedicated and sustainable source of public funding for arts and culture statewide. Without it, Hawai'i's creative community will face deep cuts, leaving programs, jobs, and future opportunities at risk.

#### 2. General Funds Are Not a Reliable Replacement.

The proposed general fund appropriation is temporary and comes with no guarantee of future support. As federal funds diminish, general funds will likely be diverted to essential services such as health, housing, and education—leaving the arts with little to no funding at all.

#### 3. Arts and Culture Are Essential to Hawai'i's Identity and Economy.

The arts not only preserve our cultural heritage but also contribute to tourism, education, and community well-being. We need stable, dedicated funding to ensure arts and culture can thrive for future generations.

#### Impact on Donkey Mill Art Center and the Arts Ecosystem

The Donkey Mill Art Center serves as a vital resource in Kailua-Kona on Hawai'i Island, providing arts and cultural opportunities for over 5,000 people annually. Our mission is to strengthen and support individual and collective well-being through hands-on classes, exhibitions, and cultural events in the visual arts.

Of particular importance is our Youth Education Program, which has provided keiki ages 2–17 with access to arts and cultural education for 30 years. This program is supported in part by the SFCA's Artist in the Schools program, funded by the Works of Art Special Fund. These funds allow us to serve over 400 West Hawai'i keiki annually at under-resourced Title I schools such as Kahakai Elementary and Holualoa Elementary and provides professional development opportunities to our teaching artists and classroom teachers.

Through this funding, we integrate visual arts, literature, performing arts, environmental studies, and 'āina-based learning to nurture our students' sense of self, family, community, and world. For schools and communities with limited resources, programs like these are invaluable and must be preserved.

We respectfully urge you to vote NO to HB1378 HD2-SD1 in its current form and preserve the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund. Dismantling this vital funding mechanism would have far-reaching consequences, particularly for rural communities and under-resourced schools like ours.

As a nonprofit professional, a resident and tax payer of West Hawai'i, and a lifelong advocate of the arts and education, I am writing to urge you either to **oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1.** 

This bill will cut dedicated funding used for arts education by 100%, and replaces it with less than half the current budgeted amount in general funds. If passed, this cut would have an extremely detrimental impact not only to our organization, but to the thousands of people in West Hawai'i that we serve each year at the Donkey Mill Art Center with critical arts programs, free gallery exhibitions and community events.

The Donkey Mill Art Center has been delivering high quality arts education programming for 30 years including through the Artists in the Schools program. Thanks specifically to fund support from the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA), we are **able to serve over 400 elementary students** in local area schools this year alone. And half of the AITS-granted schools still do not have a dedicated arts specialist on staff. If arts education funding is cut by these extremes, many students will not have any specialized arts education time in their school day. Not only is this extremely inequitable, but countless studies have proven that arts experiences result in improved mental health, stronger community relationships, and creative problemsolving skills. Our keiki deserve *more* than what we are currently offering them, *not less*. By cutting arts education funds, we would be doing a disservice to them, our community and our future community.

Additionally, through the Mill's curatorial work, Hawai'i State has acquired and recognized many artists from rural communities, including Hawai'i Island, at various career stages. It provides them supplemental income through the sale of their work. SFCA's **Art in Public Places** Collection directly supports artists and it reflects the evolving dialogue of arts across Hawai'i—a record of our shared history and humanity. The artwork managed and displayed by SFCA is not only enjoyable, it provides a sense of collective identity, belonging and connection.

Furthermore, please do not forget: arts and culture are not just about creative expression—they are a major economic driver in Hawai'i. The creative sector employs over 20,000 Hawai'i residents and generates \$3.3 billion annually, fueling local businesses and economic growth.

If you want to encourage economic growth and help keep families of Hawai'i in Hawai'i, don't cut support that threatens jobs and shrink already limited educational resources for youth.

Let's keep supporting what makes living in Hawai'i truly vibrant: its people.

We provide educational art walks, conduct art research, and offer gig work opportunities for emerging artists and art professionals. I am here to express my strong opposition to HB1378-HD2. This measure threatens the economic viability of our creative sector, the preservation of Hawai'i's cultural heritage, and the educational opportunities it provides.

Investing in the arts is not merely an expenditure; it is a strategic investment in our state's economic and cultural resilience. Maintaining stable funding for the arts is critical in times of fiscal uncertainty. It safeguards jobs, supports educational programs, and ensures the preservation of cultural assets that contribute significantly to our tourism industry and community well-being.

#### **Key Points:**

HB1378-HD2: A Detriment to Hawai'i's Creative Economy and Workforce Development:

This bill's proposed changes to the Works of Art Special Fund will directly impact the ability of organizations like Exhibition Grid to provide valuable gig work and training opportunities for emerging artists and art professionals.

The resulting reduction in funding will destabilize the creative sector, leading to job losses and hindering economic growth in an industry that contributes significantly to our state's revenue.

General Funds: An Unreliable Foundation for Sustainable Cultural and Educational Initiatives:

Relying solely on general fund appropriations creates an unstable environment for arts organizations and educational programs.

Arts funding is often the first to be cut during fiscal constraints, jeopardizing long-term planning and the continuity of vital cultural and educational initiatives.

My name is Vicki Boswell, and I am writing to express my strong **OPPOSITION** to HB1378, which threatens critical funding for arts and culture in Hawai'i. As a former Molokai social worker with over 20 years of experience as a mobile crisis counselor, elementary school counselor, and family therapist for families caught in the Child Protective Services system, I have seen firsthand the profound need for social-emotional development programs for our keiki. In response to this need, I founded Hokulani Children's Theatre of Molokai (Hokulani CTOM) 2.5 years ago to provide our island's children with a space to learn vital skills that foster confidence, emotional resilience, and community engagement.

### **Key Points**

#### The Arts Are a Lifeline for Vulnerable Populations

Hokulani CTOM is the **only** ongoing performing arts education program on Molokai, serving both **keiki and kūpuna**, two of the island's most vulnerable populations. Research has consistently demonstrated the benefits of performing arts education for children, particularly those facing adversity. According to a report by the **National Endowment for the Arts**, students from low-income backgrounds who are highly involved in the arts are **five times more likely** to graduate high school and **twice as likely** to earn a bachelor's degree compared to their peers with minimal arts exposure.

#### **HB1378 Jeopardizes Long-Term Funding for the Arts**

The Works of Art Special Fund is the only **dedicated and sustainable** source of public funding for arts and culture statewide. Restricting this fund will have **disastrous effects** on small communities like Molokai, where arts programs already struggle for resources. Without stable funding, programs like Hokulani CTOM will be unable to continue providing essential services that empower children and elders through artistic expression.

# General Funds Are Not a Reliable Replacement

HB1378 proposes shifting funding to the general fund, but this is an unreliable alternative. General funds are subject to shifting priorities and economic downturns, often leaving arts programs underfunded or eliminated altogether. Given the financial constraints faced by small communities, the loss of dedicated arts funding could mean the permanent closure of Molokai's only performing arts education program.

# **Arts Education Builds Stronger, More Resilient Communities**

Studies show that students engaged in the arts demonstrate improved cognitive skills, emotional intelligence, and academic performance. The **American Alliance for Theatre & Education** reports that students involved in drama programs have higher standardized test scores and stronger reading comprehension. Furthermore, arts participation has been linked to **lower rates of juvenile delinquency**, reinforcing the role of arts education in crime prevention and social well-being.

## **Conclusion**

I urge you to **OPPOSE HB1378** and protect the Works of Art Special Fund, which has been essential in sustaining arts education and cultural preservation across Hawai'i. Eliminating dedicated funding for the arts would not only stifle creative expression but also diminish opportunities for our keiki and kūpuna to build confidence, resilience, and a sense of belonging.

Aloha! It's Nicole Duarte; I've written to you before and I'm writing to you yet again in **strong opposition to HB1378-HD2.** 

Today, I write to you from the Davies Pacific Center, where I am sitting as an exhibition attendant for Hawai'i Triennial 2025 (HT25), the state's largest exhibition of contemporary art from here, the Pacific, and beyond. (The International Biennial Association recently called HT25 one of the most significant in the region.) Here, I greet visitors and talk to them about the exhibition, while I work on the catalog for the Triennial, field media requests, make updates to our website, and submit online testimony to the State legislature. Like so many people in Hawai'i, we, in the arts, wear many hats—and some of us work multiple jobs and take on freelance work to make ends meet. Our world has always been a bit of a tenuous mix of shifting sands—made even more precarious by the current presidential administration—but one thing we could count on in Hawai'i was the Works of Art Special Fund. This fund, as you know, supports more than just works of art, it supports exhibition making, arts-related programming, and the people who look to the arts for enrichment and well-being.

I should probably tell you that HB1378-HD2 jeopardizes the long-term funding and stability that the Works of Art Special Fund provides, undermining the critical funding on which organizations and artists operate and fundraise, as I'm sure you're aware. But my mind can't help but think about all of the visitors to the Triennial, the participants in the Triennial's public programming, and the students who have made field trips to the exhibition with their classes. For students who are immersed in STEM curriculum, the exhibition—and the visual arts in general—offers a different mode of visual-based learning, an opportunity to absorb teachings outside of a classroom setting, a chance to gain visual literacy, and practice critical thinking skills. Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and members of the Committee

My name is Amy Rose Craig, and I am an artist, educator, and advocate for arts funding that prioritizes the visual arts, community engagement, and the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund. I submit this testimony in strong opposition to this bill, which seeks to divert funds from the existing Works of Art Special Fund and expand the responsibilities of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) beyond its original mission.

#### Concerns with the Bill

1. Misallocation of the Works of Art Special Fund

The Works of Art Special Fund was established to support public visual art installations, conservation, and education. This bill seeks to dilute those resources by expanding allowable uses to include performing arts events, marketing, and administrative costs that were never part of the original intent. Expanding SFCA's responsibilities without adequate planning, expertise, or infrastructure may lead to inefficiencies and mismanagement.

# 3. Threat to Visual Arts Funding

By removing clear funding allocations for visual arts and introducing vague language about grants and operational costs, this bill risks deprioritizing the creation, preservation, and exhibition of public art. Visual artists, educators, and conservators rely on the Works of Art Special Fund, and any reallocation reduces opportunities for new commissions, maintenance of existing artworks, and community arts education.

# 4. Lack of Fiscal Transparency and Oversight

The bill does not provide a clear funding cap for the proposed Performing Arts Grants Program, nor does it establish safeguards to prevent the depletion of existing visual arts funds. Without proper oversight, this could lead to significant financial strain on SFCA's current projects and reduce its ability to fulfill existing commitments.

# 5. Alternative Avenues for Performing Arts Funding Already Exist

The performing arts are already supported through multiple state, federal, and nonprofit grant programs, including the Hawaii State Foundation's existing grants program. Rather than forcing SFCA to redirect funds away from public art, a separate funding mechanism should be established for performing arts initiatives.

#### Conclusion

While performing arts are an essential component of Hawaii's cultural landscape, this bill undermines the foundational mission of the SFCA and threatens to erode critical funding for public visual art. Instead of repurposing existing funds, lawmakers should explore alternative funding sources for performing arts grants that do not jeopardize Hawaii's visual arts programs.

For these reasons, I urge the committee to oppose this bill and to protect the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund for its intended purpose.

Mahalo for all you do for the people of Hawai'i.

I write today to **OPPOSE HB1378-HD2-SD1.** There are many reasons why this bill is harmful. Here are just a few:

- 1. SECTION 6 of HB1378-SD1 changes the law on Section 103-8.5, HRS. This cuts 100% the dedicated funding from the Works of Art Special Fund (WOASF) for arts education, the art in public places program, relocatable works of art programs, art display, upkeep, maintenance, repair, staff services, and restoration services, storage and transportation of art.
  - Currently the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) receives \$5.5 million from the Works of Art Special Fund (WOASF). This bill would reduce the amount SFCA receives from this fund, disallow its usage for the above programs and services, and instead replace that with only \$4,028,811 in general funds to cover all the above referenced items AND the salaries of 17.50 Full-Time Equivalents of the SFCA staff. Further, general funds are not guaranteed funding. They can be reduced or cut at any time.
- 2. This is not the time to put more burden on the State's general funds. It's important to note that the most recent general fund appropriations for SFCA's operations and staffing have been around \$1 million (not including the special appropriations for Bishop Museum and Iolani Palace). In this time when the entire state is searching for ways to cover the loss of federal funds with state general funds, I don't see how the legislature can go from appropriating \$1 million to SFCA to appropriating over \$4 million. Where would that come from? The only responsible and sound choice to make in this economic environment is to maintain the current law and usage of the Works of Art Special Fund by opposing HB1378-HB2-SD1.
- 3. **This bill pushes SFCA to depend even more on federal funds**, which we all know are under threat by the administration of the current President of the United States. This bill pushes for 4.5 Full-Time-Equivalent staff salaries to be funded by federal funds. Further, three of the SFCA staff members are listed as being 100% funded by federal grants. What will the Legislature do if those federal funds don't come through? Furlough and cut these

staff members? Or appropriate more general funds for these positions?

4. **Not so special**. This bill purports to establish a "performing arts grants special fund." This sounds terrific at first glance, but upon examination of the funding sources, there is in fact nothing "special" about this "special fund." It is still dependent on general appropriations, federal funds, unspecified revenue, and adds donations and grants received. In doing so, it seems this bill is attempting to transform the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts from a State Arts Agency into a quasi-nonprofit. This effectively puts SFCA and the State in direct competition for private grants and donations with the very nonprofit arts organizations we aim to support. I believe this will exponentially harm the arts economy of Hawaii.

I'm writing to respectfully oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1. Please protect the integrity of the SFCA and vote NO on HB1378-HD2-SD1. This bill restricts the Works of Art Special Fund, halving funding to the Artists in the Schools grant, and limiting the role arts can play in our communities in multiple ways. Besides these initial cuts, it puts the arts on shaky ground regarding funding going forward.

I am a teaching artist on the Hawaii State Teaching Artists Roster. Through the Artists In The Schools grant I bring visual arts projects to students who don't otherwise get art experiences, and use drawing and painting to illuminate their learning in Science. They learn to observe closely, be creative thinkers, and make meaning out of their learning. In my residency this year, working in the Maui High Marine Science classroom I worked with 170 students. They used various art processes to visualize the first cellular life, the first diverse multicellular life of the Cambrian Explosion, and to study the skeletal structure of extinct whales and to imagine what they would have looked like. Next, they will be creating paintings of Hawaii near-shore reef species, connecting their learning to species in our coral reefs. These opportunities will be limited or lost by the changes to funding caused by this bill.

This is just one of many experiences I have created to meet teacher and student needs in the classroom over my 20 years as a teaching artist on Maui. I teach students to observe closely, and to be creative problem solvers-- skills that serve people in all professions, skills our islands need more than ever. The arts also teach us that our own perspective matters, and to value how other people see the world. In order to find our way forward, on my home island of Maui, in Hawaii, and in our country and planet, we need this. Please do NOT cut funding to the Works of Art Special Fund and put art funding on shaky ground.

Art is a tool for inquiry and illuminating our world, for making things we can't quite fathom visible, for exploring thoughts and feelings that have no other avenue--and that can lead to discoveries, ideas, and solutions that change our world. Art is necessary for wellbeing, for mental health, for innovation. Its impacts are more often qualitative than quantitative, so it has to fight for funding. However, cutting the arts, especially art experiences that reach students in our schools, is watering down the quality of our future.

My name is Kelsey Angel Baehrens and I'm writing to respectfully oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1. This bill introduces major concerns—especially the restriction of the Works of Art Special Fund and lack of clarity around governance and funding. I consider myself an O'ahu legacy artist. My parents, Angela Angel and Scott Baehrens, are artists themselves who were either raised in or entrenched themselves in Hawaii arts communities. My mother graduated from Leeward Community College's renowned theater program with local arts heroes like Roslyn Catracchia, Reiko Ho, Patrick Fujioka, and the late great Lisa Matsumoto. She and my father co-created Excel Entertainment, a precursor for 'Ōhi'a Productions, whose original musicals like Once Upon One Noddah Time and The Princess and the Iso Peanut are, in my opinion, among our crown jewels of locally grown theater. My parents were also documentary filmmakers, who traveled to Micronesia to help preserve the endangered cultures there. They built an impactful arts program at Waipahu High School in the 90s called SMILE. My father produced shows for the Waikīkī Blue Note, and for decades, my mom served 'Ōlelo Community Television as a camera operator, producer, and brilliant COO.

I remember being a toddler basking in the joy of the theater and music spaces they created, at the iconic Hawai'i Theater, at Waipahu High School, at Ala Moana Center for shows like Imagination, Wishes and Wings, and Christmas Gift of Aloha, being taken to Honolulu Theater for Youth productions, and ultimately realizing the arts were my destiny, too. Hawaii continued to build me up as I grew. I attended Mid-Pacific School of the Arts, 7th through 12th grade, on a full ride scholarship. My confidence bloomed with local programs for kids like PAPA and Allegra Performing Arts. I cut my professional acting and directing teeth in productions with Hawai'i Theater, 'Ōhi'a Productions, Hawai'i Shakespeare Festival, Manoa Valley Theater, and KOA Theater.

Today, I'm a working artist who thrives solely on the money I make in the arts (on the continent). I am living my and my parents' dream. I am also a co-creator of a new production company called the Talk Story Collective, a team of kanaka and kama'āina wahine producing Hawaiian plays and storytelling arts in communities across the country. Last year, we co-produced our debut theatrical piece in Las Vegas called "Hawai'i Talk Story", where Hawai'i-born actors traveled from 8 states just to be together, to speak pidgin on stage together, and to bring a piece of home to Hawaiians in Vegas. I cannot tell you how meaningful that event was for me, for all of us.

I dream of returning home soon and planting my roots back in Hawaiian soil. Without my foundation in the local arts community, my career would not exist. I need to give back to the place that raised me with such love and joy and encouragement. In order to realize my ambitions to grow our local theater and music scenes, I will need funding from my state government. There is no getting around that. I know firsthand the difficulty of fundraising, the grind in getting folks to believe in your mission as much as you do. You probably understand that feeling better than anyone. Times are hard, and artists are always among the first to feel it. Yet artists are still essential to social infrastructure, as educators, as keepers of culture, as activists, as thought leaders. A friend of mine likes to say that arrt changes culture and culture changes policy.

While HB1378 includes positive provisions that I believe head in the right direction, it ultimately threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund. It is our only dedicated, reliable funding source for the arts. Replacing this funding with federal and general funds, especially now, can only reduce our funding as it will compete with very high priorities like housing, education, and healthcare.

Thank you for reading my testimony and for your tireless work for Hawai'i. It does not go unappreciated with me and my community. Please reconsider HB1378. Artists want to come home to Hawai'i to do their work, and we need local art and artists now more than ever.

Aloha,

My name is Tiffany, and I am a 4th-year PhD student in Political Science specializing in Museum Studies at UH Mānoa. I live in Makiki and am represented in the House by Rep. Andrew Takuya Garrett, and Sen. Carol Fukunaga in the Senate. I am writing in strong opposition to HB 1378, and any efforts to defund visual arts in Hawai'i. Defunding visual arts would be a significant loss—not just culturally and educationally, but economically.

Actors, dancers, singers, and performers are essential to Hawai'i's creative economy, but they are not enough to drive it. While they deserve investment, they represent a small part of the creative economy such that further investment should not come at the expense of visual arts funding.

Cities around the world have demonstrated the economic power of prioritizing visual arts and public art investments. This strategy has been crucial to the success of rapidly growing cities like Dubai and Abu Dhabi. The first thing Abu Dhabi did was prioritize establishing world-class museums and cultural institutions like Louvre and Guggenheim Abu Dhabi in their growth strategies. Cultural institutions put places on the map and spearhead economic growth. This is equally true with public art. Public art has been proven to attract tourism, enrich communities, and drive local business by making urban spaces more engaging and livable. Cities like New York, London, and Tokyo have long understood that investing in public visual art generates revenue, creates jobs, and strengthens their economy. An evident vibrant arts scene makes a place desirable to visit, to live in and to stay in, strengthening the overall economy while diversifying it too.

The economic power of visual arts extends far beyond cultural institutions. Visual arts are integral to industries like marketing, design, and film. The pop art movement of the 1950s and 60s, for example, laid the foundation for contemporary marketing, branding, and product design. When it comes to film and television, actors and performers play a critical role—but they are just one part of a much larger creative industry. The credits of every film are dominated by visual artists, set designers, costume designers, graphic artists, and many others. Today's visual art education, exposure, and movements shape tomorrow's marketing, design, and entertainment industries, all which provide tech-forward opportunities that allow Hawai'i to complete economically.

Defunding visual art education, cultural institutions, and public art risks cutting off the talent pipeline for film, media, and design here in Hawai'i—industries that are already largely outsourced. By investing in visual art education and local institutions, we ensure that these opportunities stay in Hawai'i—whether for film productions, advertising, or major cultural events like the Hawai'i Triennial. The Triennial, recognized internationally as the largest showcase of contemporary art in Hawai'i, is a testament to the immense local talent that already exists—from artists, to technicians, curators, and other arts workers. The Triennial's global recognition underscores that Hawai'i is home to a vibrant, innovative creative community. But to keep this momentum going, we must invest in arts education and infrastructure that ensures current and future generations of Hawai'i's youth are prepared to carry this legacy forward across various industries.

Hawai'i has immense potential to be a leader in the creative economy. We are already cultural trendsetters in many ways—just look at the global proliferation of musubi and poke shops in the last decade or less. The question is, how do we ensure that the trends we define return tangible benefits to our residents and local economy? The answer lies in cultivating and investing in our local talent, cultural institutions, and public arts, which is why we must reject HB 1378 and any efforts to defund the visual arts.

Aloha Members of the Committee,

My name is Jacie Miyashiro, and I am a teacher in the Central District on Oʻahu. I am submitting testimony in opposition to HB1378-HD2-SD1, which threatens the future of arts and culture funding in Hawaiʻi through its restriction of the Works of Art Special Fund and lack of clarity around governance and funding.

As a musician myself, I appreciate the House Culture and Arts Committee's intention to support performing arts. However, artists in our community have raised major concerns about the proposal to support public art with general funds, which do not provide a consistent and guaranteed source of funding for arts programs. While it is admirable to want to appropriate money for performing arts, it should not be done at the expense of existing programs.

Art creates opportunities for connection like no other. When we returned to school in the 2022-2023 school year, I thought that the problems the COVID-19 pandemic created for education were in the past. And yet, I found that it was even more difficult to get students to engage with my English Language Arts curriculum and with one another. It was time to try a different approach. At the end of the school year, I tasked students with creating an art piece that evoked a theme from the novel we had read the previous quarter, then we voted on one student's artwork in each class which we would turn into a large canvas painting. Students became so engaged in our art project that many of them stayed hours after school in order to complete it in time to showcase at an event the teachers planned for students' families. The art project provided a space for student collaboration as they worked together to mix colors and negotiate space while working. Integrating art into my class reinvigorated my English Language Arts curriculum that year.

I would love the opportunity to incorporate more art into my teaching and work with the Artists in the Schools program in the future; however, I worry that that program's funding may not survive due to the proposed changes in this bill. Therefore, I urge you to oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1 and to protect the Works of Art Special Fund.

Aloha Senator Donovan M. Dela Cruz, Senator Sharon Y. Moriwaki, and Committee Members,

I am writing in my adamantly strong opposition to HB1378 HD2 SD1, which aims to establish the Performing Arts Grants Program and Performing Arts Grants Special Fund, allow the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts to acquire property, and expand SFCA's role in the arts community.

HB1378 HD2 SD1 ultimately threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund—Hawai'i's only dedicated and reliable funding source for the arts. In its place, the bill proposes federal and general funds, which are not guaranteed and will have to compete with critical state priorities such as housing and healthcare. This shift will cause major disruptions to essential arts funding and potentially lead to a huge loss of staff support for public art programs.

Here in Hawai'i, state funding is crucial in keeping the arts and local culture alive. It is what breathes life into programs, performances, talks, and creative connections. Without a protected source of funding, the very programs that make the arts accessible—especially to underserved communities and students—will be at risk.

The Works of Art Special Fund has ensured long-term continuity of community values through art exhibitions, public events, and arts education. It has made possible what once seemed impossible, like the Hawai'i Triennial, which brought communities and students into gallery spaces that many might not otherwise access due to economic barriers. Not everyone can afford to visit museums and galleries on their own dime. In Hawai'i, where the cost of living is skyhigh, arts funding must remain protected to ensure true accessibility.

In my own experience as Education and Public Programs Coordinator for the Hawai'i State Triennial 2025, I have seen firsthand the impact of arts education and school field trips funded through SFCA. From crafting Limumuu planters with scientist and conservationist Ikaika Bishop—who collaborated with Korean artist Hyemin Son for the Triennial—to storytelling

through paintings with Montessori students at HoMA, it is evident that arts learning is deeply intersectional. Some students thrive with worksheets, others through oral talk story, while visual learners connect the dots through images, and tactile learners grasp concepts by engaging their senses. Eliminating stable arts funding means eliminating these essential learning opportunities and lessening inclusive learning environments for classrooms.

We work closely with State Foundation on Culture and the Arts on a number of projects that enrich lives, broaden perspectives, and strengthen communities. For example:

- SFCA grants have enabled more equitable access to programs like Hawai'i History Day, which supports the teaching of history and civics by providing curriculum, professional development and training, classroom materials, and interscholastic competition at no cost to the community. We serve grades 4-12, in partnership with 46 public, private, and charter schools on Kaua'i, Maui, Moloka'i, O'ahu, and Hawai'i in 2025.
- We collaborate with SFCA and the Hawai'i State Public Library System on the Hawai'i State Poet Laureate program, which organizes literary events that empower diverse voices to engage with social issues through storytelling and creative expression. In 2025 so far, poetry workshops and community discussions have been hosted by Kahuku Public and School Library, Mānoa Public Library, and Lāna'i Public and School Library, with additional events planned for Waikīkī and 'Āina Haina libraries. These events create safe spaces to explore issues like political polarization, LGBTQ experiences, immigration and health care, language loss and learning, cultural identity, and more.

Our partnerships with SFCA greatly increase public access to high-quality arts and humanities programming and resources across our state.

Our nonprofit relies on a federal grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the sister agency to the National Endowment for the Arts (which supports state arts councils like SFCA) and the Institute for Museum and Library Services (which supports our state public

libraries). Steady support from these three federal agencies over decades have brought hundreds of millions of dollars into our local economy and made possible thousands of meaningful local programs and resources. All three federal institutions of public education and public good are currently facing unprecedented cuts in funding and support. If the State of Hawai'i believes that the arts, culture, and humanities create a stronger, more connected, and more compassionate community, now is the time to bolster and steady state funding for our sector, not retract it.

Dear Legislators,

I am a performing artist, arts administrator, a previous recipient of the SFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Award, and president of the nonprofit Hawai'i Museums Association.

I submitted initial testimony in strong support of HB1378, **but now oppose HB1378-HD2-SD1** in its current form.

I still strongly believe that enabling SFCA to provide direct support for performing arts activities would greatly benefit organizations and projects involving performance presentation, preservation, innovation, and collaboration across Hawai'i's multicultural landscape. But not at the expense of restricting SFCA's most stable and reliable source of funding: the one percent from state capital improvement projects.

In 1967, Hawai'i became the first state in the nation to adopt a percent-for-art law with the enactment of the Art in State Buildings Law, expanded in 1989 with the Works of Art Special Fund. This visionary landmark legislation, a source of great pride in Hawai'i, inspired governments around the world to pass similar legislation to support and sustain arts in their communities.

I admire and applaud the lawmakers whose intent is to annually fund both visual and performing arts at levels that strongly fuel Hawai'i's creative economy. However, the one percent statute is crucial to providing stable, consistent support for the arts and culture sector, protected and isolated from competition with other legislative agendas. The one percent is a long-term commitment to the deep value and unwavering support of arts and culture in our community. Capping the annual amount that enters the fund effectively dismantles the one-percent structure, and cripples it forever.

The original spirit of HB1378 – to create new funding for performing arts – would have a transformational impact on communities across Hawai'i. The original components of this bill have merit, and should be explored further with a long-term sustainable vision applied. However, I oppose this amended bill because it severely restricts SFCA's most reliable source of funding, and threatens its future.

Furthermore, it is highly disappointing that this bill moved out of committee despite overwhelming oppositional testimony not just from the public, but also from government entities.

Growing up as a Native Hawaiian performing artist from O'ahu, I never thought it would be possible to return home as a professional performer because of the limited resources and opportunities here. As I got older, this reality motivated me to return home and start a nonprofit specifically devoted to changing this for future local performers so they would not have to be displaced from their own home.

Last week, I joined fellow Hawai'i delegates including visual and performing arts professionals from the DOE, University of Hawai'i, State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, and the Hawai'i Arts Alliance in DC to speak with our federal representatives about the great contributions of our diverse artistic community to our state economic and social resilience.

Gaining a deeper understanding of the fragile federal funding landscape made it clear that this bill is exactly the opposite of what our community needs for artists to thrive. The committee's attempt to advance this divisive legislation that establishes performing arts funds while threatening the state arts funding is extremely unfortunate. HB1378-HD2-SD1 would only destabilize the entire creative community, hurting smaller arts organizations and communities on our neighbor islands who rely solely on state arts funding, while also greatly compromising arts education in the state.

This testimony is to express my strong objection to HB 1378 HD2 SD1. I have been an art professor at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa since 1992, and am also appointed Interim Director of the John Young Museum, The Art Gallery, and the Commons Gallery at UHM from 8/23-8/85. As an educator and Interim Gallery Director, I see the positive impacts that the 1% for art makes on the community, Native Hawaiian artists, and the emerging artists. The SFCA is one of the only avenues for support for Native Hawaiian artists. Recently, the The Art Gallery at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa held the exhibition Mai Nā Kūpuna Mai, which featured works by Native Hawaiian artists. The SFCA recommended four major pieces out of this show for purchase. Three of those artists had not had work previously collected by the SFCA (Marques Hanalei Marzan, Maika'i Tubbs, Puni Jackson) The fourth artist, Sean Kekamakupa'aikapono Kaonohiokalani Lee Lov Browne, is considered a treasure of the community. While the SFCA has collected his sculpture in the past, this is the first of his paintings recommended for collection. The bill states that "the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection." That is not true. The state does not have enough work by Native Hawaiian artists and is working to address that through recommendations of purchases.

The state also does not have enough work by the upcoming generations of emerging artists. Recently the SFCA also recommended for purchase the work of three MFA students part of the current show that is up at the UH Art Gallery, Still Standing. There are currently 280 art students at UHM, who have a great deal to contribute to the community. Often the first opportunity students have professionally is funded through programs offered by the State Foundation and Culture in the Arts. The SFCA funds organizations that give young artists the opportunity to exhibit and sell their work and to work in the community doing valuable service such as Arts in the School. Compared to other states Hawai'i is sadly lacking in art education in public schools. Often the only exposure students get to the arts is through SFCA programs. Already, there is a huge brain, drain, with talented students going to other states where there is more opportunity, without the 1% for art, we would lose even more of our talented young artists. Because I work closely with these young artist, I know how passionate driven and gifted they are. I know how much they are willing to give back to the community, and it is important for them to have the cultural institutions in place that allow them to reach their full potential. In sharing their immense talents with the community they make the state a better place to live in. I have taught at UHM for 32 years, and over the years,

I have seen the great impact that my former students have made in the community because of their access to programming that is funded by the SFCA.

Most other states have private galleries that participate in the cultural discourse and support artists. Because of the high cost of real estate Hawai'i has far fewer private galleries. Artists who are making a cultural impact and furthering the pursuit of knowledge in the field of art are completely dependent on public institutions to show and sell their work. Many of the wealthiest property owners in the state live in other states or countries, and support the cultural institutions in their home cities, not here. SFCA is one of the only sources of revenue for nearly every major cultural institution. The SFCA was the first institution of its kind in the country and marks a major achievement for the State.

Tourist destinations are becoming more competitive. Many tourists look for a place that offers cultural engagement. Funding of the arts is essential in making Hawaii a desirable destination. The arts also raise the quality of life for those who live here. Thank you for considering my testimony. Please consider your commitment to the future, to the quality of life for local residents and for the perpetuation of Kanaka culture. Mahalo for your time in reviewing my testimony.

My name is Erika Molyneux, and I am a new media arts faculty-member at Leeward Community College and a former board member of the Honolulu Printmakers and Gallery 'Iolani at Windward Community College. The statements expressed are my opinions as an individual and do not represent the position of my college or these organizations.

Please OPPOSE Bill <u>HB1378</u>, which establishes the Performing Arts Grants Program and Performing Arts Grants Special Fund to support performing arts in the State, clarifies the scope of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events, amends the funding sources for the State Art Museum. Amends the amounts required to be transferred by agencies into the Works of Art Special Fund and the allowable uses of the Special Fund, and appropriates funds.

While <u>HB1378 HD2 SD1</u> includes some positive provisions, it *ultimately threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding* by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund—Hawai'i's only dedicated, reliable funding source for the arts. This fund has ensured that Hawai'i's arts sector remains resilient, even during economic downturns. It takes away the 1% allocation of funding from new construction projects, making the amount flexible over time and thus vulnerable to political and economic conditions. According to this bill, federal and general funds are to be used to fund the arts. These funds are not guaranteed and will compete with other state priorities like housing, education, and healthcare.

Any short-term funding gains are not worth sacrificing long-term stability. This bill weakens the arts ecosystem instead of strengthening it.

For all these reasons, please OPPOSE Bill HB1378. Mahalo nui for your time and consideration.





I was alarmed to observe at the last hearing (March 13th) that so many leaders in the Hawaii arts community did not fully understand the provisions of this bill, as evidenced in the large number of testifiers who expressed gratitude for Senator Lee's opening explanatory comments. Last March, when a similar bill was put forth but ultimately not passed, Senator Lee promised to speak and work with leaders in the art community to try and create more dialogue and understanding of the issues, and to hopefully generate more possibile alternatives to the proposed dismantling of the Works of Art Special Fund and Percent for the Arts Law. If these converstations had indeed took place, as pledged, and if creative dialogue around allocating sources of secure funding for the arts had happened, then why has so much shock and confusion been rippling through the arts community since this bill was put forth? I simply implore you to delay any possible passing of this bill until the promised conservations and dialogues have actually come to pass. Please hold true to your word.

I am a practicing visual artist and have been an instructor in the Drawing and Painting Program at UH Mānoa since 2012. I also served many years working for art outreach programs at the Honolulu Museum of Art and the Hawai'i State Art Museum, including programs for veterans, adjudicated youth, and English language learners. In my 17 years of working in art education, I have seen with arresting clarity the power of art to enrich, expand, deepen, transform, and heal the hearts and minds of individuals across all age groups and from all backgrounds. I have also directly experienced all of these things through my own art practice, and through my intimate relationship with art.

The percent-for-the-arts law and the Works of Art Special Fund are crucial to ensuring a stable source of funding for the arts in Hawai'i. The importance of these funds to the health and vibrancy of artists and our whole community cannot be understated. The proposed bill would eliminate reliable support for the arts, forcing artists and art educators into an uncertain struggle to secure funds for a field which, despite its centrality to the well-being of humanity, is continually short on resources. The percent-for-the-arts and the Works of Art Special Fund have allowed me to sustain myself in Hawai'i as an artist and educator for almost two decades. I know that this is true for many artists working professionally across the state. Please don't let support for the arts be jeopardized by hearing this bill.

I am writing to express my opposition to HB1378, SD1.

At first glance, HB1378, SD1 appears to be a repackaging of the HB 1807, HD2 that was introduced last year, but it is in fact, significantly worse. While this bill recognizes the important work of the State Foundation on Culture & Arts (SFCA) in serving the people of Hawai'i, this bill contains funding changes that would essentially end that work:

- (5) Amending the funding sources for the state art museum;
- (6) Amending the amounts required to be transferred by agencies into the works of art special fund and the allowable uses of moneys from the works of art special fund;

If approved, this bill would nullify the existing law that ensures stable funding for the SFCA that was established through the 1967 Act 298 and the 1989 Act 389. By which, those acts sought to establish and secure the continued support of the arts in a way that could not be easily swept away as HB1378, SD1 proposes to do.

By placing the funding of the SFCA exclusively on federal funds, grants, and general revenue this bill would renege on nearly 60 years of the State's commitment to "...promote, perpetuate, preserve, and encourage culture and the arts as central to the quality of life and people of the State."

In consideration of the above, I ask the members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means not to approve HB1378, SD1.

As a teaching artist in the public schools, I do not know all the technical terms in this bill but I do understand that there are proposed cuts to the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (HI SFCA). Please do not cut any funding for the Arts.

The Arts enrich all of our lives in a myriad ways. For children especially, the Arts provide a meaningful way to learn about the world and about themselves. The HI SFCA uses their funds for many art education programs, benefitting students throughout the state. All this would be in jeopardy if funds are cut - and the students would be the ones losing out.

We are already stretching every penny to bring a quality Arts program to as many students as possible. For example, at a Title 1 school, eighty 3rd graders had a ten week Arts residency for under \$4,000; that's less than \$5 per week per child. By the end of the residency each student had created beautiful art works to go with their own writing, producing illustrated poems and stories. All labor and supplies were provided through the SFCA funding - including oil pastels for every student, as well as lessons with monoprinting, drawing, painting, and collage. The teachers and students were very pleased and appreciative of this Arts and writing experience.

Ideally, more funding would be allocated so that every public school could have an Art program for their students. Research shows that the Arts enhance all kinds of learning, scholastic and mental and emotional resilience. The Arts are one good way students practice creative problem solving - so necessary in today's world. There are many gifted young artists in Hawaii and almost every child loves doing Art. They treasure their Art and remember their Art experience. The children are Hawaii's future.

I have lived and worked in Hawaii for 20 years as an arts educator in schools island wide and with all ages. I have witnessed youth perform their first play in front of their families and friends, make their first animated film and have it screened at HIFF and go on to study animation at university in Hawaii . I have many more amazing stories of how arts impacts their lives positively. This bill cuts dedicated funding used for arts education by 100%, and replaces it with less than half the current budgeted amount in general funds.

Half of the Artists in the Schools granted schools do not have a dedicated arts specialist on staff. If arts education funding is cut by these extreme, some of these students will not have any specialized arts education time in their school day. Not only is this extremely inequitable, but countless studies show the relationship between arts experiences and positive mental health, stronger community relationships, and a positive sense of self. This bill aims to diminish the success of Hawai'i's keiki.

In addition, this funding has been supporting immersive art experiences for neurodivergent young people over the past three years. These experiences are designed and created specifically for students who most of the time have never been on a field trip before because of their high needs. By cutting this funding, you would be cutting the opportunity to develop artistic experiences for Hawai'i's most vulnerable population.

Our keiki deserve more than what we are currently offering them, and by cutting these funds, we are doing a disservice to them and our community.
