**Testimony COMMENTING on HB0348
RELATING TO SINGLE-USE PLASTICS.**

1 **Fiscal Implications:** The Department of Health (“Department”) requests that this measure be
2 considered as a vehicle to provide this needed funding so long as it does not supplant the
3 priorities and requests outlined in the Governors executive budget request.

4 **Department Testimony:** The Environmental Management Division, Solid and Hazardous
5 Waste Branch (EMD-SHWB) provides the following testimony on behalf of the Department.
6 This measure prohibits lodging establishments from providing personal care products in small
7 single-use plastic containers to guests and visitors and establishes civil penalties for violations as
8 identified by a Department inspection.

9 The Department supports measures to reduce the amount of waste generated in the state
10 as it reduces the amount of waste that may require landfill disposal. However, the Department
11 currently doesn’t have the staff or funding necessary to properly implement the inspection and
12 enforcement component of this measure.

13 The Department respectfully requests funding and the establishment of one full-time
14 equivalent (1.0 FTE) position to receive complaints and conduct follow-up inspections of
15 lodging establishments identified as distributing personal care products in small single-use
16 plastic containers in violation of this measure. In addition to conducting inspection and
17 enforcement actions, dispensing citations, and coordinating with the Office of the Attorney
18 General to pursue civil penalties, this position would also be tasked with providing education and
19 outreach to the regulated community.

1 Should the legislature pass this measure without granting the Department the position and
2 funding, we note that the Department will not be able to proactively enforce the requirements
3 and may only be able to enforce them when resources are available and based on complaints.

On behalf of the Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association, the state's oldest and largest private sector tourism organization, representing 700 members, nearly 50,000 hotel rooms, and 40,000 lodging workers, we appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony on HB 348, which seeks to prohibit lodging establishments from providing small plastic containers for personal care products in guest accommodations.

We support the intent of this measure, as our industry has long been committed to sustainability, environmental stewardship, and reducing waste. Many of our lodging members have already implemented this standard voluntarily, including major global brands such as Marriott and Hilton Hotels, which have phased out small plastic amenity bottles in favor of more sustainable alternatives.

Testimony Regarding House Bill 348
Relating to Single-Use Plastics

Aloha Chair Tam, Vice Chair Templo
and Members of the Committee on Tourism:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony regarding House Bill 348 (“HB 348”) relating to single-use plastics, as it pertains to prohibiting lodging establishments from providing personal care products in small plastic containers within sleeping room accommodations, any space within sleeping room accommodations, or bathrooms used by the public or guests.

The lodging industry has moved toward bulk dispenser usage of its personal care products. Accordingly, the lodging industry would prefer a definition of “personal care product” which is not susceptible to an overly broad interpretation. Although in HB 348 “personal care product” has the same meaning as Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 321-30.5,¹ the preferred definition of “personal care product” is one similar to the definition of “personal care product” in SB 670. We respectfully suggest a definition as follows:

“Personal care product” means shampoo, hair conditioner, bath soap or lotion.


¹“Personal care product” means an article intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled, or sprayed on, introduced into, or otherwise applied to the human body or any part thereof for cleansing; beautifying; promoting hygiene or attractiveness; or altering one's appearance; and any article intended for use as a component of the article. “Personal care product” does not include any prescription drug.
