RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE STRENGTHENING OF FOOD BANKS TO PROVIDE HAWAII-GROWN FOOD TO FOOD-INSECURE COMMUNITIES

Whereas, the Makakilo/Kapolei/Honokai Hale Neighborhood Board No. 34 ("Board") is a citizens' advisory board whose purpose is to "increase and assure effective citizen participation in the decisions of government" per the City and County of Honolulu's Neighborhood Plan of 2008; and

Whereas, the Board finds that about one in three households in Hawaii is struggling to secure consistent access to food, highlighting the urgent need to restore basic nourishment and dignity to families across the islands (The State of Food Insecurity in Hawaii, Hawaii Food Bank, 2023); and

Whereas, food insecurity in Hawaii disproportionately affects vulnerable populations, particularly children, with nearly thirty percent of keiki growing up in food-insecure homes, some enduring entire days without a meal, which can lead to cognitive, behavioral, and emotional challenges; and

Whereas, the Board also finds that Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander communities are disproportionately affected, with more than forty percent of households facing hunger, reflecting deep-rooted inequities in access to resources, economic opportunity, and essential services; and

Whereas, the Board also finds that its district hosts the highest concentration of Native Hawaiian homesteads across the state; and

Whereas, the Board recognizes that approximately 400 of our district neighbors are unsheltered, and nearly three thousand individuals across the state face similar hardships, making it exceedingly difficult for them to access nutritious food and essential resources (Point In Time Count 2024); and

Whereas, Hawaii's food banks have made significant strides in addressing hunger, partnering with over five hundred agencies, including schools, community-based nonprofits, churches, and food pantries, to distribute more than twenty-seven million meals in 2023, collectively serving two hundred forty thousand individuals each month across the State; and

Whereas, the Board expresses its deep gratitude for the three foodbanks within our district—St. Jude's Catholic Church, the Armed Services YMCA at the Daniel K. Akaka VA Clinic, and Message of Peace Ministry at Kapolei High School—that selflessly serve our neighbors in need; and

Whereas, the support systems that were available during the COVID-19 pandemic have diminished, and it is critical to maintain robust support for food banks to continue addressing the ongoing food insecurity crisis in Hawaii; and

Whereas, the Board expresses its gratitude to the farmers and ranchers in our district, including those at the Pacific Gateway Center, who empower vulnerable populations, provide local produce and goods, and contribute to bolstering Hawaii's food security; and

Whereas, to strengthen the connection between food banks and local agriculture, Hawaii's food banks have partnered with over five hundred seventy-five local farms and food hubs, creating a reliable market for Hawaii-grown produce, which has contributed to the local economy, with an

investment of more than \$11,000,000 in local agriculture over the past five years, generating nearly \$19,000,000 in economic impact (Farm to Families, Hawaii Food Bank, 2020); and

Whereas, with rising costs of imported food, increasing the State's reliance on locally grown food is both a sustainable solution and a necessary approach to ensure Hawaii's families have access to fresh, nutritious food while supporting local farmers and ranchers and reducing dependence on imports; and

Whereas, the Board recognizes that strengthening food banks' ability to purchase, store, and transport fresh, Hawaii-grown or -produced food to food-insecure communities is essential in building a more resilient and equitable food system, supporting local agriculture, and ensuring food security for all residents; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Makakilo/Kapolei/Honokai Hale Neighborhood Board No. 34 supports the strengthening of food banks to provide Hawaii-grown food to food insecure communities; and be it

Resolved, that the board supports the intent of the bills <u>HB428 (2025)</u> and <u>SB1250 (2025)</u> Relating to Farm to Families; and be it

TESTIMONY ON HB 428 HD1 Relating to Farm to Families

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards and Members of the Committee,

I am Benson Medina, Director of the Department of Research and Development, County of Hawai'i. One of the agricultural objectives of this department is to "support collaboration, innovation, resource development, and programmatic sustainability throughout the food system to reduce food waste, improve producer viability and resilience, develop workforce development pathways, or increase access to locally produced food among low-income residents."

The County of Hawai'i provides written testimony in **SUPPORT of HB428 HD1**, to establish the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program to alleviate food shortages in the State.

Hawai'i County faces the highest rates of food insecurity in the State, with forty percent of Hawai'i County households reporting food insecurity in a 2023 study commissioned by Hawai'i Foodbank. The Food Basket, Hawai'i Island's food bank, is at the forefront of Farm to Family initiatives, pioneering efforts to connect local farmers with communities in need. Through innovative programs, they ensure that fresh, locally-grown food reaches keiki, kūpuna, and families facing food insecurity. As Hawai'i Island's primary food bank, The Food Basket (TFB) partners with over 100 partner agencies to provide emergency food assistance or other direct services to those in need.

Since the COVID- 19 pandemic, TFB has witnessed an enormous increase in individuals who do not know where their next meal is coming from. During the pandemic, TFB served up to six times more individuals than they did pre- pandemic. Currently they are serving 34% more individuals compared to pre- pandemic numbers, nearly 50,000 people every month. TFB has experienced ongoing cancellations of large quantities of

commodity food from breaks in the supply chain due to COVID- 19 and prices have skyrocketed, causing them to increasingly rely on our local food supply.

The Farm to Families program would provide essential funding for food banks to purchase from local farmers and producers, improving emergency food access, boosting local agriculture, and strengthening Hawai'i's food system during the ongoing economic crisis that is affecting so many families across the state.

Additionally, by the State investing in fresh, locally grown produce into food banks, we can provide families with healthier, more sustainable food options while bolstering Hawai'i's agricultural economy. The bill offers a direct benefit to Hawai'i's agricultural sector, providing a steady and fair market for local produce, helping farmers plan for future growth.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **SUPPORT** of this important measure. The act establishes the Hawaii Farm to Families Program to alleviate food shortages in the State. Requires reports to the Legislature prior to the Regular Sessions of 2026 and 2027. Appropriates funds.

We **SUPPORT** this measure for the following reasons:

- For far to long our communities have been living in a crisis related to food security. Over 30% of Hawai'i is food insecure. That number significantly increases to over 40% when we focus on our most vulnerable and underserved community, kānaka 'ōiwi.
- 2. There are many negative impacts to our food insecure communities, especially our keiki; ranging from anxiety to depression, to even thoughts of suicide. Investing in our food systems is a must to combat these negative impacts.
- 3. Reserach shows the significant economic returns on governments investment into our food systems at all levels. Socioeconomically this positions our community to have more robust and consistent markets, creates financial incentives for the next generation of farmers, and overall leads to a more resilient and sustainable Hawai'i.
- 4. This bill supports farmers, ranchers, and fishermen by expanding their access to new markets. During COVID and following the 2023 Maui fires, some farmers lost over 70% of their market overnight. Farm to Families will help build more consistent markets for

farmers. The bill will also help build resilience by developing sourcing channels that can be scaled up in times of emergency and increase fresh food access for our community during this critical time as we face rising grocery costs.

On behalf of Hawai'i Foodbank, I express our STRONG support for HB428 HD1, Relating to Farm to Families. This bill establishes the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program to address food shortages across the state, requires reports to the Legislature before the Regular Sessions of 2026 and 2027, and appropriates funds to support its implementation.

As the state's largest hunger-relief organization, Hawai'i Foodbank has been committed to ensuring no one in Hawai'i goes hungry since 1983. We work with over 225 agency partners on O'ahu and Kaua'i to distribute food, and programs like Food 4 Keiki and 'Ohana Produce Plus provide nutritious meals to children and families. In addition to addressing daily needs, our organization mobilizes during emergencies to provide immediate relief and aid long-term recovery efforts.

In addition, Hawai'i Foodbank's Farm to Families program, launched in 2020, has already demonstrated its impact by investing \$11 million into more than 40 local farms and food hubs, distributing over 9 million pounds of Hawai'i-grown produce and proteins. HB 428 will expand this initiative by strengthening the supply chain, ensuring fresh, Hawai'i-grown food reaches food-insecure households while supporting local agriculture.

This bill is critically needed. The "State of Food Insecurity in Hawai'i" report revealed that in 2023, 30% of households in our state experience food insecurity, including 29% of children. In 10% of these households, at least one member went without food for an entire day some or most months of the year. These figures highlight the urgent need for a sustainable solution to hunger in Hawai'i.

Over the last few years, one of the most pressing issues for many local families has been food insecurity. With many out of work and surviving on government unemployment support, communities have relied on the efforts of food banks and local food producers to meet their basic need to eat.

In response to the COVID pandemic, federal monies injected into Hawai'i through county initiatives helped grow a local farm-to-food bank effort, in which food banks were able to purchase local products for distribution to needy communities. This effort was a win-win-win, in that local food producers had a market to sell their products when hotels and restaurants shuttered their doors, local families received fresh and nutritious food products made locally island-wide, and food banks that were struggling to purchase shelf-stable food due to nationwide shortages were rescued by Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers who provided local food to their communities.

The Farm to Food Bank efforts across the state led to many important foundational relationships between local farmers, ranchers, and community feeding organizations that helped struggling communities cope with the social and economic consequences of the COVID pandemic. Unfortunately, natural disasters, food supply chain disruptions, and state emergencies have become a harsh, consistent reality for our local communities. Food banks across the state are constantly having to hold food drives to maintain these community lifelines, which have increasingly relied on their assistance and local producers to maintain consistent supply. They will need support to meet these food security challenges, and continuing to strengthen the bonds between farms and food banks is a worthy investment.

On behalf of the Maui Food Bank, I express our strong support for HB 428 HD1 Relating to Farm to Families which establishes the Hawaii Farm to Families Program to alleviate food shortages in the State.

For 30 years, Maui Food Bank has provided daily and emergency assistance to those facing food insecurity in Maui County. Maui Food Bank distributes food to families and individuals on Maui, Molokai and Lanai through direct service programs and through our network of 170 agency partners. Last year, we served on average 45,000 people each month, distributing a total of 8.7 million pounds of nutritious food, including 2.3 million pounds of fresh produce. Of those served, 40% are children and youth.

HB 428 HD1 empowers food distribution organizations to forge stronger partnerships with local farmers and food producers, ensuring that fresh, locally grown produce reaches families experiencing food insecurity. These collaborations between local farms and food organizations deliver benefits to both our communities and the economy.

Just last week, a neighbor reached out to us in a desperate situation, in need of fresh produce. She suffers from acute kidney disease and relies solely on fresh fruits and vegetables for her diet. With no funds to buy groceries and unable to consume the canned goods provided by her local pantry, we stepped in to help. We assembled a box filled with locally grown, fresh produce, ensuring she had the nourishment she needed. This is a powerful example of how this Bill can enhance the health and well-being of our community.

As an example, the Maui Food Bank currently purchases from over 30 farmers in Maui County to provide healthy, locally grown produce. Two programs highlighting our purchasing from Maui County farms are listed below:

• Fresh 4 All program: Maui Food Bank purchases and picks up donated fresh produce from local Maui farmers, produce wholesalers, and farmers' markets for distribution to those in need, reducing physical and transportation obstacles.



• <u>'Ai Holo program</u>: Works with 15 local farmers and suppliers to deliver fresh, nutritious food to children from low-income families in Maui County, including rural areas like Hana, Molokai, and Lanai. Over 8 weeks, participants receive weekly boxes containing local produce, dairy, and proteins.

As a member of the Hawaii Hunger Action Network, HAPA strongly supports HB428 HD1. According to a recent report by the Hawaii Food Bank, <u>one in three households in Hawaii has</u> <u>reports being food insecure</u>¹. Additional reporting from the Aloha United Way, just released in January 2025, further highlights the need for systemic changes to address the struggles of Hawaii's A.L.I.C.E. (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) population. <u>Nearly half (46%)</u> <u>of ALICE households struggle with consistent food access, compared to 28% statewide</u>.² Yet too often Food Banks are torn between choosing cheaper, less healthy food to feed more recipients and the ability to provide nutritious, locally grown or produced foods.

Increasing the ability of food banks to purchase locally grown food is a win-win for our communities and farmers. For local farmers, accessing new markets can be a challenge. Creating opportunities to connect our most vulnerable communities with locally grown or produced food will help grow our local food and agriculture economy while providing our communities with nutritious food during times of hardship or crisis.

Preparing Hawai'i's families in the wake of disaster, food banks rely almost exclusively on private donations and grants, even though local governments rely heavily on them during times of crisis. The Farm to Families program would provide funding for purchasing from local farmers, improving emergency food access for families and opening up a local market for farmers during times of economic challenges or crisis. I urge you to please support HB428 HD1.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) strongly supports **House Bill 428, HD1**, which establishes the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program. This measure seeks to alleviate food insecurity by funding food banks to procure, store, and distribute fresh, locally grown food to food-insecure communities. The impact of this initiative will be particularly significant for Native Hawaiian families, who continue to experience disproportionately high rates of food insecurity, and for Native Hawaiian farmers, who will benefit from greater economic stability and market opportunities.

Food insecurity is a persistent issue in Hawai'i, with over 40% of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander households experiencing hunger—a rate far exceeding that of other groups in the state (Hawai'i State Department of Health, 2022). The high cost of imported food, which accounts for nearly 90% of the state's supply, exacerbates this problem, making fresh, nutritious, and culturally significant foods like kalo (taro), 'ulu (breadfruit), and 'uala (sweet potato) difficult to access for many Native Hawaiian families. The establishment of a state-funded supply chain that prioritizes fresh, locally sourced produce for food banks may address this disparity, ensuring that those in need have access to healthy, locally grown food. This approach strengthens Hawai'i's food sovereignty and ensures that food assistance programs are aligned with local dietary traditions, providing not just sustenance but also reinforcing cultural identity. This measure acknowledges the importance of increasing reliance on **Hawai'i-grown produce** and explicitly mentions **kalo** (taro), 'ulu (breadfruit), and 'uala Okinawan sweet potato as examples of the types of food that should be prioritized for distribution through food banks.

Beyond addressing food insecurity, this measure provides much-needed economic support for Native Hawaiian farmers, many of whom face structural barriers that limit their ability to compete with large-scale agricultural producers and imported food. The 2017 Census of Agriculture reported that there were 1,121 farms in Hawai'i operated by Native Hawaiians or other Pacific Islanders, representing approximately 15% of all farms in the state. These farms collectively manage over 265,000 acres, yet the market value of products sold remains relatively low, averaging \$77,411 per farm. The Taro Security and Purity Task Force Report (2010)¹ highlighted several obstacles preventing Native Hawaiian taro farmers from achieving economic viability, including land access challenges, inadequate distribution infrastructure, and the lack of direct market pathways for their crops. By creating a stable and reliable market for locally grown food through food banks, this measure directly supports these farmers by ensuring consistent demand for their produce and reducing the financial uncertainty they face.

The inclusion of traditional Hawaiian crops in food assistance programs also aligns with long-standing efforts to revitalize Native Hawaiian agriculture. Taro farmers, for instance, continue to struggle with limited land availability due to high lease costs and zoning restrictions that prioritize other forms of development over traditional farming practices. The Taro Security and Purity Task Force specifically recommended state-level action to support access to agricultural lands for Native Hawaiian farmers, incentivizing traditional farming through subsidies and ensuring that local produce remains at the center of Hawai'i's food system. This bill offers an opportunity to address those recommendations by creating direct purchase programs that benefit small-scale traditional farmers and ensure the preservation of Native Hawaiian agricultural practices.

Investing in local agriculture through this program will have far-reaching benefits for the entire state. Keeping food production within Hawai'i strengthens the local economy by ensuring that dollars spent on food stay within the state rather than being used to import goods. The Hawai'i Foodbank reports that for every dollar spent on local produce, there is a multiplier effect that benefits the broader economy, stimulating related industries such as food processing, transportation, and retail. Additionally, prioritizing locally grown food over imported goods reduces the state's vulnerability to supply chain disruptions, such as those experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic, when imported food became scarce and expensive. Supporting local farmers also reduces Hawai'i's reliance on long-distance food shipments, decreasing carbon emissions associated with transportation and promoting environmental sustainability.

While OHA fully supports this bill, we encourage legislators to consider key steps to ensure its effectiveness. Ensuring that funding is equitably distributed across all counties, particularly in rural and neighbor island communities where food insecurity is most severe,

is critical. Transportation logistics must be carefully planned to guarantee that fresh food reaches all areas of the state efficiently, preventing gaps in food distribution.

Additionally, the Department of Agriculture should prioritize procurement from Native Hawaiian farmers and small-scale agricultural producers, many of whom lack access to large-scale distribution channels. Supporting these farmers aligns with the recommendations outlined in the Taro Security and Purity Task Force Report², which emphasized the need for state-level investments in small, community-based farming operations. Further, incorporating accountability measures within the program will ensure that funds are effectively allocated and that the procurement of local food remains the program's top priority.

HB428, HD1 is a transformative measure that will not only combat food insecurity but also revitalize local agriculture, promote food sovereignty, and uplift Native Hawaiian farming communities. By supporting food banks in sourcing local produce, this initiative strengthens Hawai'i's agricultural economy, provides economic security for Native Hawaiian farmers, and ensures that all residents—especially those most vulnerable—have access to nutritious food. This program represents a commitment to a more sustainable, self-sufficient Hawai'i, where the land and its resources are cultivated to feed and support the people who call these islands home.

OHA urges the Legislature to **PASS HB428 HD1** and consider the recommendations outlined above to ensure its success and sustainability. Mahalo for your time and consideration.

Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI)¹ and the Healthy Eating, Active Living² (HEAL) Coalition is in **support of HB 428 HD1**, which establishes the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program to increase locally grown or produced food in our food bank system.

One in three families are food insecure in Hawai'i. This results in over 150,000 people relying on the food bank system for assistance each month. The food bank system provides a very important social service to our community and it's essential that we help fund their efforts.

Increased Demand Requires Increased Investment

The Hawai'i Food Bank's dramatic rise in food distribution – from 12.5 million pounds in 2018 to 21.2 million pounds in 2024 – reflects a growing crisis of food insecurity in our islands.³⁴ This 70% increase represents thousands more local families struggling to put food on their tables. Given our state's high cost of living and dependence on imported food, we must invest in strengthening the food bank system's operations to ensure this essential service can continue supporting our island 'ohana.

A \$2 million state investment through HB 428 HD1 would represent less than 5% of the food bank network's annual operating expenses, yet could significantly

strengthen its ability to serve our communities. This modest initial investment would demonstrate Hawai'i's commitment to addressing food insecurity while helping ensure the sustainability of this vital emergency food network.

Fresh Produce in High Demand

Hawai'i's food banks and pantries face a high demand for fresh produce, but supply falls short due to limited funding and distribution challenges.⁵ Given the limited availability, there are hours-long lines at food distribution sites that offer fresh produce. Investing in farm-to-families programs would help to create a steady local supply of nutritious produce, improving food security and public health across the islands.

Local Investments Help our Economy

A \$2 million investment in Hawai'i's food bank system creates ripple effects throughout our local economy. When we purchase from local farmers and producers, those dollars circulate within our communities rather than flowing to continental suppliers. This strengthens our agricultural sector, creates local jobs, and helps build a more resilient food system for our islands.

When families receive adequate nutrition through the food bank, they can better focus on work, education, and other activities that contribute to our economy, reducing the long-term costs associated with food insecurity.

We urge you to support HB 428 HD1 to strengthen Hawai'i's emergency food network and help more families access the nutritious food they need. This investment in our food banks is an important step toward reducing hunger in our islands.

My name is Michael Robinson, and I am the Vice President of Government Relations & Community Affairs at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system comprised of its four medical centers – Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox and over 70 locations statewide with a mission of creating a healthier Hawai'i.

HPH writes in SUPPORT of HB 428, HD1 which establishes the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program to fund food banks and alleviate food shortages in the State.

HPH has long recognized the relationship between healthy outcomes and food security, as well as the strong connection between access to healthy foods with health and wellness. HPH screens our in-patients across our facilities for indications of food insecurity and is acutely aware of the challenge it is for our patients. The link between a healthy diet and healthy living is well established where lower food insecurity is linked to lower risk of obesity, heart disease, type 2 diabetes and certain cancers. Healthy eating can help people with chronic diseases manage these conditions and avoid complications. The crisis in food security among the most vulnerable population has been reported and has come to light more recently in the Aloha United Way's 2024 ALICE Report. The Report indicated that 28% of households statewide face food insecurity; nearly half (46%) of households below the ALICE Threshold do not have consistent access to food.

Programs that encourage partnerships between farmers and food assistance programs can make a profound impact. By investing in Hawaii-grown agriculture producers, the State can support not only local farmers but also the communities they feed. This approach aligns with the values of mālama 'āina, caring for the land, and ensures that the State honors the deep connection between the land and the people of Hawaii. Uplifting local farmers will also uplift the entire community, fostering a more resilient food system that can withstand future challenges. The Hawai'i Farm to Families Program would support not only families and their food needs, but would also provide Hawaii's agriculture

producers with a market to support their operations, and keep moneys circulating within the State to boost the local economy.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of **HB 428**, which would support a Farm to Families program. This bill would appropriate funds to alleviate food shortages in the State by ensuring fresh produce is directed to families in need.

A strong emergency food system is a critical pillar of food equity and resiliency, which is why we support instituting a Farm to Families program at the state level. This legislation would strengthen local food supply chains, from supporting the local agricultural economy to guaranteeing that nutritious food is available to more families, to reducing farm food waste.

Fresh, local produce is essential for improving community health, yet is often out of reach for many families struggling to afford life in Hawai'i. This program would help make healthy, whole foods available to more people, thereby alleviating hunger and preventing long-term health issues like diabetes, heart disease, stroke, and depression.¹

Most recently, the Maui wildfires contributed to a spike in food insecurity–as many as 49% of Maui's population.² It was the food banks and distribution partners who stepped in–institutions that historically have relied almost entirely on charitable contributions.

By strengthening the partnerships between local farmers and our food banks, we are setting up a food system that is not as reliant on imports and puts back money in our local economy. Our state has set goals to double our local food production by 2030; passing this bill is one step to getting us there.³

Testimony in Support of House Bill 428

Aloha e nā Luna o ka Hale o nā Lunamaka'āinana,

My name is Tiare Smith, a Native Hawaiian resident of Kahalu'u, O'ahu, where I have lived for 45 years. As a daughter of this 'āina, I have borne witness to its bounty and its burdens, to the resilience of our people, and to the precipitous decline in our ability to sustain ourselves amidst rising economic and environmental pressures. It is with profound conviction that I submit this testimony in unwavering support of House Bill 428, an Act Relating to Farm to Families, which promises to address the unconscionable specter of food insecurity that haunts our communities while honoring the symbiotic relationship between our local farmers and the families they nourish.

The data presented in HB 428 is both sobering and galvanizing: one in three households in Hawaii struggles to secure consistent access to food, with Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander families—my own kith and kin—bearing the brunt of this crisis at a rate exceeding forty percent. This is not merely a statistic; it is a clarion call to rectify longstanding inequities that disenfranchise our most vulnerable, particularly our keiki, nearly thirty percent of whom endure the indignity of hunger. The legislature's findings illuminate the cascading consequences of such deprivation—cognitive impairment, behavioral challenges, and mental health crises—each a preventable tragedy antithetical to the values of aloha and mālama that define us as a people.

HB 428 proposes a visionary solution: the Hawaii Farm to Families Program, which would empower the Department of Agriculture to fund food banks in purchasing, storing, and transporting fresh, Hawaii-grown produce to those in need. This initiative is a masterstroke of pragmatism and principle. By forging a robust partnership between our local farmers and community food systems, the bill not only alleviates immediate hunger but also fortifies the economic and ecological resilience of our islands. The Hawaii Foodbank's investment of over \$11,000,000 in local produce over the past five years—yielding a nearly \$19,000,000 boost to our economy—demonstrates the transformative potential of such an approach. HB 428 would amplify this impact, ensuring that crops like kalo, 'ulu, and Okinawan sweet potato—staples of our cultural and nutritional heritage—reach the tables of those who need them most.

For 45 years, I have watched Kahalu'u and its surrounding communities grapple with the rising cost of imported goods, a dependency that erodes our self-sufficiency and inflates the suffering

of our families. HB 428 offers a sustainable antidote, reducing our reliance on external supply chains while creating a stable market for Hawaii's 575 local farms and food hubs. This is not merely an economic transaction; it is an act of mālama 'āina, a reaffirmation of our duty to care for the land that sustains us. By channeling state resources into this program, we uplift our agricultural producers, bolster our local economy, and restore dignity to households teetering on the edge of despair.

I urge the legislature to consider the moral and practical imperatives of this bill. To delay or deny its passage is to perpetuate a status quo that is untenable—a disservice to our keiki, our kūpuna, and the generations yet to come. HB 428 is a rare convergence of policy and pono, a chance to weave a stronger, healthier, and more equitable tapestry for Hawaii. I implore you to enact this measure with the urgency it demands, appropriating the necessary funds to bring its promise to fruition.

We are developing a 75 acre community ag center where we are exploring and implementing a vertically integrated farm that is increasing food security and resiliency for the island of kaua'i. We are writing in support of the "Farm to Families" bill, a critical piece of legislation that will help secure a consistent market for local food producers like us, strengthening our community food systems and ensuring that fresh, locally grown produce reaches families facing food insecurity. We have been distributing food boxes around the island since COVID and feel strongly in finding the mechanisms to continue the program in perpetuity. The 250 boxes a week we produce have helped the farm and retail store reduce waste and provide a healthy alternative to other food bank foods currently available.

One of our biggest challenge is to find long term reliable markets that can support small and medium size farms, and this bill will do just that.

With a growing market share the local production can increase and the reliability and quality can be supported. Our heavy reliance on imports makes us very vulnerable especially in time of crisis and every concrete support will ensure for a more sustainable and resilient for food system. Now we'll diversify the economy allowing more farmers to have ways to bring their product to market and support other added value businesses and restaurants by increasing their production. But this cannot happen without the financial commitment that the state can provide to create a tomorrow where most people eat locally grown produce as we have an incredible ability to grow round the year an incredible variety of fruits and vegetables and protein.

Many of them come to us from homelessness. We are master's students in Early Childhood Education, committed to serving young children and their families throughout Hawai'i. Together, we work as Parent/Child Educators, in Public Pre-K programs, and in a private preschool serving Native Hawaiian children, each of us supporting vulnerable communities that are impacted by economic and food insecurity.

Every day, we witness the impact that food insecurity has on the health, development, and wellbeing of the children and families we serve. We are compelled to voice our strong support for this bill, as it offers a meaningful solution to the food shortages affecting our communities. By ensuring greater access to fresh, locally grown food, this bill has the power to uplift not only our keiki ,but also their families and the farmers who nourish them.

We strongly support HB 428, Relating To Farm To Families, which establishes the Hawai'i Farm to Families Program to alleviate food shortages in the state.

According to a 2024 report by the Hawai'i Foodbank, our state is facing a growing food crisis, 30% of households are struggling to maintain consistent access to food. Rising food costs are putting even more strain on Hawai'i's families. From November 2024 to January 2025, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (2025) reported a 1.9 percent increase in food prices in urban Hawai'i, while four of the six major grocery stores reported an even steeper increase of 3.4 percent. This crisis affects our keiki the hardest, placing them at increased risk for cognitive delays, behavioral challenges, and long-term health disparities (Gallegos et al., 2021). No child should have to face these obstacles simply because their family cannot afford nutritious food.

HB 428 provides a sustainable community-driven solution by connecting food banks with our local farmers to supply fresh, locally grown produce to families in need. This program not only ensures that vulnerable populations receive nutritious food, but also fosters economic resilience by investing in our local agriculture sector, by providing them access to local families who need healthy produce and other food products, and a regular and predictable way to distribute their goods. This bill aligns with our values of mālama 'āina, caring for the land, and reinforces the deep connection between food security and community well-being and has broad support from local farmers on all islands.

Access to fresh, nutritious food is critical for healthy keiki and 'ohana, and this bill would help ensure that families have consistent access to local, healthy options. By supporting this program, we uplift both our farmers and our most vulnerable residents, creating a healthy, strong, and resilient Hawai'i.

We urge the committee to pass HB 428.

From November 2024 to January 2025, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (2025) reported a 1.9 percent increase in food prices in urban Hawai'i, while four of the six major grocery stores reported an even steeper increase of 3.4 percent. This crisis affects our keiki the hardest, placing them at increased risk for cognitive delays, behavioral challenges, and long-term health disparities (Gallegos et al., 2021). No child should have to face these obstacles simply because their family cannot afford nutritious food.

HB 428 provides a sustainable community-driven solution by connecting food banks with our local farmers to supply fresh, locally grown produce to families in need. This program not only ensures that vulnerable populations receive nutritious food, but also fosters economic resilience by investing in our local agriculture sector, by providing them access to local families who need healthy produce and other food products, and a regular and predictable way to distribute their goods. This bill aligns with our values of mālama 'āina, caring for the land, and reinforces the deep connection between food security and community well-being and has broad support from local farmers on all islands.

Access to fresh, nutritious food is critical for healthy keiki and 'ohana, and this bill would help ensure that families have consistent access to local, healthy options. By supporting this program, we uplift both our farmers and our most vulnerable residents, creating a healthy, strong, and resilient Hawai'i.

We urge the committee to pass HB 428.
