Testimony on H.B. 429 – RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING

Chair Woodson, Vice Chair La Chica, and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **support of H.B. 429** which appropriates funds to hire teachers and teacher assistants and for equipment and services for public preschools.

H.B. 429 aligns with our *Ready Keiki* initiative, the Administration's multi-faceted plan to ensure universal access to high-quality childcare and preschool. The Executive Office on Early Learning and School Facilities Authority built and refurbished over 50 classrooms to date and anticipate adding an additional 50 classrooms in the next two years. In 2024, the National Institute for Early Education Research's annual *State of Preschool* report found that Hawai'i is only one of five states in the country to meet 10 of 10 research-based quality benchmarks for its public pre-kindergarten programs. We must ensure that we have qualified teachers and teacher assistants to ensure keiki success.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services supports this measure and defers to the Department of Education and the Executive Office on Early Learning. DHS respectfully requests that any appropriation align with the amount requested in the executive budget and not reduce or replace a priority identified in the executive budget.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to hire teachers and teacher assistants and for equipment and services for public preschools.

There continues to be a statewide shortage of qualified caregivers and staff for early learning programs due to low wages and lack of benefits. Additionally, operating costs for child care programs continue to rise.

This measure aims to increase the number of public pre-k teachers and teacher assistants, assist in covering additional services and equipment costs needed for children and staff, and expand the existing child care capacity.

Executive Office on Early Learning's Position: SUPPORT

The Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) offers the following comments in strong support of H.B. No. 429.

This House Majority Package bill appropriates funds and authorizes positions to support the expansion of EOEL Prekindergarten (Pre-K) classrooms over the next biennium. It aligns with the funding requested in the Governor's proposed executive budget and has been identified as a priority of the Lieutenant Governor's Ready Keiki initiative. We are grateful to the House Majority Caucus for introducing this bill and appreciate the opportunity to highlight this funding request.

EOEL works in partnership with the Hawai'i State Department of Education (HIDOE) to administer 92 Public Pre-K classrooms in 74 HIDOE campuses across the State. The funding and positions in this bill would allow EOEL to add an additional 50 classrooms over the next two years.

In 2020, the Hawaii State Legislature passed Act 46 which established a framework and benchmarks for achieving universal access to early learning for 3- and 4-year-olds. The requested expansion of EOEL Pre-K classrooms helps advance our progress toward these goals and supports educational equity through priority enrollment for at-risk children.

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Since the passage of Act 46, the number of EOEL prekindergarten classrooms has grown. However, demand remains high, with the number of applications far exceeding the number of available classroom seats for the 2024-25 school year.

As the program continues to grow, EOEL also works closely with HIDOE to ensure children enrolled in our classrooms receive high-quality early childhood development and early learning experiences that promote Kindergarten readiness. We are happy to report that the program is consistently recognized by the National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) for meeting benchmarks for quality standards, and as of their 2023 report, Hawai'i is one of only five states that met all 10 benchmarks for state preschool programs.

EOEL strongly supports H.B. No. 429, as it will expand access to high-quality early learning, advance educational equity, and help fulfill the state's commitment to universal access to early learning for 3 and 4-year-olds. We appreciate the Legislature's continued investment in our youngest keiki and their families and respectfully request your support of this funding.

E ka Luna Hoʻomalu Woodson, ka Hope Luna Hoʻomalu La Chica, a me nā lālā o ke Kōmike Hoʻonaʻauao o ka Hale o nā Lunamakaʻāinana, aloha nui kākou. My name is Dr. Waiʻaleʻale Arroyo, Vice President of Hiʻialo at Kamehameha Schools.

Kamehameha Schools **supports** HB 429, which supports the continued implementation of EOEL public preschool for Hawai'i's keiki.

According to recent figures, only 41.4% of Native Hawaiian children attend preschool and 1 in 2 are living below the ALICE threshold. The continued expansion ensures that all keiki including Native Hawaiians have access to early learning in their community. Such access is important to ensure the readiness of keiki to enter kindergarten while lessening the financial burden on families.

Founded in 1887 by the legacy of Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, Kamehameha Schools (KS) is a private, educational, charitable trust committed to improving the capability and well-being of Native Hawaiian people through education. KS envisions a thriving lāhui where learners, grounded in Christian and Hawaiian values, grow into 'ōiwi leaders who inspire and contribute to their communities, both locally and globally.
