Testimony on H.B. 692 – RELATING TO THE PRESCHOOL OPEN DOORS PROGRAM

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **support of H.B. 692, H.D. 1** which expands the preschool open door program's eligibility criteria to allow more keiki and their ohana to be served by this program.

Access to preschool is a social justice issue in our state and we know that children who attend high-quality preschool are much better prepared for success. H.B. 692, H.D. 1 aligns with our *Ready Keiki* initiative, the Administration's multi-faceted plan to expand access to high-quality childcare and preschool. Our focus is on ensuring that our keiki are ready for Kindergarten and creating economic stability for families returning to the workforce. The success of *Ready Keiki* depends on a multi-pronged approach which includes building and refurbishing classrooms, creating teaching pathways for educators, and expanding the Preschool Open Doors program for local families. The amendments proposed in H.B. 692, H.D. 1 are critical to ensuring we have enough classrooms for all keiki.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the bill

and provides comments.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill is to expand the Preschool Open Doors Program's

eligibility criteria. Repeals the requirement that Preschool Open Doors Program providers be

accredited. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1).

DHS appreciates the amendments of the Committee on Human Services &

Homelessness:

- 1) Clarifying that the Preschool Open Doors Program shall continuously serve children who are in the three years prior to kindergarten entry until they enter kindergarten;
- 2) Clarifying the types of child care programs that are eligible to participate in the Preschool Open Doors Program;
- Specifying that a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the Preschool Open Doors Program may share in the costs of the Program through a copayment based on need rather than an amount of up to one dollar;
- 4) Changing the effective date to July 1, 3000, to encourage further discussion; and
- 5) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style.

The Department and the proponents of this bill have discussed to gain a better understanding of the need for inclusion of family child care homes for the Preschool Open Doors program and the Department's concerns with ensuring the child care setting is suitable in preparing children for their eventual entry into kindergarten. The conversations also addressed ensuring that children participating in one Preschool Open Doors program year are given consideration to continue their participation in the subsequent Preschool Open Doors program year, provided they are still eligible. As a result of these discussions, the Department has reviewed the proponent's suggested amendments and agrees with the suggestions.

The Early Learning Board (ELB) formulates statewide policy relating to early learning, as well as directing the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL).

The ELB supports HB 692 HD1, which would allow families with children ages two up to kindergarten entry to apply for Preschool Open Doors (POD) subsidies. This expansion of state subsidies will greatly benefit Hawai'i's working families.

Executive Office on Early Learning's Position: SUPPORT

The Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) offers the following comments in support of H.B. No. 692, H.D. 1 and defers to the Department of Human Services (DHS) regarding implementation and funding.

The Preschool Open Doors program plays a crucial role in helping families afford quality child care. This legislation will expand access to early learning opportunities for Hawai'i's families by expanding eligibility for the Preschool Open Doors program to include 2-year-olds (children three years prior to kindergarten entry) and by repealing the accreditation requirement for program providers.

Community-based early learning providers are vital to a strong, mixed-delivery early learning system, offering families flexibility in choosing care that best meets their needs. Many of these providers also have the capacity to offer full-day and year-round care, which is not offered by most free public prekindergarten programs but is essential for many working families.

Reducing financial barriers to community-based early learning programs also enables more parents and caregivers to participate in the workforce while ensuring their children receive the early childhood development and learning experiences critical to lifelong well-being.

We appreciate the Legislature's continued investment in our youngest keiki and their families. Thank you for the opportunity to share these comments in support of H.B. No. 692, H.D. 1.

As it stands, the Preschool Open Doors Program (POD) is a vital resource for families with 3- and 4-year-old children, offering much-needed financial assistance to make child care more affordable and accessible. By expanding eligibility to include 2-year-olds, this bill acknowledges the importance of early childhood development during these formative years and addresses a substantial gap in child care support for families with younger children.

Child care expenses are one of the largest financial burdens for families on O'ahu, with some households paying upwards of 48 percent of their income on child care tuition. Expanding the POD program to include 2-year-olds will help alleviate these pressures, allowing families to remain in the workforce, achieve greater economic stability, and provide a strong foundation for their keiki to grow and thrive.

We also strongly support efforts to enhance quality in early learning programs. The Department of Human Services recently established an accreditation program to promote accreditation and other quality improvement measures. Since the POD program is vital in expanding family access to early learning opportunities, we support removing the accreditation requirement in this bill. Other complementary programs are already in place to support quality improvement efforts, ensuring that expanded access is not done at the expense of quality.

E ka Luna Ho'omalu Yamashita, ka Hope Luna Ho'omalu Takenouchi, a me nā lālā o ke Kōmike Waiwai o ka Hale o nā Lunamaka'āinana, aloha nui kākou. My name is Dr. Wai'ale'ale Arroyo, Vice President of Hi'ialo at Kamehameha Schools.

Kamehameha Schools <u>supports</u> HB 692, HD1, which expands the eligibility for the Preschool Open Doors (POD) Program making it easier for Hawai'i's families to access early learning opportunities.

The expansion to 2-year-olds will allow all families, including Native Hawaiian families, to access early learning opportunities earlier, essentially giving keiki three years of preschool preparation. We also commend the adjustments to the administration of the child care provider accreditation program. These additions minimize costs, giving providers a supportive pathway to achieve accreditation.

Founded in 1887 by the legacy of Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, Kamehameha Schools (KS) is a private, educational, charitable trust committed to improving the capability and well-being of Native Hawaiian people through education. Early Childhood Action Strategy (ECAS) is a statewide cross-sector collaborative designed to improve the system of care for Hawai'i's youngest children and their families. ECAS partners work to align priorities for children prenatal to age eight, streamline services, maximize resources, and improve programs to support our youngest keiki.

ECAS supports, with amendments, HB692 HD1, which would expand the Preschool Open Doors program's eligibility criteria and significantly increase access to early learning programs for young children and their families. *No appropriation is requested as part of this measure.*

High-quality early learning programs provide children with the experiences and environments that are pivotal to school readiness and lead to improved educational, economic, health and well-being outcomes for children, lasting into adulthood. The Preschool Open Doors (POD) program currently provides key financial assistance to families to facilitate access for 3 and 4-year-old children to these child care and early learning programs. The POD program changes proposed in this measure would expand eligibility to 2-year old children and decrease some of the additional barriers that have restricted and/or are projected to limit full uptake of the assistance available to, and critically needed by families.

By expanding POD eligibility to include 2-year-olds, this bill acknowledges the importance of early childhood development during these formative years and addresses a substantial gap in child care support for families with younger children. The bill will also reduce the significant financial burden many families face regarding child care expenses. Hawai'i has some of the highest child care tuition rates in the nation, with expenses for families comparable to, and at times even exceeding, housing costs. Assistance for 2-year olds, as well as the proposed adjustment to continuous services will alleviate financial pressures, enabling families to remain in the workforce and achieve greater economic stability, while simultaneously laying a strong foundation necessary for our keiki to grow and thrive.

Expansion of the child care settings in which POD assistance may be applied, will also be instrumental to increasing children's access to early learning opportunities. Inclusion of family child care homes, and removal of the accreditation requirement for child care centers will significantly increase the availability of child care seats for children in the current landscape where capacity and vacancies are highly limited. We strongly encourage the continued promotion of program quality through the accreditation support programs recently established by



the Department of Human Services, and the rate incentives embedded in the POD payment structure, without the limitations to choice and access posed by an accreditation *requirement*.

We would like to especially highlight the inclusion of family child care providers as a much-needed option for local families to access early learning opportunities for their children. Family child care providers can often better meet the needs of families with non-traditional parental work hours, match the cultural and linguistic preferences of families, and are often found in rural communities in which larger child care centers cannot be sustained. Enacting policy that recognizes family child care providers as eligible for POD funding would result in immediate growth in the number of available early learning slots for local keiki.

Related to quality practices that promote school readiness, we would also like to note that high quality early learning experiences that prepare children for kindergarten can be made available to children as much in family child care settings as in formal child care center classroom settings.

To address inclusion of family child care homes as eligible POD providers, with quality safeguards, we respectfully recommend the following amendments to Section 2, subsection (c), page 4, lines 1-2:

(3) An exempt center-based provider that meets the 2 requirements of section 346-152.5+; or

(4) A family child care home that is registered by the department in accordance with section 346-171, provided that they meet at least one of the following quality standards:

- i. is accredited through the National Association for Family Child Care or National Early Childhood Program Accreditation;
- ii. participates in a partnership program that aligns with federal Head Start or state prekindergarten program standards; or
- iii. achieves a satisfactory score on a nationally-recognized quality rating or assessment tool.

Additionally, to support the continuity of care and enrollment of children who have multiple years of ageeligibility for POD, we respectfully recommend the following amendment to Section 2, subsection (b), page 2, lines 10-13:

(b) Subject to the availability of funds, the program shall <u>continuously</u> serve [three- and four-year-old] children who are in the [two] three years prior to kindergarten entry <u>until they enter kindergarten</u> pursuant to section 302A-411- and each year prioritize children who were participating in the program in the year prior, provided they continue to meet program eligibility requirements.

Aloha e Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and members of the committee:

On behalf of Hawai'i Children's Action Network (HCAN) Speaks!, mahalo for the opportunity to testify in **STRONG SUPPORT of H.B. No. 692 H.D. 1**, which expands the eligibility criteria for the Preschool Open Doors (POD) program and removes the requirements that POD providers be accredited. This measure is essential in increasing access to early learning for families across Hawai'i, particularly those with young children who face financial barriers to participation.

 The Need for Subsidies for Families with Two-Year-Olds – The early years of a child's life are crucial for cognitive, social, and emotional growth. However, the cost of early learning remains a significant burden for many families. Expanding POD eligibility to include twoyear-olds ensures that more children receive the early learning experiences necessary for future success, reducing long-term disparities in opportunities.

Research consistently shows that early intervention and structured environments significantly impact a child's future achievements and overall well-being. Providing subsidies for families with younger children would allow more parents/guardians to enter or remain in the workforce, ultimately strengthening Hawai'i's economy while ensuring children receive the foundational experiences they need.

2. Removing Accreditation Requirement to Increase Accessibility – Currently, a limited number of group child care centers and infant-toddler centers in Hawai'i hold accreditation from organizations such as the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) and the National Early Childhood Program Accreditation (NECPA). While accreditation is one indicator of standards, it is a costly and time-consuming process for providers. The high costs associated with accreditation, which can exceed \$4,000 for initial fees alone, often create barriers for smaller, community-based child care centers.

Since the number of child care centers in Hawai'i has been declining, removing the accreditation requirement will allow more providers to participate in the POD program, thereby expanding options for families in need. Many non-accredited centers still maintain strong care and development programs but cannot afford the financial and administrative burden of accreditation. This change will ensure that families have a broader selection of preschools to choose from without limiting access due to accreditation requirements.

3. Including Family Child Care Homes – In addition to expanding eligibility, it is crucial that family child care homes be included as providers under the POD program. Family child care homes offer a nurturing and flexible environment that many working families rely on. These providers often serve smaller groups, allowing for individualized attention and care that supports early development. By ensuring family child care homes are eligible for participation in the POD program, the state can broaden the options available to parents and care givers, making early learning more accessible to families in both urban and rural communities.

To address inclusion of family child care home as eligible POD providers, with quality safeguards, we respectfully recommend the following amendments to Section 2, subsection (c), page 4, lines 1-2:

(3) An exempt center-based provider that meets the 2

requirements of section 346-152.5; or

(4) A family child care home that is registered by the

Department, in accordance with sections 346-171, provided

that they meet at least one of the following quality

standards:

- is accredited through the National Association for Family Child Care or National Early Childhood Accreditation;

By passing **H.B. No. 692 H.D. 1**, the Legislature can take a crucial step toward making early learning more accessible and affordable for Hawai'i's families. Parents and Children Together (PACT) <u>supports HB 692 HD1</u> Relating to the Preschool Open Doors **Program**, which expands the program's eligibility criteria, resulting in more local keiki being able to access early learning services at a younger age.

Research continues to show that—despite the expansion of state-funded early learning services and programs—less than 40% of 4-year-olds and less than 15% of 3-year-olds are enrolled in state-funded programs—clearly demonstrating a continued lack of access for many children and families. The bill will reduce the significant financial burden many families face regarding child care expenses. The cost of child care is one of the largest expenses for many families on Oahu and across the State, often exceeding housing or other essential needs.

While family child care providers are generally limited in their inclusion in state-funded early learning offerings and programs, research indicates that they can play an outsized role in a community's overall early learning framework. Studies have also found that family child care providers are an important option. Low-income families, those with non-regular work hours, and ethnic or racial minorities are likely to utilize family child care providers. Making family child care providers eligible for POD funding would result in immediate growth in the number of available early learning slots for local keiki.

Founded in 1968, PACT is a statewide community-based organization providing a wide array of innovative and educational social services to families in need. Assisting more than 15,000 people across the state annually, we help identify, address, and successfully resolve challenges through our 20 programs. Among our services are early education programs, domestic violence prevention and intervention programs, child abuse prevention and intervention programs, child hood sexual abuse supportive group services, child and adolescent behavioral health programs, sex trafficking intervention, poverty prevention and community building programs.

Dear Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and the Members of the Committee,

Members of AAUW of Hawaii thank you for this opportunity to testify in **strong support of HB 692, HD1, Relating to the Preschool Open Doors Program** which will:

- Expand eligibility to include children ages 3-5 years old.
- Allow for continuous eligibility until kindergarten entry.
- Remove the accreditation mandate (but does continue to require licensure).
- Requires no appropriation.

Hawai'i is experiencing a child care crisis. The demand for available, quality, and affordable child care far exceeds the current capacity in Hawaii. There is only one opening for every four children ages six and below. The situation is even worse for those seeking a child care space for infants and toddlers with only one opening for every 37 children. This leaves families, and single parent households in particular in a bind. Without available child care services, many parents end up in a no-win position. They can either stay home with their young children and face increasing economic hardship or be stuck scrambling to find someone to "watch" their children. These informal child care settings often do not provide the necessary early childhood educational and developmentally appropriate activities which lead to a child being ready to enter kindergarten.

In Hawai'i, family members, especially grand parents have often stepped in to provide child care. Unfortunately, kupuna are finding it financially necessary to remain in, or return to, the workforce in order to make ends meet in our ever increasing expensive state.

In addition, having children actually penalizes women in the workforce. The Institute for Women's Policy Research reports 50.5% of households with children in Hawai'i have mothers who are the main source of family income. However, women working full time experience what's known as the "Motherhood Penalty". Working mothers make only \$.74 for every dollar working fathers make in Hawaii while the overall gender wage gap in Hawai'i where working women make \$.84 for every dollar a working man make.

The cost of licensed child care ranges from approximately \$13,000 to \$23,000 per year depending on the age of the child. The median income for a single parent family is \$43,050, which means that child care for an infant would use up over 50% of the salary; leaving little left over to pay for transportation, parking, food, housing and taxes.

One of the major obstacles preventing mothers from securing a well-paid, stable job is finding and retaining available, affordable, quality childcare. This measure increases the availability and access to the quality and affordable early child care which is so important for early childhood development and also allows parents the stability to continue in the workforce to provide for their family.
