- 1 Fiscal Implications: The Department of Health ("Department") requests that this measure be
- 2 considered as a vehicle to provide this needed funding so long as it does not supplant the
- 3 priorities and requests outlined in the Governors executive budget request. The appropriation of
- 4 \$1,750,000 for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the same amount for fiscal year 2026-2027.
- 5 **Department Position:** The Department would like to testify and offers comments.
- 6 **Department Testimony:** The Emegerncy Medical Service & Injury Prevention System Branch
- 7 (EMSIPSB) submits the following testimony on behalf of the Department of Health. We
- 8 acknowledge the intent behind this bill, particularly in addressing the challenges related to
- 9 distance and access to emergency services in underserved communities. Expanding access to
- 10 emergency medical services in these areas is an important step toward improving healthcare
- delivery and ensuring timely care for individuals in remote regions.
- However, we would like to raise a consideration regarding the call volume in these communities
- and whether it justifies the use of traditional 911 services. Given the potentially lower frequency
- of emergency calls, traditional 911 responses may not always be the most efficient or cost-
- effective approach to meeting the community's needs.
- 16 Further evaluation of call volume and service efficiency may be necessary to determine the most
- suitable solution for these areas. An alternative model worth considering is the use of Advanced

- 1 Life Support (ALS) services through programs like Community Paramedicine or Mobile
- 2 Integrated Health (MIH). These programs are designed to address both emergency and non-
- 3 emergency medical needs, offering care within the community at a potentially lower cost
- 4 compared to traditional 911 services. Community Paramedicine and MIH can provide targeted
- 5 care, including follow-up visits, preventative services, and chronic disease management, without
- 6 the need for costly emergency transports for non-urgent cases.
- 7 Incorporating alternative ALS services such as Community Paramedicine or MIH could
- 8 complement the bill's goals by providing additional support and services tailored to the unique
- 9 needs of the community, while also ensuring the most efficient use of available resources.
- 10 In conclusion, while the intent of the bill is clear and necessary, further consideration of the
- community's specific needs, call volume, and available service models, such as Community
- Paramedicine and MIH, may help ensure that the solution is both effective and sustainable.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) submits this testimony in **SUPPORT** of HB 784 which makes an appropriation for the operation of an additional ambulance for the island of

OHA is the constitutionally established body responsible for protecting and promoting the rights of Native Hawaiians. Among its statutory duties, OHA is required to (1) serve as principal public agency in the State of Hawai'i responsible for the performance, development and coordination of programs and activities relating to native Hawaiians and Hawaiians; (2) assess the policies and practices of other agencies impacting native Hawaiians and Hawaiians; and (3) conduct advocacy efforts for native Hawaiians and Hawaiians.²

In fulfillment of its mandates, OHA seeks to advance policies, programs and practices that increase access to quality, culturally informed healthcare for Native Hawaiians. HB 784 will expand critical emergency medical services infrastructure and mitigate transportation barriers, which is crucial for Native Hawaiians who live in rural areas on the island of Hawai'i. Given the island's significant growth and aging population³, an additional ambulance is necessary to help reduce death and disability among residents and visitors.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs respectfully urges this committee to PASS HB 784. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify.

Testimony in Support of House Bill 784

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Kazuo Todd, and I serve as the Fire Chief of the Hawai'i Fire Department. I appreciate the opportunity to provide testimony in strong support of House Bill 784, which would appropriate funding for an additional Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulance to be based in the Makalei area of North Kona.

The need for this ambulance is critical. The Kailua Fire Station ambulance is currently the busiest on the island, often responding to multiple calls back-to-back, leaving North Kona underserved when that unit is unavailable. This results in longer response times, with ambulances from outside the area having to travel significant distances to reach 911 callers, delaying life-saving care. By positioning an ambulance at Makalei Fire Station, we shorten the response for the population fo North Kona, but also provide second in medical response to back up Kailua and the residents of this region.

North Kona's population has grown significantly, and the demand for emergency medical services has increased with it. Many residents also face barriers to primary healthcare access, with clinics located up to 30 miles away. As a result, emergency medical services have become the first point of healthcare for many in the community. An additional ALS ambulance would enhance response capabilities, ensuring timely prehospital care, reducing patient morbidity and mortality, and improving overall public health outcomes.

For these reasons, I strongly urge the Legislature to pass House Bill 784 and ensure that North Kona receives the emergency medical services it desperately needs. Mahalo for your time and dedication to the health and safety of our community.

Good morning, Hawaii State Legislators my name is Chad Sohriakoff, and I am the Fire Rescue Captain at the Kailua Kona fire station. I would like to provide testimony here today to advocate for the urgent need for an additional ambulance in the North Kona District. As a first responder, I have witnessed firsthand the growing demand for emergency medical services in our community.

The district of Kona has experienced a significant increase in emergency calls due to population growth. The Kailua Kona fire station is the busiest Fire Station on the Island of Hawai'i. In 2024 alone the Kailua Kona fire Station received over 4,550 emergency calls.

Currently, our emergency response system in the district of Kona is under strain due to:

- 1. Longer Response Times- with limited ambulances, response times are increasing, putting lives at risk.
- 2. Overburdened EMS Personnel- our paramedics and EMTs are stretched thin, leading to burnout and staffing challenges.
- 3. Delays in Critical Care- In life-threatening situations, every second counts. A delay in emergency medical care can mean the difference between life and death.

Adding another ambulance to our emergency response fleet in Kona will:

- Reduce response times and improve patient outcomes.
- Enhance coverage across the county.
- Alleviate stress on our current EMS teams, improving their efficiency and well-being.

Investing in an additional ambulance is not just an expenditure; it is a critical investment in public safety and health. I urge this board to prioritize this request, ensuring that when residents call 911, help arrives swiftly.
