Aloha Chair Kila, Vice Chair Grandinetti, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of Young Brothers, LLC ("YB")¹ offering <u>STRONG SUPPORT</u> for Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 150, Senate Draft 1.

This resolution requests the Hawaii State Department of Transportation ("HDOT") to convene a working group and lead committees to develop and recommend federal, state, and county programs to subsidize the transport of waterborne cargo.

During the 2020 legislative session, the Hawaii State Senate adopted Senate Resolution No. 125, S.D. 1 (2020), requesting the PUC to convene the Hawaii Water Carriers Working Group ("HWCWG") to discuss and recommend solutions to ensure continuous water carrier service throughout the State, balanced with the need for water carriers to maintain financial sustainability. In the HWCWG's final report summarizing its findings and recommendations, the HWCWG recommended that the State Legislature pass a resolution directing the Hawaii Department of Transportation to convene working group(s) to create and recommend federal, state, and county subsidies for the transport of waterborne cargo. The working group found that due to Hawaii's dependency on the import of goods, maritime support to ensure food security in the State is required.²

¹ YB is a common carrier by water, transporting property by tug and barge between the islands of O'ahu, Hawai'i, Kaua'i, Maui, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i. YB is currently the only water carrier authorized to transport property under Chapter 271G, Hawaii Revised Statues ("HRS") (i.e., the Hawaii Water Carrier Act), subject to the regulatory authority of the Public Utilities Commission of the State of Hawaii ("PUC"). Since 1900, customers across Hawaii have relied on YB's frequent, regular, and universal sailings to serve as the bridge that connects all communities in this island-state.

YB is generally supportive of efforts to secure subsidies that can reduce the cost of shipping goods for its customers in ways that are consistent with State policy decisions. YB believes that such policy driven subsidies should be funded from external sources (e.g., federal funds or the State General Fund) rather than through cross-subsidization between YB's customers, which can lead to distorted non-cost-based rates for all customers.

In its March 25, 2025, testimony on this resolution, HDOT recommended "a reduction of the size of the working group to no more than five members excepting DOT, provided that the working group consult with additional parties prior to the transmittal of the report to the legislature." YB supports this recommendation as it may facilitate HDOT's ability to efficiently and effectively respond to this resolution.

For the reasons stated above, YB offers STRONG SUPPORT for this measure.

SB250 RELATING TO TAXATION

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and Members of the Committee,

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council **supports SB250** which creates an income tax credit for transportation costs incurred by certain taxpayers who ship agricultural products and inputs between counties.

As an island state, shipping agricultural goods is necessary for many parts of the supply chain. The rising cost of transportation can be prohibitive for both new and established agricultural operations. While the Reimbursement Transportation Cost Payment Program is a welcome federal program, we have found that the producer cap is too low, so this supplemental state program is a welcome solution.

Over the past couple of years, we have asked our DC Delegates to raise the cap, and it was raised a small amount recently to \$11,200. While we were grateful for that increase, it is still not nearly enough to cover the 25% the program aims to cover.

Young Brothers just recently proposed to increase interisland shipping rates substantially. This income tax credit could help to alleviate the burden of the steep proposed increase.

We respectfully ask that the bill specify that "qualified transportation costs" include "produce and agricultural goods, including livestock." (Page 7, line 10)

We appreciate the opportunity to testify on this measure. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the four county-level Cattlemen's Associations. Our member ranchers represent over 60,000 head of beef cows; more than 75% of all the beef cows in the State. Ranchers are the stewards of over 750 thousand acres of land in Hawaii, or 20% of the State's total land mass. We represent the interests of Hawaii's cattle producers.
