Dear Members of the Committee on Land and Water,

You will be holding a hearing on the nomination of Ms. Laura Thielen to be the Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. While I hear many favorable things about her, there is one matter that I respectfully suggest may prove disqualifying.

In the examination of her qualifications, an exploration of her participation in the illegal scheme to continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the ruling by the Hawai'i Supreme Court in the *Sierra Club* case, is appropriate.

In the hearing before the Senate on the proposed Superferry legislation, Mr. Fukunaga confirmed that, when lobbying against the 2007 legislation requiring an EIS for Superferry, he understood the law to mean that, if an EIS is required, the Superferry had to stop operating. The same law applies to an EA.

Then when the Supreme Court later issued its opinion that an EA is required, Mr. Fukunaga came out with his opinion that the Superferry could continue to operate while preparing an EA; he knowingly misstated the law. That deliberate misstatement set in motion all the illegal events the transpired up to the time Judge Cardoza entered his order.

I do not necessarily believe that Ms. Thielen understood that she was participating in an illegal act outside the scope of her authority. Nevertheless, she did participate.

In questioning Ms. Thielen during her confirmation hearing, you have an opportunity to continue the process of exploring what really happened in the Superferry episode.

I have attached a legal memorandum that is very blunt in its terms because it is part of papers being prepared to request a special prosecutor be appointed.

If Ms. Thielen is not accompanied by counsel, it would be appropriate to remind her of her Fifth Amendment rights against self incrimination. Even better would be to advise her in advance to appear with legal counsel. I assume that she will be under oath while testifying in her confirmation hearing.

I trust this submission will be viewed as contributing to your fulfilling your responsibilities in the confirmation process.

I believe Ms. Thielen deserved better than the leadership she received from the Governor and regret that matters got so far out of control and so far outside the law.

QUESTIONS POSED:

Did Laura Thielen, as Acting Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, participate in a conspiracy to illegally continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry after the Hawai'i Supreme Court ruling in the *Sierra Club* case required, as a matter of law, that all further operations of the Hawai'i Superferry Cease?

Did the acts committed by Ms. Thielen constitute terroristic threatening, a Class C felony?

On August 31, 2007, the Hawai'i Supreme Court issued its opinion in *The Sierra Club v. The Department of Transportation of the State of Hawai'i*.

In that opinion, the Court stated:

Therefore, based on this record, we can only conclude that DOT's determination that the improvements to Kahului Harbor are exempt from the requirements of HEPA was erroneous as a matter of law. The exemption being invalid, the EA requirement of HRS § 343-5 is applicable. This issue being dispositive, we need not consider Appellants' other arguments.

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) includes the following requirement:

- (2) The final authority to accept a final statement shall rest with:
 - (A) The governor, or the governor's authorized representative, whenever an action proposes the use of state lands or the use of state funds, or whenever a state agency proposes an action within the categories in subsection (a); or
 - (B) The mayor, or the mayor's authorized representative, of the respective county whenever an action proposes only the use of county lands or county funds.

Acceptance of a required final statement shall be a condition precedent to implementation of the proposed action.

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) (emphasis added).

Once the Hawai'i Supreme Court ruled that the State of Hawai'i is required to prepare an environmental assessment for the harbor improvements made to facilitate operation of the Hawai'i Superferry and for the operation of the Hawai'i Superferry itself, all the requirements of HRS § 343-5 applied. One of those requirements found in HRS § 343-5(b)(2) is completion and acceptance of the environmental assessment prior to any further operations by the Superferry.

DISCUSSION

Acceptance of a required final statement shall be a condition precedent to implementation of the proposed action.

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) (emphasis added). See also HAR § 11-200-23(c)

(Acceptance of a required statement shall be a condition precedent to the use of state or county lands or funds in implementing the proposed action.); see also Kepoo v. Kane, 106 Haw. 270, 291, 103 P.3d 939, 960 (2005); Kahana Sunset Owners Ass'n v. County of Maui, 86 Haw. 66, 74; 947 P.2d 378, 386 (1997); "Guidebook for the Hawaii State Environmental Review Process" (2004) published by the Hawaii Office of Environmental Quality Control at 9 (final EIS accepted before project can proceed) and 13 (environmental

review process must be completed before final approval of an action can be granted.)

The Hawaii Supreme Court has consistently upheld this legal principle. See e.g. Pearl Ridge Estates Comm. Ass'n v. Lear Siegler, Inc., 65 Haw. 133, 648 P.2d 702 (1982), (voided boundary amendment because EA had not been prepared prior to approval); Molokai Homesteaders. v. Cobb, 63 Haw. 453, 466, 629 P.2d 1134, 1144 (1981) (environmental compliance required "prior to a governmental approval").

The opinion that the Hawai'i Superferry could continue to operate while preparing an environmental assessment was contrary to law; "condition precedent" and "concurrent" are mutually exclusive terms.

There is no colorable question of law regarding the application of HRS § 343-5 to the facts in *The Sierra Club v. The Hawai'i Department of Transportation*. The law mandated that:

(1) The Hawai'i Superferry cease all use of harbor improvements made by the State of Hawai'i to facilitate Hawai'i Superferry's operation until such time as the State of Hawai'i completes an environmental assessment of the harbor improvements and of the operations of the Hawai'i Superferry and that assessment is accepted by the Governor or the Department of Transportation.

(2) Any attempt by the Hawai'i Superferry to resume operations using such improvements prior to completion and acceptance of the environmental assessment would be an illegal act.

(3) All Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies and the Executive Branch of the State were obligated to desist from facilitating the continued operation of the Hawai'i Superferry.

(4) All actions by a Federal, State, or local law enforcement agent or any member of the Executive Branch of the State to facilitate the continued operation of the Hawai'i Superferry constituted *ultra vires* acts (acts outside the authority of their office) and subjected the person acting to personal liability.

The official actions taken to continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the Supreme Court ruling, constituted actions outside the authority of the public officials involved and constituted both illegal actions and actions taken in furtherance of a conspiracy to violate the law.

Encouraging and facilitating the illegal operation of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the Supreme Court ruled that an environmental assessment was required, constituted malfeasance in office or official misconduct on the part of the Governor and the Director of the Department of Transportation.

The agreement between the Governor, the Director of the Department of Transportation, and the management/directors of Hawai'i Superferry, Inc. to continue operations of the Superferry illegally, after the Supreme Court ruled that an environmental assessment is required, constituted a conspiracy.

The events of August 26 and 27 in Nawiliwili Harbor, Island of Kaua'i, include the following civil torts and/or criminal offenses:

Even though State and Federal officials in the highest positions of responsibility were not present on August 26 and 27, to the extent those officials acted to create and/or facilitate the situation, those officials are accessories to the events on those dates.

On August 26 and 27, law enforcement officials arrested numerous people trying to prevent the implementation of the illegal conspiracy to continue Superferry operations. All those arrests were false arrests.

The people arrested on August 26 and 27 were falsely imprisoned.

Anyone participating in the Superferry enterprise who took from another person their boat, surfboard, boogie board, or other possession without their consent is guilty of theft.

The actions of law enforcement in seizing the property of people in the Nawiliwili Harbor area on August 26 and 27 took place with the implicit use of deadly force. Such actions constituted robbery.

In the course of aiding and abetting Superferry in violating the law, law enforcement personnel arrested, and detained against their will, citizens trying to enforce the law. Such actions constituted kidnapping.

To the extent the County Prosecutor pursued or continues to pursue prosecution of those arrested, rather than those participating in the illegal conspiracy, the County Prosecutor is engaged in, or is engaging in, obstruction of justice.

The Coast Guard boat that de-tarped and manned its large caliber machine gun in Nawiliwili Harbor committed an assault on those within range.

When the Governor then created the Unified Command to continue the illegal operation, all participants in the Unified Command joined the conspiracy.

HRS §707-716 Terroristic threatening in the first degree. (1) A person commits the offense of terroristic threatening in the first degree if the person commits terroristic threatening:

- (a) By threatening another person on more than one occasion for the same or a similar purpose;
- (b) By threats made in a common scheme against different persons;
- (c) Against a public servant arising out of the performance of the public servant's official duties. For the purposes of this paragraph, "public servant" includes but is not limited to an educational worker. "Educational worker" has the same meaning as defined in section 707-711; or
- (d) With the use of a dangerous instrument.

(2) Terroristic threatening in the first degree is a class C felony. [L 1979, c 184, pt of §1(2); am L 1989, c 131, §1; gen ch 1992; am L 2006, c 230, §31]

The press conference held by the Governor, the Coast Guard, and Superferry announcing the plan to return to Nawiliwili Harbor constituted an act of official terroristic threatening.

To the extent that the Attorney General cooperated with the Superferry illegal enterprise and/or failed to prosecute the government officials cooperating in that enterprise, the Attorney General is guilty of obstruction of justice.

The release of the statement of offenses and punishments aimed at those intending to enforce the law in Nawiliwili Harbor was the second act of official terroristic threatening. That second act triggers Section (a) of the State statute.

The Governor going to Kaua'i to again threaten people with arrest and prosecution is a third act of official terroristic threatening, reinforcing the application of Section (a) of the State statute.

Laura Thielen participated in the Governor's meeting on Kaua'I in her official capacity as Acting Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. As a participant, she committed the offense of terroristic threatening.

The official threats made against hundreds of people to further the Superferry enterprise triggered Section (b) of the State statute.

The people trying to enforce the law in the face of official lawlessness assumed a position as "public servants." The threats directed at these public servants triggers Section (c) of the State statute.

To threaten to arrest, prosecute, imprison and fine people acting in harmony with the law in order to further violations of law constitutes official terroristic threatening.

The inclusion of law enforcement personnel in the Unified Command added use of deadly weapons to enforce the threats, triggering section (d) of the statute.

The conspiracy to intimidate, arrest, prosecute, imprison, and fine the people trying to enforce the law against the illegal operation of Superferry constitutes a civil rights conspiracy with both state and private actors.

Water diversion hurts

Why did the Board of Land and Natural Resources turn off the water on Kaua'i's North Shore?

The Board of Land and Natural Resources, under Laura Thiclen (Interim Director, DLNR), recently voted to turn off the natural water supply to a large portion of Kaua'i's North Shore. A special legislative session is underway. One agenda item is confirming her nomination. The board's decision to dry up our streams adds insult to grievous injury: seven deaths, destruction of property and phenomenal damage to the Kilauea River watershed in March 2006.

The flow of water in streams throughout the area has totally ceased, not due to drought, but by deliberate action of DLNR. Water from state land is being diverted under the guise of "liability concerns" from streams not affected by the Kaloko Dam breach. The water now flows out to sea, bypassing traditional waterways. Wildlife habitat and nesting sites have been destroyed.

This action is widely impacting the 'aina. Farmers' livelihoods and residents' quality of life are affected. During droughts, brush fires are a threat. Surface water plays an important role in fire fighting, but the ponds are gone. Thus homes and lives are jeopardized.

Water flowing from state land belongs to the people. This issue must be resolved before irreparable damage is done to North Shore watersheds, residents and agriculture.

1. Why have some of our streams on the North Shore just dried up?
2. Why is water being diverted from natural streams to the ocean?
3. Water has also been turned off for months at Polihale State park.

I am curious to know whether the shutting off of the water on the North Shore was preceded by an environmental assessment. Maybe Ms. Thielen should leave her office and go camping at our beautiful "State Park". You will find that there are NO signs warning people that there is no water at the park. You will find the bathrooms to be a disgusting breeding ground of germs and feces. You will find toilet paper and feces in the keawe trees due to the lack of working facilities.

My family and I live on Kauai's North Shore. We packed up for family time at Polihale State park. It is over 2 1/2 hr drive for us. We brought with us a little fresh water to rinse off the kids but were not prepared to have NO water there. Needless to say there were NO warning signs either.

We have so many of our own issues and problems on Kauai without adding the Superferry passengers wanting to camp at our State Parks. Our facilities are NOT prepared for more visitors or campers. There are much needed stipulations addressed before the Superferry resumes business. The Courts ruled that an EA was to be completed BEFORE the Superferry was to run. I am still dumbfounded that we are in Special Session to change the law. This is so unconstitutional. How can an EA be done while the Superferry is running? Please correct me if I'm wrong. Environmental assessment is a procedure that ensures that the environmental implications of decisions are taken into account **before** the decisions are made. The process involves an analysis of the likely effects on the environment, recording those effects in a report, undertaking a public consultation exercise on the report, taking into account the comments and the report when making the final decision and informing the public about that decision. So why would we agree to let a private business run **before** an EA is complete?

Which leads me to my final question...

4. Why was Ms. Thielen sitting with the Governor at the meeting when she came to Kauai?

She has been appointed to protect this land. Why has she sold out to the Governor? We will be watching her! Her Loyalties should be to the land. Please do the right thing in protection and preservation of our Aina and examine carefully whether Ms. Thielen is really the right person for this responsibility.

SUBJECT: Testimony in Opposition to Confirmation of Gubernatorial
Nominee, LAURA H. THIELEN as Chairperson of the Board of Land and
Natural Resources (GM 5)

I am Dr. Thomas Dye, President of the Society for Hawaiian Archaeology (SHA). We have over 200 members that include professional archaeologists and advocates of historic preservation in general. At the behest of our membership, I am testifying in opposition to the confirmation of Laura Thielen as Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Many of our members routinely work with the Department's Historic Preservation Division and have done so for years.

At our 2007 annual business meeting held on October 20, 2007 in Kona, Hawai'i, our membership voted unanimously to oppose the nomination of Ms. Thielen based on the serious concerns our members have over the continued deterioration of the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) which stands in stark contrast to Ms. Thielen's publicly-announced assessment that SHPD has been and is moving in the "right direction." Ms. Thielen has stated that SHPD is one of her highest priorities and yet, to date, she has not demonstrated an informed understanding of how serious the division's problems are, or even what they are, and is proposing remedies that appear to be largely superficial and short-sighted. More troubling, she has not sought the solid advice of knowledgeable and experienced individuals who could provide her with the information and direction we believe she needs most. In short, she needs a reality check.

The following is a brief summary of our primary concerns:

Staffing: Although claims have been made that 24 or 25 out of the 27 positions are now filled, SHA understands that at least some newly hired archaeologists are "emergency" hires, meaning that their employment is for a 90-day period with one extension and not benefits. It is not clear what will become of these individuals or the positions when this employment period ends. Of greater concern, is that this hiring practice lends itself to the already very high level of staff turn-over and delays in the reconstruction the Division's badly damaged institution knowledge and experience. Are these the approaches the Administration is touting as "creative"?

Lowering Professional Qualifications: Position descriptions for archaeological and history and culture professional positions have been recently rewritten, to reduce the minimum qualifications and experience individuals need to fill SHPD's primary professional positions. Previously, these qualifications were consistent with or exceeded

national historic preservation standards. In addition, multiple levels archaeological qualifications have now been created but no additional positions have been created to absorb these additional levels. Thus, individuals with lower qualifications can and are now filling positions that were once held by individuals with advanced degrees and/or years of experience in Hawaiian archaeology. More importantly, these recent hires are not being trained or supervised by individuals with the higher qualifications and experience.

Archaeologists hired with reduced qualification are also being put in the awkward and vulnerable position of not meeting the qualifications required, by administrative rule, of anyone conducting archaeological work in Hawaii (§§13-281-2 and 3). Thus they are reviewing, without qualified supervision, the adequacy of reports and plans they are not qualified to prepare. Formerly job descriptions and qualifications for supervising professionals and those conducting reviews requiring professional judgment calls were based on the nationally recognized Standards of the Secretary of the Interior (http://www.nps.gov/history/local-law/arch_stnds_0.htm). Replacing the high number of departed staff with individuals with lower qualification and less experience will not help rebuild the institution and functions of SHPD no matter how well intended and dedicated the current staff may be.

Programmatic Agreement for HRS §6E-42 Project Reviews: Ms. Thielen has publicly touted an initiative she and the Governor's Office began to purportedly streamline the historic preservation review process and lower SHPD work loads. They wish to enter into programmatic agreements with county agencies that would define entire classes of projects and applications that would no longer be submitted to SHPD for review in accordance with HRS §6E-42. These are characterized as actions that are superfluous, such as road striping and the installation of grease traps, in that they would not affect historic properties in any way. Staff would then be able to focus on permitting and land use actions that have the greatest potential to impact historic properties.

While superficially this may sound reasonable and effective, on closer examination it is both potentially dangerous and unlikely to significantly reduce workloads. Basically, it shifts historic preservation decisions from SHPD staff to county planning staff or engineers that may not have the background to know if a project in a particular locale could affect historic properties and they may not have access to records needed to make what informed decisions. For example, on O`ahu alone we know of instances where grease trap excavations resulted in the inadvertent discovery of human burials. Also former SHPD staff who literally saw thousands of project submittals do not recall any that were solely for road striping. Road striping was generally part of larger highway improvement project that, depending on its location and depth of disturbance, could impact historic properties, particularly burials. Eliminating projects that are infrequently submitted will not significantly reduce workloads.

We note also that there is no basis in state law or regulations for such programmatic agreements as there is in the federal historic preservation process. A key factor in federal programmatic agreements is that most federal agencies with them have on staff historic

preservation specialists that can make professional judgment calls on whether an action is or is not excluded under the programmatic agreement.

We strongly question why the state is pursuing, at this time, a departure from long-standing policy and practice when the counties already have some latitude under HRS §6E-42 determining what projects will be submitted to SHPD for review. In the past, experienced and knowledgeable staff at SHPD, most of who had very good working relationships with their county staff, were able to quickly and effectively prioritize their workloads and filter out superfluous reviews. Staff was willing and able to do this because it ultimately supports a higher level of compliance with the state's historic preservation laws.

Weekly Posting of Reports and Plans and SHPD Determinations: The SHPD is required by regulation and by court settlement to provide a weekly web posting of all its review determinations and a list of all reports and plans received for review during the preceding week. During the last three years, the online postings became intermittent and erratic, with updates occurring at monthly or even quarterly intervals. From September 2006 through August 2007, no online postings whatsoever appeared on the division's website. The SHPD resumed the postings in August 2007 but in a confusing, diminished, and inaccurate format that is difficult for professionals to understand and probably impossible for the public to use as the regulations intended. Why was the database previously used for posting, which also served other office functions to reduce duplicate data input, abandoned?

Streamlining the Review Process: Given Ms. Thielen's emphasis on streamlining, it difficult to understand why previously established procedures implemented to support and streamline the compliance review process has been dismantled or abandoned and done so without replacements. For example, stamps with prepared compliance language were used to quickly approve plans where no historic properties would be affected. Use of the stamps was discontinued. In addition to the failure to maintain the weekly online postings described above, the SHPD's website is woefully out of date. Recent hires are not reflected in the staff listing, and all telephone contacts for O`ahu are referred to clerical staff. Agendas for the island burial councils are posted erratically, sometimes less than six business days before a meeting while minutes are posted months after they are due. A database of reports and plans in the SHPD library, formerly accessible online, was abruptly removed in 2005 and there has been no visible effort to replace it. Most importantly, the division's GIS database ? a critical tool for staff and public alike ? has apparently been scuttled, with all access to it denied. All of these things ? accomplished online ? would streamline the review process and greatly assist the public who must work with SHPD; not coincidentally, moving more information sources to the web would also free up staff time.

Privatization: Using reduced staffing as an excuse, the SHPD has begun to privatize various functions, ranging from the recovery of inadvertent burials to the regulatory reviews of reports and plans. There has been little transparency in developing or securing private services. The processes for determining which functions are privatized, how contracts for the work are let, who gets such contracts, and what

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accountability, if any, the private contractors have for their work is all unknown. More importantly, there appears to be no standard or thorough policy to avoid conflicts of interest.

Working Group Reports: We have waited in vain for SHPD and the department to report on the meetings of Historic Preservation Working Groups convened in 2006, and in which many SHA members participated. Although at least \$24,000 of State money was spent on this endeavor, there is still nothing to show for it, despite repeated inquiries made to successive Directors of DLNR. Ms. Thielen recently announced creation of a working group to assist the Bureau of Conveyances. We hope that interested parties concerned about that Division do not face the same fate.

Record Keeping: Our members report continual problems with SHPD's record keeping. It is commonplace for the division to claim that they cannot locate their own files or correspondence which can have serious consequences. SHA members have experienced situations where SHPD has claimed that copies of existing preservation plans or agreements cannot be found or previously issued approval letters are "missing." The resulting delays are costly to any permit applicant, and disastrous in the case of historic sites. How is the SHPD going to monitor such preservation plans if it can't keep track of its own records? Conversely, when SHA members and others have been denied access to SHPD records and files, often in an arbitrary and capricious manner, it has required the assistance of the Office of Information Practices to resolve these issues. Most serious of all, we are aware of several instances where the SHPD has apparently purged its correspondence files, erasing the state's record of its own historic preservation decisions.

In conclusion, we hope that the Committee carefully considers the concerns listed above. If Ms. Thielen is confirmed as Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, I wish to reconfirm our willingness, as a Society and as individual members, to help provide her with the information, perspectives, and experience we believe she needs to truly move the Historic Preservation Division in the "right direction." Thus far she has rebuffed our willingness to help, but we remain committed in our attempts to support this important state agency and its fundamental functions.

Dear Members of the Committee on Land and Water,

You will be holding a hearing on the nomination of Ms. Laura Thielen to be the Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. While I hear many favorable things about her, there is one matter that I respectfully suggest may prove disqualifying.

In the examination of her qualifications, an exploration of her participation in the illegal scheme to continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the ruling by the Hawai'i Supreme Court in the *Sierra Club* case, is appropriate.

In the hearing before the Senate on the proposed Superferry legislation, Mr. Fukunaga confirmed that, when lobbying against the 2007 legislation requiring an EIS for Superferry, he understood the law to mean that, if an EIS is required, the Superferry had to stop operating. The same law applies to an EA.

Then when the Supreme Court later issued its opinion that an EA is required, Mr. Fukunaga came out with his opinion that the Superferry could continue to operate while preparing an EA; he knowingly misstated the law. That deliberate misstatement set in motion all the illegal events the transpired up to the time Judge Cardoza entered his order.

I do not necessarily believe that Ms. Thielen understood that she was participating in an illegal act outside the scope of her authority. Nevertheless, she did participate.

In questioning Ms. Thielen during her confirmation hearing, you have an opportunity to continue the process of exploring what really happened in the Superferry episode.

I have attached a legal memorandum that is very blunt in its terms because it is part of papers being prepared to request a special prosecutor be appointed.

If Ms. Thielen is not accompanied by counsel, it would be appropriate to remind her of her Fifth Amendment rights against self incrimination. Even better would be to advise her in advance to appear with legal counsel. I assume that she will be under oath while testifying in her confirmation hearing.

I trust this submission will be viewed as contributing to your fulfilling your responsibilities in the confirmation process.

I believe Ms. Thielen deserved better than the leadership she received from the Governor and regret that matters got so far out of control and so far outside the law.

QUESTIONS POSED:

Did Laura Thielen, as Acting Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, participate in a conspiracy to illegally continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry after the Hawai'i Supreme Court ruling in the *Sierra Club* case required, as a matter of law, that all further operations of the Hawai'i Superferry Cease?

Did the acts committed by Ms. Thielen constitute terroristic threatening, a Class C felony?

On August 31, 2007, the Hawai'i Supreme Court issued its opinion in *The Sierra Club v. The Department of Transportation of the State of Hawai'i*.

In that opinion, the Court stated:

Therefore, based on this record, we can only conclude that DOT's determination that the improvements to Kahului Harbor are exempt from the requirements of HEPA was erroneous as a matter of law. The exemption being invalid, the EA requirement of HRS § 343-5 is applicable. This issue being dispositive, we need not consider Appellants' other arguments.

(emphasis added).

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) includes the following requirement:

(2) The final authority to accept a final statement shall rest with:

(A) The governor, or the governor's authorized representative, whenever an action proposes the use of state lands or the use of state funds, or whenever a state agency proposes an action within the categories in subsection (a); or

(B) The mayor, or the mayor's authorized representative, of the respective county whenever an action proposes only the use of county lands or county funds.

Acceptance of a required final statement shall be a condition precedent to implementation of the proposed action.

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) (emphasis added).

Once the Hawai'i Supreme Court ruled that the State of Hawai'i is required to prepare an environmental assessment for the harbor improvements made to facilitate operation of the Hawai'i Superferry and for the operation of the Hawai'i Superferry itself, all the requirements of HRS § 343-5 applied. One of those requirements found in HRS § 343-5(b)(2) is completion and acceptance of the environmental assessment prior to any further operations by the Superferry.

DISCUSSION

Acceptance of a required final statement shall be a condition precedent to implementation of the proposed action.

HRS § 343-5(b)(2) (emphasis added). See also HAR § 11-200-23(c)

(Acceptance of a required statement shall be a condition precedent to the use of state or county lands or funds in implementing the proposed action.); see also Kepoo v. Kane, 106 Haw. 270, 291, 103 P.3d 939, 960 (2005); Kahana Sunset Owners Ass'n v. County of Maui, 86 Haw. 66, 74; 947 P.2d 378, 386 (1997); "Guidebook for the Hawaii State Environmental Review Process" (2004) published by the Hawaii Office of Environmental Quality Control at 9 (final EIS accepted before project can proceed) and 13 (environmental

review process must be completed before final approval of an action can be granted.)

The Hawaii Supreme Court has consistently upheld this legal principle. See e.g. Pearl Ridge Estates Comm. Ass'n v. Lear Siegler, Inc., 65 Haw. 133, 648 P.2d 702 (1982), (voided boundary amendment because EA had not been prepared prior to approval); Molokai Homesteaders. v. Cobb, 63 Haw. 453, 466, 629 P.2d 1134, 1144 (1981) (environmental compliance required "prior to a governmental approval").

The opinion that the Hawai'i Superferry could continue to operate while preparing an environmental assessment was contrary to law; "condition precedent" and "concurrent" are mutually exclusive terms.

There is no colorable question of law regarding the application of HRS § 343-5 to the facts in *The Sierra Club v. The Hawai'i Department of Transportation*. The law mandated that:

(1) The Hawai'i Superferry cease all use of harbor improvements made by the State of Hawai'i to facilitate Hawai'i Superferry's operation until such time as the State of Hawai'i completes an environmental assessment of the harbor improvements and of the operations of the Hawai'i Superferry and that assessment is accepted by the Governor or the Department of Transportation.

(2) Any attempt by the Hawai'i Superferry to resume operations using such improvements prior to completion and acceptance of the environmental assessment would be an illegal act.

(3) All Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies and the Executive Branch of the State were obligated to desist from facilitating the continued operation of the Hawai'i Superferry.

(4) All actions by a Federal, State, or local law enforcement agent or any member of the Executive Branch of the State to facilitate the continued operation of the Hawai'i Superferry constituted *ultra vires* acts (acts outside the authority of their office) and subjected the person acting to personal liability.

The official actions taken to continue operations of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the Supreme Court ruling, constituted actions outside the authority of the public officials involved and constituted both illegal actions and actions taken in furtherance of a conspiracy to violate the law.

Encouraging and facilitating the illegal operation of the Hawai'i Superferry, after the Supreme Court ruled that an environmental assessment was required, constituted malfeasance in office or official misconduct on the part of the Governor and the Director of the Department of Transportation.

The agreement between the Governor, the Director of the Department of Transportation, and the management/directors of Hawai'i Superferry, Inc. to continue operations of the Superferry illegally, after the Supreme Court ruled that an environmental assessment is required, constituted a conspiracy.

The events of August 26 and 27 in Nawiliwili Harbor, Island of Kaua'i, include the following civil torts and/or criminal offenses:

Even though State and Federal officials in the highest positions of responsibility were not present on August 26 and 27, to the extent those officials acted to create and/or facilitate the situation, those officials are accessories to the events on those dates.

On August 26 and 27, law enforcement officials arrested numerous people trying to prevent the implementation of the illegal conspiracy to continue Superferry operations. All those arrests were false arrests.

The people arrested on August 26 and 27 were falsely imprisoned.

Anyone participating in the Superferry enterprise who took from another person their boat, surfboard, boogie board, or other possession without their consent is guilty of theft.

The actions of law enforcement in seizing the property of people in the Nawiliwili Harbor area on August 26 and 27 took place with the implicit use of deadly force. Such actions constituted robbery.

In the course of aiding and abetting Superferry in violating the law, law enforcement personnel arrested, and detained against their will, citizens trying to enforce the law. Such actions constituted kidnapping.

To the extent the County Prosecutor pursued or continues to pursue prosecution of those arrested, rather than those participating in the illegal conspiracy, the County Prosecutor is engaged in, or is engaging in, obstruction of justice.

The Coast Guard boat that de-tarped and manned its large caliber machine gun in Nawiliwili Harbor committed an assault on those within range.

When the Governor then created the Unified Command to continue the illegal operation, all participants in the Unified Command joined the conspiracy.

HRS §707-716 Terroristic threatening in the first degree. (1) A person commits the offense of terroristic threatening in the first degree if the person commits terroristic threatening:

(a) By threatening another person on more than one occasion for the same or a similar purpose;

(b) By threats made in a common scheme against different persons;

(c) Against a public servant arising out of the performance of the public servant's official duties. For the purposes of this paragraph, "public servant" includes but is not limited to an educational worker. "Educational worker" has the same meaning as defined in section 707-711; or

(d) With the use of a dangerous instrument.

(2) Terroristic threatening in the first degree is a class C felony. [L 1979, c 184, pt of §1(2); am L 1989, c 131, §1; gen ch 1992; am L 2006, c 230, §31]

The press conference held by the Governor, the Coast Guard, and Superferry announcing the plan to return to Nawiliwili Harbor constituted an act of official terroristic threatening.

To the extent that the Attorney General cooperated with the Superferry illegal enterprise and/or failed to prosecute the government officials cooperating in that enterprise, the Attorney General is guilty of obstruction of justice.

The release of the statement of offenses and punishments aimed at those intending to enforce the law in Nawiliwili Harbor was the second act of official terroristic threatening. That second act triggers Section (a) of the State statute.

The Governor going to Kaua'i to again threaten people with arrest and prosecution is a third act of official terroristic threatening, reinforcing the application of Section (a) of the State statute.

Laura Thielen participated in the Governor's meeting on Kaua'i in her official capacity as Acting Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. As a participant, she committed the offense of terroristic threatening.

The official threats made against hundreds of people to further the Superferry enterprise triggered Section (b) of the State statute.

The people trying to enforce the law in the face of official lawlessness assumed a position as "public servants." The threats directed at these public servants triggers Section (c) of the State statute.

To threaten to arrest, prosecute, imprison and fine people acting in harmony with the law in order to further violations of law constitutes official terroristic threatening.

The inclusion of law enforcement personnel in the Unified Command added use of deadly weapons to enforce the threats, triggering section (d) of the statute.

The conspiracy to intimidate, arrest, prosecute, imprison, and fine the people trying to enforce the law against the illegal operation of Superferry constitutes a civil rights conspiracy with both state and private actors.

Water diversion hurts

Why did the Board of Land and Natural Resources turn off the water on Kaua'i's North Shore?

The Board of Land and Natural Resources, under Laura Thiclen (Interim Director, DLNR), recently voted to turn off the natural water supply to a large portion of Kaua'i's North Shore. A special legislative session is underway. One agenda item is confirming her nomination. The board's decision to dry up our streams adds insult to grievous injury: seven deaths, destruction of property and phenomenal damage to the Kilauea River watershed in March 2006.

The flow of water in streams throughout the area has totally ceased, not due to drought, but by deliberate action of DLNR. Water from state land is being diverted under the guise of "liability concerns" from streams not affected by the Kaloko Dam breach. The water now flows out to sea, bypassing traditional waterways. Wildlife habitat and nesting sites have been destroyed.

This action is widely impacting the 'aina. Farmers' livelihoods and residents' quality of life are affected. During droughts, brush fires are a threat. Surface water plays an important role in fire fighting, but the ponds are gone. Thus homes and lives are jeopardized.

Water flowing from state land belongs to the people. This issue must be resolved before irreparable damage is done to North Shore watersheds, residents and agriculture.

Which leads me to my final question...

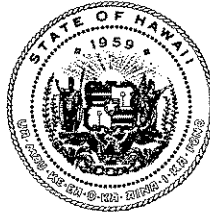
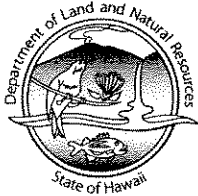
4. Why was Ms. Thielen sitting with the Governor at the meeting when she came to Kauai?

I. Introduction and Background

Aloha Senators Hee, Kokubun, Fukunaga, Tokuda and Whalen. Thank you for this opportunity to appear before you today and provide information about my background, qualifications, vision and goals for the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

Given the compressed schedule due to the nature of the special session, I have taken the liberty of providing this information in the form of an outline, so it is easier for you to scan and raise questions during the hearing today. I hope you find this helpful.

I have provided my resume and other background information to you previously. Today I'll just touch upon four personal matters that I think are most important because they convey my character and how I will behave as Chairperson of the Department, if you confirm my nomination.

First, I was raised in Hawaii, and as a teenager I had the great fortune of visiting the island of Kahoolawe twice on access with the Protect Kahoolawe Ohana. I have a great appreciation and deep aloha for our state, for the beauty of our environment, and the essential role our host culture plays in our state character and our unique sense of place. Hawaii is, and always has been, my home.

Second, I am now raising two daughters of my own, and it is critically important to me that I pass to them a state which is more beautiful, environmentally and culturally rich than it is now, and which can sustain them here so I can spoil my grandchildren in my own backyard.

Third, I believe that no matter how much I know, I have much more to learn. After my first visit to Kahoolawe, Uncle Harry Mitchell gave me my Hawaiian name, which means the mist which hangs next to the side of the pali. He choose that name because every

time he turned around after telling a story, he saw me standing to the side listening, and he thought of that mist. I listen, I ask questions, I make the effort to reach out to different groups to hear different views. I want to learn and I enjoy learning.

Fourth, I am not afraid to make a decision. I do not make hasty or ill-informed decisions, but I won't avoid decisions. I will always make principled decisions based upon what I believe to be the best interest of the Department and the state.

II. Role of the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources

If I were you, I'd want to know how the nominee views the role she is stepping into. In my opinion, the Chairperson of the Department is responsible for leading, ensuring and enabling the Department and its staff meets their public trust, statutory and administrative responsibilities. This entails managing a Department with a wide scope of responsibilities; multiple divisions and programs; and a large staff scattered across offices on multiple islands.

The Chairperson of the Department is responsible for the nuts and bolts management of an agency: making sure the divisions and program managers are operating effective programs and managing staff; recruiting and getting positions filled with qualified people; providing training and resources for staff to do their jobs; and, setting priorities for the resources allocated to the agency. The Chair is responsible for developing solutions to chronic problems that plague the department and interfere with the mission, and to work with staff to successfully implement those solutions.

The role also entails being a communicator and advocate for our state's natural and cultural resources. The Chairperson is responsible for communicating and advocating policy, management and legislative recommendations to the Governor, Legislature, Land Board and Water Commission, and, after final decision making, communicating those policies back through the Department for implementation. In addition, the Chairperson is responsible for communications between the agency and the general public, who are the beneficiaries of the state's natural resources; and between the Department and other federal, state and county agencies with shared jurisdiction over natural resources and public lands.

The Chairperson of DLNR should be guided at all times by serving the public trust responsibility over Hawaii's natural beauty and all natural, cultural and historic resources. The Chairperson is only a temporary steward of our most precious, fragile and finite resources. S/he is charged with ensuring these resources are passed to future generations.

III. Priorities and Goals

If I were you, I'd want to know the nominee's priorities for the department. I would like to share with you the three areas which I believe are the highest priorities for DLNR.

1. Transforming the DLNR from Resource Management to Resource Stewardship

The ancient Hawaiians understood the interrelationship between land and sea. However, our current regulatory structure is very sector-specific and ignores these interrelationships, to the detriment of our natural resources. For example, the Division of Aquatic Resources may take heroic actions to preserve coral reefs. However, these actions will be doomed to failure unless the Division of Forestry and Wildlife is equally successful at controlling deforestation; and other state and county agencies control urbanized polluted runoff. We must work in concert to be successful stewards of resources. No one division in DLNR, or one agency can be successful unless we all are successful.

As Director of the Office of Planning I led the development of the 2006 Ocean Resources Management Plan. This Plan provides a blueprint for the Department to integrate the areas of common focus of the divisions responsible for managing natural resources, and to work in a more coordinated fashion with other agencies. Integration between the Department divisions is essential to transforming the Department into a steward, rather than a manager, of natural resources.

2. Increase compliance with resource protection laws and rules through Education, Civil and Criminal Enforcement

Our resource protection laws and administrative rules cover all our land and three miles out into our waters. Clearly our state cannot afford sufficient police to staff all these areas at all times. Accordingly, we must rely on our residents to police themselves, and our visitor industry to assist with educating tourists to similarly police their behavior. Improving behavior will require a combination of constant education, strategic enforcement such as civil penalties and high-profile cases that serve as deterrents.

Sustained and directed education efforts, such as those designed to reduce smoking, have been extremely successful at changing public behavior. Similarly, targeted civil penalty strategies, such as the "Click-it-or-Ticket" have also significantly improved compliance rates with specific laws. DLNR should engage in strategic planning around enforcement which considers specific education and civil penalty pilot projects directed to improving certain behaviors, and monitor the effectiveness of those efforts.

Enforcement should not be the kuleana of one division within DLNR. All subject matter divisions play a key role in developing and disseminating educational programs. All divisions should be working with DOCARE when developing the concepts for administrative rulemaking and legislation, to ensure we are developing policies and procedures we can be successful in enforcing.

3. Develop the full mission of State Historic Preservation Division

Hawaii's rich history and culture define our state, and make us unique from every other place in the world. We have a rich host culture, lively and varied immigrant cultures, beautiful historic buildings, sites and landscapes, all of which provide a strong sense of character to our state. Given the accelerating pace of growth, we must be more proactive in identifying ways to preserve and enhance our cultural and historic sites.

DLNR is fortunate to have so many potential partners in this effort. We should join with this community to develop a shared, public database of regional surveys of cultural and historic sites; ways to enhance these sites, where appropriate, to preserve their beauty and educate our residents about our history. We must develop broader partnerships with our local landowners to meet our critical responsibility to re-inter the iwi kupuna. We must direct our attention to the types of projects that are most likely to impact cultural historic resources, and respond professional and expediently.

IV. Steps Taken During my 3 Months at DLNR (July 30 – October 25)

Finally, if I were you, I'd want to know what a new Chairperson has actually done, not just what she talks about. I am providing an outline of actions below, and will fill in the details during the testimony and while responding to your questions:

1. Introducing self and meeting DLNR staff & site visits

- a. Met with each Division at their Honolulu offices for overview briefing on programs, plans and budgets
- b. Brown Bag Mondays with any and all DLNR staff
- c. Weekly staff meetings
- d. Created DLNR Cabinet with division administrators to identify departmental priorities and increase collaboration
- e. Neighbor island site visits to meet DLNR staff and community (first Maui visit done; Kauai, Hilo, Kona scheduled)
- f. Scheduling Division Days: One day/week rotating through divisions to visit site/programs they want me to see

2. Historic Preservation Division

- a. Filling Positions (assisted by DHRD Deputy Director)
- b. Seeking salary differential to fill archeologist and cultural specialist Branch Manager positions to supervise professional staff
- c. Developing programmatic agreements with Federal Highway Transportation, counties
- d. Cleaning the database to organize and prioritize requests for review
- e. Decreasing backlog
- f. Secured office space in Hilo; Kauai
- g. Revised minimum qualifications for specialists to match federal standards

- h. Progress in re-interring iwi on Oahu and Maui
- i. Reaching out for new partnerships
 - OHA and native Hawaiian community
 - Historic Preservation Community

3. Bureau of Conveyances

- a. Met with all BOC employees twice: not taking sides; work with everyone moving forward
- b. Surveyed all BOC employees on preferences, ideas
- c. Management Training for all managers & supervisors
- d. Employee Assistance Program training for all Bureau staff
- e. Created RFP Working Group with representatives from Title, Escrow, Law, Banking, Real Estate, Land Court, Union to develop scope of contract to automate the paper filing process for the BOC
- f. Hired facilitator assigned to BOC to engage all staff in providing input and compiling questions regarding the automation of BOC process
- g. Creating BOC management team (Administrator and 2 Branch Managers) to develop joint plan to reduce backlog and remain within current budget pending automation
- h. Working to fill vacancies; create and fill new positions

4. Boating

- a. Coast Guard Recreational Boating Safety Grant
 - 2006 data approved and funds received;
 - current with 2007 data and will receive funds;
 - eligible for 2008 grant; and
 - working with coast guard to have a semi-designated patrol (maritime patrol on Oahu) to recreational boating safety and on-water resource enforcement.
- b. Cruise Ship Security – Lahaina being transferred from DOCARE to DOBOR by January 1, 2008; transition Kona subsequently
- c. 2 security and 3 clerical positions being transferred from DOCARE to DOBOR for security
- d. DOCARE increasing on-water presence on Oahu through dedicated marine patrol focusing on resource protection and boating safety
- e. Developing Ala Wai improvements draft master plan, to be reviewed with boaters

V. Future Steps

1. Implementation of Ocean Resource Management Plan

- a. DLNR Cabinet developing inter-divisional, department-wide priorities around land and ocean based resource stewardship
- b. Active participant in statewide Ocean Resource Management Plan working groups

2. Strategic Planning for Enforcement/Compliance

- a. Initiating strategic planning within DOCARE this year (consultant contract finalized)
- b. Identifying specific administrative rules for civil enforcement strategies for pilot project
- c. Initiate department-wide enforcement/compliance strategic planning in subsequent year

3. Increase resource stewardship efficiency and effectiveness through improved technology and “back office” support

- a. SHPD – developing a searchable public access database and library of cultural sites, surveys and SHPD determinations
- b. Developing a centralized DLNR information database library to monitoring impacts on resources and measure program effectiveness


Laura Thielen's background as a lawyer in a respected firm, her education, and her work as Chairperson of DLNR along with her work as Director of the State Office of Planning all give her a unique perspective and excellent experience to lead DLNR in a new and innovative direction. Her concepts of integration of efforts and practices has long been needed to make DLNR truly responsive and responsible.

Her background in non-profit work and Legal Aid, and her background in environmental work in Ohio also give her a perspective that is often lacking in bureaucratic appointments, and such a perspective is greatly needed in DLNR.

Ms. Thielen has already accomplished much in her two months at DLNR, such as creating a working group to automate the processing of the Bureau of Conveyances and shift the Bureau into a 21st Century on-line application system. This automation is badly needed.

I urge you to confirm Laura Thielen as the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

I was fortunate to be a member of the Governor's selection committee, one of approximately 30 members each representing different groups, organizations, and industries that come in contact with DLNR. 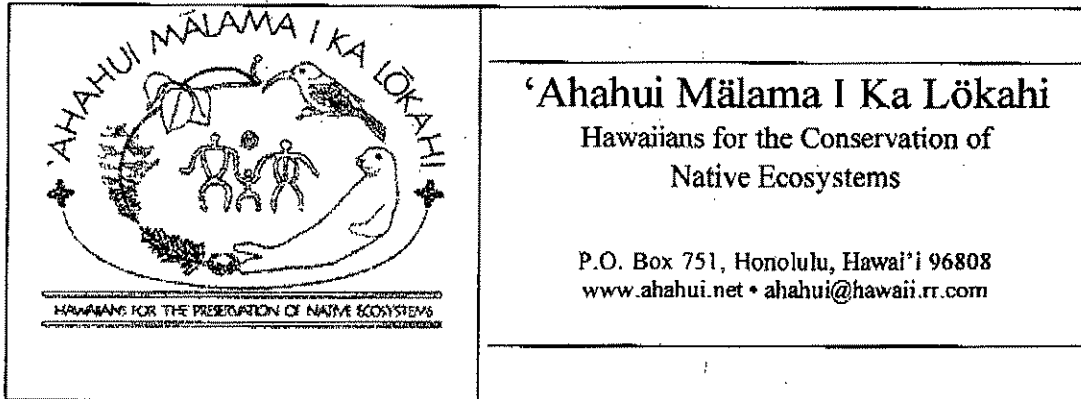



Senators Should Confirm Laura Thielen as Director of Department of Land and Natural Resources

Hawai`i needs a dynamic leader to head the Department of Land and Natural Resources into the Era of Sustainability.

Oct 21, 2007

Today's Superferry controversy demonstrates that Hawai`i's booming development since the 1960s has created overwhelming environmental and social problems not adequately addressed by our present fragmented and cumbersome governmental system. While the State and Counties have all kinds of planning processes on the books, too often they exist more as vague guidelines that are not followed through in any meaningful way in practice.

Issues of environmental limits and sustainability will become even more critical as the Islands begin to be impacted by Global Climate Change, and rising costs of food, energy, and transportation, due to Peak Oil driving the costs of fuel skyhigh.

Fortunately the Legislature has begun to seriously recognize the magnitude of these issues. They passed **The Global Warming Solutions Act of 2007** (Act 234 — which sets an enforceable limit on Hawaii's greenhouse gas emissions) — and established the **Hawai`i 2050 Sustainability Task Force**.

Laura Thielen, now Acting Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), represent exactly the kind of dynamic new government leadership we desperately need to take Hawai`i into the 21st Century. DLNR's main responsibilities include managing: aquatic resources, boating and ocean recreation; the Division of conservation, resource and land; and Hawai`i's forests, wildlife and state parks land, historic sites, and coastal lands. This is a daunting task by itself, but many other governmental bureaucracies have overlapping responsibilities, and too often we see agonizing slow responses (if not gridlock) from all the agencies involved.

Though I have advocated Hawai`i needs a streamlined Department of Sustainability to coordinate all these agencies, I am impressed that Laura Thielen is initiating several innovative programs within DLNR. She is working with three Departments — Agriculture; Health; and Business, Economic Development & Tourism — to proactively identify locations for environmentally and culturally responsible renewable energy and aquaculture facilities. She is developing a "common vision and mission" between the various Divisions within DLNR itself.

Thielen is unusually qualified to take on this fresh-for-government set of initiatives. She served as the Director of the State Office of Planning, which is tasked with developing comprehensive, long range and strategic planning. She administered the State's Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Program. The Office of Planning is taking the lead in a multi-agency effort to establish, promote, and coordinate the use of geographic information systems (GIS) technology. Other projects under her guidance include reclaiming former industrial sites ("brownfields redevelopment"); "Wai`anae Ecological Characterization"; Urban Lands studies; a "Summary of Financial and Technical Assistance Programs for the Conservation of Natural Resources"; various maps; the "Leeward Coast Initiative"; the "Hawaii Ocean Resources Management Plan"; and the Hawaii Statewide Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS).

Holding a Master's Degree in Public Policy from Georgetown University, and a law degree, Thielen worked with LHT Services which provided project development, research and technical writing services to non-profit and governmental agencies. Thielen's forté is environmental and land-use issues. Earlier in her career, she served as the Managing Attorney of the Legal Aid Society of Hawai`i's legal hotline.

In sum, Laura Thielen is exceptionally qualified to lead the Department of Land and Natural Resources into these challenging times. Besides practicing an integrative approach to the multiplicity of environmental and land use and water use issues involved, she is firm in her commitment to expanding public participation in resolving these often contentious issues.

I hope our Senators, who have recently shown strong support of sustainability, will quickly confirm her Directorship of DLNR, and give Thielen all the assistance she needs to revitalize this important Department of Hawai`i's State government.

I am writing in support of the confirmation of Laura Thielen as Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. My experience with Laura was as chair and member of the Marine and Coastal Zone Advocacy Council (MACZAC). MACZAC serves in an advisory capacity to the State's Coastal Zone Management Program in the Office of Planning. We are volunteers representing all islands, advocating on behalf of the public on coastal and marine issues.

When Laura first came on board as director of the Office of Planning, MACZAC had recently disagreed with the administration on two issues. One was the cancellation of a conference on the Hawaii Ocean Resources Management Plan (ORMP), to be co-sponsored with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. The other was the role of the DLNR Chair in overseeing the Office of Planning, including the CZM Program. MACZAC had earlier testified at the Legislature against a bill that would have transferred the CZM Program to DLNR.

Given this context, our group took a "wait and see" attitude toward Laura. We first got to know her at one of our quarterly meetings. This one was held on Lanai, including an evening public meeting, so we had more than just a few hours to get to know her. My initial impression was positive. I think what impressed me most was Laura's willingness to listen and learn. The other thing that impressed me was that she learned so quickly and soon had a solid grasp of the issues we dealt with.


I got to know Laura better as a member of the Hawaii Ocean and Coastal Council (HOCC), established by executive order to guide development of the Hawaii ORMP. The Office of Planning was responsible for updating the ORMP, which was long overdue. Laura took a strong leadership role in this process—reaching out to a wide range of stakeholders, convening a public workshop, and personally shepherding preparation of the plan document. 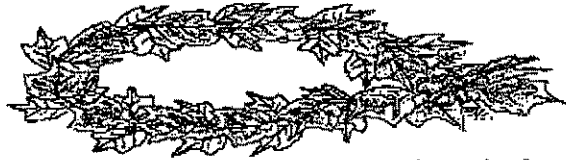



My name is Bill Paty and I am in support of the confirmation of Laura Thielen as chairperson of DLNR.



I am writing to strongly support the appointment and confirmation of Laura H. Thielen as Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).

I am an Information Technology Specialist with the State Geographic Information System (GIS) Program in the State Office of Planning (OP), and served in that capacity while Ms. Thielen was the Director of OP.



I sincerely believe that she would be just as great an asset to the State if confirmed as the Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

I believe that Ms. Laura Thielen, current Interim Chairperson and Director, should be confirmed as the Chairperson and Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR). As a government partner representative on the DLNR Director Search Committee, I can attest that the search process was done in an open manner and provided fair opportunities to all persons interested in the position.

The purpose of the Search Committee was to encourage and solicit qualified persons to apply for the vacant Chairperson position, develop a short-list of those applicants most qualified, and recommend the 3 most qualified applicants to the Governor for selection. It was my understanding that the Governor was not bound to select from those applicants recommended by the Committee. The Committee consisted of various persons representing DLNR staff, native Hawaiian organizations, environmental organizations, hunting and fishing groups, and other agencies that have a stake in DLNR business.

Advertisements of the position were run in major local newspapers across the State. A total of 34 applicants submitted resumes and were considered by the Search Committee. Using various methods, including a weighted criteria method, 6 applicants were identified as most interesting to the Committee and worthy of an interview. Interviews were conducted on June 18, 2007. All interviewees were asked the same questions in the presence of the full Committee. Upon conclusion of the interviews, the Committee voted on the candidates to recommend to the Governor. Due to the disparity of votes between the top two candidates and the third candidate, the Committee elected not to submit the name of a third candidate for the Governor's consideration.

Given the diversity of the Search Committee members, that is the wide range of personalities and interest, you can imagine that the process of deciding upon the most qualified candidates was not easy to reach. Members debated each candidate's merits and shortcomings. However, in the end, the top two candidates received nearly unanimous endorsement from all members. One of the two recommended candidates is Ms. Laura Thielen. For these reasons, I believe that Ms. Thielen should be confirmed as the Chairperson and Director of the DLNR.







I am sure you have all the information on Laura regarding her qualifications, education etc. What you may not know is about the person she is and that's where I can help.


As a young girl going to Lanikai Elementary School I could see her ability to get along with her classmates and having so many friends told me that she would have a very bright future.

Ms Thielen was raised and currently resides in Kailua, Oahu. Upon graduating from Punahou High School, Ms. Thielen attended college at the University of Colorado, attaining a bachelor of arts in political science. She furthered her education with a law degree from Case Western Reserve School of Law (Cleveland, Ohio) and a master's degree in public policy from Georgetown University.

Ms. Thielen began her professional career as an attorney with the law firm of Squire Sanders and Dempsey in Cleveland, focusing on litigation and environmental law. Her interest in environmental law brought her back to Hawaii where she practiced at the firm of Gerson Grekin Wynhoff and Thielen. From there, Ms. Thielen went on to join the Legal Aid Society of Hawaii, serving as the managing attorney for the Statewide Intake and Legal Hotline. And just prior to serving in state government, Ms. Thielen was the sole proprietor of LHT Services, which provided business consulting to non-profit organizations and state agencies. In April 2005, Ms. Thielen was appointed as the Director of the Office of Planning, where she was, among other things, instrumental in updating the Ocean Resource Management Plan and in formulating legislation related to important agricultural lands.

The Department finds that Ms. Thielen's extensive background in and understanding of land use and environmental law including knowledge in contested case and general administrative hearings, applications for Conservation District Use Permits and zoning changes would be an enormous asset to the Department. The Department would also note that it had a very good working relationship and interaction with Ms. Thielen during her watch at the Office of Planning. Her tenure on the Board of Education (2002-2005), demonstrates a passion for shaping and supporting education in Hawaii. In as much, the Department believes that education

can serve as a viable conduit in nurturing the youth of Hawaii on our rich natural heritage and the need to conserve and protect our natural resources.

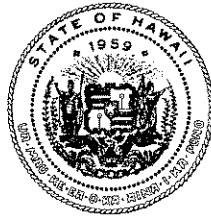

The Department of Land and Natural Resources supports the confirmation of Laura H. Thielen as Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

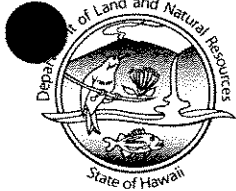



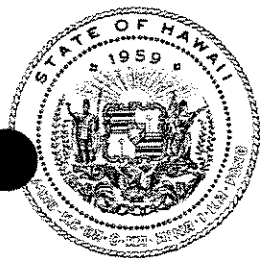

Chair Hee, Vice Chair Kokubun and members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land.

I appear before you in strong support of Governor Linda Lingle's nomination of Laura H. Thielen as Chairperson of the State of Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).

From April 5, 2005 to July 27, 2007, Ms. Thielen served the people of the State of Hawaii as the Director of the State Office of Planning, an agency attached to the Department of

Business, Economic Development & Tourism. In that capacity, Ms. Thielen reported to me and I had significant and substantive interaction with her, which is the basis of my testimony in strong support of her nomination

Based on my significant and substantive interactions with Ms. Thielen, I am of the strong view that she possesses the vision, passion, management and leadership skills necessary to be an effective and successful Director of a critically important State agency.

As I am sure you know, Ms. Thielen comes from a long lineage of public servants dedicated to preserving and advancing the unique natural resources that make Hawaii a special place. Indeed, these natural resources are the fundamental basis of Hawaii's economy and quality of life. Throughout her career, Ms. Thielen has demonstrated a passion for proper stewardship of Hawaii's land and natural resources.

In her capacity as Director of the State Office of Planning (OP), Ms. Thielen reported to me and I interacted with her on policy, legislative, budgetary, personnel, contracting and on projects and initiatives that OP undertook.

Ms. Thielen is a very effective, proactive and strong manager. At OP, she was able to very rapidly identify opportunities, some of which I elaborate below, and to lead, rally and manage OP staff to take capitalize on those opportunities.

As part of her leadership and management skills and style, Ms. Thielen was an active and effective advocate for her agency and the role it could play on important planning initiatives for the State. Her effective advocacy extended to seeking and obtaining increased funding from the Department of Budget & Finance, a necessary skill for an effective department director. I have

no doubt that Ms. Thielen will be an effective advocate for resources, for initiatives and for her staff at DLNR.

Also as part of her leadership and management style, Ms. Thielen was quick and consistent in recognizing the talent of her staff and in elevating them to fully deploy their talents. Ms. Thielen also worked hard to help her staff to succeed. I have no doubt that at DLNR, Ms. Thielen will continue to recognize, encourage and support her staff to deploy their talents to accomplish the mission of that agency.

Ms. Thielen is also a proactive problem solver. She is very adept at recognizing a problem, analyzing the root cause of that problem and in proactively devising collaborative solutions to the problem.

One example is the Coastal Zone Management (CZM) program at OP. Upon her arrival at OP, Ms. Thielen discovered that this federally-funded program was at risk of losing one-half of its funding because it had not complied with federal EPA and NOAA requirements for final management measure to reduce non-point source pollution. Ms. Thielen quickly re-organized the program management and reached out to the State Department of Health and the counties to devise a plan to maintain the funding level of the program. She then actively worked with the EPA and NOAA to respond to their concerns and to successfully preserve the federal funding.

This collaboration with other departments and with stakeholders was repeated in many instances. For the federal "Brownfields" program, Ms. Thielen lead the outreach to the State Department of Health, the Counties and environmental groups, bringing a new higher level of activity to this program. In the hazards mitigation area, Ms. Thielen similarly led an outreach program with the stakeholders in this important area, leading to more collaboration. Finally, Ms.

Thielen led an interdepartmental effort that also included private sector stakeholders in rural development and economic development to apply for a federal grant. This was the first time that these stakeholders across sectors had worked together in such an effort.

I believe Ms. Thielen's collaborative attitude and leadership will well serve the DLNR, where stakeholder outreach, involvement and input will be critically important.

At OP, the results of Ms. Thielen's leadership speak for themselves. The number of planning documents produced by the office has been the highest in recent history. Under her leadership, OP drafted an Ocean Resource Management Plan, the first time such a plan was issued since the statute was written 1991. OP also issued an Urban Lands Report, also updated for the first time since 1991. Under Ms. Thielen's leadership, OP produced more policy reports to the Administration and Legislature. OP also led an inclusive public discussion on and provided planning information for rural communities.

A final example I will cite is Ms. Thielen leadership and work on the State's Geographic Information System (GIS), which is located at the Office of Planning. In thinking proactively about how to best utilize and deploy this important resource, Ms. Thielen discovered that thirty-four divisions within nine departments and the Governor's Policy Office utilize geospatial technology. In addition, she discovered that all nine of these State departments are planning to expand their geospatial system, and will need dramatically increased system support.

Ms. Thielen and the GIS Team identified two significant impediments to the state taking full advantage of the powerful statewide GIS system and database:

1. Agencies were utilizing outdated software licenses which were not able to download all the data and imagery.

2. The lack of coordination between agencies meant the state was duplicating contracts and efforts on developing databases, GIS applications, and purchasing imagery.

Under her leadership, OP initiated a survey of the approximately 144 GIS software users across the State to identify the highest priorities of the staff utilizing GIS. They discovered that the users supported greater coordination between GIS users to improve efficiencies, more training, a faster and more reliable network, and updated software.

As the result, OP initiated discussions with software vendors to discuss the advantages of a single, statewide software license and discovered that vendors were willing to provide the state with updated software licenses and additional benefits, for approximately the same cost the state was currently spending on the software, in exchange for combining the 144 licenses into a single license, known as an "Enterprise License."

A single, statewide Enterprise License has tremendous benefits for the State, in that it will permit all state agencies utilizing GIS to upgrade their software to current standards, maintain that software at no additional cost during the terms of the license, and access all imagery in the central geospatial database.

The GIS Team developed a strategic plan for building an integrated statewide GIS system, a proposal for the IT Governance Committee to support a single statewide GIS software license and obtained the support and endorsement of all GIS users state-wide. Ms. Thielen then proposed and obtained administrative approval to submit a bill establishing a special fund for the purpose of funding the GIS system, and \$200,000 to pay for the base amount of the Enterprise License. The legislature supported the special fund, although the appropriation dropped out literally at the 11th hour.

I believe these and other examples highlight Ms. Thielen's management skills and abilities. In my limited experience in state government, I have come to recognize the critical importance of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. That department has responsibility for all that makes Hawaii special and unique and all that is the basis of the quality of life our residents desire and deserve. Laura H. Thielen is qualified, has the vision and passion and possesses the leadership and management skills to lead the department.

I respectfully urge your confirmation of Laura H. Thielen as the Chairperson of DLNR.

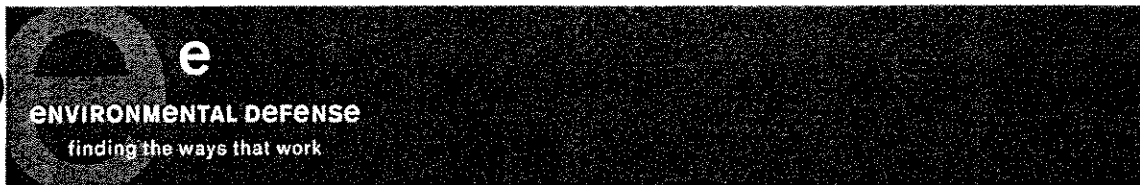

I am writing to urge your full support for the candidacy of Laura Thielen for Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR).

I am a Senior Scientist with Environmental Defense Fund, a non-profit organization with approximately 3,000 members throughout the Islands. I am currently traveling and am unable to return to Hawai'i in time for the confirmation hearing. I apologize for not appearing in person before the Committee but would like very much to convey some thoughts to you.

To ensure a thorough and broadly-based selection process, Governor Lingle appointed an unusual 30 person BLNR Chair Search Committee, of which I was a member. The search committee consisted of Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners, developers (including the President of Castle and Cook), a significant number of environmentalists, representatives of hunting and fishing communities, state employees, the finance and architecture sectors and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. It was a group of individuals and interests which, under normal circumstances, would rarely see eye to eye on many issues.

All of us were united, however, in wanting to see a well-run, functional Department of Land and Natural Resources. I believe that most of us felt that the challenges inherent in managing DLNR are immense, and have been so for years.


Laura Thielen, in an impressively thoughtful and careful manner, described to the diverse search committee how she would work to make improvements at DLNR part of what she called "a continual effort to make our state a better place to live." As she put it, "I want us to raise the standards and expectations we set for ourselves, and then to surpass them."

In her brief time as Acting Chair, she has shown a welcome commitment to transparency and public process and appears to be making it increasingly difficult for the continuation of the culture of back-room deals and other unsavory practices which have long been the hallmark of the DLNR. 

Aloha, Senator Hee:

It has been a long time since we've talked and worked together. I have thought deeply writing this letter from a deep and true place. While I cannot judge whether Laura Thielen will be a good chair for the Department of Land and Natural Resources, and this I have told her. What I am able to do is talk about my direct experiences with her as a girl growing up in Hawai'i and as the director of the Office of Planning and her work in developing the Leeward Coast Initiative.

I met Laura when she was a teen on the Island of Kaho'olawe; she went on access with her mother, Cynthia Thielen, who was then the attorney for the Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana - this you know. Laura was a gangly, introspective, respectful, helpful girl. She helped to carry water, to plant, to learn how to respect the 'Aina and her elders. I was then in law school and clerking for Cynthia at the Legal Aid Society. I lost contact with Laura after that access, but saw her pop up in various places - BOE, then as E.D. of the Office of Planning.

It is in this position that I have had more contact with Laura. In response to the growing homelessness, especially of families, Gov. Lingle developed the Leeward Coast Initiative, which Laura had the responsibility of putting into motion. The LCI began in February, 2007 by the State developing an Outreach Team of State Employees from various departments who surveyed about 167 residents, mostly leaders, in the Wai'anae Coast Community, about the ideas and projects that we thought would best support economic and social development along this coast. A list of "32 Great Ideas," which was a compilation of ideas from these surveys, ideas from past plans for and about the Wai'anae Coast, and ideas from the Outreach Team, was generated.

Through two small grants, one from the Community Based Economic Development Program (CBED) in DBEDT and one from the CBED program in OHA, my organization took those ideas out to the community in two ways: first, we surveyed 150 residents, regular citizens, from throughout the coast and asked them for their responses to the 32 ideas: what were their priorities, if any, what was missing? We also conducted a deeper discussion with members of the Empower Wai'anae Steering Committee on what they thought about the ideas and what was missing.

Throughout the initial development stage of the LCI, Laura has been responsive to my calls for information and has listened to my concerns about follow-up by the State in terms of commitment of resources: funds, time and policy changes. While she has been transitioning from OP to DLNR, and in the absence of an OP Director, she has helped to set up a meeting with Linda Smith of the Governor's Office to continue exploring the potential for community-government partnership. We have an exploratory meeting set with Ms. Smith and other State officials and a few members of the Wai'anae Coast Community on October 31st.


While my testimony does not speak to her qualifications as head of DLNR, I do believe that she listens well and follows through with her commitments and speaks to her willingness to communicate directly and respectfully with members of the community, which I believe is important to the issue of accountability to Hawai'i's people for the natural and historic resources of our beloved homeland.

Mahalo for considering my testimony in your deliberations.

I am writing in support of Laura Thielen's nomination for Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. I offer my support as an individual and not as a representative of the Department of Urban and Regional Planning or the University of Hawai'i.

I first met Ms. Thielen when she was appointed Director of the Office of Planning. In her first weeks in office, she made a point of introducing herself to a number of professional planners to ask us about our perceptions of the Office of Planning's activities and direction. We also discussed her desire to develop an internship program with students in the Department of Urban and Regional Planning at UH.

I first worked with her on the development of the Ocean Resources Management Plan in the fall of 2005. The Office of Planning staff had been meeting with staff of DLNR and OHA staff and ocean and coastal resource users groups. I was selected to help organize and facilitate an Ocean Summit at which people could meet and recommend priorities for the proposed Ocean Resources Management Plan (ORMP). I subsequently assisted the planning firm that prepared the initial draft of the ORMP as well as working with another firm that helped developed coastal zone management performance indicators. Finally, I facilitated several meetings for the Office of Planning.

I am impressed by the leadership qualities demonstrated in these projects and other endeavors she initiated during her tenure as Director of the Office of Planning. First, I am struck both by her strategic vision and her attention to detail. It is rare to find a senior manager who seems as comfortable balancing "big picture" concerns and a focus on the tasks that need to be successfully implemented to achieve that vision. In the ORMP process, for example, she was attentive to the many voices calling for greater attention to the principles and practices of *ahupua'a* management as a vehicle for both for involving communities in improved ocean and coastal management and for incorporating traditional knowledge and practices. She insured that a focus on *ahupua'a* was central to the new ORMP. She also facilitated additional research and deliberation about how *ahupua'a* management might be more effectively

supported by the Office of Planning and the Department of Land and Natural Resources.


Ms. Thielen's commitment to action is another impressive manifestation of her leadership. The Office of Planning has so many mandates to implement, including the management of coastal zone management program, that the director can easily justify full-time attention to these endeavors. She recognized that there were additional issues that ought to be on the policy agenda. One such issue is the proliferation of development in the rural areas of the state. She initiated a rural lands project focusing on scattered, low-density development of first and second homes in the state Agriculture District on all the islands. One of the purposes was to document the extent of rural development and the attendant fiscal, infrastructure capacity and resource management issues. The study is part of a larger effort to develop principles expressing state interests in the location and design of rural communities. After conducting multiple workshops throughout the state, OP collaborated with the counties to design effective mechanisms for minimizing the fiscal impacts of rural development, protecting aquifer recharge areas and reducing other impacts of new settlements.

Another important manifestation of her leadership is her recognition of the need for the professional development of current and future planners and managers. We had several discussions about developing an internship program in the Office of Planning in which planning students could participate in projects. The first of these interns was in place when she left OP for DLNR. She also organized professional education workshops for staff. As a supervisor, she provides direct, constructive feedback to staff—and consultants.

I admire her energy and commitment to effective resource governance. As is the case with all the other effective leaders I know, she has strong opinions. What sets her apart, in my experience, is her willingness to listen to alternative points of view and keep an open mind. This is a rare quality in senior managers—and one much to be admired.

I think she will continue to provide excellent leadership to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. She has my enthusiastic support.



Chairman Hee and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of the confirmation of Laura Thielen as Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

My name is Royce Jones and I work in the field of geographic information systems or GIS. I have taught classes at the University of Hawaii on quantitative geography as well as classes at Honolulu Community College on GIS, but mostly what I do is work with Federal, State and County government agencies and private businesses to help them harness the power of GIS.

Some of you may remember me from the Reapportionment Commission back in 2001. I was the lead GIS advisor to the Commission and worked closely with them using GIS to redraw the Congressional, Senate and House district boundaries following the 2000 census. I presented the maps and described the methods used for redistricting in many public hearings.

I bring up GIS because that is the context in which I first met Laura. I have worked on GIS projects with the DBEDT/State Office of Planning staff since 1990. At that time it was called the Office of State Planning (OSP) and they were using GIS even then. Over the years I have seen their staff levels shrink and expand, but through it all they have continued to foster the use of GIS in State government and assist other State agencies either directly by making maps for them, or indirectly by making data available so the agencies can make their own maps.

When Laura became Director of DBEDT/State Office of Planning in April 2005, I saw staff I had known for years suddenly become more energized, organized and enthusiastic about their ability to effect change and get GIS more widely used in State government. I attribute this change directly to Laura's leadership and support.


She showed the GIS staff a strong vision of what they could do and gave them the confidence to take more of a leadership role themselves and to go out and meet with staff from other State agencies to form a plan for expanding use of GIS.

I saw Laura's leadership exemplified more broadly when I was invited to participate in reviewing the draft strategic plan for the Office of Planning. After working internally to create a draft plan, Laura invited feedback from outside groups. To me, this willingness to listen to outside ideas, indicates a leader who knows how to work with diverse groups, solicit and accept criticism, integrate this information into a larger vision, and take action to realize that vision.

In summary, I strongly support the confirmation of Laura Thielen as Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources. 

Today, we actively manage more than 32,000 acres in 11 nature preserves on O'ahu, Maui, Moloka'i, Lana'i, and Kaua'i and also work closely with government agencies and private landowners on cooperative land management projects.

3. The Division of Conservation and Resource Enforcement to increase financial and human resources and training for enhanced natural resource enforcement.

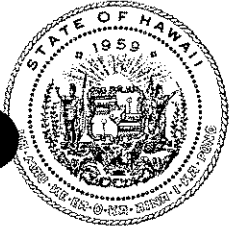



The working Group is dedicated to finding solutions.

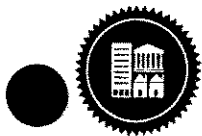

I found her to be fair in her decisions and straightforward and open in her decision-making, to the extent she could as an administrator. She always acknowledged unselfishly the work and efforts of her staff, both internally and externally.

This is not to say that I agreed, as a professional planner, with all the decisions she made and how she made them. I also acknowledge that not all OP staff had a similar working experience with Laura; she made management decisions upon her arrival at OP that hurt her working relationship with some staff. I think she can only have learned from that experience, and indeed, I witnessed in her, over time, a much more measured and flexible management style.

Having worked at OP since 1989, I have seen several directors come and go, and have had the opportunity to weigh the contribution that each has made to advancing good planning for the State and the role and value of OP in this. Overall, Ms. Thielen was on a course to reenergize the Office and to bring renewed vitality to the role of such an agency in statewide planning. She deserves a chance to bring her aptitudes and abundant energy to restoring public faith in the Department of Land and Natural Resources and fostering its success in protecting the natural assets that make our State so special.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit these comments.



Ms. Thielen made some beneficial changes on the way the Office of Planning operates. However, certain aspects of her tenure were very negative.

1. At times, Ms. Thielen allows her emotions to govern her interaction with employees. On one occasion I observed, and on numerous occasions anecdotally, she screamed at employees.
2. Within a month of her arrival, she told a Program Manager, a civil service employee of more than 30 years tenure, that he was fired, without notice and based upon what turned out to be false charges.
3. Ms. Thielen is a micro-manager and can be extremely dictatorial.
4. On the day after Ms. Thielen moved to DLNR, the entire staff acted as if the ceiling had suddenly been raised three feet – a sense of oppression had been removed.

I want to thank Chair, Senator Clayton Hee, and Vice Chair, Senator Russell Kokubun, as well as members of the Committee on Land and Water for this opportunity to testify in strong support of the confirmation of Laura H. Thielen to serve as Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DNLR). My name is Victor Geminiani.

I had the great pleasure of working with Laura while serving as the Executive Director of the Legal Aid Society of Hawaii. Laura was employed by Legal Aid as the first manager of our program's newly created Telephone Hotline system called the Information System for Legal Aid Network Statewide (ISLANS). Due to significant losses of state and federal funding as well as a desire to improve the accessibility of legal services and improve quality of service to clients throughout the state, Legal Aid decided to create a new intake system that would serve as a vehicle for clients to gain immediate consultation with a lawyer or paralegal for legal advice and consideration for full representation. Laura was hired specifically to design and implement the system throughout the state.

During ISLANS creation, Laura was responsible for the development of a series of components including scripts and desk books covering all of the substantive areas of poverty law, a training program to train all advocates employed in ISLANS, a quality control system to ensure appropriate advice and assistance was being provided to clients, an integration plan throughout Legal Aid to connect each of the program's 9 offices to ISLANS, recruit and hire all ISLANS advocates and a resource development plan to fund the effort. Laura also took full responsibility to link all other legal services providers including the Domestic Violence and Legal Hotline, Voluntary Legal Services, No Loio, Protection and Advocacy, The UH Elder Law Program and the Hawaiian Legal Services Corporation into the operation of ISLANS. This critical link ended the practice of referring clients to the wrong program by the staff of each of these partner organizations by having ISLANS be the source for all initial referrals by each of the partners.

Throughout the entire design and implementation of the effort, Laura provided leadership, vision, a remarkable capacity to juggle multiple tasks at the same time, creativity, good humor and an impressive ability to bring people together around the development of a group vision and action plan. Recently Laura has exhibited these same strengths in her leadership of the state's Office of Planning.

Laura has the skills, passion and professionalism to provide critical leadership to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. I strongly urge this committee to confirm her as Chairperson of DNLR. Again, thank you for an opportunity to testify today.



Our relationship with Ms. Thielen is a growing one. Prior to her appointment as Interim Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, we worked with Ms. Thielen in her capacity as Director of the Office of Planning, specifically on the Ocean Resources Management Plan (ORMP) in which she supported integrating Moku Councils into state policy.

Prior to her confirmation hearing, we attempted to clarify Ms. Thielen's position on the Aha Kiole Commission and the status on funding. Although she was not able to meet with us, she confirmed that she was supportive of moku management in Hawai'i.

My name is Karen Kamalu Poepoe. I am a resident of the Ahupua'a of Pala'au on the island of Moloka'i. I have also served, from its conception, as an active supporter and recent board member of the Hui Malama 'o Mo'omomi.

As I have been made aware of the manner in which the governor's office, the DLNR and other 'concerned' parties have wrestled for one of the new potential leadership roles for cultural and natural resource management in Hawai'i, I wish to speak out to remind those involved in these political power plays, that a law was passed that specifically gives a role to the Hawaiian practitioners of each Ahupua'a on each island, in an effort to undo the obvious damage that, through mismanagement by our current systems, has left our resources in the deplorable state we find today.

Act 212 came into effect on July 1, 2007. If one of the strategies of the current administration's political machine is to use stalling tactics to hold back activity on the part of the Aha Moku Councils and their plans to employ ahupua'a management to our unhealthy systems by ignoring the law and setting up competing committees that keep management under their thumbs, then we are in the same unfortunate situation where we began.

I am the people. I have trust in our American system of government and the Constitution of the founding fathers. But from my vantage point I cannot help but feel that, rather than cooperating and working together to find a good solution to a really bad problem, our state government is more concerned with hanging on to their reins of power.

Thielen deserves confirmation at DLNR

The Superferry controversy demonstrates that Hawaii's booming development since the 1960s has created overwhelming environmental and social problems not adequately addressed by our present fragmented and cumbersome governmental system. While the state and counties have all kinds of planning processes on the books, too often they exist more as vague guidelines that are not followed in practice.

Issues of environmental limits and sustainability will become even more critical as the islands begin to be affected by global climate change, and rising costs of food, energy and transportation, due to peak oil driving the costs of fuel skyhigh.

Fortunately, the state Legislature has begun to seriously recognize the magnitude of these issues. It passed the Global Warming Solutions Act of 2007, which sets an enforceable limit on Hawaii's greenhouse gas emissions, and established the Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Task Force.

Laura Thielen, now acting director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, represents exactly the kind of dynamic new government leadership we desperately need to take Hawaii into the 21st century. DLNR's main responsibilities include managing: aquatic resources, boating and ocean recreation; the division of conservation, resource and land; and Hawaii's forests, wildlife and state parks land, historic sites and coastal lands. This is a daunting task by itself, but many other governmental bureaucracies have overlapping responsibilities, and too often we see agonizingly slow responses (if not gridlock) from all the agencies involved.

Though I have advocated that Hawaii needs a streamlined Department of Sustainability to coordinate all these agencies, I am impressed that Thielen is initiating several innovative programs within DLNR. She is working with three departments -- Agriculture, Health and Business, Economic Development & Tourism -- to identify locations for environmentally and culturally responsible renewable energy and aquaculture facilities. She is developing a "common vision and mission" between the various divisions within DLNR itself.

Thielen is unusually qualified to take on this fresh-for-government set of initiatives. She served as the director of the state Office of Planning, which is tasked with developing comprehensive, long-range and strategic planning. She administered the state's Coastal Zone Management Program. The Office of Planning is taking the lead in a multiagency effort to establish, promote and coordinate the use of geographic information systems technology. Other projects under her guidance include reclaiming former industrial sites; urban land studies; a summary of financial and technical assistance programs for the conservation of natural resources; the Leeward Coast Initiative; the Hawaii Ocean Resources Management Plan; and the Hawaii Statewide Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy.

Holding a master's degree in public policy from Georgetown University and a law degree, Thielen worked with LHT Services, which provided project development, research and technical writing services to nonprofit and governmental agencies. Thielen's forte is environmental and land use issues. Thielen is exceptionally qualified to lead the DLNR in these challenging times. Besides practicing an integrative approach to environmental and land and water use issues, she is firm in her commitment to expanding public participation in resolving these often contentious problems.

I hope our senators quickly confirm her directorship and give Thielen all the assistance she needs to revitalize this important department.

I speak as a biological scientist with background in native fauna since U. H. graduate research in 1968. I have served on the DLNR's Natural Area Reserves System Commission for three earlier governors. I was the voting delegate from Hawaii with the National Wildlife Federation, and the Western Association of Fish and Game Commissioners presented me with its Volunteer of the Year award in 1999. I am a member and past Chair of the non-partisan Hawaii Coalition of Conservation Voters since 1982 to support candidates with solid environmental priorities.

Our State requires a DLNR Chair with the tenacity to obtain the latest science and oldest cultural wisdom to best oversee the responsible use and responsible kapu of island natural resources. The qualities of being consultative, careful, fair, and optimistic are also sought to succeed with restoring more stream water flow to windward watersheds for reopening kalo patches and restoring fish nurseries in estuaries.

The State's ongoing challenge is how to retain the diverse unique original inhabitants while controlling and repelling invader species, especially from continents.

Since July, I helped Conservation Council for Hawai'i lobby to improve a weak U. S. Senate bill to control ship ballast water's invasive species, and I must thank her for responding so that the State Administration can defend its new regulations from federal preemption so we may prohibit most untreated discharges of ballast water, thus preventing new aquatic invasives.

Having been a member of Land Use Commission while this nominee was State Planning Director, I seeing her function in an Interim capacity, I must report she can bring the same skills to the Board of Land and Natural Resources she showed at the Office of Planning, where she represented the state in hearings before the LUC and assisted other state agencies especially with the new Ocean Resources plan.

Among prior positions, she consulted to non-profit organizations and state agencies including University of Hawai'i Foundation, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawai'i Justice Foundation, Hawai'i Commission on Access to Justice and Foster Parent Association.

Because I expect her to act for the public interest to achieve balanced uses of island natural resources, I ask you to support this nomination.
