It is with pleasure that the Department of Land and Natural Resources recommend to the Senate, the confirmation of the appointment of James G. Lee Jr to the Island Burial Council, Island of Hawaii. The Burial Councils were created under Section 6E-43.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) for the Islands of Hawaii, Maui/Lanai, Molokai, Oahu and Kauai/Niihau to implement Section 6E-43, HRS relating to prehistoric and historic burial sites.

The Burial Councils are comprised of representatives from specific geographic regions and representatives of developer/large property owners pursuant to Section 13-300-22(a), Hawaii Administrative Rules. Mr. Lee was nominated to serve as developer/large landowner for the Island Burial Council, Island of Hawaii. If confirmed it will be his first term on the Hawaii Island Burial Council.

Mr. Lee serves as the Director of Development for W.H. Shipman, Ltd. He is responsible for the management and development of all industrial, commercial and residential property for W.H. Shipman. Mr. Lee also serves on the Hawaii County's Workforce Investment Board for a term to expire March 31, 2009.

Mr. Lee has worked on the 1250 Oceanside project as a Project Manager and was tasked with planning, managing and budgeting for this development project on the Island of Hawaii. He has also worked as a Budget/Legislative Analyst for the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources greatly appreciates this Committee's consideration of James Lee Jr. and strongly recommend his confirmation to the Hawaii Island Burial Council.

Aloha mai Honorable Chair and members of the Senate Committee on Agricultural and Hawaiian Affairs,

I am writing in opposition to James G. Lee's nomination to the Hawai'i Island Burial Council.

Mr. Lee's resume contains no experience or training that indicates he has the prerequisite sensitivity to and understanding of Native Hawaiian burials and the practices associated with these nor sufficient knowledge of the laws, rules, and regulations protecting such burials.

Further, Mr. Lee is a former project manager of the Hokuli'a development. Hokuli'a has been an on-going agenda item for Hawai'i Island Burial Council meetings. This past month alone there were three Hokuli'a agenda items. Many important decisions involving burials at Hokuli'a are up-coming. It would inappropriate, at the very least, to allow Mr. Lee to be a part of these decisions given his past direct association with the Hokuli'a project.

Finally, at its June 2007 meeting, the Hawai'i Island Burial Council has an outstanding question with the state attorney general office to determine whether Hokuli'a's assistance, which allowed a lot owner to build a home adjacent to a previously known burial without a burial treatment plan having been approved, was legal.

Additional Testimony Senate Committee on Agriculture and Hawaiian Affairs

Aloha mai Honorable Chair and members of the Senate Committee on Agricultural and Hawaiian Affairs,

I attended the October 18, 2007 Hawai'i Island Burial Council (HIBC) meeting.

During my testimony, I asked the state attorney general and the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) staff if they had read any of the Hokuli'a rulings and/or the Hokuli'a settlement agreement. They had not.

Yet there were three separate Hokuli'a agenda items that came before the Hawai'i Island Burial Council.

How could the state attorney general and SHPD staff properly advise the HIBC if they had no knowledge of the legal constraints under which they were operating? The answer is they could not and so were being negligent in their duties.

The HIBC cannot serve its purpose without proper and legally-required administrative support.

Adding a HIBC member with potential conflicts of interest within the current (non)operating environment of the SHPD is ill-advised at best and of questionable legality at worst.

To whom it may concern:

I have been informed that James G. Lee is being considered at the confirmation hearing for Burial Council as project manager? This is the person that was the project manager at Hokulia from September 2002 through to June 2005. He was charged with the descecration of a lava tube known to be a hawaiian burial site. He filled the tube with trash and debris to cover it up.

Is this not a clear conflict of interest for such an appointment? This is a misuse of the committee time and budget; this is definitely a conflict of interest and there is no basis to consider James G. Lee for the Burial Council member of any kind.
