My name is Charlene Cuaresma, president of the Filipino Coalition for Solidarity, which represents more than 45 Filipino community leaders whose aim is to work for social justice issues to empower our community to make socially responsible contributions to Hawai'i and our global neighbors. Since its inception in 2001, the Filipino community has reached out to the Coalition for assistance to navigate through the legal system. Language access is critical to settle legal issues and disputes. The Filipino Coalition for Solidarity supports initiatives to build the capacity for Hawai'i's government programs to be accessible to all.

Lito Asuncion is a highly regarded community leader, and I strongly support his nomination with full confidence and no reservations. I have known Mr. Asuncion for 35 years, as fellow Operation Manong volunteers. Operation Manong was a tutorial program composed of University of Hawai'i college students, who provided tutorial and outreach services to newly arrived immigrant students in public schools, in order to aid their transition into the school and community. Since then, Mr. Asuncion has contributed to fostering Filipino youth leadership development through the establishment of Sariling Gawa, a private, non-profit program, which hosts a statewide cultural and leadership skills building camp annually. My son is a Sarling Gawa alumnae. His training influenced him to later become the first Filipino to serve as student government president at UC Berkeley.

As a member of the Filipino Centennial Celebration Commission, Mr. Asuncion was also responsible for forging strategic collaborative partnerships, garnering broad based community support to promote diversity and goodwill through contributions made by the Filipino community to benefit all of Hawai'i's people.

Mr. Asuncion knows the issues of language access not only for Filipinos, but also other groups. Filipino immigrants comprised 61% of the State's immigrant group, which is larger than all immigrant groups combined. According to the 2000 U.S. Census Bureau, 10 % of Filipinos were reported to be in linguistically isolated households in the Counties of Hawai'i, Honolulu and Kaua'i. Maui County reported 16% of linguistically isolated households. Filipinos reported to be limited English proficient or speak English less than very well were 16% in Hawai'i County, 23% in Honolulu County, 20% in Kaua'i County, and 30% in Maui County.

Mr. Asuncion will serve the Office of Language Access well. His qualifications are best noted by his ability to bring people together for productive planning and implementation teams, his intellectual acumen and critical thinking skills that are based on his vast knowledge in Ethnic Studies and significant lessons learned from Hawai'i's labor history. Mr. Asuncion brings decades of experience in state government and as a successful small business entrepreneur. As an excellent facilitator, listener, and systems analyst, Mr. Asuncion can help advance initiatives to support state government to become the national flagship for providing language access for all to benefit and prosper.
