On the Big Island we do not have the necessary infrastructure in the Kawaihae area. Senators: Please accept my testimony in favor of Part IV, § 13 of this bill which mandates that the legislative auditor conduct a performance audit of the Cutter-Lingle Administration to determine how it is that the Administration determined that the \$40 million expenditure of state funds for harbor improvements to accommodate the Superferry qualified as a HRS Chapter 343 exemption. I respectfully request that the remainder of this bill in its entirety be stricken.

While the good people of Hawai'i have articulated the many reasons in fact and at law why it is not in the public interest for this vessel to operate in our waters until at least an EA is completed by the state, there's at least one more reason that I want to bring to your attention. This concerns the allegations that this vessel represents a "transportation alternative" for the people of Hawai'i. Shibai!

The state of Hawai'i is the only state in the county that does not contribute to financing public transportation. Indeed, by statute, public transportation is the responsibility of each individual county. Even the capitol city of Honolulu receives no state funds for its public transportation system. It is little wonder that the transportation alternatives we the people who live here seek and deserve on a daily basis continue go unmet by our government(s). Not only do the counties have to pay their own way, they do not even get to retain their own traffic fines.

The real injury in this situation is the state's nonparticipation in providing for the real transportation needs of its citizens; the insult comes in the form of state support (to its most insane proportions as evidenced by this Special Session) of a private transportation enterprise of no actual benefit to the people (or farmers) of Hawaii. Just check out the fare and travel schedules. And don't forget to add the 28.3% fuel surcharge to EACH fare, for passenger and vehicle. And also be sure to check out the tarrif schedule which shows graduated fares for trucks depending on size, and whether or not the truck is carrying a load. I add a special plea for the mother whale who brings her calf to the area between Kahului Harbor Mouth and the 2-mile buoy and duplicate the list of errors in the bill which I handed hard copy at the Maui hearing:

Special Plea: If you do nothing else, make them slow down the last 5 miles into Kahlui Harbor. Every year a mother whale and her calf come there and they are kind of friends of the paddlers. In fact, I've accidentally run over them in the cance with my stroker hitting the calf with a paddle. Because you absolutely cannot see them. They rest 12 inches under the water, no spouting, no movement. They hear the slow moving freighters and get out of the way (I think they didn't hear our cance). But they have no experience with the 34 knot HSF. The first time HSF takes that route while they are there, the whales will be killed.

I say this because my friends were in a canoe coming back to the harbor and saw the HSF waaaay out there and thought they had plenty of time to get into the harbor before it caught up to them. Before they knew it, HSF was on top of them. As it passed, right at the mouth of the harbor (beginning of no wake zone) the 5 foot wake almost swamped the canoes and they were only saved because of the expertise of the steersmen.

The people who are saying there are no whales on the Kahului side of Maui don't know anything. We see lots of them when we are out in the canoe during whale season as well as the pod of dolphins who visit Kahului Harbor regularly, a monk seal who has been hanging out at the harbor and ranging up to Kanaha and many turtles.

PLEASE PUT A 12 KNOT SPEED LIMIT WHERE WHALES ARE during whale season and don't kill the monk seal!

False Statements Made in the Proposed Superferry Bailout Bill

- 1. The title is not descriptive.
- 2. We all know this is a special interest bill being passed so HSF can continue flouting HRS 343. By pretending it is a bill for "large ferries", you open the door to any company coming into Hawaii and starting a ferry service prior to doing an EIS. Probably no one will because they, unlike HSF, know that the economics just don't make sense. But you are leaving the door open. I also doubt

that any judge would believe this isn't a bailout bill for one specific company and therefore unconstitutional. So this subterfuge really isn't necessary.

- 3. Section 1(a) Paragraph 2: "approved by the lower court approximately two years earlier." No lower court approved it. They simply declined to hear the case based on plaintiff standing. Subsequently this was overturned.
- 4. Section 1(a) Paragraph 2: "such an occurrence is not explicitly contemplated in chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is not consistent with the intent of the legislature, an as such, the policy that should be adopted under law must be amended and clarified." The law was written ESPECIALLY for a new project. Saying that this situation is not "explicitly contemplated" is nonsense. Saying the legislature didn't intent that large ferries do an EIS before commencement of operations is simply not true.

If you mean a situation where the Governor deliberately flouts the law, a timid judge rules no standing when the State is sued and subsequently that judge is corrected by the Appeals Court and the Governor is told to do an EIS – well this is EXACTLY what the law was written for.

If you pass this part of the law, you are basically saying that any time Gov. Lingle (or any governor) wants to ignore HRS 343, she will get away with it because "It is not explicitly contemplated" that the governor will ignore HRS 343.

5. Section 1(a) Paragraph 3: "furtherance of the legislature's goal of promoting a sustainable future for its residents, a large capacity ferry vessel company would also utilize technology that produces less carbon emmissions when compared to inter-island aircraft transportation with the same carrying capacity."

This is utter nonsense. Since when would you transport a car via airplane? If you compare passenger fuel use between interisland air and HSF, the airplane uses LESS fuel per passenger mile than HSF and is thus emits less CO2. The HSF goes about 3 times as fast as an interisland barge. Since fuel consumption goes up with the cube of velocity, HSF will use 27 (TWENTY SEVEN!) times as much fuel and put 27 times as much carbon into the atmosphere. HSF is BAD FOR SUSTAINABILITY and BAD FOR GLOBAL WARMING. And this bill's statement is BAD SCIENCE.

- 6. Section 1(a) Paragraph 3: "between islands in a very short period of time". 3 hours instead of 9 hours. Not a real big difference when you take into account that HSF will arrive after the morning markets which is times wrong for our farmers. One farmer testified that air freight (which is faster and more convenient) is actually cheaper than sending a truck and driver over on HSF.
- 7. Section 1(a) Paragraph 3: "**produce...lower cost**" Our farmers and business people testified that since they had to send a driver over with their produce, wait until the next morning for the market (which they missed due to the HSF coming into 'Oahu in the afternoon) and also because there is no way to come back without spending the night, that this would be considerable more expensive than shipping via Young Brothers.
- 8. Section 1(a) Paragraph 3: "ferry...would foster diversified agriculture..." This statement is simply not backed up with any facts whatsoever.

- Section 1(a) Paragraph 3: "immediate operation of...ferry...in the public interest...continue...while environmental impact statement are conducted" There is no evidence to support this statement.
- 10. Section 1(a) Paragraph 6(1) Oversight Task force has no power, is composed in the great majority of Lingle appointees.
- 11. Section 2(b) Sets no time limit on completing EIS. Makes no provision for HSF to pay for damage it causes because and EIS wasn't done first. Makes no provisions for halting HSF, if it turns out it is creating serious damage.
- 12. Section 2(c)1 "**critical importance of the inter-island ferry service**" There is no critical importance. We have lived without this ferry service ever since the Hydrofoil went bankrupt and we can continue living without it while it does an EIS. This is just nonsense.
- 13. Section2(d) "at the same time, protect Hawaii's fragile environment" This is so despicably hypocritical, that is needs to be removed in order for the judge who is going to be asked to strike this law down as unconstitutional to not have a heart attack laughing so hard at the sheer. brazen baloney.
- 14. Section 3. If the EIS is found lacking, HSF can continue operating. There is no incentive ever to do a real EIS with effective mitigation measures. There is no statement saying that the HSF has to implement mitigation measures coming out of the EIS.
- 15. Section 4 does not state what measures Governor Lingle is to require of HSF. Since her original bill contained absolutely NO MITIGATION measures, one assumes she will likely impose NO MITIGATION MEASURES. This leaves the environment and neighbor islands completely unprotected.
- 16. **ADD THIS:** All drafts of the EIS, comments, review, and notices of hearings or meetings shall be posted prominently on the State website so that the public may access all relevant documents easily.

(In the past, DOT has sent 1 copy to the library where it is too expensive for us to access and copy it. It is extremely important that the EIS and all associated events and documents be posted prominently and quickly on the State Website.)

- 17. "(e) All statements and other related documents shall be made available for inspection by the public during established office hours." Change this to: "(e)All statements and... shall be posted on the State Website expeditiously and prominently."
- 18. "(f) The office shall be responsible for the publication of the notice of availability..." should be changed to "(f)The office..... AND BY POSTING PROMINENTLY ON THE STATE WEBSITE"
- 19. (g) add AND BY POSTING PROMINENTLY ON THE STATE WEBSITE"
- 20. (i) shall commence as of the date notice of availability of the draft statement is intially issued" Insert AND POSTED PROMINENTLY ON THE STATE WEBSITE
- 21. Section 12. The majority of the task force is Lingle appointees. Lingle appointees need to be the minority. There should be an equal number of Task Force members from each island appointed by each island's county council. Lingle's guys can come to meetings in case anyone wants to ask them a question but don't get to vote. And give them enforcement powers they can shut down HSF operations if they see harm.

Based on the limited hearsay, third and fourth hand comments, these are my opinions. The big rub is with the EIS. I do believe that the Superferry should have done due diligence beforehand, and obtained guidance via the EIS. However, I have also heard that the State may have committed to "grease the skids" with this regard. Again, this is only what I have heard, but if this is the case, then fault does not lie solely with the Superferry. If this is true, then the Superferry should definitely be allowed to sail, perhaps with a somewhat reduced schedule, until the EIS is complete.

Traffic nightmares: The vehicular capacity of the Superferry is less than that of the various fleets in the Pacific Northwest. There many companies running multiple vessels in that market. I believe strongly that the legislature should not meet in Special Session and discuss the draft bill.

The bill is unconstitutional, illegal, and definitely not in the best interests of the Moana, Aina or the Ohana. This bill must NOT be passed.

This bill will be overruled by the Supreme Court and we will be back to where we were two years ago. EIS first!

Key aspects of the Bill will be overridden and enforced by the Federal Government through the Marine Mammal Protections Act, the Endangered Species Act, and the National Environmental Protect Act. The State is setting itself for federal lawsuits.

This Bill is blatantly wrong in numerous cases. The Superferry is not in the best interests of the public. It is not of critical importance. It is not a required public convenience and necessity. It is a frivolous

adventure amusement ride for tourist and rich of Oahu. It is like a horizontal thrilling high speed roller coaster, where you vomit for 3 hours but have the added excitement of maybe seeing a whale killed.

What local families can afford to take off time from three jobs to come over to the neighbor islands at the outrageously high prices HSF is charging? The price of oil just exceeded \$90 a barrel and both Matson and Young Brothers are already raising their fuel surcharges. Can you imagine how expensive it will be to go fast on Superferry?

The State law HRS 343-5 is quite clear, an environmental assessment must be done before operation to avoid damage. Judge Cardoza stated, after hearing four weeks of expert testimony: "Plaintiffs have demonstrated the possibility of irreparable injury with respect to the environmental impacts of the Hawaii Superferry operations on natural resources, protected species, increased introduction of invasive species and causing social and cultural impacts."

IRREPARABLE INJURY. Legislators what don't you understand? This bill is proposing taking chances, playing "Russian roulette" with our natural, social and cultural environment for over a year, or until the Bill's study is completed. No! EIS FIRST!

Being reasonable, and assuming that the Legislature will not stand up to the Unified Command of the Governor, DOT and HSF, what conditions might I suggest while the Bill's study is being done?

1. To protect the marine life, HSF must go <15 knots and travel only in daylight hours. Speed kills!

- 2. To protect against invasive species, no vehicles.
- 3. To protect against traffic congestion, no vehicles

4. To protect social and cultural damage, don't come to Kauai

NO EIS, NO SUPERFERRY TO KAUAI !

Plain and simple. Legislators do you get the message?

NO EIS, NO SUPERFERRY TO KAUAI !

Without night cruising, and by going at a safe speed, it is likely that HSF will only be able to make one trip a day. By going to only one island, there need be increases in agricultural inspectors, DOARE officers, and infrastructure improvements in one place. Most of the tourists are on Oahu and Maui. That is where the Superferry customers are. But that is where the whales are. Don't sacrifice Maui!

As evident in the demonstrations that occurred in August, the Superferry is not welcome on Kauai until an EIS is completed.

EIS FIRST !

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Specific comments on the Bill:

Page 2, Line 9. It is <u>not</u> in the public interest just for an alternative means of travel. This shows how trivial this operation really is. Just for variety?

Page 2, Line 15. Are you really that snowed by HSF PR? The HSF uses dirty fuel. It is not just carbon emissions. What is the total load of Greenhouse Gases (carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, sulfur dioxide, nitrous oxides etc.) and soot? Get an independent scientific assessment before you add this statement.

Page 2, line 18. It may take only four hours actual transit, but if the Superferry arrives on Oahu late at night the produce sits in the truck another eight hours. Better produce travels in cheaper refrigerated trailers on barges.

Page 3, line 3. Gen. Lee, head of Hawaii National Guard, testified that in recent events the military and commercial shipping/flights adequately handled neighbor island emergencies. The military capability is huge. The Superferry does not add appreciably to the State's emergency capabilities.

Page 3, line 7. The need for "immediate operation" is not substantiated. Judge Cardoza declared that the operation would cause "irreparable injury". What is the rush? According to page 49 of the Harbors Operating Agreement between DOT and HSF, the HSF must carry business interruption insurance. So the insurance pays off the \$40 million. Has the legislature seen proof of coverage and the pay-off that HSF is getting?

Page 6, line 3. There is no documented or established "critical importance" that warrants overriding HRS 343.

Page 8, line 10. Conditions set by the governor? That is like asking the fox to set the conditions on guarding the hen house! She has no expertise and blatantly favors the Superferry position. The legislature must set the conditions. EIS FIRST.

Page 11, line 18. The Superferry must not be declared "a required public convenience and necessity". It is at best a frivolous adventure ride.

Page 12, line 7. It is un-constitutional for this bill to re-empt County regulations, approvals, and permits. You will have the Counties laying suit against this precedent.

Page 12, line 15. The Gov. cannot not ethically impose such conditions because of her obvious conflict of interests. The Legislature must impose all conditions. The role of an EIS, done BEFORE operation, is to determine best mitigation measures.

Page 13, line 15. These conditions MUST be in place before the operation of the Superferry.

Page 41, line 13. The Task Force must not be under DOT. Conflict of interest yet again. Put it under OEQC or DLNR.

The State agency employees and HSF representative must be non-voting members of the task force, again, for reasons of conflict of interest.

How is the task force going to obtain information? Will there be DOCARE officers or NOAA/NMFS officers on the Superferry to record incidents? Will the hull and jet intake ports be examined for body parts after each voyage? Will the Task Force get weekly reports from DOCARE and Agriculture Inspectors?

The Superferry must stop all operations if it \Box takes \Box an endangered marine mammal or turtle until an appropriate fine or settlement is made with the controlling State and Federal government agencies. Same goes if an invasive species (eg. Mongoose) is introduced to Kauai.

We cannot do this because their is no reasonable way to get our tools, equipment and materials, (mostly sustainable eucalyptus and ohia), to the job sites.

With Matson and Young Bros., putting up their rates on a regular basis it makes it too expensive to ship things, and with the restrictions on the airlines, we cannot fly with many of our tools of the trade, even in our checked in luggage, e.g. nail guns, compressors etc., and many of our vehicles are equipped with our work stuff.  - It creates NO specific safeguards to protect each island from invasive alien species.
 - It makes NO provision to mitigate traffic and harbor congestion.
 - It neglects to protect residents from inter-island crime and drug shipments.
 - It leaves us vulnerable to theft of natural and cultural resources.

Superferry Operating Conditions

Submitted to the Legislature on Behalf of Maui Tomorrow We strongly oppose operation of Hawaii Superferry during the time it takes to prepare an EA or an EIS. Such operations violate unambiguous Hawai'i law. <u>Maui</u> Circuit Court Judge Joseph E. Cardoza correctly found that such operations caused the possibility of irreparable harm to marine mammals and an increased rate of alien species introductions.

Evidence received during the hearings made it obvious that the Hawaii Superferry project "may" have a significant effect on the environment and, as such, a full EIS is required. Legislative recognition of this inevitability is no real concession to environmentalists.

We urge the Legislature not to pass this unconstitutional special legislation benefiting a single business, depriving us of vested Constitutional rights and violating the separation of powers by overruling a judicial decision.

If the Legislature has already decided (a) to convene a special session and (b) to allow Hawaii Superferry to operate while an EA or EIS is being prepared, it would be irresponsible of us to abandon the protection of the environment to the same administration that has been dedicated for many years to minimizing legitimate concerns about the Superferry project.

We are compelled to recommend conditions of operation to be imposed by the Legislature, not because we agree that the Superferry can operate (we do not) or because we agree with the proposed legislation or its purposes (we do not), but because it is now necessary to protect Hawai'i from the impacts of the improvident actions of the Lingle Administration and the Legislature if they were to allow the Hawaii Superferry to operate, even after a month long trial amply demonstrated that this would be unlawful and would cause irreparable harm in multiple fashions.

Based on one month of daily testimony from highly qualified experts, the consensus of prevailing expert opinion was that the following mitigation measures are absolutely required to minimize to some responsible degree the possibility of irreparable harm caused by Hawaii Superferry operations during the time it takes to prepare an EA or EIS:

CONDITIONS OF OPERATION

Protection on Marine Mammals and Turtles

- 1. Hawaii Superferry vessels shall travel in routes that are in waters that are in excess of 1000 fathoms.
- 2. If Hawaii Superferry vessels travel in a route that is in any part in waters less than 1000 fathoms, its vessels shall travel at the NOAA recommended speed of no more than 13 knots. The 13 knot limitation shall be inclusive of the first 10 miles of exists and entrances to <u>Honolulu</u>, <u>Kahului</u> and Nawiliwili harbors. At all times, regardless of fathom depth, the ferry shall travel at lesser speeds than provided above as determined by the Captain to provide safe passage to passengers and to minimize strikes of whales.
- 3. Should a Hawaii Superferry vessel strike a marine mammal, a written report of

such strike shall be immediately transmitted to NOAA and any other agencies responsible for monitoring and regulating strikes.

4. Hawaii Superferry shall immediately apply for and receive from NOAA an incidental take permit and in engage in Section 7 consultation with NOAA regarding the impacts of its ferry operations on protected marine mammals.

Protection Against Introduction of Alien Species

- 5. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct thorough undercarriage washes of all vehicles during embarkation at all ports to help dislodge seeds, insects, and animals. Such undercarriage wash systems shall include appropriate debris traps and filters.
- 6. Hawaii Superferry shall utilize sufficient vacuum stations to vacuum the floors of all vehicles during embarkation. An Appropriate filter system to trap and contain all debris shall be employed.
- 7. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of plants or plant propagative materials.
- 8. Hawaii Superferry shall secure and pay for all costs to have a dog handler team present at all harbors to conduct inspections of all vehicles at the time of embarkation. These dogs will be utilized to prevent the inter-island transmission primarily of invasive species and secondarily, of drugs.
- 9. Hawaii Superferry shall inspect (a) the trunks of all cars, (b) the beds of all pickup trucks, © the engine compartments of all vehicles and (d) the interiors of all vehicles, items such as coolers, boxes, trunks and luggage shall be opened and inspected.
- 10. agricultural inspections shall not be conducted on a random basis. Every vehicle and passenger shall be inspected or screened.
- 11. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of fishing nets.
- 12. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct, publish and disseminate a risk assessment within three months of operation to further assess potential impacts and better identify potential mitigation options.
- 13. Hawaii Superferry shall post signage at all harbors about invasive species, Specific information about invasive species shall be disseminated during the ticketing process on <u>Hawaii</u> Superferry's website. Said signage and information shall have been reviewed and approved by a representative of the <u>Maui</u> Invasive Species Committee.

Protection of Customary Native Hawaiian Practices

14. Passengers, upon checking in at a harbor, shall declare whether they intend to camp at any destination island. Hawaii Superferry shall disseminate to all passengers who have declared their intent to camp written rules and procedures

for camping on the destination island.

- 15. Passengers shall only camp at Federal, State and County campgrounds at destination islands, and then only if they can demonstrate upon checking in that they have obtained in advance permits to camp at those campgrounds.
- 16. Passengers shall not be permitted to transport to another island cultural or natural resources or products from the ocean, from the shoreline or from the inlands of another island, unless the can demonstrate through a written receipt that the have purchased these items from a legitimate commercial establishment.
- 17. Should Hawaii Superferry, through the inspection process, discover an attempt to transport natural resources to another island, this transport shall be disallowed and Hawaii Superferry shall immediately notify local DLNR DOCAR officials.

Agricultural Inspections

- 18. There shall be two (2) qualified Department of Agriculture agricultural inspectors present and participating in agricultural inspections at all times of embarkation and disembarkation at each port. The DOA inspectors shall supervise all HSF screeners.
- 19. Hawaii Superferry , as an impact fee, shall pa all costs of the agricultural inspectors required in the foregoing paragraph.
- 20. The State Department of Transportation, in conjunction with the Governor, the State Legislature, and the Department of Agriculture shall forthwith allocate positions and funds for the additional agricultural positions necessary to staff the inspection personnel set forth in paragraph 18 above.
- 21. Hawaii Superferry shall post a bond in the amount of \$40,000,000.00 to reimburse the State for the balance of the funds due, in the event that the Hawaii Superferry does not operate or refuses to follow mitigation measures required b the EIS.

Permission to Operate Applies Only to the Alakai

22. The permission to operate in this Bill is limited solely to the operation of the Alakai and shall not extend to any other vessel or vessels operated b Hawaii Superferry. The "no action" provisions of Chapter 343 shall be fully applicable to all other Superferry vessels, except for the Alakai.

Time Limits

- 23. Hawaii Superferry shall not be able to utilize the lack of a time deadline in HRS Chapter 343 for the completion of the EIS as a means to keep operating for whatever period of time it may take to prepare an EIS. The Alakai shall not be entitled to operate after the expiration of the last day of the fifteenth (15th) month after the date of the adoption of this legislation.
- 24. These conditions of operation shall, however, be applicable to any and all <u>Hawaii</u> Superferries irrespective of whether they operate before or after the preparation of the EIS.

Verification of Compliance

- 25. Designated representatives of Plaintiff groups shall be entitled to verify Hawaii Department of Transportation's and Hawaii Superferry's compliance with all the foregoing.
- 26. In order to accomplish the foregoing, the designated representatives of Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et. al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3) shall be granted access to all State lands granted at all ports to Hawaii Superferry for its operations

Enforcement of Conditions

- 27. The foregoing conditions of operation may be enforced by the Attorney General of the State of Hawai'i and by Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et .al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3).
- 28. These conditions may be enforced in any Circuit Court in the <u>State of Hawaii</u> and the prevailing party shall be entitled to the reimbursement of reasonable attorney's fees and costs.
- 29. An allowable remedy in any such enforcement action shall be the cessation of Hawaii Superferry operations until and unless compliance is achieved with the foregoing condition

I do not see the concern regarding the environmental impact. This vessel is probably the most environmentally friendly vessel we will have in our islands. They have taken great precautions to assure that contaminated water (including rain run-off) will not enter the ocean.

They are also well aware of the possible interaction with whales and have procedures in place to avoid such interaction, unlike all the whale watching vessels which deliberately find and follow the whales, creating more danger and possibly increased stress to these animals.

We have waited a long time to be able to travel inter-island with our cars. The impact of traffic should be minimal, since the majority of people who bring their vehicles would have rented cars, anyway. Granted, the traffic around the pier will be more congested when the vehicle arrives and prior to departure, but I don't see the difference between that and a major event happening at different venues on the islands.

My name is Kauila Clark and I serve as a Native Hawaiian Cultural Practitioner at the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center certified by a Kupuna Council of Master healers as created by law and sanctioned by Papa Ola Lokahi. My practice has taken me all over the US and the world. In my experience the Hawaii Superferry has gone beyond in its' commitment to Native Hawaiian values and process. They have been very cooperative and respectful in being pono in their process to build a business in Hawaii to benefit the families and businesses in Hawaii. The Hawaii Superferry will make it affordable to bring our families together.

Pilahi Paki, a noted Kupuna, gave us the Acronym of ALOHA that the Hawaii State Legislature passed into law. She also said before she died that if we do not accept and practice ALOHA by the year 2000 that we would end up being like anywhere else because the Aumakua would leave these Islands and we would become HA OLE (without spirit). The behaviors in protest against the Hawaii Superferry did not exhibit the behaviors Aunty Pilahi gave us. I want to add my number to the many on Kauai who object to the way the Superferry has been forced upon us without due process. I have copied a quote from the newspaper here that states my opinion exactly,

"...the law should not be bent or changed just to suit the current whims or sentiment of some people, even if they are the majority of people.

The law is intended to apply to all people, the minority as well as the majority. The ranks of the majority and minority constantly shift with each new issue. If each time the majority feels justified to change the law to suit its purposes and wishes, we are reduced to a nation of men, not of law. The law then ceases to protect the minority.

On one issue or another and at one time or another, we will all find ourselves in the minority. It will be a terrible blow to our confidence in our system of government if, as a minority, we felt that the law will not protect our interests because the majority could whimsically change it to suit itself at any time."

The anger we feel is generated by several issues:

1. The special consideration offered the Superferry by the Governor. Even a bike path on Kauai involves an environmental assessment. This apparent preference for the benefit to business interests at the expense of due process involving the people it impacts is very troubling.

2. The focus on the potential benefit to residents of Oahu. Yes, they want to come to Kauai because it is still very different from Oahu. What a great vacation! But they forget that by coming here and bringing their cars, surfboards, hiking boots with Oahu weed seeds embedded in the soles, gear for camping on our beaches, and plants grown and products made in Oahu they are impacting our environment and gradually changing it to be more like Oahu. We want Kaua'i to stay Kaua'i for as long as possible.

3. The apparent view of our lawmakers that they are above the law. It should not be possible for our elected officials to change a law just because it is not convenient. What if we all decided that the speed limits or tax rates were inconvenient? Laws are passed to create order and establish priorities. We change these at our own peril.

4. The possible unintentional (or even intentional) introduction of invasive species during the time the environmental assessment is being done. The one that concerns me the most is the mongoose. I can see someone thinking this would be a great prank to play on Kaua'i and bring a pair over in their car. They could easily be brought in a small container, even a picnic basket, that might be missed during a routine car inspection. We have many more native birds here because of the absence of the mongoose. I enjoy the sound of nene flying over my house in Princeville on a regular basis. Once the introduction is made, it cannot be undone. This possibility needs to be addressed in an environmental assessment BEFORE the SuperFerry sails to Kaua'i again.

5. The media features the owners and the employees of the Superferry and the hardships created by any delay in beginning service. I do feel sorry for the employees, but the owners had to be aware that doing an environmental assessment was the usual precursor to doing business in Hawaii. They had plenty of time to do it while the Superferry was being designed and built. This lack of foresight isn't something we should reward. We should discourage this behavior from ever occurring again by taking action and establishing for once and for all that an EIS MUST come first!

Every day we learn more about how our activities impact the environment. When will we learn that the time to act is NOW? Overturning a law intended to protect our environment is taking many steps backward just at the time we should finally be putting the environment first before all other considerations.

In opposition to the Second Special Session, Relating to Transportation

This Second Special Session flies in the face of H.R.S. 343. The goal of H.R.S. 343 and Environmental Impact Statements is to study the effects of certain developments on the environment prior to their integration or implementation. To allow large capacity ferry vessel company to operate an inter-island ferry service before the environmental assessment or environmental impact statement process is completed, defeats the purpose of this process altogether. Only once the process has been completed should any such service be allowed to operate in the state of Hawaii.

Secondly, the State Supreme Court ruled, unanimously, that the need for an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement was triggered by the harbor improvements necessary for the operation of a large capacity ferry vessel service. At the announcement of that ruling, the state and the large capacity ferry vessel company should have halted plans to operate until both were in full compliance with the law and ruling of the State Supreme Court.

What's more, convening a special session of the State Legislature to pass legislation specifically designed to allow a large capacity ferry vessel service to operate without having completed the steps laid out in H.R.S. 343 sets a dangerous precedent to allow future businesses and administrations to maneuver around H.R.S. 343 in detriment to the unique and beautiful environment of Hawaii.

Lastly, a temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force, I believe, will not be able to adequately regulate a large capacity ferry vessel service while attempting to safe-guard the environment. Without the completion of an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement, it is unlikely such a task force will be effective in predicting and responding to potential environmental hazards created by large capacity ferry vessel service and such an oversight task force would be even less effective if one of its members is a representative of the large capacity ferry vessel company, as there would most certainly be a conflict of interest.

In conclusion, I am in opposition to this Second Special Session Relating to Transportation because I believe the steps and provisions laid out in H.R.S. 343 are sufficient; I believe the unanimous ruling by the State Supreme Court makes clear the correct course of action; I believe such a special session sets a dangerous precedent for the future and I believe an oversight task force, as laid out in this proposed legislation would constitute a conflict of interest and be ineffective in adequately predicting and safe-guarding against potential adverse environmental impacts created by the operation of a large capacity ferry vessel service. I thank you for this opportunity to testify.

I strongly support the intent of this bill to allow the Superferry to operate while the EIS is being conducted. As an island state we need an ocean mode of travel and transport as an alternative to the airlines for interisland travel. It is very clear that the majority of the residents of this state also support the Superferry as evidenced by numerous polls, letters to the editor in the daily newspapers, and the Honolulu Advertiser online forums.

The vocal minority who oppose the Superferry is just that, a very small part of our community. Those who have expressed themselves in a hostile, aggressive or illegal manner are not representative of the people of this state. Their actions have made a travesty of the Aloha spirit and have brought international attention and shame to the good people of Hawai`i nei. Many of the opponents of the Superferry do not have their roots in Hawai`i. Therefore they may not appreciate the importance of another means of transportation to bring families together on different islands because they do not have an extended `ohana here.

I consider myself an environmentalist (whatever that overused term may mean). I am simply not convinced by arguments that the Superferry is a destructive force to the land and ocean. Plant species have been brought to Hawai`i not just by humans but also by birds, ocean currents and wind currents. Recently on Oct. 5, I participated in a volunteer service project sponsored by the Army Natural Resource Program. We went to the top of Mt. Ka`ala, the highest point on O`ahu, which has a native wet forest ecosystem. The purpose of the trip was to remove an invasive rush Juncus effusus that is establishing itself in this very pristine environment containing mostly native plants that are also endemic to Hawai`i. Because this area is not open to the public and is very remote, it is quite possible that Juncus effusus arrived through natural means and not via humans. I have also participated in service trips to Koke`e State Park on Kaua`i to remove invasive species that have established themselves in the forest such as strawberry guava and kahili ginger. There are very few areas in our state that are truly pristine and untouched by invasive plants.

The NOAA National Marine Fisheries Service has compiled a database of all known ship strikes of large whales worldwide from 1975 through 2002. In 134 cases where the type of vessel was known, the following number of strikes occurred: Navy ships - 23; container, cargo and freighter ships - 20; whale watching vessels - 19; cruise ships - 17; ferries - 16; Coast Guard vessels - 9; tankers - 8; recreational boats - 7; steamships - 7; fishing boats - 4; and dredge boat, research vessel, pilot boat and whaling catcher boat 1 strike each. Furthermore, in the 58 cases where the speed of the vessel was known at the time of the collision, more strikes were reported at speeds of 13-21 knots than at speeds in excess of 30 knots. While the data in this report is by no means definitive because of the many variables and unknowns, it is clear that a wide variety of shipping activities constitute a threat to these magnificent creatures. And our Hawaiian waters certainly are abundant with the many different kinds of vessels that have been associated with large whale ship strikes. (source: http://www.fakr.noaa.gov/protectedresources/whales/publications/lwssdata.pdf).

This Legislature expressed strong support for the Superferry in 2004 by adopting Senate Concurrent Resolution 149. The Legislature further provided support by approving a reimbursable bond for \$40 million to fund harbor improvements to facilitate the Superferry's operation. I respectfully request that you continue your support of the Superferry by passing this bill out of committee to the full Senate. Thank you very much.

I want to add my number to the many on Kauai who object to the way the Superferry has been forced upon us without due process. I have copied a quote from the newspaper here that states my opinion exactly,

"...the law should not be bent or changed just to suit the current whims or sentiment of some people, even if they are the majority of people.

The law is intended to apply to all people, the minority as well as the majority. The ranks of the majority and minority constantly shift with each new issue. If each time the majority feels justified to change the law to suit its purposes and wishes, we are reduced to a nation of men, not of law. The law then ceases to protect the minority.

On one issue or another and at one time or another, we will all find ourselves in the minority. It will be a terrible blow to our confidence in our system of government if, as a minority, we felt that the law will not protect our interests because the majority could whimsically change it to suit itself at any time."

The anger we feel is generated by several issues:

1. The special consideration offered the Superferry by the Governor. Even a bike path on Kauai involves an environmental assessment. This apparent preference for the benefit to business interests at the expense of due process involving the people it impacts is very troubling.

2. The focus on the potential benefit to residents of Oahu. Yes, they want to come to Kauai because it is still very different from Oahu. What a great vacation! But they forget that by coming here and bringing their cars, surfboards, hiking boots with Oahu weed seeds embedded in the soles, gear for camping on our beaches, and plants grown and products made in Oahu they are impacting our

environment and gradually changing it to be more like Oahu. We want Kaua'i to stay Kaua'i for as long as possible.

3. The apparent view of our lawmakers that they are above the law. It should not be possible for our elected officials to change a law just because it is not convenient. What if we all decided that the speed limits or tax rates were inconvenient? Laws are passed to create order and establish priorities. We change these at our own peril.

4. The possible unintentional (or even intentional) introduction of invasive species during the time the environmental assessment is being done. The one that concerns me the most is the mongoose. I can see someone thinking this would be a great prank to play on Kaua`i and bring a pair over in their car. They could easily be brought in a small container, even a picnic basket, that might be missed during a routine car inspection. We have many more native birds here because of the absence of the mongoose. I enjoy the sound of nene flying over my house in Princeville on a regular basis. Once the introduction is made, it cannot be undone. This possibility needs to be addressed in an environmental assessment BEFORE the SuperFerry sails to Kaua`i again.

5. The media features the owners and the employees of the Superferry and the hardships created by any delay in beginning service. I do feel sorry for the employees, but the owners had to be aware that doing an environmental assessment was the usual precursor to doing business in Hawaii. They had plenty of time to do it while the Superferry was being designed and built. This lack of foresight isn't something we should reward. We should discourage this behavior from ever occurring again by taking action and establishing for once and for all that an EIS MUST come first!

Every day we learn more about how our activities impact the environment. When will we learn that the time to act is NOW? Overturning a law intended to protect our environment is taking many steps backward just at the time we should finally be putting the environment first before all other considerations.
