Unfortunately I cannot attend todays meeting in Kona today because of work. I would like to state my total support for the Superferry. I find it interesting, that almost all of the people testifying against the the Superferry are asking the State to deny only the Superferry operation in the state of Hawaii, and not the other shipping and airline companies that have introduced 99% of all the invasive species, etc. to all of the islands in the past. Concerning traffic, it will certainly increase at the harbors, but it will also alleviate a substantial amount of traffic at the airports. Wouldn't that be nice! Whales, not a problem. The ferry has stated that it would travel at a reduced speed when in whale calving areas. Today 360 degree sonar and radar systems would almost eliminate any chance of a whale collision. No EIS for Young Brothers?? I've fished the Kohala coast for over 18 years and have always enjoyed watching the whales. Every year I would see whales swimming between the tugboat and the barge being towed by a 1,000+ foot steel cable. Whales are intelligent enough to discern what the tug and barge are, and they certainly avoided them. Unfortunately, I doubt that they have a clue what the long cable is. Sometime I would see whales with calves swimming between the barge and tug and wondered if they would collide with the cable. I'm sure if this happened we would not know or be told about it.

It would be extremely short sighted if the main reason that the senate is doing this is because the state is funding a portion of the harbor upgrades for this particular enterprise. All of the shipping transportation systems should be required to submit an EIS every-time they upgrade or add to their business infrastructure, even if the state doe's not fund the upgrades. Airlines included, and all retroactively. Add a flight provide an EIS. Add a barge, provide an EIS. Add a highway, provide an EIS. Not requiring ALL transportation systems to provide an EIS will only ensure that invasive species, traffic problems, etc. will persist.

Obviously, if those testifying against the ferry were really interested in stopping the spread of invasive species, potential traffic problems or even the rare whale collision, they would also insist that all transportation systems be required to do so. I don't see them doing that. The state should stop allowing monopolies or duopolies from limiting competition and the public's choices. WHY I VOTE NO ON THE SUPERFERRY BILL:

- It overturns the unanimous Hawaii Supreme Court decision.
- It overturns Judge Cardoza's decision indicating potential irreparable harm; he heard 22 days of testimony.

- It leaves it to Governor Lingle to create the superferry's operating conditions,

BUT - It offers NO specific protections for marine animals.

- It creates NO specific safeguards to protect each island from invasive alien species.
- It makes NO provision to mitigate traffic and harbor congestion.
- It neglects to protect residents from inter-island crime and drug shipments.

- It leaves us vulnerable to theft of natural and cultural resources.

(Unfortunately, to-date Governor Lingle has frustrated all efforts to get any mitigation measures.)

- It allows the superferry to operate free of HRS 343, the Environmental Protection Act.
- It sets up a potentially stacked, 13 month "oversight committee" with NO enforcement capability.
- It denies the County any ability to regulate the superferry.
- It sets a precedent that our courts may be over-ruled by legislators meeting in a "special session" while the public is given only 2 minutes to comment.

I DO NOT SUPPORT A SPECIAL SESSION TO PASS THE SUPERFERRY BILL.

IF YOU PASS THIS BILL I ASK THAT YOU INCLUDE MAUI TOMORROW'S 29 CONDITIONS. MAHALO,

Superferry Operating Conditions

Submitted to the Legislature on Behalf of Maui Tomorrow

We strongly oppose operation of Hawaii Superferry during the time it takes to prepare an EA or an EIS. Such operations violate unambiguous Hawai'i law. Maui Circuit Court Judge Joseph E. Cardoza correctly

- found that such operations caused the possibility of irreparable harm to marine mammals and an increased rate of alien species introductions.
- Evidence received during the hearings made it obvious that the Hawaii Superferry project "may" have a significant effect on the environment and, as such, a full EIS is required. Legislative recognition of this inevitability is no real concession to environmentalists.

We urge the Legislature not to pass this unconstitutional special legislation benefiting a single business, depriving us of vested Constitutional rights and violating the separation of powers by overruling a judicial decision.

If the Legislature has already decided (a) to convene a special session and (b) to allow Hawaii Superferry to operate while an EA or EIS is being prepared, it would be irresponsible of us to abandon the protection of the environment to the same administration that has been dedicated for many years to minimizing legitimate concerns about the Superferry project.

We are compelled to recommend conditions of operation to be imposed by the Legislature, not because we agree that the Superferry can operate (we do not) or because we agree with the proposed legislation or its purposes (we do not), but because it is now necessary to protect Hawai'i from the impacts of the improvident actions of the Lingle Administration and the Legislature if they were to allow the Hawaii Superferry to operate, even after a month long trial amply demonstrated that this would be unlawful and would cause irreparable harm in multiple fashions.

Based on one month of daily testimony from highly qualified experts, the consensus of prevailing expert opinion was that the following mitigation measures are absolutely required to minimize to some responsible degree the possibility of irreparable harm caused by Hawaii Superferry operations during the time it takes to prepare an EA or EIS:

CONDITIONS OF OPERATION

Protection on Marine Mammals and Turtles

- 1. Hawaii Superferry vessels shall travel in routes that are in waters that are in excess of 1000 fathoms.
- 2. If Hawaii Superferry vessels travel in a route that is in any part in waters less than 1000 fathoms, its vessels shall travel at the NOAA recommended speed of no more than 13 knots. The 13 knot limitation shall be inclusive of the first 10 miles of exists and entrances to Honolulu, Kahului and Nawiliwili harbors. At all times, regardless of fathom depth, the ferry shall travel at lesser speeds than provided above as determined by the Captain to provide safe passage to passengers and to minimize strikes of whales.
- Should a Hawaii Superferry vessel strike a marine mammal, a written report of such strike shall be immediately transmitted to NOAA and any other agencies responsible for monitoring and regulating strikes.
- 4. Hawali Superferry shall immediately apply for and receive from NOAA an incidental take permit and in engage in Section 7 consultation with NOAA regarding the impacts of its ferry operations on protected marine mammals.

Protection Against Introduction of Alien Species

- 5. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct thorough undercarriage washes of all vehicles during embarkation at all ports to help dislodge seeds, insects, and animals. Such undercarriage wash systems shall include appropriate debris traps and filters.
- 6. Hawaii Superferry shall utilize sufficient vacuum stations to vacuum the floors of all vehicles

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during embarkation. An Appropriate filter system to trap and contain all debris shall be employed.

- 7. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of plants or plant propagative materials.
- 8. Hawaii Superferry shall secure and pay for all costs to have a dog handler team present at all harbors to conduct inspections of all vehicles at the time of embarkation. These dogs will be utilized to prevent the inter-island transmission primarily of invasive species and secondarily, of drugs.
- 9. Hawaii Superferry shall inspect (a) the trunks of all cars, (b) the beds of all pickup trucks, © the engine compartments of all vehicles and (d) the interiors of all vehicles, items such as coolers, boxes, trunks and luggage shall be opened and inspected.
- 10. agricultural inspections shall not be conducted on a random basis. Every vehicle and passenger shall be inspected or screened.
- 11. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of fishing nets.
- 12. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct, publish and disseminate a risk assessment within three months of operation to further assess potential impacts and better identify potential mitigation options.
- 13. Hawaii Superferry shall post signage at all harbors about invasive species, Specific information about invasive species shall be disseminated during the ticketing process on Hawaii Superferry's website. Said signage and information shall have been reviewed and approved by a representative of the Maui Invasive Species Committee.

Protection of Customary Native Hawaiian Practices

- 14. Passengers, upon checking in at a harbor, shall declare whether they intend to camp at any destination island. Hawaii Superferry shall disseminate to all passengers who have declared their intent to camp written rules and procedures for camping on the destination island.
- 15. Passengers shall only camp at Federal, State and County campgrounds at destination islands, and then only if they can demonstrate upon checking in that they have obtained in advance permits to camp at those campgrounds.
- 16. Passengers shall not be permitted to transport to another island cultural or natural resources or products from the ocean, from the shoreline or from the inlands of another island, unless the can demonstrate through a written receipt that the have purchased these items from a legitimate commercial establishment.
- 17. Should Hawaii Superferry, through the inspection process, discover an attempt to transport natural resources to another island, this transport shall be disallowed and Hawaii Superferry shall immediately notify local DLNR DOCAR officials.

Agricultural Inspections

- 18. There shall be two (2) qualified Department of Agriculture agricultural inspectors present and participating in agricultural inspections at all times of embarkation and disembarkation at each port. The DOA inspectors shall supervise all HSF screeners.
- 19. Hawaii Superferry , as an impact fee, shall pa all costs of the agricultural inspectors required in the foregoing paragraph.
- 20. The State Department of Transportation, in conjunction with the Governor, the State Legislature, and the Department of Agriculture shall forthwith allocate positions and funds for the additional agricultural positions necessary to staff the inspection personnel set forth in paragraph 18 above.
- 21. Hawaii Superferry shall post a bond in the amount of \$40,000,000.00 to reimburse the State for the

balance of the funds due, in the event that the Hawaii Superferry does not operate or refuses to follow mitigation measures required b the EIS.

Permission to Operate Applies Only to the Alakai

22. The permission to operate in this Bill is limited solely to the operation of the Alakai and shall not extend to any other vessel or vessels operated b Hawaii Superferry. The "no action" provisions of Chapter 343 shall be fully applicable to all other Superferry vessels, except for the Alakai.

Time Limits

- 23. Hawaii Superferry shall not be able to utilize the lack of a time deadline in HRS Chapter 343 for the completion of the EIS as a means to keep operating for whatever period of time it may take to prepare an EIS. The Alakai shall not be entitled to operate after the expiration of the last day of the fifteenth (15th) month after the date of the adoption of this legislation.
- 24. These conditions of operation shall, however, be applicable to any and all Hawaii Superferries irrespective of whether they operate before or after the preparation of the EIS.

Verification of Compliance

- 25. Designated representatives of Plaintiff groups shall be entitled to verify Hawaii Department of Transportation's and Hawaii Superferry's compliance with all the foregoing.
- 26. In order to accomplish the foregoing, the designated representatives of Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et. al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3) shall be granted access to all State lands granted at all ports to Hawali Superferry for its operations

Enforcement of Conditions

- 27. The foregoing conditions of operation may be enforced by the Attorney General of the State of Hawai'i and by Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et .al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3).
- 28. These conditions may be enforced in any Circuit Court in the State of Hawaii and the prevailing party shall be entitled to the reimbursement of reasonable attorney's fees and costs.
- 29. An allowable remedy in any such enforcement action shall be the cessation of Hawaii Superferry operations until and unless compliance is achieved with the foregoing conditions.

Aloha to the members of the Senate Committee:

Our family operates a Certified Organic farm and the only dairy on the Garden Island. We have farmed here for over thirty years, so we have some firsthand knowledge of what it is to be an endangered species. Our position is that there should be no exemptions to an EIS for Superferry. The existing environmental law should be upheld.

We do not trust the expertise of the employees of Superferry to recognize the dangers of agricultural hitchhikers. Our feeling is that each vehicle should receive a minimum 5 minute inspection prior to boarding. With the potential of 282 vehicles per trip, we know that there is no way that this will happen.

We do not accept the argument that Superferry is no different than Young Bros. or Matson. We receive monthly feed shipments on Young Brothers and, through the years, have also shipped vehicles and equipment. With YB, for example, vehicles are accepted only on certain days and the policy is that the vehicle must be empty prior to shipment. Vehicles are inspected and there is no rush or hurry when cargo is dropped or picked up at the docks.

We are very concerned about the "bringings and takings" of the Superferry. When Superferry brings the mongoose, what will happen to our free-range flock of laying hens which is so important to our sustainable agriculture enterprise? Kauai is the only island where this egg-eating, bird-eating pest has not gained a foothold. Did you know that a female mongoose produces three litters per year with 3-6 per litter? What about our nene, albatross, shearwater, and other ground-nesting birds? These are also susceptible to the imported fire-ant. A seemingly innocent potted plant brought over as a gift can contain thousands of undetected eggs. Fire-ants have been known to kill baby goats and geese in my native state of Texas. And what about agricultural theft? Here on Kaua'i, the farm community is closely-knit and we have a network of protection because we know who grows what. We reject the idea that Superferry will help farmers get our crops to markets on Oahu. Why would we pay more to ship on Superferry? Our crops will get to Oahu, all right, but not with our permission!

Ours is the most unique state in the USA. Here we have the Orchid Isle, the Friendly Isle, the Valley Isle, the Secluded Isle, the Garden Isle, and the Gathering Place. We are embraced, protected, and linked by our mother Ocean. We don't need an H-4 a.k.a Superferry to link us. So far, Superferry has only served to divide us. It is the *lack* of Interstate traffic that protects us from theft rings and kidnappings. If Superferry comes, we can no longer brag about not having to lock our houses!!

For our family, we say: Keep Kauai, Kauai. Part of her essence, part of her allure is that she is not easy. She requires and deserves that humans must make an extra effort to experience her. It certainly does take us Kauaians a lot of extra effort to call her our home. But we know that she is worth it. To our neighbors on Oahu, e komo mai. But please, we beg you, our lawmakers don't take the side of the Superferry. It is the Superferry who will take the irreplaceable from all of us! Governor Lingle and HIDOT Director Fukunaga led the HSF corporation down the garden path with the mantra of 'don't single out the Superferry'. Now they are proposing just that by calling for a special session. This project has been a public relations nightmare from early on. The amount of resources wasted on this project has been staggering. Why does the governor continue to use poor judgement regarding this 'pet project'. Doesn't she have other issues to attend to that will have greater benefits to her constituents? The homeless might appreciate this kinda of special attention. How about affordable housing or traffic improvements? Her legacy has been tarnished and her good standing with the people of Hawaii has been compromised to the point of some calling for the resignation of Director Barry Fukunaga and possible impeachment papers for Hawaii's first female governor.

This may seem excessive but everything about this project has been excessive; the size and speed of the boat, the government subsidies and favoritism shown for this corporation, the threats and response from the 'unified comand' to surfers and other protesters. Even the call to reconvene the state legislature to consider further exemptions for the HSF corporation seems so excessive; one must question the judgment and motives of our elected leaders for supporting this.

The response from residents testifying during the public briefings facilitated by our state senators demonstrated the broad level of opposition to a special session. The likelihood of continued protests and acts of civil disobedience remains significant and the outside world is watching to see how we resolve this conflict. By supporting this act to exempt the Superferry from Hawaii environmental law sets up a sensational and much anticipated confrontation that has been well documented and covered by the local and national news services. The opportunity to chose a more prudent path to pursue a resolution that will not compromise our important environmental laws has been offered. The choice is yours to make.

Again all of this is avoidable and unnecessary. A judicial decision was made regarding the state laws. Our elected leaders must honor that. Let the EA/EIS process unfold and let's see how SUPER this ferry really is. If the HSF Corporation has Hawaii's people at heart they will wait for the results and begin operations assured that the interest of the state is served. The people of this state do deserve inter-island transportation alternatives. One that is reliable and affordable and safe for the environment and its users. We the people should not accept anything less. An EA will help to develop this system.

Mahalo for considering my position on this important issue. May the public's trust and faith in government as well as the goodwill between neighbor islands be restored by your sound judgment and integrity. God Bless and best wishes for a speedy decision.

I am extremely concerned about the impact of the Superferry on the transport of invasive species around the State. I live in Hilo, and have become accustomed to the obnoxious, loud singing of the coqui frogs in my neighborhood. This past summer, I had the chance to spend a few days with a friend in Manoa. It took me a while to figure out why I had trouble falling asleep at her house. At last I understood - my busy brain was trying to figure out why it was so eerily quiet. THERE WERE NO FROGS! I had forgotten how peaceful a night's sleep could be.

I know from personal experience that coquis like to travel by car. I have found coquis hanging out on my neighbor's truck. He carries them around the island with him. This happens as a daily occurrence here. If he drives onto the ferry, he will take these frogs with him to Oahu. It will be so sad when every neighborhood in the State has to deal with the nuisance and environmental impact of coqui frogs, Miconia, bocconia, banana poka, and even worse! things that could arrive here in the future.

There must be a comprehensive environmental impact assessment BEFORE the ferry service begins, and proper prevention of the movement of invasive species, and assessment of the impact on the natural resources and communities of the neighbor islands. This is the law in Hawaii, and the law must be upheld.

Greetings Senators! My name is Rick Warshauer, I'm a conservation biologist from Volcano on the Big Island, and I have some serious concerns about the special bill that this special session is hearing. I could not find a bill number or name for it, so I'll just call it the Supervector Smokescreen Bill.

Why bother to require any washing or inspections of vehicles and cargo? We know that such inspections are not effective, otherwise Hawaii would not have this everincreasing pool of introduced species evading inspections and impacting Hawaii. It is not what is interdicted that counts, it is what gets past inspections and quarantines that are problematic. Washings need to be lengthy and thorough to be effective. These pest species include many that are adverse to native ecosystems, agriculture and our lifestyle. The few pests that are subject to control efforts cost taxpayers and businesses enormous amounts of money and lost opportunities. The adverse economic impacts and costs to attempt control of any one or a few of these pest species will exceed the cost to construct the harbor improvements required by the Supervector. It is very poor economy to risk spreading pest species to islands which still lack them. Eradications of pests are very rarely achieved, and control efforts are nearly always long-term and costly. Imagine the impact of spreading the varroa mite to the Big Island, where its multi-million dollar queen bee export industry would be compromised or eliminated. Even worse, the island's existing and future agriculture potential would be curtailed by reduced or lost pollination services. The fact that not all pests are not on all islands reflects the difficulties many pests face travelling interisland on barges, airlines and cruise ships. A roll-on roll-off vessel like the Supervector is the great equalizer, however. Pests on or in vehicles and cargo will converge from all over one island, speed onto the loading ramp, travel to the next island, and then be off into many places of the next island in a matter of HOURS, not days, and thereby they avoid long storage on hot asphalt and other hazards. Noisy coqui frogs, mite-afflicted bees, damaging fountain grass seeds and many other pests travel regularly on vehicles, and cannot be effectively screened or cleaned. Either can drugs or stolen goods.

The only effective way to prevent or markedly reduce the risk of pest transfer among the islands is for the Supervector NOT TO CARRY VEHICLES on board. If during the EIS process an effective way to sanitize vehicles is proven—and I doubt that this can be done—then the decision might be revisited. Speaking of the EIS law, why require the Supervector to do the EIS at all if the bill is to make any negative findings inapplicable to the Supervector? Also, is all this Ch. 343 text in the bill just to allow further dismantling of our EIS law, and to make mockery of the public's challenge rights under Ch.91?

The Supervector is not cheap to ride. The Supervector is not safe for our economy or environment. It may cause the demise of one of our older inter-island air carriers. The Supervector tries to operate outside the law, as confirmed by our courts, and it wants you to make it a special exception to the law in its sole behalf. The Supervector has also expressed an abundance of arrogance and absence of Aloha.

So why are we here at this expensive special session? Is it from public pressure generated from misinformation and a desperate desire to turn back the clock to cheap inter-island travel? I miss those days too, but they're gone, just like the fish on O'ahu reefs that I use to catch as a kid. Please get real and DON'T let them carry vehicles on the Supervector. If they cannot make it or hack it, then tough stuff. They have pointed out their other options, so let them choose without special dispensation from you. Use your time instead to launch a study of what Hawaii really needs in ideal surface transportation.

I would like to pledge my support for the Hawaii Superferry and the aforementioned committee. I think it will be of great benefit, both economic and social, to the Hawaiian Islands.

I was surprised that an environmental impact review had not already been carried out, but think that it is no ones interest to suspend service of the ferry while conducting such a review.

There has already been great damage to the State's reputation and if the service is discontinued there could be repercussions for both tourism and industry in the future as corporations will not regard Hawaii as a viable place to conduct business.

I would like to discuss two of the main arguments against continuing the service.

1) the potential for harm to the humpback whales due to the speed of the Alakai - I am not sure how much faster this ship travels compared to the barges that sail between the islands, but perhaps, until the environmental review has been conducted, the Alakai could slow down to that speed when entering the shallower waters around Maui where the whales predominately gather.

2) the problem of large numbers of vehicles arriving on land at the same time - does this not already occur when the barges arrive? These ships are loaded with large container trucks which have to disembark and travel in the immediate vicinity of the port and the infrastructure holds up to that. If the superferry arrives when no other barges are unloading then there should not be a problem.

Lastly I would like to state that I have no connection with any business which would benefit or be damaged by the superferry. I am merely a resident of the Big Island who would welcome the opportunity to travel easily between the other islands. Domestic tourism will benefit greatly from the continuance of the Superferry.

In opposition to the Second Special Session, Relating to Transportation

This Second Special Session flies in the face of H.R.S. 343. The goal of H.R.S. 343 and Environmental Impact Statements is to study the effects of certain developments on the environment prior to their integration or implementation. To allow large capacity ferry vessel company to operate an inter-island ferry service before the environmental assessment or environmental impact statement process is completed, defeats the purpose of this process altogether. Only once the process has been completed should any such service be allowed to operate in the state of Hawaii.

Secondly, the State Supreme Court ruled, unanimously, that the need for an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement was triggered by the harbor improvements necessary for the operation of a large capacity ferry vessel service. At the announcement of that ruling, the state and the large capacity ferry vessel company should have halted plans to operate until both were in full compliance with the law and ruling of the State Supreme Court.

What's more, convening a special session of the State Legislature to pass legislation specifically designed to allow a large capacity ferry vessel service to operate without having completed the steps laid out in H.R.S. 343 sets a dangerous precedent to allow future businesses and administrations to maneuver around H.R.S. 343 in detriment to the unique and beautiful environment of Hawaii.

Lastly, a temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force, I believe, will not be able to adequately regulate a large capacity ferry vessel service while attempting to safe-guard the environment. Without the completion of an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement, it is unlikely such a task force will be effective in predicting and responding to potential environmental hazards created by large capacity ferry vessel service and such an oversight task force would be even less effective if one of its members is a representative of the large capacity ferry vessel company, as there would most certainly be a conflict of interest.

In conclusion, I am in opposition to this Second Special Session Relating to Transportation because I believe the steps and provisions laid out in H.R.S. 343 are sufficient; I believe the unanimous ruling by the State Supreme Court makes clear the correct course of action; I believe such a special session sets a dangerous precedent for the future and I believe an oversight task force, as laid out in this proposed legislation would constitute a conflict of interest and be ineffective in adequately predicting and safe-guarding against potential adverse environmental impacts created by the operation of a large capacity ferry vessel service. Good morning and Mahalo to the legislature for allowing me to provide some insight into what will be for myself and every single disabled/handicapped person I have spoken to, consider an extremely important and viable transportation alternative... Keep in mind that I live in a complex with 24 physically impaired individuals who have a vested interest in seeing this operation come to fruition.

I am not here to lay blame or to criticize who did what and when, or to debate whether or not this is a needed service as the majority of our population has voiced this quite loudly. I can only impart to you what it will mean for myself and the handi-capped population of our state.

First of all allow me to briefly describe what we all go through when we need to travel by airline. Aside from playing "20 questions" and finally receiving permission to board the aircraft,(by the way, the airline doesn't like us to travel alone) we have to go through the very undignified procedure of transferring to a specially designed wheelchair that will fit in the isle of the airplane. Of course they have to load us first which always leads to scowls and comments from waiting passengers. Of course, this doesn't add to the stress of traveling. This means that airline personnel will have to pickup my chubby carcass at least 4 times. Twice on departure and twice on arrival. This is not a pleasant thing to go through.

Meanwhile "Magilla Gorilla" has taken a 25 thousand dollar wheelchair (my-lifeline) and is trying to shove it into the baggage compartment....no easy feat as it weighs 530 lbs. Just by itself. Unfortunately, we can't be on the ramp to supervise it's loading and unloading. Never mind the fact that we, on occasion, get to deal with an over-zealous TAS individual who is determined to find some kind of terrorist tool hiding in the wheelchair or my bladder bag. It is so bad sometimes that it's laughable.

In addition to my disability reasons, I am also doing business in wheelchair sales and have to take this wheelchair to the neighbor islands for demonstration purposes.

I, nor my handicapped friends want or need any special legislation. The Superferry will allow us the option of traveling unencumbered with a modicum of dignity and respect that any normal person would expect.

It is hoped that this August body of legislators will stand up and side with the majority of what your constituency is desiring.

It should also be kept in mind that as a frequent user of the Old Seaflite program back in the 70's, I don't ever recall slicing through baby whales, and a hydrofoil was a much more radical mode of transport than what we are discussing here.

My name is Jolene Valente Witt and I am the Port Manager for the island of Kauai. I was born and raised in Koloa, and I have lived in Kekaha for most of my married life.

When I was a little girl, we used to fly back and forth to see my Aunts and Uncles on Oahu, who had to move off island because there were more opportunities there to support their families. I wanted to see the other islands but I was so afraid to fly. I asked my Mom, why doesn't someone build a bridge between the islands? My Mom told me "one day someone's going to build that bridge, you just have to be patient and it's going to be done." To me, Alakai is that bridge that I had dreamed about since I was a little girl. I am proud to be a part of the Hawaii Superferry and I believe it will be good for the residents and the businesses of Kauai.

Many of us on Kauai support the ferry and see the potential, but it is not our culture to speak out. We are intimidated by conflict. For those of us who grew up in plantation culture, we have been taught when there is conflict just let people say what they're going to say, just "let 'em go" and it will pass over.

Even now, when it's so important to speak up and let people know what we want, it is very hard for us to do it. Last night I met with 10 members of the staff and they were happy that I would go to represent them. Then I spoke with my family, and while they understood the importance of me going, they were also afraid for my grandson getting singled out in a school where the opposition is more popular. This week he received the school newsletter with information to audition for a play to dramatize the meeting with the Governor at the Convention Hall. It concerns me what we are teaching our children on Kauai about respect for other people by glorifying this day that was a shame for all of us as residents of the island. I respect everyone's point of view and everyone's entitled to their own opinion, but the violent way that opposition has been expressed makes it even harder for the "silent majority" to speak out. Thank you for letting me explain why I support Hawaii Superferry and believe this bill should be passed to allow Hawaii Superferry to operate while an EA is being conducted.

Hawaii Superferry provides a bridge between island families that is valuable to us, and gives more freedom to move around. Many residents do not like flying, and have trouble traveling with families. So many of us who are born and raised on neighbor islands have family on other islands, and this provides an affordable option to visit with them. With

the recent price increase in shipping, it can actually be cheaper to travel with our own vehicle and definitely more convenient.

Some of us suffer from disabilities. I have been trained to assist people with disabilities and I myself have been diagnosed with a disability, and at one time I could not even climb the stairs. The idea of me not being able to lay down or spread out was a problem for me, and made travel to Oahu for medical treatment extremely difficult. There are many people with different conditions who would find travel by ferry more comfortable, and for some it may be the only way they can travel.

It's not easy to find a good part time job that works well with a full time job and still gives time with the family before going to bed. Many of our employees have to work a second job to supplement their incomes and make a living on Kauai. While I speak only for myself, many of my 35 colleagues on Kauai have also expressed similar opinions, and I hope you take that into consideration.

If the Hawaii Superferry isn't allowed to operate, it would be a loss not only for employees, but also for business on Kauai. Kauai has already been labeled as "anti business" and that creates a domino effect with the jobs and the whole economy. Please help us to preserve the Superferry, not only to help us keep our jobs for us, but also jobs for everybody.

Ever since my first trip to Seattle and Vancouver island with my parents, I've longed to be able to drive my car on Kauai, or Maui, or any of the other islands. We drive our car onto the ferry, and drove off to see the Butchart Gardens and the other sights in Victoria. Decades later, I made the same trip with my family, with an extra leg to Port Angeles. Still just as enjoyable.

Picking up a rental car on the neighbor islands is ok, but it's just not **your** car! The familiarity or your own vehicle eliminates the learning curve associated with rentals... Where are the lights, the wipers, etc. The Superferry is the embodiment of my desire to visit friends and relative on the other islands. We would pack a little differently, probably bringing more o-miyage on the way over, and more goodies on the return!

Even though I have friends working for the Superferry, I had the desire to keep up with all of the "goings-on" with the Superferry, but not the time. The only things I have heard and seen, are primarily negative, as one would expect. I guess it's human nature to emphasize the negative.

Based on the limited hearsay, third and fourth hand comments, these are my opinions. The big rub is with the EIS. I do believe that the Superferry should have done due diligence beforehand, and obtained guidance via the EIS. However, I have also heard that the State may have committed to "grease the skids" with this regard. Again, this is only what I have heard, but if this is the case, then fault does not lie solely with the Superferry. If this is true, then the Superferry should definitely be allowed to sail, perhaps with a somewhat reduced schedule, until the EIS is complete.

Traffic nightmares: The vehicular capacity of the Superferry is less than that of the various fleets in the Pacific Northwest. There many companies running multiple vessels in that market. I didn't see even the slightest hint of localized gridlock with the vehicular embarking / disembarking process. Granted there is far more area in the Northwest to spread the traffic, but still, not a hint of gridlock...

To me, the saddest thing about all of this, is the message that the "neighbor" islands is sending to the residents of Oahu... "Stay Home". I would expect that the lions share of ridership to the neighbor islands would be Oahu residents. Visitors to Hawaii probably wouldn't want to burn up several precious hours riding on a ferry in their rental car. Maybe I'm bringing a new computer for my dad on Kauai, or a sewing machine to a relative on the Big Island. I'm certainly not going to pack it as baggage on the plane!

Funny too, I haven't heard one peep about those who would travel from the the outer islands to Oahu! Do we just not care? Are we simply welcoming everyone with open arms? Or do we just look at this as a step toward a more connected society, the shrinking of our world?

I hope the Superfierry stays. Riding the ferry system in the Pacific Northwest is fine, but there's no family there... Isn't that what it's all about? Connecting friends and family?

I'm amazed but not surprised we're even debating the proposed inter-island ferry service in Hawaii because every other community would recognized how fortunate they are to be given such an opportunity -- so I can understand why the ferry operators are perplexed by the carefully orchestrated opposition to it. I just hope they are not successful in inciting the hysteria and fear in our elected officials, bad conditioning/education Hawaii is infamous for -- and which keeps the great riches and talent of the world from offering their services here. We can be the most blessed people in the world -- if we would allow it, rather than fighting off every new and great idea, while clinging tightly to our age-old problems -- mainly of a mentality and culture that refuses to accept any solutions.

And the outer islands have become a mecca for anti-progress protestors, who still think the ideal is for the indigenous peoples of the world to continue to live in grass huts and caves as God's intended ideal for them -- and they should reflexively fight off every good for humans that give an advantage over every other species -- and that the ideal is for humans to be in fair competition with every species for only their allotted fair share, which they insist is when the human population no longer exists -- so that the other animals can reign.

That's what I'm hearing of the arguments against the Superferry -- and why I haven't been at these Hearings (demonstrations) like most other sane and rational people -- thinking that government decisions will be by those who can scream the loudest and bully and intimidate those who are uncertain what they think. And that is a great problem in Hawaii, and so I ask in these deliberations, that our elected officials, merely resist all the deceptions and manipulations, and make a courageous decision based on their own intelligent thought processes, which is all that one can ask of another.

If we value intelligence, the intelligent and productive people of the world will know they are welcome here, and then, that intelligence will solve all the problems of our times and place -- rather than insisting that those age-old problems are who were are and must be forevermore. Life is too short and precious, not to explore the wonderful world -- that can begin at home, in these Islands, with the addition of the Superferry.

I want to add my number to the many on Kauai who object to the way the Superferry has been forced upon us without due process. I have copied a quote from the newspaper here that states my opinion exactly,

"...the law should not be bent or changed just to suit the current whims or sentiment of some people, even if they are the majority of people.

The law is intended to apply to all people, the minority as well as the majority. The ranks of the majority and minority constantly shift with each new issue. If each time the majority feels justified to change the law to suit its purposes and wishes, we are reduced to a nation of men, not of law. The law then ceases to protect the minority.

On one issue or another and at one time or another, we will all find ourselves in the minority. It will be a terrible blow to our confidence in our system of government if, as a minority, we felt that the law will not protect our interests because the majority could whimsically change it to suit itself at any time."

The anger we feel is generated by several issues:

1. The special consideration offered the Superferry by the Governor. Even a bike path on Kauai involves an environmental assessment. This apparent preference for the benefit to business interests at the expense of due process involving the people it impacts is very troubling.

2. The focus on the potential benefit to residents of Oahu. Yes, they want to come to Kauai because it is still very different from Oahu. What a great vacation! But they forget that by coming here and bringing their cars, surfboards, hiking boots with Oahu weed seeds embedded in the soles, gear for camping on our beaches, and plants grown and products made in Oahu they are impacting our

environment and gradually changing it to be more like Oahu. We want Kaua`i to stay Kaua`i for as long as possible.

3. The apparent view of our lawmakers that they are above the law. It should not be possible for our elected officials to change a law just because it is not convenient. What if we all decided that the speed limits or tax rates were inconvenient? Laws are passed to create order and establish priorities. We change these at our own peril.

4. The possible unintentional (or even intentional) introduction of invasive species during the time the environmental assessment is being done. The one that concerns me the most is the mongoose. I can see someone thinking this would be a great prank to play on Kaua'i and bring a pair over in their car. They could easily be brought in a small container, even a picnic basket, that might be missed during a routine car inspection. We have many more native birds here because of the absence of the mongoose. I enjoy the sound of nene flying over my house in Princeville on a regular basis. Once the introduction is made, it cannot be undone. This possibility needs to be addressed in an environmental assessment BEFORE the SuperFerry sails to Kaua'i again.

5. The media features the owners and the employees of the Superferry and the hardships created by any delay in beginning service. I do feel sorry for the employees, but the owners had to be aware that doing an environmental assessment was the usual precursor to doing business in Hawaii. They had plenty of time to do it while the Superferry was being designed and built. This lack of foresight isn't something we should reward. We should discourage this behavior from ever occurring again by taking action and establishing for once and for all that an EIS MUST come first!

Every day we learn more about how our activities impact the environment. When will we learn that the time to act is NOW? Overturning a law intended to protect our environment is taking many steps backward just at the time we should finally be putting the environment first before all other considerations.

Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for giving me a chance to testify on this important bill. My name is Kanoa Parker and I work as Chief Officer aboard the Hawaii Super Ferry, ALAKAI. Working on board the ALAKAI has given me the chance to work on state of the art equipment in the waters where I grew up, while at the same time advancing my license and career. To have this chance to work here in Hawaii as opposed to the Gulf of Alaska or the Far East, is really a wonderful opportunity.

Growing up on O'ahu, I have been around the ocean my whole life, whether it has been surfing, fishing, paddling or sailing. I have a great respect for the ocean, and Hawaii's environment. Working on the ALAKAI, I have come to find out that Hawaii Superferrie's environmental policies are more stringent and environmentally conscious than any company I have worked for. I have worked on tankers in Alaska, containerships and car-carriers sailing around the world, and just prior to the Superferry I was on the cruise ships sailing here inter-island.

With our no discharge policy, and stringent inspections for invasive species I feel confident about Hawaii Superferry making the least amount of impact on the environment as possible. All my fellow co-workers, whether on board, in the terminals, or in the office share my views. The amount of training and focus that the company has placed on the environment is very impressive.

The Hawaii Superferry is a great alternative to the state of Hawaii for inter island travel. From conversations with passengers on the few trips that we have done, and just this past weekend talking with some of the passengers who came aboard for our military appreciation cruises, there was an overwhelming consensus of how much everyone on board enjoyed themselves. They were so impressed with everything about the ALAKAI and our crew. This gave me a real sense of pride to be a part of this whole operation. I think the people of Hawaii deserve this alternative to travel. They deserve to have a choice of whether they want to use the Superferry to facilitate their businesses, or take their cars to outer islands to see their families. The Superferry has so many positive things that it can bring to Hawaii. Besides an alternative for travel, the vessel could be used as a major asset for disaster and emergency relief. With the ferries cargo-carrying capacity, speed and maneuverability, the ALAKAI could play an integral role in disaster relief to outer islands.

Aloha Senators:

Mahalo for the opportunity to address the proposed bill concerning large capacity inter-island ferry vessel. I feel there is inadequate environmental information available to make any decisions on potential impacts of the Hawaii Superferry, Inc. (HSF) to endangered species of Hawai'i and I am very concerned about the proposed bill. Hawai'i, the hotspot of extinctions, has more endangered species per square mile, than any other place on the planet. No matter what actions the state of Hawai'i takes overturning Hawai'i Revised Statutes 343, the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) prevails and NEPA regulations must be adhered to.

NEPA takes precedence over Little NEPA (HEPA), as has been established by case law for over thirty years. No initiation of service can be made without National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. §§ 4321 et seq.) considerations, including Habitat Conservation Plans (HCP) and Incidental Take Procedures (ITP) for every potentially impacted endangered and threatened species; low income and cultural impacts; cumulative impacts; and project alternatives and potential impacts to critical habitat areas and environmentally sensitive areas.

Authority: NEPA, the Environmental Quality Improvement Act of 1970, as amended (42 U.S.C. 4371 et seq.), sec. 309 of the Clean Air Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 7609), and E.O. 11514 (Mar. 5, 1970, as amended by E.O. 11991, May 24, 1977).

Section 102(2) of the NEPA contains "action-forcing" provisions that ensure that federal agencies act according to the letter and the spirit of the law prior to any impacting action. The HSF is a major federal project due the federal funding received by the HSF through the United Stated Department of Transportation Maritime Administration (MARAD) Title XI loan of \$139,731,000.00 to Hawaii Superferry, Inc., and NEPA must be considered in regards to all the endangered species of Hawai` i and it's waters.

MARAD had reservations about the lack of environmental scrutiny;

On March 28, 2005 MARAD, in granting their Categorical Exclusion stated:

Based on the information available at that time, there appeared to have been very little, if any, NEPA or state environmental work performed related to the proposed ferry service that would be adequate for MARAD's responsibilities under NEPA...

But based their Categorical Exclusion on the Hawaii state Categorical Exemption issued by Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT), gualifying that:

MAR-820 recommends that the loan guarantee contract contain the requirement that Hawaiian High Speed Ferry (HSF) Corporation comply with all applicable environmental laws and regulations.

Serious consideration needs to be given to the validity of the MARAD Categorical Exclusion that was based on the Hawaii State Department of Transportation Categorical Exemption, since the ruling No. 27407 of the Hawaii Supreme Court on August 31, 2007, invalidates the state DOT Categorical Exemption. Wouldn't the MARAD Categorical Exclusion be invalidated also?

Sec. 1502.3 Statutory requirements for statements.

As required by sec. 102(2)(C) of N 8). Significantly (Sec. 1508.27). Affecting (Secs. 1508.3, 1508.8). The quality of the human environment (Sec. 1508.14).

d) Environmental impact statements shall state how alternatives considered in it and decisions based on it will or will not achieve the requirements of sections 101 and 102(1) of the Act and other environmental laws and policies.

(e) The range of alternatives discussed in environmental impact statements shall encompass those to be considered by the ultimate agency decision maker.

(f) Agencies shall not commit resources prejudicing selection of alternatives before making a final decision (Sec. 1506.1).

In *Hawaii Superferry: Commitments and Actions to Address Environmental Concerns*, prepared for Hawaii Superferry, Inc., February 2007 by CH2M Hill, there are no comments included by any wildlife agencies. It is stated that the DAR of DLNR was contacted in 2006, but no comments were specified. I'm not sure why Aquatic Resources, not Marine Resources, was contacted, but Kauai Aquatic Resources was not asked for input to potential impact to Huleia River (D. Heacock, pers.comm). Page 24 of *Hawaii Superferry: Commitments and Actions to Address Environmental Concerns*, includes:

3.10 Agency Consultation

As mentioned throughout this document, agencies were consulted by HSF for applicable functions.

That's all. This is horribly inadequate and does not satisfy NEPA requirements.

The only wildlife species mentioned in the document are migratory humpbacked whales, Hawaiian monk seals and green sea turtles, but no contributing agency input. There are many other whale species afforded endangered species protection and other listed sea turtles. There is no mention of potential impacts to endangered and migratory birds. Potential impacts to all federally listed threatened and endangered plant and animal species must be given full consideration under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) before any potentially impacting action is taken. Section 7 consult must begin with federal wildlife agencies.

Potential impacts to federally-listed threatened and endangered plant and algae species by introduction of invasive species of plants and animals is monumental and must be considered on an island-by- island basis due to the unique biological diversity of each island and cumulatively, to the entire state. Introduction of mongoose to sensitive habitats for ground nesting birds could have population extinction potential.

NEPA consideration of potential impacts to threatened and endangered Hawaiian species must include:

'Alae `ula, Hawaiian moorhen, (Gallinula chloropus sanvicensis); `Alae ke`oke`o , Hawaiian coot, (Fulica alai); ` Ae`o, Hawaiian stilt, (*Himantopus mexicanus knudseni); Koloa maoli,* Hawaiian duck, (Anas wyvilliana); Nene, Hawaiian goose, (Branta sandvicensis); 'Ua'u, Dark rumped petrel, (Pterodroma phaeopygia sandwichensis); 'A'o, Newell's shearwater, (Puffinus auricularis newelii); `alala, Hawaiian Crow, (Corvus hawaiiensis); Bandrumped storm petrel, (Oceanodroma castro); Manu o ku, White tern, (Gygis alba rothschildi): `io, Hawaiian hawk, (Buteo solitarius); Short-tailed albatross, (Phoebastria albastrus); `akohekohe, Crested Honeycreeper, (Palmeria dolei): Nihoa Millerbird, (Acrocephalus familiaris kingi): Kauai Nukupu'u, Kauai nukupu`u, (Hemignathus lucidus hanapepe); Maui Nukupu`u, Maui nukupu`u, (Hemignathus lucidus affinis); `O`o`a`a, Kauai`O`o, (Moho braccatus); `O`u o`u (Psittirostra psittacea); Palila, palila, (Loxioides bailleui), Maui Parrotbill, (Pseudonestor xanthophrys); Po`ouli, po`ouli, (Melamprosops phaeosoma); oloma 'à, Molokai Thrush, (*Myadestes lanaiensis rutha); kama`o,* large Kauai Thrush, (*Myadestes* myadestinus), puaiohi, small Kauai Thrush, (Myadestes palmeri); ilio holo i ka uaua, Hawaiian monk seal, Monachus schauinslandi); koholä, Humpback whale, (Megaptera novaeangliae); Sperm whale, (Physeter macrocephalus); Blue whale, (Balaenoptera musculus); Fin whale, (Balaenoptera physalus); Sei whale, (Balaenoptera borealis); North Pacific right whale, (Eubalaena japonica); Olive ridley turtle, (Lepidochelys olivacea); Leatherback turtle, (Dermochelys coriacea); Loggerhead turtle, (Caretta caretta); Honu `ea, Hawksbill turtle , (*Eretmochelys imbricate); Honu,* Green sea turtle, (*Chelonia mydas);* and the `Ope`ape`a, Hawaiian Hoary bat, (Lasiurus cinereus semotus);

The following birds are offered protection under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act: Eurasian Skylark, (*Alauda arvensis*); House Finch, (*Carpodacus mexicanus*); Northern Cardinal, (*Cardinalis cardinalis*); Kolea, Pacific Golden Plove, (*Pluvialis fulva*); Band-rumped Storm-Petrel, (*Oceanodroma castro*); White-tailed Tropicbird, (*Phaethon lepturus*); Wandering Tattler, (*Heteroscelus incanus*); Bristle-thighed Curlew, (*Numenius tahitiensis*); *Pueo*, Hawaiian Shorteared Owl, (*Asio flammeus sandwichensis*).

The Hawaiian archipelago is home to 22 species of breeding seabirds, three of which are endemic to the islands. Presently 75 % of known Hawaiian seabirds are extinct or threatened with extinction and listed on the Federal Endangered Species List (USFWS 1985). Island seabird populations have been declining worldwide. Seabirds within the Hawaiian archipelago are vital to a well-balanced marine ecosystem.

The following sea birds are found in Hawaiian waters: Moli, Laysan albatross, (Phoebastria immutabilis); Black footed albatross, (Phoebastria nigripes); 'A, Brown booby, (Sula leucogaster); 'A, Masked booby, (Sula dactylatra); 'A or Mahi, Red-footed booby, (Sula sula), 'Iwa, Great frigate, (Fregata minor); Black noody, (Anous stolidus pileatus); Noio koha, Brown noddy, (Anous minutus); Blue noddy, (Procelsterna cerulean); 'Ou, Bulwer's petrel,, (Bulweria bulwerii); Bonin petrel , (Pterodroma hypoleuca); Christmas shearwater, (Puffinus nativitatis); 'Ua 'u kani, Wedge-tailed shearwater, (Puffinus pacificus), 'Ewa 'ewa, Sooty tern, (Sterna fuscata); Koa e 'ula, Red-tailed Tropic Bird, (Phaethon rubricauda); and Koa e ke'o, White tailed Tropicbird, (Phaethon lepturus dorotheae) must be considered.

The Hawaii High Speed Ferry, Inc. has operated as an errant vendor of our ports, and has not followed recommended environmental procedures. Improvements to our port facilities are not wasted can perhaps be better used by a vendor that would be environmentally more respectful of state and federal laws and not cause so much trouble and litigation encumbrances. Perhaps an inter-island passenger ferry system would be a more environmentally sensitive start. If the speed of the proposed HSF and the invasive species transfer by vehicle transport are the most critical issues, has any compromise been considered by HSF? Is this the kind of privatization of our port services that we, as a state, really need? Do we really need a Super-fast, Super Ferry?

Many companies operate with consideration to HEPA and NEPA; those that do not should not be offered

special consideration. The Hawaii High Speed Ferry, Inc. cannot be allowed to begin operation without NEPA considerations. HEPA must not be overturned or compromised. The State of Hawai'i cannot risk federal enforcement of NEPA. Please follow the letter and intent of HEPA and NEPA and protect the endangered species of Hawai'i.

In Part IV, SECTION 12 (a), the department of transportation is authorized to establish a temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force to examine the environmental impacts of the ferry. Suggested makeup of the taskforce does not include any wildlife official (the BLNR member is not necessarily a wildlife appointee). Qualified state and federal wildlife endangered species agencies must be included, like the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Marine Fisheries, National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration, Pacific Marine Fisheries and Hawai' i Department of Land and Natural Resources endangered species specialists and the invasive species committees of each island. The temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force shall meet monthly, commencing with December 31, 2007. With service attempted to begin late October, 2007, that would mean a 60 day gap in impact reporting or invasive species transfer. That is unacceptable. Where is monitoring mandated? The temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force is scheduled to "submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to legislature and governor no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2009". 2009!!!!. Entirely unacceptable.

Thank you very much for your time and consideration. These decisions you are making will affect many generations of our grandchildren and their quality of life in these islands. Please include the following in your Hawai`i Superferry legislation:

- NEPA consult must begin immediately with qualified state and federal agencies on all the endangered species of Hawai`i potentially impacted with this new mode of high speed travel, as mandated by law.
- Qualified federal and state agency endangered species and wildlife biologists must be included in the temporary Hawaii inter-island ferry oversight task force.
- Agency monitoring and more rapid reporting/response time must be mandated as part of this new law. The governor cannot wait until 2009 to be informed of the status of impacts.
- The status of the MARAD Categorical Exclusion must be reevaluated since the revocation of the Hawai`i DOT Categorical Exemption.
- Please reevaluate the Public Utilities Commission Permit Decision and Order No. 21524 and reconsider if the Hawai`i Superferry, Inc. is truly in the public interest, need and necessity and if it is based on proper math.

The differences between the superferry and other modes of transportation is where focus needs to be placed. After these differences are corrected, the question is then economic.

I feel that the people of Hawaii would support a bill that prevents special interest groups from distorting the truth for their own personal gain. I think that such a bill would be transparent and fair if it provided reasonable requirements to insure that the superferry meets, not exceeds, current industry and public standards for the transportation of cars luggage and people. (i.e. airplanes, freight, private boats, etc.)

If the ferry is placed on a fair playing field with other modes of transportation, the question then becomes only one of economics, as all other arguments are mute if similar problems could arise from the current forms of transportation.

If the superferry is held to the same industrial standards, it will compete with other modes of transportation. It cannot create a demand (other than its initial novelty) if it is not already there. Therefore it is not likely that there will be a net increases in cars and people especially because comparatively it's a more expensive and time consuming way to travel.

As evidenced by the recent airline price wars, inter island travel is going to occur in a very cheap, for *the masses way. Are activists trying to take out their legitimate concerns about too many visitors on* the ferry? It's obvious that more people are coming to the islands, (who almost all rent cars by the way). However, is fighting the ferry going to improve the situation? I personally see the superferry as an opportunity to raise the standard for transportation. At its price, it will be primarily affordable to tourists who want to spend a little extra money and use a little more time at sea, as opposed to on a neighbor island. It is also a reasonable price for business needs, and would provide the means for island businesses to forgo building additional facilities on neighbor islands. This would additionally help them better compete with larger businesses that would develop on island

to provide essential services.

As far as improving familial relations? I think this is just advertising, as a flight rental car package is likely to be cheaper and definitely faster, saving on two things that families have a short supply of, time and money.

It is hard, as in anything to sift through bias to find reality when the voices of some shout so loudly, and I sympathize with those willing to fight for what they want, but I wonder if we are not "missing the boat" by fighting the ferry. I applaud those who think for themselves and set aside ridicule to do what is fair. The ferry, under the same regulations as current forms of transportation, will definitely raise the current standard for inter island transportation, and may potentially help local businesses keep the outer islands small.

The very fact that you are gathering today, the very fact that you are even considering some sort of special legislation around the Superferry in "spite" of already existing state laws, and in "spite" of the recent court rulings, speaks volumes regarding who is wielding the power behind the scenes in our Hawaiian State Government.

All the editorials in Honolulu praised the citizens of Maui for taking our case to the courts and not to the water. "The law is the law," they said. "Don't break the law to get your voice heard – let the courts decide."

Well, we did that. And the courts have decided. Despite our shallow pockets compared to the State of Hawaii and the Hawaii Superferry, we have won summary judgments from the State Supreme Court and the 2nd Circuit Court. The State must do an environmental assessment and the Superferry cannot operate until the assessment is complete and accepted because it may do "irreparable harm."

Irreparable harm. Unfixable.

That is why we do an EIS – to prevent irreparable harm by identifying impacts that may do irreparable harm and mitigating them BEFORE the operation begins.

But now you are threatening to circumvent those rulings.
What kind of a message does that send?

Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

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Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not. Don't break the law. Its that simple.

We want the BEST for Hawaii, won't settle for LESS.

How can we teach our children to respect the law, much less politicians, if you allow criminal acts to the highest bidder.

This is a shameful message.

You representatives and elected officials, along with us citizens, should demand en EIS. Why? Because its the law and its the right thing to do.

Anything less is pure corruption and that's a heavy burden to bear and disgusting message to spread.

Is the government for sale?

More importantly, do you want to be the reason ecosystems and species go extinct from the high potential for unchecked spread of invasive species and overuse of undermanaged areas?

I don't and I won't be quiet about it. This is abuse and neglect.

Don't destroy Hawaii.

Demand an EIS for every big business and military scheme in these islands. They are the visitors, it is the host who makes the rules.

The military should be under investigation, not assistance, from the state.- for the atrocities they continue to inflict upon our aina. Is this ferry to be a cover to transport their vehicles? If so, be honest. Are you putting civilian lives into a target for terrorism?!

Be as good a politician as you would be a parent to your own children. Demand the best. Or shame on you and pity on your descendents, you will be destroying their environment too.

TESTIMONY

I am testifying IN SUPPORT of the Superferry being able to immediately start service between the islands of the State of Hawaii.

All of the claims of harm to the environment are full of holes and are not supported by science and common sense because of the following obvious reasons:

1 - Daily, inter-island commercial and private jets and cargo air planes carry thousands of passengers and hundreds of tons of cargo between the islands without inspection for ants spiders, bacteria, etc.; 2 - Daily, inter-island ocean shippers tow huge barges from island harbor to island harbor. These barges are filled with hundreds of unwashed vehicles of all sizes and shapes including construction vehicles and equipment covered with mud and ants from every sector of the Island of Oahu, Additionally, the ocean barges carry huge ocean going containers - which have been shipped into Hawai'i from every part of the world as well as every sector of Oahu - into each and every outer island in the State of Hawai'i;

3 - Private and Commercial ships of all sizes visit all the harbors in the State of Hawaii daily and none of these ships are searched for ants, seeds, etc.

4 - The pontoon design of the Superferry's hull creates a surge and wake in front of them and actually push fish and whales away from them. Additionally, the Superferry does not have a propeller which is the great danger to whales and marine mammals.

IN CONCLUSION, the Superferry should be allow to start service immediately, because presently and for the last 200 years, none of the shipping containers or 1,000's of vehicles and construction equipment which barges and ships daily transport to the outer Hawaiian Islands are searched in the manner that the environmentalists are demanding that vehicles and cargo traveling on the Superferry be searched.

Additionally, all the injuries to marine mammals that the environmentalists claim will occur **WILL NOT OCCUR** because the Superferry does not have exterior propellers which cause 99% of injuries to



marine animals. And, the Superferry's pontoon hull design creates a surge in front of them which propels anything - including marine mammals - to be pushed away from them as they approach the object (this is the reason one frequently sees marine mammals playing in the bow surge in front of ships).

SOURCE of the UNDERGROUND OPPOSITION TO THE SUPERFERRY

It is a very common rumor that the dock, tug and stevedore workers of Hawai'i are the real source of all the loud protests to the Superferry (along with their families, investments and real estate brokers and anyone they can enlist in their protests. This group of harbor workers demand HUGE salaries which drive up the costs of every commodity available in Hawai'i and have deep pockets to create the loud protests which oppose the Superferry's Service).

Their protests should be ignored and the Superferry be allowed to begin service immediately.

My name is Teri Leicher. My family owns and operates Jack's Diving Locker, which has 2 Retail Dive Stores, 5 Boats and 40 employees in Kailua Kona.

I could not testify in person as I am about to board a flight.

As a Business we have been actively involved in and dedicated to marine and

environmental conservation for over 25 years. We have been recipients of the Living Reef Award, The Hero of the Year for the Environment award and others.

Because of this I was asked to volunteer my expertise to help the Superferry with

potential community concerns. I was amazed to see how open to change and willing they were to work with the community on issues. They made major changes to mitigate potential problems.

I am very disappointed with what is currently happening with the Superferry. I feel that an environmental assessment is not a bad idea and should be done for the entire shipping industry...but not just the Superferry. We have cruise ships on an almost daily basis dumping muddy bilge water in our pristine Kailua Bay. The Superferry doesn't even have ballast or bilge water. The cruise ships dump sewage in the waters off of our shores. The Superferry uses the Honolulu sewer system.

As far as folks taking our fish, they can already do that using Young Brother's or Hawaiian Airlines. We need different laws to protect our resources.

The roads are already overcrowded with visitors and locals. I do not think the Superferry will have much of an impact there. During the blessing at Kawaihae there were over 2000 visitors to the harbor. Traffic was not a problem. The roads are due to be improved anyway.

Many local folks are eager to see the Superferry start so they can go to Honolulu to shop, take their race cars to the drag races, take their horses for a parade, take their canoes for the races, go surfing and many other activities.

I would recommend that the Superferry not be made a last minute "Scapegoat", but be allowed to run. At the same time the State of Hawaii should do an EA or an EIS for the entire shipping Industry. It's long over due.

I honestly do not know whether the Superferry is a good thing for Hawaii or a bad thing for Hawaii. But I do know that holding a a special session for the Superferry is not appropriate. We are a nation of laws. This means that the law should not be bent or changed just to suit the sentiment of some people, even if they are the majority of people. Nor should a law be changed to make up for administrative mistakes.

Our environmental law was enacted after considerable discussion, work, time and compromise by our Legislature. It has served us well for many, many years and has protected our environment. The environmental laws, locally and nationally, were not enacted to merely be an inconvenience. They are intended to address very important needs and to cure serious problems that will affect us, in the long run, much more than the success or failure of the Superferry. I support permitting the Superferry to operate during the period that a reasonable EIS is being conducted despite my concerns for the safety of marine mammals and turtles. The business will have to have a very pro-active set of operating procedures to reduce the risk of these contacts and to report any that do occur.

Businesses have a right to rely on the representations of govermental agencies overseeing their permitting requests and the Superferry has invested many millions of dollars based upon the unfortunate positions taken by our administration.

Although the majority of the reasons cited by those opposed to the ferry are profoundly incoherent and irrational, I do feel that there are viable reasons to be concerned about marine life. Given that we already have many different types of commercial sea-going vessels plying intrastate waters which must mitigate the risks of collisions and harm to sea life, these risks should be dealt with while the business is in operation.

Dear Hawaii,

To reduce the fear, anxiety and concerns of our neighbor island residents regarding the operation of the Super Ferry, it might be prudent to award temporary incremental permits of 15, 30 and 60 day periods respectively, to allow the Super Ferry to operate between Oahu, Maui and Kauai during the EIS. Should greater issues or concerns arise during these limited periods of operation, the permits could be temporarily rescinded and reinstated when the problem(s) is/are resolved. This might provide both sides of this issue greater control to stop operation of the Super Ferry should an unforeseen environmental emergency arise, and to address these concerns immediately, while an EIS is being conducted.

If we find that both sides of this issue have valid concerns, it might show up within the first 15 or 30 days of operating in our waters. This should promote constructive discussion or criticisms concerning the operation and future of the Super Ferry in Hawaii, long before the conclusion of an EIS. I wanted to take this opportunity to voice my opinion on the issue of the superferry in advance of tomorrow's meeting.

I am in full favor of the Superferry.

I am looking forward to be able to travel from my home on Oahu to a neighbor island via a nice boat ride in the open air rather than being cooped up in a plane.

I am looking forward to being able to travel with my family without having the hassles of carrying onboard or checking or renting baby car seats.

I am looking forward to arriving or returning without the fear of having had my luggage lost or broken or having to go through the hassle of packing up everything into checkable luggage.

I am looking forward to being able to take longer trips to outer islands without having to pay \$500 for the rental of a car large enough to accomodate my family and all our child car seats, strollers, boogey boards, etc...

I am looking forward to showing my children what our islands and waters look like from the bridge of a boat on the open water.

I am not worried about invasive species (why would there be more invasive species transferred between islands on the superferry versus Young Brothers barges, interisland cruise ships, or 100 flights per day on Aloha, Hawaiian, Go!, or Island Air?)

I do not understand why residents of outer islands are concerned about the influx of what will mostly be Kama'aina coming to visit neighbor islands or visit family. The total number of arrivals via the Superferry is small compared with the numbers arriving via airlines (a flight search HNL to LIH showed 11 flights/day on Aloha, 16 flights per day on Hawaiian, 6 flights/day on Go! which represent capacity of approximately 3600 passengers/day - much larger than the stated capacity of the Superferry of 866 passengers).

The only potential concern I have is for the safety of the Humpback Whales but there is no evidence at this time that the Superferry (and it's modifications to route during Whale season) are any more dangerous than the myriad of other vessels plying these waters.

In the early days of Chapter 343, HRS, I was the Chairman of the State's new Environmental Quality Commission, the body created to prepare proper regulations for the conduct of environmental assessments and impact statements. The regulations in force today are essentially the same as the original ones created by the Commission in 1980. During the preparation of the regulations, the Commission constantly was impressed by what a well-thought out, and expressed law, the legislature had provided. It was a tribute to the conscientiousness and acumen of legislators. It was well-balanced, it was purposeful, it had very reasonable deadlines and it did not contain any project vetopower, for its purpose was only advance "disclosure" of impacts – a very reasonable and objective undertaking in public affairs.

Because of this, I urge you not to re-write this law or to damage it with amendments designed only to excuse the flawed process applied to the Superferry. It wasn't the law that failed here. It was because someone - someone in the state government – failed to follow it. There aren't many who transgress laws and are afforded a grant of legislated immunity after the fact.

I would like to put in a few words for the superferry.

I believe the anti ferry sentiment is driven by industries that stand to lose revenue if it allowed to bring service to the islands. These are: 1 the airlines that are already under attack from Mesa Air Group. 2. Young Brothers and the stevedores who hold a monopoly on inter-island transport of vehicles. 3. Car rental business who would see revenues fall because they won't be renting to Kamaainas when visiting friends and family. Re-renting to tourists who visit multiple islands during their visits ,IE new contracts each time they change island.

The environmental issue is being floated by these industries through channels as the excuse.

1. The airlines stand to lose a lot of local revenue as they are the only way to get to a neighbor island. This is an ongoing monopoly that only recently has had outside competition from Mesa. Before Mesa we had to go with either Aloha or Hawaiian and their prices made going to Las Vegas a cheaper venue than going to Mołokai for the weekend!

2.Young Brothers and the stevedores do not wash the vehicles it transports and never has. It ships heavy equipment, bulldozers, backhoes and trenching equipment, that was previously used in the brush and would be most likely to bring invasive species for years. This damage, if it is to be believed, has already occurred for YEARS!

3. The car rental agencies are the only way a local family can get around if they travel to a neighbor island. They stand to lose much of their business to the local contingent if the ferry gets approved.

While on a recent fishing trip on the North side of Molokai I saw the ferry go by on it's way to Maui and back. It traveled in water between 500 and 1000 FATHOMS, which is roughly a half of a mile to a mile deep! My 30 years of experience on the water has shown that whales prefer water in the 25 to 40 fathom range, 150 to 250 feet, occasionally going deeper when going from island to island.

If the ferry operated I would not be making an impact on the rush hour traffic on any island as I would be on vacation. I get enough of that all year going to work! I would choose to drive during off peak hours just to avoid it.

In conclusion I would ask the government to look into where the environmentalist lawyers money comes from. I always want to see that. Lawyers aren't cheap and don't usually work pro bono. Money talks and if I were the gambling type I would lay odds on money coming through channels to these attorneys. Money talks just ask the guys fighting the Turtle Bay expansion.
