We have 100+ tenants, many of them large national companies. The comments I have gotten from their mainland reps with whom I work, chiding Hawaii's third world attitude about business are downright painful. A major national investment stopped by a handful of surfers; then hearings showing protestors totally stifling debate made a very negative impression and bode very badly for future investment.

I would suggest someone determine that Matson and Young Brothers update their EIS' (arcasm intended) for the dozens of barges traveling between the Islands daily. Let the shippers add the cost of the studies as a pass-through to product prices and see how concerned the people of Kauai and Maui would be to ensure evasive species aren't attached to the vessels.

I moved here from Bremerton Naval Hospital, (Seattle Washington Area), in 1968, after being medically discharged from the Marine Corps.. I couldn't believe that there was no Ferry between islands. In Seattle, Vancouver, and most of the rest of the World, ferries exist, to economically move folks and their cars from one place in an island/state/island nation to another.

I quickly discovered that the Molokai Channel was a very difficult passage for a traditional Ferry, and that a specialized vessel was required. I was sooooo pleased to hear that the Hawaii Superferry had

I was on Kauai when the protesters illegally blocked the Superferry from landing at the Nawiliwili Harbor. The following day the Superferry canceled its landing and the protesters held a party celebrating their "victory". I found this victory celebration very disturbing.

Although my personal opinion is that the Superferry, as well as many other large developments that impact out lifestyle, should perform an EA prior to making a significant investment commitment, I believe that the rule of law should prevail in situations such as this and that the law was broken by the protesters, in spirit as well as in fact, by obstructing access to the harbor.

In your deliberations regarding the Superferry, I ask that you keep in mind the possibility that the type of illegal protest exhibited by the Kauai group of protesters may become the method of choice to stop any development to which a minority may object. My name is Kauila Clark and I serve as a Native Hawaiian Cultural Practitioner at the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center certified by a Kupuna Council of Master healers as created by law and sanctioned by Papa Ola Lokahi. My practice has taken me all over the US and the world. In my experience the Hawaii Superferry has gone beyond in its' commitment to Native Hawaiian values and process. They have been very cooperative and respectful in being pono in their process to build a business in Hawaii to benefit the families and businesses in Hawaii. The Hawaii Superferry will make it affordable to bring our families together.

Pilahi Paki, a noted Kupuna, gave us the Acronym of ALOHA that the Hawaii State Legislature passed into law. She also said before she died that if we do not accept and practice ALOHA by the year 2000 that we would end up being like anywhere else because the Aumakua would leave these Islands and we would become HA OLE (without spirit). The behaviors in protest against the Hawaii Superferry did not exhibit the behaviors Aunty Pilahi gave us. She did not express tolerance but an acceptance of oneself and others through honor respect through lokahi. The acronym reads A-Akahi meaning kindness as expressed through tenderness (non judgment), L-Lokahi meaning unity as expressed through harmony (conflict with honor and respect), Olu Olu agreeable as expressed through pleasantness (being a teacher and student at the same rime, to listen, share and learn from each other), H-Haa Haa humility as expressed in modesty (remembering all the support and encouragement you received from others as you journey through life) A-Ahonui meaning Patience as expressed in perseverance (Holding personal priorities over the situation at hand)

These are the values that have perpetuated the culture for thousands of years and we need to utilize them in these trying times. Let us resolve this as we have for thousands of years in solving problems. May we be pono for all especially for the families of Hawaii. May we be pono in our discussions and resolve. I think a task force to oversee the process while they operate is fair.

Aloha Chairs Souki and Oshiro!

My name is Henry Curtis and I am the Executive Director and the Vice President for Consumer Affairs at Life of the Land, Hawai'i's own environmental and community action group advocating for the people and the `aina since 1970. Our mission is to preserve and protect the life of the land through sustainable land use and energy policies and to promote open government through research, education, advocacy, and litigation.

Environmental Impact Statements were adopted by a Governor's Executive Order in 1973 and codified as HRS Chapter 343 in 1974. Following the ConCon of 1978, the Legislature wrote a "Findings and purpose," codified as Chapter 343-1 "The legislature finds that the quality of humanity's environment is critical to humanity's well being ... The legislature further finds that the process of reviewing environmental effects is desirable ... and public participation during the review process benefits all parties involved and society as a whole. It is the purpose of this chapter to establish a system of environmental review which will ensure that environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making along with economic and technical considerations."

The Hawai'i Supreme Court ruled in Molokai Homesteaders Coop. Ass'n v. Cobb 63 H. 453, 629 P.2d 1134 (1981) that the EIS law "contemplates consideration of secondary and nonphysical aspects of proposal, including socio-economic consequences."

On April 3, 2003 the Senate proposed strengthening the EIS law to catch large projects which had evaded environmental review: "the legislature finds that proposals for privately financed wastewater facilities, waste-to-energy facilities, landfills, oil refineries, or power-generating facilities on private lands fail to trigger an environmental review under current law. Thus, this Act specifically includes these types of proposed actions within the scope of chapter 343."

Fifty-four weeks later, on April 19, 2004, the bill passed final reading in both houses without any opposition: 42-0 (House) 24-0 (Senate). During the final days of the 2004 Legislative session, on May 5, Governor Lingle signed HB1294 SD1 CD1 into law as Act 55.

In the summer of 2003 Life of the Land attended a 2 hour meeting with John Garibaldi et al. LOL Assistant Executive Director Kat Brady specifically discussed invasive species, and what is done by the military to prevent their movement between islands. It was clear to us then that Mr. Garibaldi intended to grease his way through the process rather than follow state law.

The compromise being suggested by proponents is that

* the ends justify the means (Superferry so critical how we get it is unimportant);

* laws are for most people but not for those who are politically connected;

* politics can and should override good science;

* hastily arrived at political decision should override careful judicial analysis;

* because some ocean carriers existed prior to Chapter 343 being enacted, some ocean going ships are small, and others have evaded writing an EIS, ergo, therefore the Superferry should also be able to violate these laws.

Like we could tell a cop who stopped us for speeding and drunk driving, its really okay because for years it was allowed, or the enforcement was spotty, or whatever.

If the state wants a Superferry it should put out a Request For Proposals with the requirements that Applicants (1) want to protect environmental law; and (2) obey the law.

Whatever mistakes have been made on either side, the bigger issue is that this is a service that is decades overdue for our state. My first eye opening was on a trip to New England 10 years ago. We used ferries to travel between the mainland and Nantucket Island, and saw similar service to Martha's Vineyard. A few years later on a trip to Vancouver, Canada, we saw an even better example of how such an operation serves the populations of the many offshore islands of Western Canada. At the time we wondered why our state did not have such a service.

I am not unsympathetic to the fears expressed by some of the dissenters. There is a provincial attitude that the Superferry will mean undesirable impact not already happening from air and barge service. Frankly, I feel that "train has left the station." Over population, too many cars, the over use of resources is happening with or without a ferry service, and it will take other measures to stop the progression of these problems. Meanwhile, the so-called environmentalists have many more immediate challenges, including land fills, recycling, mass transit, reduction in one-person-one car habits, etc., that would have far greater impact on our island communities. Why this ferry service has been targeted, I do not know. The cynical part of me suspects there are personal motives fueling the fires of these groups, and that it has nothing to do with the environment, rather the desire to limit competition.

It is obvious pro ferry people cannot have a fair turn to testify at the community meetings.
