My name is Marc W. Nuzzo. My wife Seiko and I are homeowners in the Hawaii Kai neighborhood of Oahu. I am an attorney who has moved to Hawaii to set up a family here with his wife and to share in the great culture and diversity Hawaii has to offer. We both VERY STRONGLY SUPPORT the Hawaii Superferry and the interisland link that the Superferry provides. It is a symbol of progress. Moreover, the Superferry is significantly more environmentally friendly (no discharge, special bottom paint, whale avoidance routes) than any of the numerous cruise liners and day charters that operate in between virtually every harbor in the Hawaiian Islands on a daily basis, with no similar regulations. I find it ironic that locals in some islands do not pick up a similar argument against the tour boats and cruise liners, but we all recognize the tourist dollars these operations provide. The only real difference between the cruise liners/tour boats and the Superferry appears to be that actual Hawaii resident ISLANDERS will primarily use the Superferry. I am Kimo Loo and I am a Hawaii citizen that votes. I support the Hawaii Superferry mainly because it allows for an alternative means of transportation that allows one to bring more items in a motor vehicle on Hawaii Superferry than on a plane.

It was widely known that an "exception" was made for Hawaii Superferry due to the way their loan was written and agreed upon. Didn't the court say it was okay and just recently "overturned" its decision? It has been said that if Hawaii Superferry and the Hawaii Government played by the rules and did the EIS, we would not be in this situation. I say, "If the court had ruled "no go" years back, we would also not be in this dilemma." How best can we rectify the quandary and possibly quagmire that we are in?

Do not impose such harsh restrictions on Hawaii Superferry in regards to invasive species. If you're going to do that, you should have all the people and cargo checked before landing on Hawaii soil. That means you're going to have the ships from foreign countries checked, no more snakes and little critters and pets coming in. How are tiny eggs from invasive species (including cockroaches, ants, lizards, and such) that haven't hatched going to be disposed?

Dear Henorable Members of the Legislature,

I am writing in support of the Hawaii Superferry for what I consider, based on personal experience, to be the most important reason <u>public health and safety</u>. Hawaii is unique in that all our islands are isolated by the ocean. It is not like the mainland where, in times of disaster, you can just drive, use a train, or fly to another airport to cross a state line. Because of this uniqueness, our decision making approach must also compensate.

On August 1992, I was employed by the Hawaii Army National Guard as their Environmental Engineer upon retiring from Pearl Harbor Shipyard with a nuclear engineering career. I had first hand experience of the devastation of the direct hit from Hurricane Iniki and the months of effort exerted by the National Guard, FEMA and the community in order to sustain the people with just bare necessities to survive. Many of the objectors seem to have forgotten this tragedy or just were not there. As I assisted with the FEMA effort, I thanked God frequently that no one was killed or seriously injured from the tragedy. It took several days just to get the airport functioning and several weeks to clear the roads for access. My father-in-law who suffered a stroke before the tragedy had to be transferred to Honolulu by Medevac.

Now, tune in to Hurricane Katrina and the many people that died or were injured. Picture the hospitals being overloaded with patients, understaffed, and overworked. Then, apply this scenario to Kauai with another hurricane, which is long overdue (about every 12 years), with hundred of injured people.

With the alternative of the Superferry, several hundred of the elderly, young children and people in poorly built homes could be evacuated before the hurricane arrives. On the aftermath, it would be quicker to clear a harbor than an airport for logistical support. Hence, the Superferry could be used to transport National Guard personnel, food, water, and medical supplies, and medical personnel as necessary. Also, if the capacity of Wilcox Hospital has been reached, many of the injured could be transported to Honolulu for emergent care compared to just a few at a time with Medevac or local airlines. My guess is that one trip with the Superferry is probably equivalent to 50 or more trips with aircraft, providing landing fields and control towers are operable.

As a former environmental engineer, I understand the concerns for protection of marine life and transport of alien species. However, in my opinion, we already have in operation huge cruise liners, barges, naval ships, and other commercial vessels. So any adverse effect (or no impact) on the environment has already been demonstrated.

I also understand the concerns of the objectors that compliance with the law should be mandatory. However, life is not all black and white and there are many times when gray areas must be clarified and common sense must prevail. That is why we have elected officials who can help make decisions on the gray areas and do what is best overall for the State, especially when it comes to public health and safety.

Our 3rd child is severely mentally and physically handicapped and is wheelchair bound. He cannot sit unassisted in a regular airplane chair, his muscles don't allow him to sit up. He needs his wheelchair. A trip to the mainland or anywhere else is out of the question for our son and therefore, we have not gone anywhere from the time he outgrew his car seat 3 years ago.

When I heard that the Superferry was coming to town, I was literally elated as I knew <u>not only could my</u> son travel by means of his very own wheelchair, but we could also take our wheelchair access van with <u>us</u>. I do not know of any wheel chair accessed van that we can rent on any of the outer islands. I simply want my family to enjoy a family trip just like any other family and for us and other families like us, the Superferry is the ONLY answer for us and it allows us the freedom to travel. I do not want to continue to deny my children the chance to explore outside of Oahu and with Superferry, we can take them somewhere else to experience.

With all the various types of boats and ships that come into our harbors on a daily basis makes me wonder why Superferry is being singled out like this. Yes while it is true that an EIS could have been done long ago if it was 100% required of Superferry, a lot of these naysayers could have spoken up long ago as well and voice their concerns and demanded an EIS long ago. We all saw when the ferry was being built, we saw it nearly done, we saw it when it was leaving Alabama, we saw it as it passed through the Panama Canal and as it sailed through the Pacific Ocean. All the while I did not hear of one single protester calling out for an EIS.

I love these islands just as much as the naysayers. I was born and raised here and have lived here all my 41 years. If I thought something was not good for this state and the land and the ocean, I would be hesitant. I lived at Honolulu Tower for 5 years and looked out at the Honolulu Harbor every day. It saddens me that there are people who feel compelled to stop the Hawaii Superferry from serving the islands of Kaua'i and Maui.

When I was 7 years old, growing up on Lana'i, my dad used to take me fishing with him all the time. Missing my older sisters, who had left home to attend college on Oahu or on the mainland, I remember telling him one night while fishing, "I wish there was a bridge that connected the islands so that we could go visit them every time". My dad's response to me was, and I recall as though he was here speaking to me now, "You just wait, because some day, there will be a bridge...or a way for you to go to any island and visit anytime you want...you no have to fly..."

When I first learned of the Hawaii Superferry, about nearly 3 years ago, in my heart I knew it was right. I knew this is what my dad referred to years ago and this was right for me and for others who were also feeling the "nearness" of being closer with other relatives by being given the choice to travel by ship, rather than fly. My passion stems from the emotional pangs I experienced as a child. My passion stems from words of my father nearly 50 years ago. My passion stems from wise decisions as a mother and as an adult.

The only evident environmental impact I see, is the possible few more cars being added to Kaua'i island's already very poor infrastructure...the traffic that is being spoken of, was already there and not addressed by their County years ago as more and more people moved into the area. Why wasn't impact assessments completed when more mainlanders (including celebrities) purchased hundreds of parcels of land on Kaua'i, making housing costs so unaffordable for the local Kaua'ians? Why wasn't it ever a necessity that roads were improved and widened? Why wasn't an environmental assessment done when Bette Midler cut down 200 plus trees on her property there?

The environmental dissidents seem not to have even done research on how the Superferry was built, and the immense amount of time and research that was afforded in its inception, including the special paint used on the outside that prohibits diseases, barnacles, invasive species from clinging to the ship. Something that neither NCL, Matson or Young Brothers ever uses. And did you know that the interior of the vehicle deck was also painted with a special paint that "disinfects" vehicle tires that naturally rids them of any invasive species from being transported between islands? And this is a fact that neither NCL, Matson or Young Brothers uses that type of extensive care and concern on any of their ships either! And why is HSF being singled out as being "bad" for Kaua'i? During the Dry Runs and the first sailing into Nawiliwili, there were only LOCAL people on the ship. Not thousands of tourists as the NCL ship brings there daily. So what is the difference if we flew over and rented cars anyway? It

would not make a difference.

The Superferry is being labeled as a "threat" to bring "irreparable harm" to "their" island's environment. Yet, these are simply idle threats and with no substantiation and no proof that the Superferry WILL do these bad things. How can one make these allegations when other companies using the same ports need not operate under the same rules and guidelines?

I truly believe in my heart that the Superferry is good for the State's economy. We live in the 21st Century.....not back 50 years ago. THIS change is good for the State....as ferries are used and a profitable and viable business that enhances the economy in other states and countries throughout the world. We need to now embrace this change.

The Superferry will *help* the entire state and serve the local people of Hawai'i.

The Superferry will be **THE** *help* during times of natural disasters and will be able to assist quickly.

The Superferry will continue to be good for my grandchildren and my great-grandchildren when I am long gone. Do not rob them of this progress.

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

I know that my off-island friends would be more likely to vacation here if they new that the Hawaii Superferry was available for inter-island travel; and I am sure that tourists from all over the world would too.

Today, if the Hawaii Superferry were available, I would choose to vacation on other islands instead of taking my money off-island for vacations. With the Superferry's convenience, we would be able to regularly take weekend trips as well. Obviously this means spending additional moneys on the Superferry, restaurants, hotels, etc.; all of which would help improve Hawaii's Tourism industry, and the economy of the State of Hawaii. I believe the Hawaii Superferry will provide an unprecedented economic benefit to Hawaii Tourism.

Why would anyone want to stop the Hawaii Superferry? It is extremely unfortunate that the Superferry didn't proceed with an EIS on a more timely fashion, however steps need to be taken to make sure that the business isn't forced out of the state. Living on the Big Island and being able to take a car to Oahu to purchase new or second hand goods would create more local buying rather than having special items shipped.

If barges and cruise ships operate in these waters, the Superferry should be allowed the same privileges. As a compromise, it is possible to keep the Ferry at a slower speed during the calving season. As another compromise, cars may need to show a recent car wash receipt, or other measures to keep the invasive insects and biologicals to a safe, yet reasonable level. If barges get to unload household furniture from mainland without the kind of inspection that they expect from the Superferry, then something is wrong with this picture.

Other concerns raised have been Oahu fishermen coming in a cleaning out local stocks. This also needs to be regulated with fishing zones, with particular watch for vanloads of scuba equipment since each island has its own scuba diving business. Something needs to be in place to protect fishing areas the locals depend on for subsistence.

TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL RELATING TO HAWAII SUPERFERRY (HSF)

I am strongly opposed to this bill, but since it appears that the Legislature is intent on passing it regardless, I would like to suggest some amendments to it, which would allay some of my concerns:

Conditions of Operation

- The conditions and protocols to mitigate any significant environmental effects of the ferry operation should be imposed by the Legislature rather than the Governor, given her track record on environmental protection regarding this issue. The Legislature should also be the body to require DOA inspectors and DOCARE enforcement personnel on each inter-island voyage. You could always allow the Governor to impose conditions and protocols she deems necessary, in addition to those imposed by the Legislature, by executive order.
- The conditions I would like to see are the same as those offered by Maui Tomorrow Inc. on October 18 and rejected by the Legislature in their entirety. I believe the least contentious conditions are #3, 4, 12, 13, 16, 18 & 20, and should be given your full consideration. The next least contentious conditions are be #5-10, and should also be considered.
- 3. Condition #3 should be amended to include turtles.
- 4. Condition #4 should be amended to include turtles and any other species listed as endangered or threatened in Hawaii or Federal statutes.
- A condition should be added that there shall be two qualified DOCARE inspectors present and participating in natural resource inspections at all times of embarkation and disembarkation at each port. The DOCARE inspectors shall supervise all HSF screeners.
- 6. A condition should be added that the DOT, in conjunction with the Governor, the Legislature, and the DLNR shall forthwith allocate positions and funds for the additional DOCARE positions necessary to staff the inspection personnel set forth in the above paragraph.
- 7. A condition should be added that no ferry operations take place after sunset.
- 8. A condition should be added to mitigate the traffic impacts caused by the ferry, similar to what the other judge (not Cardoza) required on Maui.

Temporary Hawaii Inter-Island Ferry Oversight Task Force

1. The Task Force should not include the following members:

- a. The Director of Transportation I don't think it appropriate to include the individual whose actions are being studied.
- b. The Director of Business, Economic Development & Tourism I don't understand the logic in including this individual.
- c. The Attorney General - I don't understand the logic in including this individual. Furthermore, he is too closely associated with defending the DOT in exempting the ferry from the environmental review process.
- d. The president of the ferry company –I don't think it appropriate to include the individual whose company's operations are being examined.
- 2. The Task Force members to be appointed by the Speaker of the House should be appointed by someone else, possibly the Vice-Speaker, given the Speaker's conflict of interest caused by his son's employment by HSF.
- 3. The monthly reports should include any adverse environmental impacts possibly caused by the operation of the ferry and any mitigation measures proposed to deter or minimize such impacts.

To close, I would like to quote from an editorial in last Monday's <u>Honolulu Advertiser</u> by Larry Lee, since he seems to express my thoughts in this area better than myself:

If each time the majority feels justified to change the law to suit its purposes and wishes, we are reduced to a nation of men, not of law. The law then ceases to protect the minority. (I believe this is called 'tyranny of the majority.")

The environmental laws, locally and nationally, were not enacted to merely be an inconvenience. They are intended to address very important needs and to cure serious problems that will affect us, in the long run, much more than the success or failure of the Superferry.

Holding a special session now to change the law to accommodate the Superferry would be potentially more harmful than beneficial. Once a precedent of changing the law on the spur of the moment merely to accommodate a popular cause or business has begun, it becomes easier to do each subsequent time.

We often complain that our system is too slow to get anything done. Yet the framers of our government deliberately fashioned a system of checks and balances with the executive, legislative and judicial branches. Even the Legislature, with is bicameral system, is designed to promote slow and deliberate decisions. Wisdom should control, not emotions and transitory feelings of urgency. Each branch of government should respect the other and not try to blatantly circumvent each other.

If the Superferry can work things out and operate profitably within the requirements of our environmental law, then we all benefit. If it can't, someday there will be a ferry or other mode of transportation that can.

In January of this year, my wife and I treated ourselves to a first ever cruise and we decided to go to Tahiti. We flew in on Hawaiian airlines and the first part of our vacation was a three night stay on the island of Moorea. Our travel agent had booked us on the local interisland ferry called Aremiti and when we got to the dock, we were directed to the Aremiti 5. There were several of these ferries and these were very similar to the Hawaii Superferry in that it had a catamaran design and also carried vehicles. The sail was about forty minutes to Moorea and the ride was very scenic and comfortable. Arriving in Moorea from the water was a truly awesome sight and it seemed a very natural way to travel. As we were crossing the channel, we saw another Aremiti and the competitor company Moorea Express. This company also had several vessels to its fleet and it seemed to me like the people here use the ferries like how we use the Bus. There was a mix of tourists and the everyday local people. Some of the locals I talked to live on Moorea, but work on Tahiti. There are also humpback whales here. And invasive species like Miconia(I saw some of the largest on Moorea and Bora Bora). Somehow, everyone here seemed to work out these issues and the ferries had become an integral part of their lives.

Last month, my wife and I visited relatives in Seattle and sidetracked a part of our trip to visit Victoria. We jumped on the Victoria Clipper(a ferry) and although a longer and bumpier ride than the Aremiti 5 in Tahiti, we still thought it was a pleasant and scenic way to view the coastline. Arriving in Victoria on the water was absolutely stunning. Here also, were several other competing ferries, and even seaplanes. The waters here are home to Orcas and somehow, the ship sailed its route as efficiently as it could and we arrived when we were scheduled to arrive. We even saw large zodiacs conducting Orca tours daily. I must say that here also, this seemed a very natural way to travel.

I know that all around the world, ferries are used as a means of transportation and especially here in Hawaii. where we have a group of islands surrounded by a vast Pacific Ocean, it seems only natural to travel to and from other islands by boat or ferry. Tahiti has quite a large ferry system to several of the islands(Moorea, Raietea, Huahine, Bora Bora) and it has become a daily fact of life for many of its people to use this mode of transportation. Thank you for allowing me to testify in support of bills to allow the HSF to serve the people of Hawaii while an environmental impact statement is prepared.

The HSF will be a real plus to the state. It will benefit our small farmers, and increase our ability to feed ourselves.

Those opposing it cite environmental concerns, but when they speak, most of their concerns are about development, and not the environment.

Some of their concerns have validity. Traffic is bad on Kauai and Maui. Not enough attention has been paid to expanding highways.

I do not believe the HSF will increase visitors between islands, but will simply give us choices in how to go.

I do believe the HSF will have less impact on the environment than airplanes.

Estimates I've seen put a boat's impact at 1/4th or less that of airplanes. This is a facet of the story I have not seen discussed.

Getting a plane up over 15,000 feet uses a tremendous amount of fuel.

If I can point out the ferries in use in the Pacific Northwest as a comparable situation, it is interesting to note that that there has never been much concern for their environmental impact.

There are over two dozen ferries in the Pacific Northwest and the area teems with marine wildlife. These ferries have run for decades and I've never heard an environmental peep from activists.

Another place with ferries is the English Channel. Six different companies provide ferry service from several cities every half hour. The considered opinion is that their environmental impact is negligible.

I believe much of the opposition to the HSF has been rude and inconsistent with Hawaii's Aloha Spirit.

I am appalled at the harassment of those aboard the first voyages and those testifying in favor of the HSF.

The activists opposing the HSF have not respected other's viewpoints. They are undemocratic in wanting to foist their views on majority. They are dishonest, in that they hide behind concerns for the

environment, when in reality, they oppose the HSF on other grounds.

I urge the legislators to pass legislation that allows the HSF to serve the people of Hawaii while an EIS is studied.

I support the bill that will permit interisland ferry service in Hawai'i while an environmental impact statement is being conducted. Aside from the recreational benefit to be had from being able to travel by sea between islands, I firmly believe that ferry service would be a tremendous benefit for all those in the islands who work or conduct business on more than one island.

My husband and I came to Oahu 23 years ago, bought a home, had 2 daughters and each started our own business. Mine is a sole proprietorship, which I began in 1994, doing child development training for agencies in the State of Hawaii's Healthy Start Program on Oahu, Maui, Molokai and the Big Island. I made a career change several years later and now do graphic design and illustration.

The Hawaii SuperFerry would have been an ideal way for me to travel to the outer islands with my training materials. I was unable to bring heavy or bulky items such as flip charts, overhead projectors, VCR's and items for display due to size and weight limits of air travel. I want to emphasize that many outer island agencies did not have the equipment I needed, or it was not working when I showed up to train their staff. This made conducting a professional training more of an adventure than I would have liked. Furthermore, the Healthy Start program, like others that struggle to operate with funding that changes from year to year, was unable to pay for rental cars for their trainers, so each agency had to transport me to and from the airport. Bringing my own equipment and materials in my own car would have made my job so much easier.

As for the environmental impact of the SuperFerry, I am reminded of a similar situation where I grew up on the mainland on the Rogue River in Southern Oregon. The pristine Rogue River is one of the original eight rivers in the United States designated by Congress as Wild and Scenic, and there was a similar outcry from a minority of residents who believed the new commercial jetboat tours from Grants Pass to the Oregon Coast would harm wildlife due to their speed, and create too much noise for those living along the river. Eventually, the jetboats were allowed to operate, and they do respect the requests of residents along the river who request that the boats slow their speed in front of their properties. There are no whales in the Rogue River, but plenty of salmon, ducks and other wildlife, which have not been harmed by the specially designed jetboats (no propellors), which skim the water and are able to operate in just a few inches of water.

I believe it is important to stop assigning blame to any particular group for the current predicament of the SuperFerry and to focus on working out a win-win situation for all involved. As with most relationships, each side has contributed something to the problem, and one would hope that the two sides can compromise so that the peoples of these islands do not lose this opportunity. I, for one, would be willing to ride the SuperFerry without my vehicle until the environmental impact statement is finalized. I support alternate routes and slower speeds during whale season to ease the fears of those who believe sea creatures would be harmed. I also support inspections of vehicles and their contents to prevent transfer of unwanted critters and things from island to island. If the State can control brown tree snakes and contraband from entering Hawaii on airplanes, they surely can advise the SuperFerry folks on how to implement a monitoring program.

I could not find a bill number or name for it, so I'll just call it the Supervector Smokescreen Bill.

Why bother to require any washing or inspections of vehicles and cargo? We know that such inspections are not effective, otherwise Hawaii would not have this everincreasing pool of introduced species evading inspections and impacting Hawaii. It is not what is interdicted that counts, it is what gets past inspections and quarantines that are problematic. Washings need to be lengthy and thorough to be effective. These pest species include many that are adverse to native ecosystems, agriculture and our lifestyle. The few pests that are subject to control efforts cost taxpayers and businesses enormous amounts of money and lost opportunities. The adverse economic impacts and costs to attempt control of any one or a few of these pest species will exceed the cost to construct the harbor improvements required by the Supervector. It is very poor economy to risk spreading pest species to islands which still lack them. Eradications of pests are very rarely achieved, and control efforts are nearly always long-term and costly. Imagine the impact of spreading the varroa mite to the Big Island, where its multi-million dollar queen bee export industry would be compromised or eliminated. Even worse, the island's existing and future agriculture potential would be curtailed by reduced or lost pollination services. The fact that not all pests are not on all islands reflects the difficulties many pests face travelling interisland on barges, airlines and cruise ships. A roll-on roll-off vessel like the Supervector is the great equalizer, however. Pests on or in vehicles and cargo will converge from all over one island, speed onto the loading ramp, travel to the next island, and then be off into many places of the next island in a matter of HOURS, not days, and thereby they avoid long storage on hot asphalt and other hazards. Noisy coqui frogs, mite-afflicted bees, damaging fountain arass seeds and many other pests travel regularly on vehicles, and cannot be effectively screened or cleaned. Either can drugs or stolen goods.

The only effective way to prevent or markedly reduce the risk of pest transfer among the islands is for the Supervector NOT TO CARRY VEHICLES on board. If during the EIS process an effective way to sanitize vehicles is proven—and I doubt that this can be done—then the decision might be revisited. Speaking of the EIS law, why require the Supervector to do the EIS at all if the bill is to make any negative findings inapplicable to the Supervector? Also, is all this Ch. 343 text in the bill just to allow further dismantling of our EIS law, and to make mockery of the public's challenge rights under Ch.91?

The Supervector is not cheap to ride. The Supervector is not safe for our economy or environment. It may cause the demise of one of our older inter-island air carriers. The Supervector tries to operate outside the law, as confirmed by our courts, and it wants

you to make it a special exception to the law in its sole behalf. The Supervector has also expressed an abundance of arrogance and absence of Aloha.

So why are we here at this expensive special session? Is it from public pressure generated from misinformation and a desperate desire to turn back the clock to cheap inter-island travel? I miss those days too, but they're gone, just like the fish on O'ahu reefs that I use to catch as a kid. Please get real and DON'T let them carry vehicles on the Supervector. If they cannot make it or hack it, then tough stuff. They have pointed out their other options, so let them choose without special dispensation from you. Use your time instead to launch a study of what Hawaii really needs in ideal surface transportation.

I consider myself an environmentalist and thus am concerned about the impact of the Superferry on whales, reefs and other species unique to Hawaii. I feel as though the State of Hawaii should have required an EIS for this project during its development.

However, I feel that some of the issues that will be addressed in an EIS have already been at least partially addressed according to newspaper accounts. Thus, I in favor of allowing the Superferry to operate with appropriate safeguards while an EIS is being completed. Similar ferry systems already operate in various locations around the world in a successful and responsible manner.

I've read that there are concerns about additional cars coming via the Superferry and using our inadequate road system. The roads near Kawaihae harbor and particularly near the intersection of Highway 19 and the Kawaihae Road do need to be upgraded to handle the increased traffic. Dear Honorable Legislators:

I urge you to vote against the proposed "Superferry Bill" for the following reasons:

1. It makes a mockery of our Environmental Review Process, Chapter 343, by providing an exception for any business that can claim to be "unique" and "critically important" to the people of this state.

I fail to see how "critically important" this Superferry is, that it cannot wait for its secondary impacts to be properly evaluated and mitigated in the interests of protecting Hawaii's <u>critically important</u> environment. The health of our state's economy largely depends on how well we protect our very special environment. The bill would have the effect of relaxing our environmental standards for the benefit of one particular company and open a loophole and precedent for other businesses to use. Are you confident that this bill will not have this effect?!

2. The Superferry's benefits to the agricultural industry are not well-established and shouldn't be used to justify circumventing established environmental protection law.

Is there solid data showing that transportation costs using the Superferry will be costeffective for farmers? The bill portrays the Superferry as "critically important" to the agricultural industry. What about the potential threats to agricultural business posed by this unique interisland ferry service? For example, the island of Hawai'i has enjoyed the advantage of not having the varroa mite which is a terrible threat to our successful queen bee and honey industry. Our bee industry is fragile and bracing itself for the arrival of the varroa mite from O'ahu where it has recently been discovered. Interisland transportation of harmful pests is already a well-known problem and adding yet another poorly controlled and inadequately inspected interisland service will just compound the arrival of agriculturally damaging pests. President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau and owner of Nalo Farms, Dean Okimoto, has gone on record as supporting the Superferry as a boon to agriculture, but in an article in "Big Island Business2Business Magazine" he talks about the importance of stopping invasive pests by checking products with the same rigor as his products are subjected to when shipped to California. He is quoted, "I think that it's critical for the future of our agriculture, and I think it costs less to do that than to try to control a pest after it's here." Amen. Will the State legislature provide the Department of Agriculture with the resources it needs to fortify its inspection program for all interisland vessels, including those currently operating? Plant nursery products

shipped between the islands on long-established carriers are the likely culprits in the spread of devastating pests like the stinging nettle caterpillar and coqui frog.

3. It is inappropriate to pass a law to accommodate one particular business, an unproven one at that!

Is this a viable business that will be able to survive over time? Why are we willing to spend \$40 million on harbor improvements and pay for a special legislative session to accommodate a business that has already said they can take their business elsewhere? Once the novelty of the Superferry wears off and people see the true costs of regular fares and vehicle charges, will Hawai'i's residents and visitors use it enough to keep it profitable? People are concerned about the unfriendly message this controversy is sending to businesses that may be discouraged from coming to Hawai'i as a result. We would do better to hold businesses accountable to high standards and send a clear message that we are resolved to protect our high quality of life. Sometimes we have to make unpopular decisions if we want to continue to say, "Lucky we live in Hawai'i!"

The only part of the Superferry Bill that makes sense is the audit of the original decision to exempt the Superferry from a detailed Environmental Impact Statement. It seems obvious that "secondary impacts" can be expected once the vehicles and people leave the concrete piers and venture into neighbor island roads and natural areas. The Superferry's impacts will be primarily on the neighbor islands which is why you are hearing more opposition to this bill from the neighbor islands. Failure to consider the secondary impacts of the Superferry was an O'ahu-centric decision, and I hope those who were responsible for that decision will be held accountable.

Thank you for holding hearings on the neighbor islands prior to convening the special session to consider this misguided bill. Mahalo for taking the time to read my testimony.
