I think it was incredibly foolish for the Governor and staff to have waived (or otherwise decided it wasn't necessary) the EIR requirements for such a high-profile business as the Superferry. I suspect the cost of the EIR would have been a fraction of the cost of the consequences of not performing it. The Governor earned every bit of the political flack for that decision. If the Superferry owners thought they could obtain a rapid deployment without an EIR, shame on them. They should know better.

Nonetheless, I am in favor of the Superferry. Whether I drive my own car on the Ferry to visit the outer island or rent one after flying over there, the same number of visitor vehicles will be on the roads. Interisland commerce would be enhanced by the Superferry. Perhaps the competition on the outer islands from Oahu service providers is not welcome by outer island workers. My name is Tiffany Vara, and I reside in Honolulu. I am writing to urge that the Senate find a solution to allow the Hawaii Superferry to remain in operation. The youngest of my five children, 6-year-old Abigail Faith, is a near-drowning survivor. For the past three years she has used a wheelchair, received feedings via a G-tube, and sometimes requires supplementary oxygen. We were thrilled at the prospect of being able to travel to Maui and Kauai with our ramp van loaded with all of Abbie's equipment and supplies.

We have visited both Maui and Kauai since Abbie was injured, but it requires planning and coordination that rival a military troop movement. It is virtually impossible to rent ramp vans on the neighbor islands, so Abbie and I are relegated to a Handivan shuttle while the rest of our family takes a rental van to the hotel – twice as much traffic created and fuel consumed.

Getting Abbie and her equipment through airport security is difficult and exhausting, but obviously can be done. However, the oxygen is a whole different matter. We are unable to take her travel tank with us in the airport, so we have to hope she will be OK until we board the flight. The inflight oxygen requires us to pay a significant extra charge. When we land on the neighbor islands we are again without oxygen. This is a nerve-wracking experience, to say the least.

The Hawaii Superferry offers people with disabilities and their families the opportunity to travel more safely, conveniently, and more efficiently. I respect the views of neighbor island residents who want to protect their 'aina, but the truth is, we are already visiting – we are just creating more traffic and using more resources to do it.

My testimony follows:

The Superferry has invested millions of dollars to bring a new transportation alternative to Hawaii, they complied with every federal, state and local rule and regulation; they have worked with the Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council to develop a plan to avoid whales. They have a plan to avoid carrying invasive species. They should be allowed operate. Numerous polls show that a majority of our citizens want the service.

I work in an environment where people express their concerns to me every day. I have heard the people speak out and support this new and innovative inter island service. I interact with thousands of radio listeners in Hawaii every day and they want the Superferry. Only a few have ever spoken out against it on my show, and even then only to recite and repeat the same few objections that have gotten so much attention without even the foundation or backing to make those objections cause for concern.

The vocal minority does not represent the majority of people at large in Hawaii. But unfortunately the media covers these groups as though they represent a large majority.

The Superferry represents positive growth in Hawaii, not just economically but environmentally. So much so, that even if this initiative fails, we should adopt the Superferry's conservative methodology to protect the environment and apply it to Matson, Young Brothers and other inter island shippers. Take another look at what this new and innovative company stands to bring to Hawaii. They are updating our standards for quality and responsibility in inter island shipping with respect to the aina. And they did it before the media scrutiny and without legislation.

If the issue was really about avoiding whales then the objectors would be protesting all forms of water transport, including the large cruise ships that travel between the islands. If the issues really had anything to do with invasive species then the groups would target Young Brothers and Matson who both transport thousands of cars, trucks and construction equipment covered with dirt every year.

Those against the Superferry do not speak for a majority of Hawaii citizens.

Time is of the essence, Superferry is losing hundreds of thousands of dollars every week it sits idle. The Governor, the House and the Senate all need to put partisan politics aside and agree on language that gets the Superferry sailing, so we don't lose this valuable transportation alternative. Please amend the law and allow Superferry to begin service, without restriction.

# Subject: Opposing Special Session and Opposing un-numbered Draft House Bill relating to transportation (Superferry).

Dear Senators,

My name is Jeffrey Parker, owner and operator of Tropical Orchid Farm, Inc. I am a member of the Maui County Farm Bureau. I have lived on Maui for 37 years and I am celebrating the 30<sup>th</sup> successful year of my business.

I was present at the first public forum on Maui regarding the Superferry which was the PUC Hearing in November 2004. At that hearing 50 out of 51 testifiers begged the PUC to exercise their power to require an Environmental Assessment for the Superferry project. 3 years later, we now have a unanimous Supreme Court ruling and a Circuit Court ruling that the exemption from HEPA granted by the DOT was improper.

But now this disingenuous House Bill threatens to undo all the progress that has been made over the last 3 years. The bill is so full of misinformation and lies that its origin must be extremely suspicious to all of you. This Bill must be rejected by any of you who still have respect for our State's laws and for the well-being of the environment.

It is easy to understand some of what has been going on here: Surely all Legislators have been paying attention to the Bush Administration's assault on the nation's environmental laws – his administration has worked overtime to reverse or weaken many of those laws. Linda Lingle is a Bush ally – a crony of Bush. And the true owner of the Superferry, J.F. Lehman is a Bush Neo-con, a close ally of Bush representing the Military Industrial Complex - and an architect of the Iraq War. So, it all makes sense: a Republican governor decides to attack and weaken Hawaii Environmental

### Policy Act.

What I don't understand is why any Democrat would support weakening our law.

In the beginning of the Draft House Bill, references are made to the Superferry being such a great thing for farmers on the outer islands. I was shocked by the twisting of reality. How inserted this into the bill?

The only framer that the Superferry could get to come as their witness in the Circuit Court hearing admitted several things under cross-examination:

- 1. That there would be no impact to his farming operation if the ferry were not allowed to run during the EA preparation period.
- 2. That the scheduled arrival and departure times do not really work for Maui farmers: the ferry arrives too late on Oahu to make the morning vegetable markets and then the driver of the truck would have to spend the night on Oahu in order to return to Maui the next day.
- 3. That refrigerated shipping is available currently (without the Superferry).

On Page 3 of the Draft Bill is stated "Operations of a large capacity ferry vessel company would foster diversified agriculture, helping the State of Hawaii to meet one of its constitutional mandates." Where is the proof of this? Once again, who is the supposed expert on agriculture who inserted this into the Draft?

What would actually help protect and foster farming is to allow the EA/EIS process to be completed prior to the startup of the Superferry. So that the real threats to agriculture can be studied – for instance the threat of the Tiny Fire Ant – which is known to travel in automobiles – and which is already impacting agriculture on the Big Island (farm workers refuse to enter infested fields to harvest crops).

Regarding Section 13 of the Draft Bill (calling for an audit of the Lingle Administrations' actions in granting the exemption for the Superferry). I understand that the Governor wants this section taken out before she will call the Special Session. Don't you dare take that out! That is the only good part of this charade bill.

Much lip service has been paid to the idea that we have to get past the divisions in our community caused by the Superferry issue – the need to begin the healing process, etc.

If you gut our court decisions. If you ignore, in the words of Judge Cordoza "the likelihood of irreparable harm to our environment – the so-called healing process will NEVER begin.

The core of HRS Chapter 343 is injunctive relief. It simple is not possible to conduct a fair study of a project's impacts while a project goes forward. For example, how do you deal with study of the "No Action Alternative" if the action is already underway?

And finally I want to make sure that all of you saw Superferry Board member Tig Krekel's statement in the New York Times article – that the real plan is to have 5 vessels – with 4 voyages a day to each of the outer islands.

So, if you pass a special law for the Superferry – you really will be exempting up to 5 vessels..... with 5 times the impacts to the environment.

I am opposed to any new law to exempt a single startup up corporation from Hawaii's environmental law. At the very least any attempt to do this will be corrupt unless it contains the 29 conditions proposed by the Plaintiff groups.

The idea that the Legislature will act – and then leave it up to Lingle to put in the safeguards to protect the environment - is a complete travesty. Lingle cannot be trusted and will only look out for the interests of the Bush business allies.

I urge you to adjourn from any Special Session on this matter – and to soundly reject this absurd unnumbered House Bill.

## Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment. SAY IT AGAIN!! - The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. I am not able to attend the hearing, please accept my below testimony.

The super ferry is a much needed alternate means of transportation between the islands which should have never been subject to an environmental impact study in the first place. None of the other boats and ships that visit our port had to go through such a study, it's being misused to kill the super ferry by a very few, but vocal group and their attorney friend, who has signal handily done more harm to the people of Maui than any other person!

All of the potential impacts are already known and have been dealt with by the super ferry operators. They are inspecting the vehicles, they have re-striped the road for better ingress and egress, they have equipment and extra crew to watch for whales.

The speed is not an issue for a vessel that can stop and turn as well as the super ferry can, it's only going to be traveling slightly faster than most ships and slower than some. Modern container ships travel at up to 26 knots, navy ships travel at up to and in some cases exceeding 40 knots and the Pacific Whale foundations own high speed catamarans can travel at up to 47 knots, and they actually chase after the whales, the super ferry will be avoiding areas that whales are know to frequent!

The traffic is not going to be an issue either, about the same number of vehicles will be leaving maui as will be arriving and the major (for maui) roads in the area can easily handle the exiting vehicles.

§343-1 Findings and purpose. The legislature finds that the quality of humanity's environment is critical to humanity's well being, that humanity's activities have broad and profound effects upon the interrelations of all components of the environment, and that an environmental review process will integrate the review of environmental concerns with existing planning processes of the State and counties and alert decision makers to significant environmental effects which may result from the implementation of certain actions. The legislature further finds that the process of reviewing environmental effects is desirable because environmental consciousness is enhanced, cooperation and coordination are encouraged, and public participation during the review process benefits all parties involved and society as a whole.

It is the purpose of this chapter to establish a system of environmental review which will ensure that environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making along with economic and technical considerations. [L 1979]

#### Star-Bulletin/ SMS survey

Supposedly showed support for Superferry with no EA

But it had a large margin of error-- 8 percentage points for island-by-

island numbers.

Kaua'i and Maui, where Superferry plans to come first, seem the most concerned.

O'ahu, which stands to gain most and lose least, seems least concerned.

64% of people statewide said Superferry should run while the EA is done. But close to half the people on Maui and Kaua'i said no. About one-third said no on Hawai'i Island; about one-fifth on O'ahu.

Running into whales was considered a big or small problem by more than half of Kaua'i and Maui people. It was about half statewide, and on O'ahu and Hawai'i island.

Transport of non-native species was considered a big or small problem by about three-quarters of the people on Kaua'l and about 7 out of 10 on Maui. It was about half statewide, on Hawai'i island, and on O'ahu.

Traffic was considered a big or small problem by three-quarters of people on Maui, more than half on Kaua'i and Hawai'i Island, and less than half on O'ahu.

Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court. PEOPLE ON THE STREET ARE SAYINF "IF WE BROKE THE LAW, WE'D BE PROSECUTED AND PUT BEHIND BARS, WHY ARE THEY (YOU) LETTING THESE GUYS SLIDE?"

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment. SAY IT AGAIN!! ONE GROUP OR DOESN'T HAVE THE RIGHT TO IMPINGE ON ANOTHER GROUP'S RIGHTS. IT'S A 2-WAY STREET! WHO IS LISTENING TO THE PEOPLE OF KAUA?!? YOU ELECTED OFFICIALS MUST REPRESENT THEM TOO.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome. STOP THE RAILROAD! IF THE SUPPERFERRY IS SUCH A SWELL IDEA, WHY THE SUBTERFUGE ABOUT IT'S MULTI USES? WHY THE MEDIA BLITZ? WHY THE EFFORT TO DROWN THE VOICES OF THE PEOPLE MOST AFFECTED? WHY NOT FOLLOW THE LAW AND TAKE THE TIME TO ARRIVE AT A CORRECT DECISION THAT UPHOLDS THE INTENT OF THE LAW.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development

requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

### Honorable Senators:

My name is Gary Orton. I have been a resident of the Island of Hawai'i for seven years, and am a part of the canoe paddling community, which makes extensive use of the Kawaehai harbor area. I practiced law in California for 30 years, was involved in state-wide transportation planning as a local elected official, and am familiar with environmental litigation.

First, I oppose this bill because the backward process of approving ferry service before preparing an EIS makes the EIS process a farce. To put it another way, the bill correctly states that the purpose of an EIS is to enlighten the decision-makers. (HB No. \_\_\_\_\_, sect. 8, subdiv. (b), [p. 20].) After the governor approves the ferry service, no more decisions will be needed; thus, no need for an EIS.

Secondly, I oppose this bill because it violates the doctrine of separation of powers. The bill purports to reserve to the legislature "the sole right" to review the adequacy of any conditions imposed by the governor in approving ferry service and to impose its own conditions. (HB No. \_\_\_\_\_, sect. 4, subdiv. (c), [pg. 14].) A legislative veto of an administrative action is not permitted in our form of government. (*Immigration and Naturalization Service* v. *Chadha*, 462 U.S. 919 (1983).) Also, by giving itself "the sole right" of review, the legislature attempts to strip the judicial branch of its traditional oversight role. All of this is on top of the specter that this bill casts in its attempt to overrule a final judgment of the supreme court. (See *Plaut* v. *Spendthrift Farm, Inc.*, 514 U.S. 211 (1995).)

Such concentration of legislative, executive, and judicial powers into the legislative branch is something Thomas Jefferson called "elective despotism." He called for novel approach: divide and balance government powers among several bodies, so that no one body could transcend its legal limits without being checked and restrained by the others.[1] Our state constitution is based on these precepts. Please honor them by not adopting this bill and respecting the Hawai'i Supreme Court's decision and its role of reviewing and correcting any further abuses of discretion in the other branches.

While I would love to be able to testify in support of the Superferry, the hearing on the Big Island is not close enough to make that possible. It has been my experience that those who attend the hearings can be very vocal and intimidating. I routinely attend zoning meetings; it is normally the same vocal minority with the same distracting testimony.

While none of us wishes to harm the environment, the time has passed to focus so completely on the environmental issues that no other issues matter. It's impossible to ignore the economic impact on the state and businesses who based their business plans on this important mode of transportation. The Superferry complied with all permitting and requirements that the state imposed. While I am happy for the double-checks created (albeit at the last minute) by those concerned with the environmental impact, it just at some point, protests have to sunset else we'd have protests over, for example, the use of combustion engines starting now. The Ferry relied on a promises and commitments made by our State government. For goodness sakes, the State should honor those commitments.

Because we have so many modes of interisland travel, including routine transportation of vehicles, it seems silly to think that the Ferry could worsen impact related to vehicle transportation and invasive species. Invasive species travel in luggage, purses, in containers and the like. Hence, the only additional impact seems to be related to speed. The Superferry should not be subjected to stricter controls than other forms of sea-bound transportation. Limiting their ability to run completely does exactly that. Because mitigation of the speed issue seems to be the only differentiating factor, the focus should be on allowing the ferry to operate and determining at what speeds they can safely operate in the presence of whales, which at best is a seasonal consideration.

Vessels from ports all over the world use our harbors. It seems blatantly unfair that the Superferry be singled out at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour. Surveys indicate that 80% of Hawaii residents want the ferry.

My name is Melissa O'Leary. I am writing in support of the Superferry speaking out as a private citizen and a healthcare professional.

I am employed as a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist. Over the past 2 decades, I have worked for a variety of organizations both locally and nationally (e.g. Rehab Hospital of the Pacific, HCIL, Independent Living Waipahu, Inc., Aloha Nursing & Rehab Centre, Brain Injury & Spinal Cord Injury Association, Challenge Alaska, Easter Seals, etc.) to enhance and improve the quality of lives for people with disabilities. One of the many challenges a person with a disability faces throughout their life, and is often overlooked, deals with accessible transportation.

In 2003, I facilitated the largest stroke support group in Hawaii, sponsored thru the American Heart Association. One of our most well-received in-services was addressing accessible travel. Many folks with acquired disabilities generally fear traveling as they are unsure about what obstacles and barriers they may encounter in route. As a result, many folks choose not to travel since they don't know how and/or what questions to ask. They fear being stranded, immobile, injured and embarrassed.

After the in-service, approximately a dozen of these stroke survivors and I decided to plan a trip to Maui to address this very issue TOGETHER! This would be the first time each one of these survivors had traveled since their stroke. To summarize our 3-day weekend to Ka'anapali, our trip was...eventful. Fortunately, our hotel was very accessible and accommodating to our special needs, however air and ground transportation was not only an inconvenience it was quite discouraging to the survivors. Some of our obstacles for travel included:

- Broken airline wheelchairs & airport staff pushing these wheelchairs without understanding the safety precautions for wheelchair management.
- Uncomfortable and unsteady airplane wheelchairs to travel up and down the narrow aisles of the plane. This "wheelchair" is a high back rigid stainless-steel cold frame. A disabled traveler is strapped down to this chair along their chest, hips and legs while an airline staff member tilts them backwards pulling them down the aisle to their seat.
- Select armrests that lift. If you weren't assigned to a seat with an adjustable armrest, you were forced to transfer over top of the armrest an unsafe transfer for someone dependent on a wheelchair.
- Inability to use the bathroom while on the plane too small for disabled individual and attendant, stranded in seat since their personal wheelchair needed to be checked in at the gate, etc.
- Prolonged wait times while airline attendants retrieved wheelchairs that had to be checked in at the gate.
- Upon receiving 3 of our checked in wheelchairs, the staff reported they lost one of the footrests.
- Untrained staff in regards to sensitivity training for the needs of individuals with physical disabilities.

• The stroke survivors who had active Hawaii state driver's license were unable to rent and drive a car in Maui because the rental vehicles did not offer hand controls to attach to the vehicles to address accessibility.

You can imagine this scenario playing out for folks with varying disabilities. If you don't have a disability or don't work in this field, these every day challenges may be overlooked, however they often deter the disabled from participating in...LIFE. A life that the rest of us take for granted.

I strongly support the Hawaii Superferry as the most accessible transport for individuals with or without disabilities. This service will offer increased choice for alternative transportation to the citizens of Hawaii. It will also address the need for accessible travel for the disabled while hopefully encouraging local airlines to train staff on sensitivity and special needs accommodations required to serve this population. I appreciate being allowed to voice my opinion and pray that this issue is taken into account when deciding on the outcome of the Superferry staying in Hawaii.

## Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.
