Given the inescapable fact that Hawaii is an island state, there is no viable reason for stopping the new ferry from running while an EIS is being prepared. No one has yet objected to the Young Bros. biweekly tug –and-barge units that service all island ports. No cruise ship has filed an EIS, despite a few dumping citations over the years. No one said a word when the last inter-island ferry provided its shortlived service. And no one on Maui, Molokai or Lana'i objects to the daily shuttle. The superferry, if anything, is less likely to be carrying evil organisms because its hull hasn't had time to pick up biological growths from the ocean.

Now if we want to get serious about environmental impacts, we have only to look at airplanes. They distribute unburned hydrocarbons from sea to shining sea. They dump fuel into the ocean on occasion. There's a subject for an EIS. Then there's the incredible noise pollution from airplanes, and the congestion caused at and by the airports. That begs the question – what about automobiles? A quick EIS will show a requirement to stop more automobiles from entering the state to avoid further environmental pollution from both operation and from dumping of used vehicles and their tires and batteries.

The point is: there are many potential polluters besides a superferry, including those ferries already in operation, as well as their seagoing partners, the fishing and sightseeing boats. If the superferry so desperately requires an EIS, then make the rule retroactive for all pre-existing polluters. But let them – and the superferry – continue operation while they all prepare EIS. It's only fair.

Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

I am here to request that Hawaii's lawmakers honor the original approval of the super ferry.

My concerns are many but time permits addressing only these few:

First, many millions of investment capital were risked in good faith reliance on an approval that took years to acquire, so the loss of this capital as a result of the government reneging on its approval will decrease Hawaii's access to future investments of this type.

The plight of Mexico's citizens who are such a desperately poor source of cheap US labor illustrates the risk when the government's behavior becomes unreliable. No one intelligent enough to accumulate large amounts of capital is foolish enough to risk it in Mexico where corruption makes the government's word unreliable. It's like running a poker table where the dealer does not honor "a card laid is a card played". No one whose play would be desired is foolish enough to do so. Those foolish enough to do so aren't desirable players.

It is irrelevant that Hawaii's reason for unreliability - namely timidity that too easily bends to the squeakiest wheels -- is more benign: The result is the same. Good investment ends.

In this case the squeaky wheels seem intent on claiming exclusive enjoyment of priceless resources without paying for them. For example, it seems those whose love of recreation leaves them less encumbered by jobs, responsibilities and courtesy seem more listened to than those whose jobs deny them equal free-time and whose natural courtesy prevents them from responding in kind. The same seems true of the already rich from elsewhere who have the resources to pursue increasing their already valuable property's worth by persuading lawmakers to prevent others from developing theirs nearby.) It seems wrong that Hawaii's lawmakers would bend to those squeaky wheels on this important matter. Please don't.

Especially when the Ferry is truly the kind of technology that can inspire Hawaii's children to dream of a future in which it's their turn to be tourists on whom others must wait with eternal cheerfulness. The Ferry is not the fire sale of Hawaii's land that is so falsely mislabeled "investment'. Neither is it the foolish payment of mainland firms to use Hawaii's cheap labor and free beauty as props in movies. Movies made with technology kept on the mainland. This Ferry is truly a wondrous thing we should keep for Hawaii's children to see and be inspired by.

My second argument is the ferry is not something new to be tested again. It is only an improvement over things already approved, so requiring a separate study will set a precedent where any advance in engineering will be held hostage to another study.

For example, requiring a study for the Ferry should then require a study every time Matson modifies a barge to permit faster less expensive towing. The ferry is, after all, just an impressive advancement in barge technology.

Finally, isn't it time that adult intelligence stands up to irrational emotions? Truly, is any lawmaker willing to swear she or he believes the bottom of a Ferry which must be kept slick and clean to retain profitable speed, and that is buffeted for hours by the equivalent of a high pressure hoses, could possibly carry anything between islands that is not more comfortably transported in the wonderfully fertile ecology that flourishes beneath existing barges? There can be no rational public debate until lawmakers stand to end such knowingly false statements, by letting those who make them know they will be publicly called on such dishonesty and then will be exclude from the debate.

All people are entitled to their opinion, but no one has the right be wrong in her or his facts.

Please hear my testimony in favor of allowing the Hawaii Superferry to operate, without restrictions that have significant adverse impact on its business model, and without avenues for continuation of the public relations and legal circus that has ensued in recent weeks.

Benefits of the Superferry are manifold. Its opponents have engaged in a campaign of distortion with the thinly disguised goal of altogether preventing the service's operation. They must not succeed.

- 1. The Hawaii Superferry is a great transportation resource for the state.
 - a. It will enhance intra-state commerce by giving smaller islands viable shopping access to the Oahu market.
 - b. It will reduce costs of service companies who do business state wide.
 - c. It provides a tremendous resource for disaster aid.
 - d. It brings new competition to intra-state shipping and travel.
- 2. Superferry service is favored by a majority of state residents.
 - a. This fact has been confirmed by numerous polls.
 - b. A minority, no matter how vocal, should not prevail over the voice of the people.
- 3. The supreme court's ruling concerned harbor improvements at Kahului. It is an unfortunate fact that this act has resulted in a counterfeit referendum on the service as a whole. The legislature should act with swift leadership to restore order and determinism to the state business climate.
- 4. Recent arguments of the SuperFerry opponents are without merit.
 - a. The so-called expert testimony in Judge Cardoza's court regarding timelines for tactical whale avoidance was laughably pessimistic.
 - b. The imu rock incident on Maui is something easily overcome by appropriate state guidelines.
 - c. Suggestions by Issac Hall that any legislative action would be unconstitutional and threats of further litigation are moot. These, along with criticisms of "over-ruling the courts" reflect a complete misunderstanding of the separation of powers. A well thought out bill would pass constitutional muster. I am sure that Mr. Hall understands this. His remarks are either little more than an attempt to cast doubt, or a chilling endorsement of judicial tyranny.
- 5. Longstanding arguments of the SuperFerry opponents are without merit.
 - a. The Superferry is not responsible for traffic problems. Among the tired lines of Superferry

opponents is that the Superferry will worsen vehicle traffic congestion.

- i. Attempts to demonstrate congestion in Maui proved the opposite.
- ii. Other venues, such as the weekly Maui swap meet, result in far worse congestion.
- iii. If Superferry patronage grew so large as to cause congestion, there are multiple avenues for mitigation.
- iv. Traffic congestion is due to scarce infrastructure, and is a statewide problem. Its application to the Superferry is a red herring.
- b. The Superferry is not responsible for drug problems. Drugs can be and are shipped by many means. If, as the opponents suggest, the Superferry service became a drug conduit, it would be a boon to law enforcement, captivating drug traffic in an enclosed area easily inspected with a dog.
- 5. Emotional appeals to whale welfare cannot be allowed govern the state.
 - a. Other animals are frequently victims of vehicle collisions, yet there are no calls for banning cars.
 - b. The Superferry is not the only operation that poses a risk to whales, yet it has been treated as if it is.
 - c. Comparisons to other parts of the world by Superferry opponents are not fair. A favorite, the Canary islands, not only has a year-round whale population, but also has far more than two vessels operating high speed ferry services. Further, statistics drawn from this venue assume causality that is unproven. It is also worth noting that pictures on anti-ferry websites show animals which were clearly victims of propeller cuts.
 - d. Given the political climate, and its efforts to date, one can safely assume that Superferry will do its utmost to prevent harm to marine mammals.

Aloha Legislators

I would like to voice my strong objection to the proposed special session of the Legislature that will consider legislation to authorize the Superferry to operate without being required to observe existing environmental protection laws. The Supreme Court has required that the clear language of HRS Chapter 343 must be honored, and no single private business should be exempted from the statutory requirements for an EA or an EIS. Any public benefit to be derived from the Superferry is not of such a critical and immediate nature that State laws should be disregarded simply to allow this one business to begin operations, especially when it is clear that the Superferry and the State government erred in their interpretation of the law. A very dangerous precedent will be established by bailing out a private business under these circumstances, and the Legislature should not be favoring a single private business venture over the obvious and possibly irreparable damages that such a venture may cause.

An after-the-fact EIS, as is proposed in the Superferry legislation, will be a meaningless exercise since the decision to allow operations to begin and to exempt the Superferry from all other State and County laws related to its commencement of operations will already have been made; an after-the-fact EIS will have no impact on the decision, which defeats the very purpose of requiring an EIS in the first place.

Leaving the establishment of environmental protective operating conditions to the Governor will not provide any meaningful protection, since the Governor has already indicated her position that the Superferry should be allowed to operate regardless of any other issues or factors. We cannot rely on the Governor to impose strict or meaningful conditions, and it would be wrong for the Legislature to avoid taking responsibility for this critical issue.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty. If we don't protect our environment, tourism will suffer, which will in turn cause EVERY other industry in the islands to suffer.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be *irreparable* harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

Please look at the long-term implications of allowing the Superferry to operate without a completed EIS. It's not worth the risk to our environment to ensure a private company's success. We did just fine without the Superferry for all these years; we'll do fine without it for the next two years while an EIS is conducted.

Thank you for your time and consideration. Please look to the future of our state and make the right decision.

Subject: Proposed Superferry Bill: Testimony by Ken Stokes

Aloha Legislators!

As a green economist and blogger on sustainability in Hawai'i (*SusHI*), I couldn't agree more that the Superferry is a key step toward sustainable transport for Hawai'i.

IMHO, this draft Bill is correct in declaring that the Superferry delivers reduced emissions from inter-island transport, enhanced viability of diversified ag markets, and essential disaster deployment options.

I have blogged about this for over one year, starting here, and continuing here and here.

Still, I lament the fact that Hawai'i **does not have** a tailored tool for assessing the sustainability of our transport options. I have <u>advocated</u> that Hawai'i adopt the "Ecological Footprint" method for these purposes.

IMHO, such a 'footprint' tool, tailored to Hawaii 's situation, is essential to assist us in determining the full cost and cumulative impacts of each mode of transport.

We must not rush blindly into significant support for this-or-that sustainability strategy without full disclosure of these 'footprint' measures.

America 's headlong and <u>ill-advised plunge</u> into ethanol subsidies, without such 'footprint' considerations, serves as a reminder of this risk.

Further, IMHO, the "Ecological Footprint" method constitutes a <u>significant advance</u> on the EIS approach, in that it provides a unified measure of cumulative impacts that sums to a single "bottom line". It is, in this sense, both less equivocal and more strategic in highlighting impacts that must be mitigated.

All impacts are not created equal, and the 'footprint' methodology can help Hawai`i determine which impacts are most significant as we seek to reduce the *un-sustainability* of our current modes of transport.

IMHO, the legislature should initiate a review of all <u>environmental assessment</u> procedures under State law with an eye to incorporating the "Ecological Footprint" methodology wherever appropriate.

IMHO, the 'footprint' method will be <u>especially instructive</u> in Hawaii's assessment of its *greenhouse gas emissions* and in its search for ways to dramatically reduce these emissions. This is especially important in that we know from 'footprint' studies done elsewhere that emissions constitute only one-half of the total 'footprint'. That is, by focusing only on emissions, we will miss these other impacts.

I believe the legislature is on solid ground when it asserts that the Superferry represents relatively

lower emissions compared with inter-island air. Still, we do not know *precisely* how much lower, nor do we know the *full* 'footprint' of related impacts...because a 'footprinting' study of Hawaii's transport options *has not been conducted*.

IMHO, we need a 'footprinting' study of our transport options, like now !

I will be delighted to assist in your further consideration of this urgent need.

My name is Susan Heinz, I am a resident of Kea'au on the Island of Hawaii.

I am in support of the Hawaii Superferry and the Bill that will permit inter-island ferry service in Hawaii while an environmental Impact Statement is being conducted.

I understand that there are two main concerns that some community members have raised that the ferry operations may have significant impact; marine mammal collision and the spread of invasive species. I have been in the vocational field of environmental review and research for more than 20 years and admit that these two issues are significant but can be mitigated. I believe the EIS process will identify and require mitigations reasonable to the community and Hawaii Superferry.

Clearly, the process for conducting business in Hawaii broke down with this example. An exception must be made to Hawaii Superferry - the risk of this business leaving Hawaii will impact so many facets of future Hawaii business, employment, societal benefits and tourism.

The last thing I want to see or hear about is a collision between a ferry and a whale - I would like to suggest a quick process mitigation for avoiding this risk be implemented and monitored by a third party (at the cost of Hawaii Superferry) on each voyage. Endangered species monitoring, as I understand, will be monitored, but it is really the kuliana of individuals to be aware of what may be transported. There are currently many other transportation methods that could allow for species transport that do not provide the level of mitigation that Hawaii Superferry is planning. After-all, invasive species are already being identified on each island with the Superferry assistance.

The Hawaii Superferry is quite important to life in the Islands; it provides a method of transportation that does not require community to fly, provides the

ability to be on the water, allow inter-island tourism and finally provides one more resource for disaster preparedness. There must be great support for the Superferry - I cant imagine a company investing a great sum of money, gaining support from State and Federal organization, if they did not research and confirm that they would have the business to support it.

The super ferry is a much needed alternate means of transportation between the islands which should have never been subject to an environmental impact study in the first place. None of the other boats and ships that visit our port had to go through such a study, it's being misused to kill the super ferry by a very few, but vocal group and their attorney friend, who has signal handily done more harm to the people of Maui than any other person!

All of the potential impacts are already known and have been dealt with by the super ferry operators. They are inspecting the vehicles, they have re-striped the road for better ingress and egress, they have equipment and extra crew to watch for whales.

The Superferry has invested millions of dollars to bring a new transportation alternative to Hawaii, they complied with every federal, state and local rule and regulation; they have worked with the Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council to develop a plan to avoid whales. They have a plan to avoid carrying invasive species. They should be allowed operate. Numerous polls show that a majority of our citizens want the service.

I work in an environment where people express their concerns to me every day. I have heard the people speak out and support this new and innovative inter island service. I interact with thousands of radio listeners in Hawaii every day and they want the Superferry. I have lived in Hawaii my entire life, 42 years, and have traveled extensively in Tahiti, Samoa, Indonesia and other far less developed and much more pristine locales than Hawaii and all have sophisticated ferry service that is a lifeline for those residents. Clearly the environment is NOT the issue here but rather a vocal minority of neighbor island residents using it as a smokescreen to restrict progress. My guess is if we weren't on the tail end of 7 years of prosperous growth in our State we'd be much more welcoming.

I have not heard one concrete argument about invasive species that would cause concern. Thousands of vehicles are shipped back and forth between the Islands and never are they subject to inspection by environmental authorities. And regarding the whales, having gone back and forth to Molokai numerous times at Superferry speeds you're lucky if you even get close to a Humpback. They're smarter and more evasive then the folks driving the boats. I'd be much more worried about the 1000' long guillotine that Young Bros tows their barges with.

The reason the Kauai folks don't mind the cruise ships is they just stay in Lihue right around the Harbor, grease the economy and then get back on the ship. Their fear is Oahu folks coming over for the weekend, camping in their spots, surfing their breaks, taking their fish etc, etc. But, as a lifelong surfer – you just don't paddle out to any spot, especially on Kauai. Usually you're with local friends and are invited. Even if you just show up – you're not going to get any waves anyway unless you're recognized in the lineup. What about the youth sports teams, paddling crews, family reunions, neighbor island folks xmas shopping on Oahu, going to UH games not to mention small business having an option other than the interIsland monopoly. What about all of them – the Silent Majority?? - I would imagine most are busy with life and don't have the time to protest about various causes. Plus who wants to put themselves up to the abuse. As we've clearly seen these are not civil demonstrations where each side can respectfully voice their opinion.

I'd say the fear is way overblown – almost like Y2K. Maybe one way to address is to limit the Kauai service to 3 times a week as a way of easing into service and minimizing the impact, whether recognized or not. With the imminent departure of GO! I am in favor of allowing the superferry to operate while an EIS is being done. While I continue to be in awe of the rhetoric and emotion that the superferry evokes, I find no scientific evidence that indicates that the superferry will increase the likelihood of environmental harm to the islands, particularly with the mitigation measures that the superferry already has in place such as whale lookouts, route adjustments, ag inspections, insisting on clean vehicles, etc.

It does seem logical that the speed of the ferry could increase the likelihood of whale strikes. Yet, with mitigating measures, whether this possible increase in likelihood is significant or not does not seem to be known at this time. While unscientific, I might ask how many of the hundreds of pleasure or fishing craft in the water every day have ever struck a whale. If there have been boat strikes (and I have heard of a few), what % of boating hours is this? Was speed involved in any of these strikes? Would the number of strikes increase with speed? I have been a fisherman and boater for over twenty years on Maui and Kaua'i, and in that time have never struck a whale. I did travel at 20+ knot speeds for considerable time in areas frequented by whales. The one time I did come close to a whale, the boat was not moving and the whale came close to the boat on its own accord.

My name is Raymond Lyman, I work for Catalina Express out of Los Angeles/Long Beach in Southern California. My position with the company is Vice President of Vessel Operations in charge of 11 vessels and a boat crew of 180 members. We run high speed passenger vessels across the San Pedro Channel to Catalina Island. I wish to comment on the extraordinary efforts the Hawaii Superferry has undertaken to operate safely in the environmentally sensitive waters of your beautiful Islands. I have read the operations scenarios developed by the Superferry company regarding Whale seasons routes and added crew observations and electronic detection. I have 25 years experience running vessels within the migratory route of the California Gray whales and have found that a trained eye can spot the air/mist blow of the whales miles away. Avoiding whales is much easier for the smaller high speed vessels than it is for the large container and deep draft ships transiting your island waters. I realize there are many objections to the Superferry operation, however, I feel it is of huge benefit to the majority of the Island residents and visitors to have such a service. Products grown or raised on one Island can be shipped fresh and at low cost compared to current available transport. Precautionary procedures can be followed to address non-indigenous species transport from one Island to another. And the fuel burn of the Superferry compared to the fuel burn of the small commuter jets per passenger has to be significantly less. In closing, I wish to comment on the Court activity as I see it. The same Court that gave early approval for the Superferry to proceed (with hundreds of millions of dollars being invested) is now allowing a vocal minority to bully it into closing down the operations. If businesses can't rely on the courts of our country to hold to their decisions regarding operations like Superferry, then who in their right mind would move forward with any particular service that could improve the lives and economic viability of the people served by the operation. As a military member transferred in 2005 who has decided to retire in Hawaii, I have a vested interest in the State's future, even though I do not have native Hawaiian blood and my family has not lived here for generations.

In my opinion, the Legislature must expedite every action required to put the Superferry back into operation. Further, the Judiciary should be required to take appropriate legal action against those citizens who are determined to block the Superferry through threats, intimidation, and direct actions contrary to the public safety.

I am a tug boat Captain, and have lived on Kauai and Oahu since 1987. I have read and heard a lot the anti ferry comments siting all the environmental and social concerns.

Here is the testimony I wish to submit.

I have first hand knowledge about how the maritime industry in Hawaii operates, there is no thought about invasive species when barges are loaded, perhaps there should be, but there are no laws directing any maritime operator to wash undercarriages or scrub boots of crewmen. To single out one operator to perform these things is ridiculous and would probably be open all kinds of litigation.

I have towed barges filled with 6000 tons of sand and gravel directly from Maui to Kauai and Oahu and sometimes the reverse. No invasive species checks conducted. The sand and gravel come directly from the quarry to the barge, then off loaded and sent by road to the final destination.

Both Matson and Young brothers have ro-ro barges, both ro-ro barges have 3 or more upper decks, which are usually loaded with cars.

Larger trucks and equipment stay on the first deck. The car carrying capacity of the Matson barge is in excess of 400 cars the Young brothers barge is even larger, there is no undercarriage wash system for those cars, livestock also makes the trip between islands, Animals frequently carry seeds within their intestines yet there are no decontamination procedures conducted.

These ro-ro barges are extremly fast to load and off load, the entire port stay is often less than 4 hours for both the off load and back load.

There is lots of talk about forcing the ferry to slow to 13 knots in shallow waters or where whales are present, The State only has jurisdiction to dictate vessel speed 3 miles from land and within harbors. The only speed limit on federal waters is the captain's best judgement, and that is the way it should be. Attempts by some to slow the ferry between the islands are futile and outside the state jurisdiction.

I concede the point that the ferry will eventually strike a whale, how many wales have been hit by ships already transiting in Hawaii waters I don't know. I do know that occasionally a dead whale is spotted around the islands, without the ferry operating, and no one claims responsibility. I'm sure the ferry will have to shoulder the blame any time a whale, dolphin, turtle or monk seal is found dead.

The legislature should not forget that it is the state of Hawaii that has the responsibility to conduct an environmental assessment for the harbor improvements in Kahului NOT the superferry.

The legislature should also be careful to draft a bill that does not impose unintended restrictions on other interisland carriers.

My name is Conrad Deparini and I am an adamant supporter of Hawaii's Super Ferry. My father recently passed away on October 4th, 2007, and I had to travel to the Big Island. I am a Hawaiian Air Club Member and one time Aloha Airlines Club member. I did not make an E Ticket booking and went to the Airport to make a booking @ 0500AM Monday, October 10th, I was told that a single, one-way ticket from HNL to ITO would cost me \$75.00 and just double that cost for a round trip! I asked what happened to the \$39.00 fare? The counter agent stated "we don't have those program anymore". I retorted, "was that when you all had a 140 million judgment in your favor against GO Airlines? She gave me the "stink eve" look while I said "I better go over to GO to help them defray their cost. On the way I stopped at Aloha Airlines and ask the counter person what was the fare from HNL/ITO round trip? She said \$88.00. I said can you imagine Hawaiian was going to charge me \$75 one way!!! The counter person "oh the \$44 one way fare was not available and the next fare available was for \$54.00 O/W". I asked what happened to the \$44.00 fare she quoted me earlier? She replied saying" we are sold out for those fares" I told her, that's okay because I'm going to buy a GO Ticket. She then said "wait a minute as she could now secure a \$44.00 fare! Since all my running around, I thought saving a few dollars was not going to change the time of my being in Hilo any earlier. The point is, when I boarded the Flight to Hilo, there were hardly anyone on the flight, I believe 30 or so. I am positive that if GO Airlines wasn't in the mix, the Airlines would be back charging identical fares and denving us the opportunity to travel for whatever reasons, at a reasonable COST! At the least, I could drive my own vehicle and not pay a necessary rental fee when I get there. That is, if the Super Ferry is allowed to operate. With Young Bros granted a rate increase, HEI raising it's rate, I wonder if American Savings Bank is going to charge their clients a little extra here and there. Aloha,

My name is Mike Fisher, and I am a geotechnical engineer with Construction Engineering Labs, Inc. in Pearl City. Allowing the Superferry to operate while the EIS is being conducted would be greatly beneficial to our company. We have a portable drill rig that we use to perform soil test borings and soil sampling for soils investigations. This equipment is stored in a small Wells Cargo trailer that is towed behind one of our company vehicles.

As the Superferry was slated to initially start its interisland service, we had scheduled a job on Maui. We intended on using the Superferry to transport our drilling equipment and the trailer, along with my company vehicle. The cost for the interisland shipping, etc. was included in our lump sum bid for the project. Between the time we were awarded our contract and the start of our soils investigation, the Superferry service was halted. As such, we had to ship our equipment on Young Bros. and rent a vehicle for me to tow the trailer while on Maui. After we were done with the job, we had to ship the trailer back to Honolulu on Young Bros. again. Since this contract was a lump sum amount, we lost \$920 as we incurred extra expenses that would have not existed had the Superferry been operating as they had planned.

Here is a breakdown of the extra costs we incurred because of the shutdown of the Superferry:

Cost to ship trailer, truck, and myself on Superferry from Oahu to Maui=\$290 Cost to ship trailer, truck, and myself on Superferry from Maui to Oahu=\$290 *Total cost for interisland Superferry round trip for trailer, truck, and myself=\$580

*Cost to ship trailer on Young Bros. from Oahu to Maui=\$490 Airfare for me from HNL to OGG=\$40 Cost of rental truck on Maui for 4 days=\$400 Cost to ship trailer on Young Bros. from Maui to Oahu=\$490 Airfare for me from OGG to HNL=\$40 Parking at HNL=\$40 *Total cost for having to ship this way=\$1,500

*As you can see, being forced to go with YB, etc. directly cost us almost \$1,000. We are a small business, and every penny counts, so when we have to take a \$1,000 hit that we can't bill the client, that really hurts. In addition to the increased cash costs, we had indirect costs such as having to deliver and pick up the trailer at YB on both islands, along with delays and having to reschedule several jobs because the Superferry would have provided same-day service, but with YB, we had 3 down days each way, which pushed several jobs on Oahu back and could have cost us those jobs.

Subject:	Please Uphold Our Environmental Laws

Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

To whom it may concern:

Thanks to the Senators for coming over and holding a hearing on Maui.

Unintended consequences. Familiar words these days as projects are rushed through. Good thoughtful laws have been enacted to protect the land. Uphold those laws. Environmental impacts such as the brown tree snake, the coqui frogs and fire ants, happened with the state's best efforts. Imagine if hundreds of cars a day, or a hundred thousand cars a year, were allowed to pass with no inspections? Fragile and environment are important words to consider. How does the state intend to pay for inspections? How will the public perceive the long lines necessary to accomplish the inspections? Will they be taking off their shoes to avoid spreading of seeds? How will trunks and truck beds be inspected for both theft and species transportation? Will their bags be opened to stem any insects from traveling from island to island? Will the cars be gassed to avoid transporting foreign species? Fragile and high speed do not fit in the same category.

How do you study the impact on whales and birth rates? How will fertility be measured?

An analogy: I need to go to the hospital in order to give birth, but I need to go through a bad neighborhood in order to get there. While I'm at the hospital it is noisy and filled with obstacles, but I don't want to give birth out in the street (open sea). Now this experience of obstacle laden birth lowers my fertility, perhaps even my desire to repeat the process. Not being a whale, I do not understand the migratory process, and seemingly they have little choice. For the whales, these island channels are the dedicated hospital and nursery, for which God told us to be conservators.

What animals will be included in the study?

Are schools of fish and their migrations known? ... Will they be included in the impact study?

Are humans to be included in this study? Impact has many ramifications. What will the impacts be? Will crime rates be studied? There is a wonderful feeling knowing that we are an island. We know each other. We will not feel the same safety when our borders will be so porous. Will we be as productive if we are worrying?

We know that the koa trees on the Big Island are different from the koa trees on Maui. Why aren't we respecting their differences? Islands are meant to be separate. They are not suburbs.

There is only one Hawaii. Please help to keep it a special place where people can come for generations to come. Our reefs are already feeling the impact of so many travelers. Try to keep an eye to the future while preserving the present.
