My name is Michael Tom from the island of Maui and I am in favor of the Bill allowing the Super Ferry to operate while the EIS is being conducted. The State Department of Vocational Rehabilitation Division has a contract with the Superferry because it is the only way for people like me with certain disabilities to travel inter-island for doctors and other types of appointments only offered on Oahu.

In addition, I own a modified vehicle that can only be serviced on Oahu. I had a reservation on the Superferry earlier this month to go to Oahu from Maui and fix the hydraulic lift on my vehicle because it is broken. Now because of the ruling by a single rogue judge I am not able to get to work indefinitely. There are no other transportation options for people in wheelchairs on the island of Maui.

We have cruise ships and barges successfully navigating our Hawaiian waters on a regular bases. Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

Aloha Legislators

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawai'i Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decision making lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughtful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption will not.

Please help us to protect the things that we all love about Hawai'i by upholding our environmental laws. This corporation should not be exempted from its legal obligations to assess the likely harms of its actions before they occur. To do so will set a dangerous precedent for other corporations seeking to do business in Hawai'i. Regardless of how you may feel about the Superferry and the need for its services, changing the laws in this way cannot be justified.

Here are some of the reasons I feel so strongly about upholding Hawaii's current environmental laws:

- Hawai'i's EIS law should be upheld because it provides a crucial layer of protection for Hawai'i's irreplaceable natural and cultural beauty.

- The proposed legislation to exempt the Superferry from its obligations under the law is overbroad. It exempts the Superferry from every permit requirement and public oversight requirement currently on the books. Proposed conditions on the operation of the Superferry fail to address to legitimate concerns about the possible irreparable harms highlighted by the Maui Court.

- The Hawaii Constitution guarantees everyone the "right to a clean and healthful environment" (Haw. Const. Art. 11, sec. 9). The Constitution, however, does not guarantee anyone the right to a profit. If our elected officials grant an exemption to our environmental laws, then they will be placing the corporations' right to profit over the public's right to a healthy environment.

- Public participation is essential to a well-functioning democracy! Hawai'i's EIS law provides a rare opportunity for public hearings. This fundamental public right should not be side-stepped to serve special interests!

- A legislative decision of this magnitude cannot be made properly in the 7 days allotted for a special session called by the Governor. It does not provide a sufficient opportunity for lawmakers to hear from the communities most affected by this decision. If the process of decisionmaking lacks integrity, then so will the outcome.

- Special treatment for special interests creates a precedent of uncertainty about when and if Hawai'i's laws will be applied and upheld, and for whom. Good business and economic development requires wise governance and certainty about the rules by which all businesses must play. The rule of law must be respected by all levels of government to ensure our system

functions properly.

- Strong protection of public trust natural and cultural resources depend on upholding the law. Laws that are not upheld or enforced are shibai and useless!

- The Maui Court decision found, after 22 days of expert testimony, that there will likely be irreparable harm from Superferry operations. Following the law as written and conducting a complete environmental review will help us to develop thoughful, meaningful mitigations to these harms before they happen. Allowing this exemption now will not.

And this is the one time that I am completely ashamed and dismayed of the people of Hawaii.

My family and I have been very fortunate to travel to various parts of the world and had been exposed to many different forms of public transportation--from large cities such as Bangkok, Sydney, New York, and Western Europe that offers rail transit system to Venice and Greece where catching water taxis or ferries were an option. I guess if I wasn't exposed to other means of transportation, I could be one of those people who fear change. However, **ignorance should not be an excuse for not diversifying our means of transportation**.

We just returned from Greece and had the opportunity to take ferry rides from Athens to the Cyclade islands and found it to be a wonderful experience. The Greeks really had a great system. These ferries ran several times per day. The following comments refer to the line numbers and pages as listed in the draft Bill as posted on the legislature?s website at http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/splsession2007b/bills/HB_Superferry_Proposed.pdf

1.?Section 9, paragraph 6 (pages 25, line 20-22, and page 26, lines 1-9)? requires ? A description of the environmental setting, including a description of the environment in the vicinity of the action, as it exists before commencement of the action, from both a local and regional perspective. Special emphasis shall be placed on environmental resources that are rare or unique to the region and the project site, including natural or human-made resources of historic, archaeological, or aesthetic significance; specific reference to related projects, public and private, existent or planned in the region shall also be included for purposes of examining the possible overall cumulative impacts of such actions? [emphasis added]. This requirement of the EIS process, which sets the mandatory baseline for analyzing seconday and cumulative impacts, is not possible to achieve if the action in question (operation of a large capacity ferry vessel) is occuring during the collection of this baseline data.

2.?Section 9, paragraph 5 on Pages 23-24. ?The section shall include a rigorous exploration and objective evaluation of the environmental impacts of all such alternative actions. Particular attention shall be given to alternatives that might enhance environmental quality or avoid, reduce, or minimize some or all of the adverse environmental effects, costs, and risks. Examples of alternatives include: (a) the alternative of no action?. This alternative will not be realistically possible if, as stated on page 11, lines 14-18: ?The operation of large capacity ferry vessels between the islands of Oahu, Maui, Kauai, and Hawaii, including the use of harbor facilities on each island and improvements at Kahului harbor, is declared to be a **required** public convenience and necessity?, and Pages 4, lines 19-22 and page 5, lines 1-6, ?This Act adopts a new policy, and further clarifies and amends existing law, with respect to this new type of inter-island ferry service to provide that, during the period in which any required environmental review and studies, including environmental assessments and environmental impact statements, are prepared, and also following their completion:? A large capacity ferry vessel company and large capacity ferry vessels may operate subject to the employment of measures to prevent significant adverse environmental impacts, if any? [emphasis added].

These first two points, taken together, reveal that it is logically impossible to conduct a real and meaningful Environmental Impact Study while the ferry service is in operation, and when its operational status is mandated by legislative declaration.

3.?Page 6, line 3-8: ?Due to the unique nature and critical importance of the inter-island ferry service industry to the people of our state, the construction and use of harbor improvements to facilitate this new type of interisland ferry service is to be governed by this Act, and not by chapter 343?. How does the legislature determine that any industry is unique enough to not be governed by Chapter 343? Is there a unique exemption clause somewhere in state law? Has any other industry been excluded due to its uniqueness factor? And where is the proof of critical importance to the people of our state? Why is it critical that a company conduct ferry service before an
environmental review process is completed? These declarations of the industry?s nature and importance need to be explicitly substantiated.

4.?These hearings are assumedly to determine if the provisions in this Bill are in the public interest?that?s the reason for public input. Stating already on Page 3, lines 7-14, ?that it is clearly in the public interest that a large capacity ferry vessel company be allowed to operate...while any environmental studies, including environmental assessments and environmental impact statements, are conducted? suggests that the drafters of this bill have already made up their minds about what is in the public interest. A definition of ?public interest? would also be appropriate here.

5.?Page 3, lines 7-14 states that ?The legislature also finds that the immediate operation of a large capacity ferry vessel company is in the public interest?. Does ?a? mean ?one? or ?any? large capacity ferry vessel company? If it means ?one?, wouldn?t this constitute a monopoly? If it means ?any?, could a Hawaii Superferry competitor show up right now and start running without an EA or EIS being done beforehand? Will there be a limit on the # of large capacity ferry vessel companies that can operate concurrently? Will the impact of multiple ferries & companies be addressed in the EIS?

6.?Section 1 on pages 1-2 asserts that the judicial determination of overturning harbor improvements and business operations that were previously authorized by the government and approved by the lower court approximately two years earlier is not the intent of the legislature. Supreme court rulings that overturn previous decisions of lower courts should certainly be the intent of the legislature to endorse. The Bill seems to suggest that this standard judicial process is flawed. If this passage is referring to the two year period it took for the Supreme Court?s ruling, this needs to be made clear.

7.?The Bill makes many broad assumptions about the character of ?a large capacity ferry vessel company?. Since the Bill avoids specifically naming Hawaii Superferry, we are by default talking about any and all ?new class? (which is undefined) large capacity ferry vessels. Therefore the statements made about the character of these vessels and the companies that operate them are merely speculative. For example:

? Page 2, lines 13-16: ?a large capacity ferry vessel would also utilize technology that produces less carbon emissions when compared to inter-island aircraft transportation with the same carrying capacity.? ?the study that produced this finding should be noted. Even if this is true of current and planned HSF vessels, it may not be true of other large capacity ferry vessels that will be regulated by this act.

? Page 2, lines 18-21: ?agricultural produce would suffer less heat damage in transit, resulting in higher quality produce and fresh food products at a lower cost for all residents of the State.? The study that produced this finding should be noted. And what about for the residents of Moloka`i, Lanai, and Ni`ihau? Certainly they are part of all the residents of the State. Will they be eating food delivered on these large capacity ferry vessels? If Oahu begins to attract a large supply of organic vegetables produced on Kaua`i, it seems to me that the cost to Kaua`i consumers will get higher, not lower, as the local supply diminishes. If the legislature is really interested in fostering diversified agriculture and sustainability, it should be looking at how each island can provide for its own needs.

8.?Page 3, lines 3-6: It is suggested here that a large capacity ferry vessel (l.c.f.v.) *could* provide the means to rapidly deploy disaster relief personnel, equipment and supplies in times of natural or other disasters. If this is being used as justification for accomodating the l.c.f.v. with special legislation, a(the) vessel company should be compelled to provide these services. Suggesting that it could doesn?t amount to anything substantive. Besides, the l.c.f.v.c. currently in question already has an agreement with the military that could likely preclude its availability at such times. And on that note, Hawai`i, and Kaua`i specifically are among the most equipped places in the world to respond to natural or other disasters, given that we have the Pacific Missile Range Facility and Pearl Harbor to come to our aid in the legion of ships and aircraft already at their disposal.?

I am writing this letter in support of having the Hawaii Super Ferry operate while the EA/EIS is being performed for the following reasons:

- The Hawaii Super Ferry has met all conditions that were imposed prior to courts determining that the State erred in not performing the EA/EIS. Not allowing the super ferry to operate during the performance of the EA/EIS in my opinion goes against due process and it sends a strong message to business outside the State of Hawaii that if the proposed business follows all the laws of the State and County there will be no guarantee that other rules and regulations will be implemented after the business has been approved to operate thus leaving the new business of losing its investment.
- Vehicles that are shipped by Young Brothers and other shipping firms between islands are not required to be washed prior to shipment. I did ship a vehicle last year via Young Brothers from Kauai to Honolulu and was not required to wash it.
- Presently commodities can be shipped through Young Brothers and other shipping companies between the islands and not be scrutinized as it is being asked for the super ferry to comply. An example stones for the imu could be crated and shipped via barge from one island to another island. Legally this may not be correct but the Super Ferry is not the culprit it is the citizens of Hawaii. Coqui frogs can hide in a container being shipped from one island to the other.
- Presently we have many vehicles being shipped into the state by individuals as well as companies on ships that are made just for automobile shipments and other ships that carry containers. This increase of the number of vehicles in the state really impacts traffic as they do not leave once they are here. The vehicles on the Super Ferry will return to where it came from once the person or company returns to its original origin unless the person decides to relocate to another island. In this event this

would not matter since the vehicle would be shipped by barge once the person relocates.

At the present time recreational boats and commercial boats can and do exceed the proposed speed limits that are being imposed on the Super Ferry. We have jet skis, para-sailing, water skiing, and etc. They all operate within the range that the whales are seen.

In conclusion I would just like to say all the items mentioned above is now going on in our islands and yes there are risks that invasive species can be transferred between islands. Humpback whales can be injured by speeding water vehicles, and numerous other issues as presented by the opposition. Is the risk going to change drastically if the Super Ferry operates in my opinion no? I say this because if you review the schedule of the shipping companies you will find the sailings today has increased drastically to accommodate the movement of goods between the islands as well as from outside the state. Increase in tourism means increase of rental cars which correlates to traffic issues. I only say that the issues stated are not because of operation of the Super Ferry and that it existed prior to the coming of the Super Ferry. Addressing and implementing rules to address these issues should be for all users of our harbors as well as the citizens of Hawaii and not only the Super Ferry.

Thank you for taking the time to listen to us and for your hard work and efforts going into this session. My name is **Chris Wong**. I am a furloughed port operator on Maui for the Hawaii Superferry. I am also the owner of a Christian clothing company. My strong support for the Hawaii Superferry goes far beyond my employment which I love dearly. The Superferry will also allow me to expand my business by bringing the materials and products I need to make presentations and attend shows. The Hawaii Superferry will also help me reduce my shipping costs, expand my business, create competitive prices statewide for goods and services I need, increase my network, allow me access to services not provided on Maui, and most important to me share my faith and increase mine.

As wonderful as **whales** are, people are more important. What major benefits do people really get from whales besides enjoying their beauty - shirts, postcards, toys, a tourist draw? Realistically, most residents don't have any more benefits from them than that. Most residents don't even get to see whales because they're too busy working. You have a choice between man and animal. You need to choose people first. One of our opponent's slogans is "Extinction is forever". That same slogan can be said for the local people who leave Hawaii because they can't survive economically. On the other hand, the Superferry could help enrollment increase for the UH system by allowing students easier access to our local college. It would make it easier for them continue their education here. The Hawaii Superferry will be the catalyst for residents to create new, exciting, and creative business, organizations, hobbies, and so on - and they may even get to see a whale or two.

I ask that you do not let our state become paralyzed and kept from greatness because you bought into "What if...." scenarios and their "fears of the unknown" being brought up by our opponents. Their concerns are the Superferry's as well, but we have not taken the extreme and pessimistic position they have. For instance, the traffic is basically a non-issue. Their issue is a lack of patience. It's no worse than politicians sign waving on the side of the road during the election season. The management of the Superferry has expressed to its employees that additional lots and routes as back-up plans are available to us in the event of major traffic issues. One traffic concern of mine, however, is that the Maui terminal needs a limited protestor area like Kauai does for the safety of the protestors, customers, and employees. I'm not against their freedom of speech, but during the first full days of operations, the protestors caused unnecessary "rubbernecking" and unneeded pedestrian traffic around our entrance. Also, there was a protestor that tripped and fell near the outside of our entry gate - a place he shouldn't have been. As the on-duty officer we hired went to assist him, one of our employees was getting verbally harassed along the fence line while this took place. We also don't agree with protestors bringing their young kids to the side of a public road holding signs for a cause they don't fully understand. Also, it's difficult to take certain opponent groups seriously when one moment, they want to overthrow the existing Hawaiian government and it's laws. The next moment, they're crying "follow the law". Then they follow up by threatening to jump into the harbors and violate the stated restricted zones. I ask that this session create the designated protestor areas for Maui, and reiterates that any violation of the restricted areas will be treated as a domestic terroristic threat.

In regards to the **Environmental Assessment** and/or the **Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)**, I ask that the legislators consider measures to protect the Hawaii Superferry from any false accusations

regarding the issues held against us. Certain people have reason to believe that the rock incident on Maui was an intentional and deliberate setup from our opponents. We don't want the Hawaii Superferry to be portrayed in a false, negative light because of stunts like this. For example, how would you know if an opponent wouldn't intentionally spread an invasive specie to an island in an attempt to falsely accuse the Superferry during the assessment and/or EIS? And if the Hawaii Superferry must conduct these studies, you must require similar businesses such as the Pacific Whale Foundation to do the EA and/or EIS with the same conditions the Hawaii Superferry might be subject to.

Please consider the consequences that will occur if the Hawaii Superferry does not operate. Hawaii will have to repay the \$40 million. You will lose a valuable, state-of-the-art alternative mode of transportation, and the people of Hawaii will probably never have another opportunity to have a service like this from this company or any other similar companies. You are also at risk to be sued by the Hawaii Superferry. Young Brothers would continue its monopoly, and probably raise their prices knowing there won't be any direct or indirect competition in sight. Hawaii will lose many potential business prospects. Airline rates will go up. And these are just to name a few results of that decision. On top of that, you'd still have the whale collisions and the spread of invasive species.

For the majority of this ordeal, you have been asked to look at the negatives. However, I encourage you to consider the optimistic viewpoint. Consider the power of Hawaii's faith-based groups, the positive influence of clubs and organizations, the wise counsel and guidance of grandma and grandpa on the neighbor island, and so on. For every evil entity brought up before you by our opponents - the criminals, drug dealers, gamblers, car thieves, greedy fishermen, possessive individuals, etc. - rest assured that Hawaii has many good entities greater then them. My extended Superferry family is one of these good, uplifting, and positive groups. These groups are the ones that will help reduce crime, help break drug addictions, help the homeless become a productive member of society that can provide for themselves again, and help keep those that might stray on the right path. Many of these people have good intentions like providing for their families, but choose to do it in an illegal way because that route requires less discipline. Might I suggest that the reason these issues exist are because these people lack a purpose, they lack the support system, they lack the financial opportunity, all of which, the Hawaii Superferry can be the avenue for them to receive what they lack whether we go to them or they come to us.

Do not let these negative voices cloud your judgment. Hawaii can have the happy-medium where we have the newest technologies and modern conveniences, yet still maintain the oldest of traditions and the beauty of the islands. The Superferry project has created an awareness and educated Hawaii on a variety of topics. Life, death, bugs, weeds, managing resources, and the like are battles that we will always have throughout life. But we still need to keep moving forward. Now is the time for you to rise above the adversity and be the leaders that take this issue and use it as a tool to better our state and the quality of life here - and it starts by bringing the Hawaii Superferry back into operation. Unfortunately I cannot attend todays meeting in Kona today because of work. I would like to state my total support for the Superferry. I find it interesting, that almost all of the people testifying against the the Superferry are asking the State to deny only the Superferry operation in the state of Hawaii, and not the other shipping and airline companies that have introduced 99% of all the invasive species, etc. to all of the islands in the past. Concerning traffic, it will certainly increase at the harbors, but it will also alleviate a substantial amount of traffic at the airports. Wouldn't that be nice! Whales, not a problem. The ferry has stated that it would travel at a reduced speed when in whale calving areas. Today 360 degree sonar and radar systems would almost eliminate any chance of a whale collision. No EIS for Young Brothers?? I've fished the Kohala coast for over 18 years and have always enjoyed watching the whales. Every year I would see whales swimming between the tugboat and the barge being towed by a 1,000+ foot steel cable. Whales are intelligent enough to discern what the tug and barge are, and they certainly avoided them. Unfortunately, I doubt that they have a clue what the long cable is. Sometime I would see whales with calves swimming between the barge and tug and wondered if they would collide with the cable. I'm sure if this happened we would not know or be told about it.

It would be extremely short sighted if the main reason that the senate is doing this is because the state is funding a portion of the harbor upgrades for this particular enterprise. All of the shipping transportation systems should be required to submit an EIS every-time they upgrade or add to their business infrastructure, even if the state doe's not fund the upgrades. Airlines included, and all retroactively. Add a flight provide an EIS. Add a barge, provide an EIS. Add a highway, provide an EIS. Not requiring ALL transportation systems to provide an EIS will only ensure that invasive species, traffic problems, etc. will persist.

Obviously, if those testifying against the ferry were really interested in stopping the spread of invasive species, potential traffic problems or even the rare whale collision, they would also insist that all transportation systems be required to do so. - It denies the County any ability to regulate the superferry.
- It sets a precedent that our courts may be over-ruled by legislators meeting in a "special session" while the public is given only 2 minutes to comment.

I DO NOT SUPPORT A SPECIAL SESSION TO PASS THE SUPERFERRY BILL.

IF YOU PASS THIS BILL I ASK THAT YOU INCLUDE MAUI TOMORROW'S 29 CONDITIONS. MAHALO,

Superferry Operating Conditions

Submitted to the Legislature on Behalf of Maui Tomorrow

We strongly oppose operation of Hawaii Superferry during the time it takes to prepare an EA or an EIS. Such operations violate unambiguous Hawai'i law. Maui Circuit Court Judge Joseph E. Cardoza correctly found that such operations caused the possibility of irreparable harm to marine mammals and an increased rate of alien species introductions.

Evidence received during the hearings made it obvious that the Hawaii Superferry project "may" have a significant effect on the environment and, as such, a full EIS is required. Legislative recognition of this inevitability is no real concession to environmentalists.

We urge the Legislature not to pass this unconstitutional special legislation benefiting a single business, depriving us of vested Constitutional rights and violating the separation of powers by overruling a judicial decision.

If the Legislature has already decided (a) to convene a special session and (b) to allow Hawaii Superferry to operate while an EA or EIS is being prepared, it would be irresponsible of us to abandon the protection of the environment to the same administration that has been dedicated for many years to minimizing legitimate concerns about the Superferry project.

We are compelled to recommend conditions of operation to be imposed by the Legislature, not because we agree that the Superferry can operate (we do not) or because we agree with the proposed legislation or its purposes (we do not), but because it is now necessary to protect Hawai'i from the impacts of the improvident actions of the Lingle Administration and the Legislature if they were to allow the Hawaii Superferry to operate, even after a month long trial amply demonstrated that this would be unlawful and would cause irreparable harm in multiple fashions.

Based on one month of daily testimony from highly qualified experts, the consensus of prevailing expert opinion was that the following mitigation measures are absolutely required to minimize to some responsible degree the possibility of irreparable harm caused by Hawaii Superferry operations during the time it takes to prepare an EA or EIS:

CONDITIONS OF OPERATION

Protection on Marine Mammals and Turtles

- 1. Hawaii Superferry vessels shall travel in routes that are in waters that are in excess of 1000 fathoms.
- 2. If Hawaii Superferry vessels travel in a route that is in any part in waters less than 1000 fathoms, its vessels shall travel at the NOAA recommended speed of no more than 13 knots. The 13 knot limitation shall be inclusive of the first 10 miles of exists and entrances to Honolulu, Kahului and Nawiliwili harbors. At all times, regardless of fathom depth, the ferry shall travel at lesser speeds than provided above as determined by the Captain to provide safe passage to passengers and to minimize strikes of whales.
- 3. Should a Hawaii Superferry vessel strike a marine mammal, a written report of such strike shall be immediately transmitted to NOAA and any other agencies responsible for monitoring and regulating strikes.
- 4. Hawaii Superferry shall immediately apply for and receive from NOAA an incidental take permit and in engage in Section 7 consultation with NOAA regarding the impacts of its ferry operations on protected marine mammals.

Protection Against Introduction of Alien Species

- 5. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct thorough undercarriage washes of all vehicles during embarkation at all ports to help dislodge seeds, insects, and animals. Such undercarriage wash systems shall include appropriate debris traps and filters.
- 6. Hawali Superferry shall utilize sufficient vacuum stations to vacuum the floors of all vehicles

during embarkation. An Appropriate filter system to trap and contain all debris shall be employed.

- 7. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of plants or plant propagative materials.
- 8. Hawaii Superferry shall secure and pay for all costs to have a dog handler team present at all harbors to conduct inspections of all vehicles at the time of embarkation. These dogs will be utilized to prevent the inter-island transmission primarily of invasive species and secondarily, of drugs.
- 9. Hawaii Superferry shall inspect (a) the trunks of all cars, (b) the beds of all pickup trucks, © the engine compartments of all vehicles and (d) the interiors of all vehicles, items such as coolers, boxes, trunks and luggage shall be opened and inspected.
- 10. agricultural inspections shall not be conducted on a random basis. Every vehicle and passenger shall be inspected or screened.
- 11. Hawaii Superferry shall not permit the transport of fishing nets.
- 12. Hawaii Superferry shall conduct, publish and disseminate a risk assessment within three months of operation to further assess potential impacts and better identify potential mitigation options.
- 13. Hawaii Superferry shall post signage at all harbors about invasive species, Specific information about invasive species shall be disseminated during the ticketing process on Hawaii Superferry's website. Said signage and information shall have been reviewed and approved by a representative of the Maui Invasive Species Committee.

Protection of Customary Native Hawaiian Practices

- 14. Passengers, upon checking in at a harbor, shall declare whether they intend to camp at any destination island. Hawaii Superferry shall disseminate to all passengers who have declared their intent to camp written rules and procedures for camping on the destination island.
- 15. Passengers shall only camp at Federal, State and County campgrounds at destination islands, and then only if they can demonstrate upon checking in that they have obtained in advance permits to camp at those campgrounds.
- 16. Passengers shall not be permitted to transport to another island cultural or natural resources or products from the ocean, from the shoreline or from the inlands of another island, unless the can demonstrate through a written receipt that the have purchased these items from a legitimate commercial establishment.
- 17. Should Hawaii Superferry, through the inspection process, discover an attempt to transport natural resources to another island, this transport shall be disallowed and Hawaii Superferry shall immediately notify local DLNR DOCAR officials.

Agricultural Inspections

- 18. There shall be two (2) qualified Department of Agriculture agricultural inspectors present and participating in agricultural inspections at all times of embarkation and disembarkation at each port. The DOA inspectors shall supervise all HSF screeners.
- 19. Hawaii Superferry, as an impact fee, shall pa all costs of the agricultural inspectors required in the foregoing paragraph.
- 20. The State Department of Transportation, in conjunction with the Governor, the State Legislature, and the Department of Agriculture shall forthwith allocate positions and funds for the additional agricultural positions necessary to staff the inspection personnel set forth in paragraph 18 above.
- 21. Hawaii Superferry shall post a bond in the amount of \$40,000,000.00 to reimburse the State for the

balance of the funds due, in the event that the Hawaii Superferry does not operate or refuses to follow mitigation measures required b the EIS.

Permission to Operate Applies Only to the Alakai

22. The permission to operate in this Bill is limited solely to the operation of the Alakai and shall not extend to any other vessel or vessels operated b Hawaii Superferry. The "no action" provisions of Chapter 343 shall be fully applicable to all other Superferry vessels, except for the Alakai.

Time Limits

- 23. Hawaii Superferry shall not be able to utilize the lack of a time deadline in HRS Chapter 343 for the completion of the EIS as a means to keep operating for whatever period of time it may take to prepare an EIS. The Alakai shall not be entitled to operate after the expiration of the last day of the fifteenth (15th) month after the date of the adoption of this legislation.
- 24. These conditions of operation shall, however, be applicable to any and all Hawaii Superferries irrespective of whether they operate before or after the preparation of the EIS.

Verification of Compliance

- 25. Designated representatives of Plaintiff groups shall be entitled to verify Hawaii Department of Transportation's and Hawaii Superferry's compliance with all the foregoing.
- 26. In order to accomplish the foregoing, the designated representatives of Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et. al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3) shall be granted access to all State lands granted at all ports to Hawaii Superferry for its operations

Enforcement of Conditions

- 27. The foregoing conditions of operation may be enforced by the Attorney General of the State of Hawai'i and by Plaintiffs in Sierra Club et .al. v. HDOT: Civil No. 05-1-0114(3).
- 28. These conditions may be enforced in any Circuit Court in the State of Hawaii and the prevailing party shall be entitled to the reimbursement of reasonable attorney's fees and costs.
- 29. An allowable remedy in any such enforcement action shall be the cessation of Hawaii Superferry operations until and unless compliance is achieved with the foregoing conditions.

Aloha to the members of the Senate Committee:

Our family operates a Certified Organic farm and the only dairy on the Garden Island. We have farmed here for over thirty years, so we have some firsthand knowledge of what it is to be an endangered species. Our position is that there should be no exemptions to an EIS for Superferry. The existing environmental law should be upheld.

We do not trust the expertise of the employees of Superferry to recognize the dangers of agricultural hitchhikers. Our feeling is that each vehicle should receive a minimum 5 minute inspection prior to boarding. With the potential of 282 vehicles per trip, we know that there is no way that this will happen.

We do not accept the argument that Superferry is no different than Young Bros. or Matson. We receive monthly feed shipments on Young Brothers and, through the years, have also shipped vehicles and equipment. With YB, for example, vehicles are accepted only on certain days and the policy is that the vehicle must be empty prior to shipment. Vehicles are inspected and there is no rush or hurry when cargo is dropped or picked up at the docks.

We are very concerned about the "bringings and takings" of the Superferry. When Superferry brings the mongoose, what will happen to our free-range flock of laying hens which is so important to our sustainable agriculture enterprise? Kauai is the only island where this egg-eating, bird-eating pest has not gained a foothold. Did you know that a female mongoose produces three litters per year with 3-6 per litter? What about our nene, albatross, shearwater, and other ground-nesting birds? These are also susceptible to the imported fire-ant. A seemingly innocent potted plant brought over as a gift can contain thousands of undetected eggs. Fire-ants have been known to kill baby goats and geese in my native state of Texas. And what about agricultural theft? Here on Kaua'i, the farm community is closely-knit and we have a network of protection because we know who grows what. We reject the idea that Superferry will help farmers get our crops to markets on Oahu. Why would we pay more to ship on Superferry? Our crops will get to Oahu, all right, but not with our permission!

Ours is the most unique state in the USA. Here we have the Orchid Isle, the Friendly Isle, the Valley Isle, the Secluded Isle, the Garden Isle, and the Gathering Place. We are embraced, protected, and linked by our mother Ocean. We don't need an H-4 a.k.a Superferry to link us. So far, Superferry has only served to divide us. It is the *lack* of Interstate traffic that protects us from theft rings and kidnappings. If Superferry comes, we can no longer brag about not having to lock our houses!!

For our family, we say: Keep Kauai, Kauai. Part of her essence, part of her allure is that she is not easy. She requires and deserves that humans must make an extra effort to experience her. It certainly does take us Kauaians a lot of extra effort to call her our home. But we know that she is worth it. To our neighbors on Oahu, e komo mai. But please, we beg you, our lawmakers don't take the side of the Superferry. It is the Superferry who will take the irreplaceable from all of us! The following is written testimony regarding the Superferry special session and the bill under consideration to exempt an inter island ferry service to begin operations without undergoing an environmental review.

Please do not usurp the separate but equal powers of government. The courts have decided on this issue. Public opinion should not be the sole driver behind this legislation. Exemptions of environmental law is not sound business development policies. Procedures are in place that put the common good ahead of corporate profit. The mistakes of the Lingle administration should not be covered up with this proposed exemption.

The unfortunate and regrettable situation of the Hawaii Superfiasco has been totally unnecessary and absolutely avoidable. Governor Lingle and HIDOT Director Fukunaga led the HSF corporation down the garden path with the mantra of 'don't single out the Superferry'. I am extremely concerned about the impact of the Superferry on the transport of invasive species around the State. I live in Hilo, and have become accustomed to the obnoxious, loud singing of the coqui frogs in my neighborhood. This past summer, I had the chance to spend a few days with a friend in Manoa. It took me a while to figure out why I had trouble falling asleep at her house. At last I understood - my busy brain was trying to figure out why it was so eerily quiet. THERE WERE NO FROGS! I had forgotten how peaceful a night's sleep could be.

I know from personal experience that coquis like to travel by car. I have found coquis hanging out on my neighbor's truck. He carries them around the island with him. This happens as a daily occurrence here. If he drives onto the ferry, he will take these frogs with him to Oahu. It will be so sad when every neighborhood in the State has to deal with the nuisance and environmental impact of coqui frogs, Miconia, bocconia, banana poka, and even worse! things that could arrive here in the future.

Greetings Senators! My name is Rick Warshauer, I'm a conservation biologist from Volcano on the Big Island, and I have some serious concerns about the special bill that this special session is hearing. I could not find a bill number or name for it, so I'll just call it the Supervector Smokescreen Bill.

Why bother to require any washing or inspections of vehicles and cargo? We know that such inspections are not effective, otherwise Hawaii would not have this everincreasing pool of introduced species evading inspections and impacting Hawaii. It is not what is interdicted that counts, it is what gets past inspections and guarantines that are problematic. Washings need to be lengthy and thorough to be effective. These pest species include many that are adverse to native ecosystems, agriculture and our lifestyle. The few pests that are subject to control efforts cost taxpayers and businesses enormous amounts of money and lost opportunities. The adverse economic impacts and costs to attempt control of any one or a few of these pest species will exceed the cost to construct the harbor improvements required by the Supervector. It is very poor economy to risk spreading pest species to islands which still lack them. Eradications of pests are very rarely achieved, and control efforts are nearly always long-term and costly. Imagine the impact of spreading the varroa mite to the Big Island, where its multi-million dollar queen bee export industry would be compromised or eliminated. Even worse, the island's existing and future agriculture potential would be curtailed by reduced or lost pollination services. The fact that not all pests are not on all islands reflects the difficulties many pests face travelling interisland on barges, airlines and cruise ships. A roll-on roll-off vessel like the Supervector is the great equalizer, however. Pests on or in vehicles and cargo will converge from all over one island, speed onto the loading ramp, travel to the next island, and then be off into many places of the next island in a matter of HOURS, not days, and thereby they avoid long storage on hot asphalt and other hazards. Noisy coqui frogs, mite-afflicted bees, damaging fountain grass seeds and many other pests travel regularly on vehicles, and cannot be effectively screened or cleaned. Either can drugs or stolen goods.

The only effective way to prevent or markedly reduce the risk of pest transfer among the islands is for the Supervector NOT TO CARRY VEHICLES on board. If during the EIS process an effective way to sanitize vehicles is proven—and I doubt that this can be done—then the decision might be revisited. Speaking of the EIS law, why require the Supervector to do the EIS at all if the bill is to make any negative findings inapplicable to the Supervector? Also, is all this Ch. 343 text in the bill just to allow further dismantling of our EIS law, and to make mockery of the public's challenge rights under Ch.91?

The Supervector is not cheap to ride. The Supervector is not safe for our economy or environment. It may cause the demise of one of our older inter-island air carriers. The Supervector tries to operate outside the law, as confirmed by our courts, and it wants you to make it a special exception to the law in its sole behalf. The Supervector has also expressed an abundance of arrogance and absence of Aloha.

So why are we here at this expensive special session? Is it from public pressure generated from misinformation and a desperate desire to turn back the clock to cheap inter-island travel? I miss those days too, but they're gone, just like the fish on O'ahu reefs that I use to catch as a kid. Please get real and DON'T let them carry vehicles on the Supervector. If they cannot make it or hack it, then tough stuff. They have pointed out their other options, so let them choose without special dispensation from you. Use your time instead to launch a study of what Hawaii really needs in ideal surface transportation.
