## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE EXPAND THE INCOME ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES OF CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAMS.

WHEREAS, it is essential that children receive adequate and sufficient meals to ensure proper health and nutrition; and

WHEREAS, children who do receive proper meals have better academic performance including improved standardized test scores, attendance, and classroom behavior; and

WHEREAS, the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) is a federally subsidized meal program that began in 1946 and operates in over 100,000 public and non-profit private schools; and

WHEREAS, the NSLP provides free or reduced-price lunches to children each day - over 31.6 million children per day received their lunch through the NSLP in fiscal year 2012, and since its inception, the program has served over 224 billion lunches; and

WHEREAS, the School Breakfast Program (SBP) is another federally subsidized meal program that was formalized in 1975 and operates in over 89,000 public and non-profit private schools; and

WHEREAS, similar to the NSLP, the SBP helps provide children with breakfast, often at no or reduced cost; in fiscal year 2012, over 12.9 million children per day received breakfast under the program with over 10.1 million receiving it for free or at a reduced cost; and

WHEREAS, these two child nutrition programs help provide nutritionally balanced meals to children every day and furthermore provide them with proper food habits, the knowledge

of what constitutes a balanced diet, and new and nutritious foods that help contribute to a proper diet; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Agriculture sets annually adjusted Income Eligibility Guidelines that are used to determine a child's eligibility for free or reduced-price meals; and

WHEREAS, these guidelines are 130 percent and 185 percent of that year's Federal income poverty guidelines for free and reduced-price meals, respectively; and

WHEREAS, at the beginning of the 2012 school year in Hawaii, there were 180,482 students enrolled in the Hawaii Child Nutrition Program with 74,174 receiving free meals and 19,816 receiving reduced-cost meals; and

WHEREAS, an increase in Income Eligibility Guidelines would expand the nutrition programs to allow more children to be eligible for free and reduced-cost meals; now, therefore,

 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Second Special Session of 2013, that the United States Department of Agriculture is requested to expand the Income Eligibility Guidelines to 150 percent and 200 percent of Federal income poverty guidelines for free and reduced-cost meals, respectively; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; United States Secretary of Agriculture; United States Secretary of Education; Superintendent, Hawaii Department of Education; and Chairperson, Hawaii Board of Education.
