Dear Chairs Rhoads and Luke, and Members of both the House Committees on Judiciary and Finance:

I am writing to voice my opposition to Bill SB1.

If this were simply a matter equal rights, this measure would be another matter altogether. But what is being sought here is the re-definition---or rather, deconstruction---of marriage as we have understood it. Gov. Abercrombie is ignoring the prerogatives of the Legislature---whether from his own Progressive agenda, or in response to the gay rights activists who have purchased his loyalty, I cannot say. But this reveals his clear contempt for the legislative process and for the will of the people.

This Legislature, in defiance of a clear majority of voters who oppose this measure, is now voting on a bill that may not be debated or changed. To quote Pres. Obama, that is not what America is all about.

Marriage is not a right but a privilege, and one that the State has a direct interest in protecting, in recognizing that the family is the basic building block of society, and that the biological family is the best way to provide for the general welfare, and to protect children. Same-sex marriage advocates know that it will undefine marriage and the family to the point that the family will lose its legal definition. They are quite open about this goal.

About 8 years ago, the Becket Fund for religious liberty, sponsored a symposium of legal scholars from all over the country. Many were in support of same-sex marriage—some were not. But the conclusions they came up with were startling: they all agreed that Same-Sex marriage would mean a huge, fundamental change in American law---a "dangerous train wreck", as one man put it---and that it was nearly impossible to even predict its far-reaching effects, except that churches were likely to lose their tax-exempt status, ministers would be required to perform gay marriages, and that religious institutions would be continually under pressure to provide services and facilities contrary to their beliefs. Chai Feldblum of Georgetown Law School said, "There can be a conflict between religious liberty and sexual liberty, but in almost all cases the sexual liberty should win because that's the only way that the dignity of gay people can be affirmed in any realistic manner."

I defy anyone in the House to express any sincere confidence in this bill's ability to prevent such discrimination. Abercrombie and others in the State House have expressed enough contempt for religious values as to destroy any confidence in their good will or the bill's resilience in resisting subsequent laws that will demand hate-crime laws to punish dissent, a pro-homosexual curriculum in the schools, and financial threats for churches that do not change their doctrines and practices. These issues are too fundamental to be decided on a bill that the Governor clearly does not want to be examined very deeply. This alone should cause this body to rise up in rejection of this strongarmed attempt to intimidate the representatives and to game the system.

The fate of human liberty and individual conscience is at stake here. Cripple religious liberty here, and no other rights are safe.

Subject: Senate Bill 1 (SB1) Relating to Equal Rights

As a community member and supporter of families, I strongly oppose SB 1 "Relating to Equal Rights" and same-gender marriage.

When I voted in 1998, I thought I was voting to prevent same-gender marriage. Certainly, our legislators and leaders know without a doubt that that was what the voters were led to believe, even if the measure was misrepresented or flawed. This is a tremendous and far-reaching issue that should be handled differently than how it is currently being handled. I respectfully request consideration of the following:

- 1. We the people should have the right to self-determine our futures in regard to marriage. This is important enough to put to a public vote.
- 2. The short time-frame of a special session does not allow adequate public input and well-written amendments. We see this as a strategy, and are deeply disappointed in our legislators' willingness to accept this. If the proponents of this bill deeply believe that their bill is pono, then it should be pono in a few months. I understand the statement, justice delayed is justice denied, but justice not well executed, is not justice at all.
- 3. Our U.S. Congress should be made responsible to refine our national laws to adequately insure federal benefits for civil unions, and not force States to redefine marriages, thereby placing a stranglehold on us and splitting our community.
- 4. As an alternative, perhaps our Legislature can take alternate measures to define civil unions within the context of our State law, for the sole purpose of meeting Federal benefit requirements for marriage without redefining marriage itself.
- 5. The exemptions provided for religious organizations should be broadened. For some churches and professional wedding-related services, it could only take a single legal action to close their doors or end their livelihoods.
- 6. I have heard some wise legislators state that good legislation usually results in both sides not totally being satisfied. I see this bill progressing with the proponents clearly having everything to gain with no concessions.

Lastly, I personally believe in equal rights, but also have deep religious convictions. When I think of my two children, I ask myself, "in which marriage context would they benefit the most?" I acknowledge that there are wonderful single parent families and same-gender parents in our communities, as well as traditional couples who should not be endowed with children. The right to parent is not my issue here. But my conclusion is that there are intended and unique attributes of a mother and a father as parents that provides the very best perspective for our children, and a parental relationship that could only be afforded through this arrangement.

He was allowed to reject my partner's rent check when I ran out of checks, thereby declaring "MY" rent delinquent. I ended up having to go and get cash (untraceable) and pay. With the laws as they are, the only thing that will keep my disabled partner, myself and our pets off the street, is if the particular judge is "pro" or "Anti" same sex recognition, instead of using the LAW. When I say disabled, Look at the whole Front page of THE GARDEN ISLAND newspaper, last Sunday Oct 27 and Monday Oct 28. "Tony's plight", took up half the entire Front page for 2 days.

(not related to the marriage equality article that took up the other half of the Suunday from page.) That is my partner.

17 years ago, when I was suddenly admitted into the hospital ER, then admitted for 7 days, this same partner was not allowed to even come in or see me or learn my status, let alone assert my medical wishes because my mother (who was anti-gay) refused to put his name on the visitor list, medical information release list, etc(because I was unconscious and family having deference over "friends", got to fill out the admitting paperwork.)

We are both getting on in years, but if either of us die, the other gets NO benefit of the others' life-longearned social security or ANY government benefit that Heterosexuals take for granted and get automatically.

If I had more time (I am, right now, drafting court documents, instead of caring for my very ill partner), I could spend an afternoon citing outrageous examples, over 27 years, where we were legally cheated out of multimillion dollar businesses, dropped from life, health and disability insurance, etc.etc. as a direct result of us not being able to use protections in the law, automatically given to legally married couples.

I would welcome the opportunity to share in more detail the REAL life effects of being a 2nd rate citizen.

Comments: A special session is simply not enough time to adequately discuss the most controversial issue of our time. Since no amendments can be made, public testimony and legislative concerns cannot be accommodated and democracy is denied. None of the other 27 states in which same sex marriage is not legal, is rushing to consider such legislation. I am here to testify in strong support of SB 1.

Some 61 years ago when I wore these shoes (Held up baptismal shoes). My parents took me into our local church and had me baptized a Christian. There hope was that becoming a part of the church so early that there would never come a day when I did not feel a part of God's family. Today I have been referred to as 'they' as 'them'. I hear fundamentalist churches tell me that I am less than and not worthy of the right to express my religious freedom by entering into marriage with the one I love.

Religious extremism is not new:

About 60 years ago another civil rights issue dominated the political sphere: interracial marriage. Christians spewed Bible verses from the Old Testament that clearly showed that God did not want his chosen people mixing with other cultures. And more recently: In October 1996, a woman had the tip of her thumb cut off for wearing nail varnish. In May 1997, five female employees conducting research for an emergency feeding program were forced from their vehicle by members of the religious police. The religious zealots used a public address system to insult and harass the women before striking them with a metal and leather whip.

And the list goes on. Yes we are used to those who would deny others the right to practice religious freedom because it differs from their own. And yes we are used to politicians who cower to those extremist views rather than standing for the rights of the minority. However this should not be the case in America and it certainly should NOT be the case in Hawaii nei.

This is NOT about accommodation nor is it about Religious freedom, those are both guaranteed in the laws of our land. What this is about is the freedom to marry the person you love. It is about a basic freedom that should not be denied to anyone. Yet today I am still denied 1,138 federal rights that are afforded married couples. Marriage & Civil Unions

How is a civil union different from marriage?

Couples who have a civil union will not have any of the protections or responsibilities federal law provides to married couples. These include social security survivors' and spousal benefits, federal veterans' spousal benefits, immigration rights associated with marriage, federal spousal employment benefits, the right to file joint federal tax returns, exemptions from income tax on your partner's health benefits, the federal exemption from inheritance tax, and many other federal protections which are denied same-sex couples whether legally joined in a civil union or a civil marriage.

Also, most other states will not recognize the legal status of your civil union, even though they would recognize the Illinois marriage of a different-sex couple. This means that when you travel or if you move to another state or country, your union may not be recognized. As a result, you should considering taking certain precautions before you travel, such as executing health care and financial powers of attorney and carrying those with you.

Finally, the most important difference between civil unions and marriage for many individuals is the second-class nature of civil unions. Civil marriage is a widely recognized and respected social structure for two people who have committed to build their life together. Civil unions are not universally understood. It is unclear whether they will be given the same level of respect as marriage in Illinois and elsewhere. What is already clear is that different-sex couples get to choose whether to enter a civil marriage or a civil union; lesbian and gay male couples are given only the civil union option.

Dear Chairs Rhoads and Luke, and Members of both the House Committees on Judiciary and Finance:

I am writing to voice my opposition to Bill SB1. I hope to testify in person.

If this were simply a matter equal rights, this measure would be another matter altogether. But what is being sought here is the re-definition---or rather, deconstruction---of marriage as we have understood it. Gov. Abercrombie is ignoring the prerogatives of the Legislature---whether from his own Progressive agenda, or in response to the gay rights activists who have purchased his loyalty, I cannot say. But this reveals his clear contempt for the legislative process and for the will of the people.

This Legislature, in defiance of a clear majority of voters who oppose this measure, is now voting on a bill that may not be debated or changed. To quote Pres. Obama, that is not what America is all about.

Marriage is not a right but a privilege, and one that the State has a direct interest in protecting, in recognizing that the family is the basic building block of society, and that the biological family is the best way to provide for the general welfare, and to protect children. Same-sex marriage advocates know that it will undefine marriage and the family to the point that the family will lose its legal definition. They are quite open about this goal.

About 8 years ago, the Becket Fund for religious liberty, sponsored a symposium of legal scholars from all over the country. Many were in support of same-sex marriage—some were not. But the conclusions they came up with were startling: they all agreed that Same-Sex marriage would mean a huge, fundamental change in American law---a "dangerous train wreck", as one man put it---and that it was nearly impossible to even predict its far-reaching effects, except that churches were likely to lose their tax-exempt status, ministers would be required to perform gay marriages, and that religious institutions would be continually under pressure to provide services and facilities contrary to their beliefs. Chai Feldblum of Georgetown Law School said, "There can be a conflict between religious liberty and sexual liberty, but in almost all cases the sexual liberty should win because that's the only way that the dignity of gay people can be affirmed in any realistic manner."

I defy anyone in the House to express any sincere confidence in this bill's ability to prevent such discrimination. Abercrombie and others in the State House have expressed enough contempt for

religious values as to destroy any confidence in their good will or the bill's resilience in resisting subsequent laws that will demand hate-crime laws to punish dissent, a pro-homosexual curriculum in the schools, and financial threats for churches that do not change their doctrines and practices. These issues are too fundamental to be decided on a bill that the Governor clearly does not want to be examined very deeply. This alone should cause this body to rise up in rejection of this strong-armed attempt to intimidate the representatives and to game the system.

The fate of human liberty and individual conscience is at stake here. Cripple religious liberty here, and no other rights are safe.

This is such a controversial issue with heavy consequences. People have very strong and passionate feelings on both sides. I do not believe it should be decided by the legislature or the court.

The issue of "gay marriage" should be put to a VOTE by the people.

If the legislative body refuses to let the people decide and is determined to pass a "gay marriage" bill on their own, then I would ask them to create a religious exemption that actually works:

- 1. The religious exemption in the bill must be rewritten to include individuals and business owners.
- 2. The exemption must be worded in such a way that there is iron-clad protection for religious organizations, their members, their affiliates and their facilities.
- 3. The condition that houses of worship be exclusive to members is preposterous, unconstitutional and must be changed.

I echo the words stated by Ms. Rachel Murdock on Oct 16, 2013 of:

"... it must be understood that the majority of people of faith do not oppose "gay marriage" because they are bigoted or homophobic. It is because they sincerely believe that religious scripture (i.e. God) prohibits homosexuality and that to participate in it is a sin. At the same time we recognize that we are all sinners and we all have the free agency to live our lives the way we chose. Still, people of faith have the right to stand for truth and righteousness at all times, and in all things, and in all places. As backward as some of these sentiments may seem to more secular minded groups and individuals, a certain amount of tolerance on their part is also needed. In my view, religious liberty takes precedence over "gay marriage." While the founders of our country generally stated that we have the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," they found it important enough to specifically guarantee that no law should prohibit the free exercise of religion.

Keeping in mind that *individuals* and religious organizations have the right to NOT be coerced into doing something that goes against their religious principles, please read *carefully*, section 572-G of the proposed bill which you can <u>download here</u>. The language of the bill grants priests and bishops of any denomination the right to refuse or solemnize any marriage and frees them from being subject to fines, penalties or other civil actions.

However, there are three conditions that must be met by religious organizations in order to exempt them from legal harassment should they refuse to make their facilities available to same-sex weddings.

1. The religious facility is regularly used by the religious organization for its religious purposes.

- 2. The religious organization restricts use of the religious facility exclusively to its members.
- 3. The religious organization does not operate the religious facility as a for-profit business.

If ANY of these three conditions are not met, then the protection of the section does not cover that religious facility. Condition (2) is the most head scratching line because almost all houses of worship that I know of, DO NOT restrict their facility (i.e. chapel) exclusively to its members. Most churches welcome visitors not of their faith and therefore this condition voids the entire so called "religious exemption." This could force churches to become exclusive or stop solemnizing marriage all together. This is completely unacceptable."

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

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
