Dear Chair Rhoads, Chair Luke, and Members of the Committees on Judiciary and Finance:

My testimony covers the impact of marriage equality on Hawai'i's economy over the next three years (2014-2016). I am a Professor with the Dept. of Economics, UH-Mānoa, and a Research Fellow with the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization, UH-Mānoa. In February 2013, I prepared a report (with Lauren Gabriel, William S. Richardson School of Law, UH-Mānoa) that estimated:

- The number of Hawai'i same-sex couples—**1,957 couples**—likely to marry over the 2014-2016 period;
- Additional tourism and wedding industry spending over the next three years triggered by weddings and marriage celebrations of Hawai'i and US couples and honeymoons of US couples (\$217 million).
- The number of same-sex spouses who would elect to be covered as a spousal beneficiary on their spouse's employer-provided health insurance.

We updated our report in July 2013 to reflect the two US Supreme Court rulings in the California Proposition 8 case and the DOMA case. Our conclusion is that the two decisions open the door to big flows of new spending in the Hawai'i tourism and wedding industries over the 2014-2016 period if Hawai'i were to enact marriage equality. We expect that marriage equality in Hawai'i will bring US same-sex couples, guests of US same-sex couples, and guests of Hawai'i same-sex couples to Hawai'i to marry, celebrate a marriage or honeymoon. More specific conclusions follow.

- The U.S. Supreme Court's decision allowing same-sex marriage to resume in California is particularly important for Hawai'i's tourism industry, as the addition of California increases the proportion of Hawai'i's visitors from states with marriage equality from 18 percent to 54 percent. We estimate **\$167 million** in additional spending over the 2014-2016 period by same-sex couples from states with marriage equality (and their guests) visiting Hawai'i to marry, celebrate their marriage or honeymoon.
- The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in the DOMA case has opened the door to a limited set of federal rights for all same-sex couples regardless of whether the couple lives in a state with marriage equality. Same-sex couples from states without marriage equality can travel to another state with marriage equality to marry and thereby gain access to the limited set of federal rights. Some of these couples would choose to marry and/or honeymoon in Hawai'i ff Hawaii enacted marriage equality. Including

spending from marriages and honeymoons of same-sex couples from states without marriage equality increases total additional spending to **\$217 million** over the 2014-2016 period.

- We estimate that marriage equality in Hawai'i will likely increase State of Hawai'i and City and County of Honolulu general excise tax revenues by **\$10.2 million** over the 2014-2016 period. State income tax revenues would also increase, but we have not estimated their exact magnitude.
- Without access to same-sex marriage in Hawai'i, many local same-sex couples will choose to gain access to federal marriage rights by traveling to the U.S. mainland to marry. The absence of marriage equality in Hawai'i raises wedding costs for Hawai'i's same-sex couples and their families and friends living in Hawai'i, harms the Hawai'i wedding industry, and diverts spending by wedding guests from Hawai'i hotels, restaurants, retail, etc. to their counterparts in the mainland United States.
- Marriage equality in Hawai'i should produce substantial federal tax savings for married same-sex Hawai'i couples with a spouse as a beneficiary on the other spouse's employer-paid health insurance. Marriage equality will also allow married Hawai'i same-sex couples to become eligible to draw spousal benefits from the social security program, as benefits are based on whether the state of residence recognizes a couple's marriage.

Chairs, Vice Chairs, and members of the Committees:

Thank you for scheduling a public hearing for this bill on a very important issue. I appreciate the time and effort that previous legislators have made to listen to individuals on this issue and the time and effort you have made to listen us this day on this issue.

I stand in strong opposition to SB1. I support HB 8, 11, 12. I represent family and friends on neighbor islands who could not afford to take off from work and fly to Oahu to testify the same. I also represent friends and family on this island who could not take off from work today to testify the same. I am a newly tenured public middle school teacher preparing to be married in a few months and start a family. I believe in hard work. I believe in doing the right thing even if at times it requires me to give up the things I want. As a teacher, one gets used to sacrifice. I serve this state well in teaching young minds. In fact, my students were sad to hear that I wasn't going to be with them today. While most students cheer at the thought of getting a substitute teacher, my classroom echoed with moans when I told them. I do not share this to boast, but to demonstrate the fact that the students in class C203 at Ilima Intermediate know how it feels to be cared about and loved. They know that because I am willing to do the difficult things. I listen to what I know is right in my heart and go out of my way to show them I care. That, to me, is the definition of love, and the kind of love required to make a lasting relationship, even a lasting marriage.

The decision of the United States Supreme Court to rule Section 3 of the Defense of Marriage Act unconstitutional in 2013 simply deemed it unconstitutional to restrict same sex couples the federal rights by those of heterosexual couples. It does not require our state to redefine marriage. Allow loving individuals the rights to take care of their families, but do not redefine marriage. The decisions to do so by others in our country and other countries have been made only within this past decade. It is too early for us to truly quantify the repercussions this decision could have here in Hawaii. In Canada, schools have mandated curriculum teaching students that it's okay to have sex with those of the same gender (see: http://www.hwdsb.on.ca/wp-content/uploads/2012/05/Sexual-Orientation-Directive.pdf). Christian and non-Christian co-workers alike have told me they notice students experimenting with same sex behaviors, even those who don't identify as being gay. Students see it as a fun experience that is now more socially acceptable. Is that okay? Even to the gay community?

Supporters of SB1 say that opposing this bill takes away people's right to love freely. I disagree and am hurt to be accused of not having love in my heart because I don't believe in sexual freedom. The promises made in marriage are of the highest forms of love, and love is about sacrifice and self-restraint. It is about doing what's right even at the cost of oneself. It is not about sexual preference. My fiancé and I have been together for 3 years. We are not perfect by any means. We fall short of truly loving each other. We don't always sacrifice and restrain our wants, but ultimately, we know that's the kind of love that will keep our marriage strong. We personally have committed ourselves to abstinence. However funny it sounds, our sexual preference would be to have sex now! 🙂 I may have other sexual attractions throughout the course of our marriage that may hurt him. He may as well. But I am training myself now, by not acting on my sexual attractions to restrain myself in the name of love. My fiancé and I choose not to act on our sexual attraction because we know teaching ourselves self-restraint is the highest manifestation of love. Some may say, how can I compare myself to those who have a real attraction for the same sex? I may need to continue to further examine the issue and I apologize sincerely if this testimony has weaknesses or hurts others. But I speak from my heart and I speak my truth keeping in mind that I too, am not perfect. I know that even some gays agree with me on this issue. For example, I have a gay friend who came out in 2006, who believes that marriage still should be defined as that between a man and a woman. He has since married a woman and they have a happy and loving family in California. He believes that love is not just about sexual preference.

Please representatives, do not rush the decision to pass this bill. As a future mother, I fully intend to continue working hard to advocate for the family and well-being of our society. I also fully intend to continue working as an educator and empowering young individuals with knowledge to improve themselves and therefore continue to improve our society. Most importantly, since we are all here about this particular issue, I fully intend to continue being a sincere friend to my homosexual friends. I love them with all my heart. I will advocate for harmoniously living with those who are different from me, even homosexuals. Give these same sex couples their rights, but do not redefine marriage. I pray that when I talk to my children about what love means and the kind of love that marriage requires, I will not be muted by the loud sounds of society saying that sexual sanctity is a thing of the past. I pray that my rights as an individual will not be taken away to practice my beliefs if public schools were mandated to condone sexual freedom.
