The hearing notice specifies that written testimony may be submitted up to 24 hours prior to the start of the hearing.

So for electronic testimony, make sure you submit it before <u>10:00 a.m.</u>, <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>October 30</u>, <u>2013</u>.

There is no special format required for written testimony.

That said, you will want to make sure to:

- Include your name (you'd be surprised how often this gets overlooked!).
- Address your testimony to the committee (in this case, "The House Committees on Judiciary and Finance").
- Mention the measure you are testifying on (SB1).

In particular, I am extremely appreciative of Pope Francis's statements about non-judgement, and recognition that the Church's obsession with sexual issues has been harmful. I wish that some of our local church leaders would heed his words, and open their minds to allow the same evolution in thinking that the Pope, the President, and millions of others have experienced in recent years. I wish that they could see the people that I see at Dignity services every week - kind and faithful people whose love is unquestionably a blessing from God. I have seen people who have been together for decades, through sickness and health and all kinds of hardship, while being denied recognition of the validity of their relationships and equal rights under the law. The separation of church and state is necessary in order to preserve the integrity of both institutions. Religious liberty is a cornerstone of democracy, and it includes not only the freedom to practice the religion of your choice, but also the promise that the government will not make decisions based on preference for the religious beliefs of one group over another. We allow people to eat pork, cut their beards, and work on Sundays, even though there are people who believe that these things are sinful. If someone were to claim that it was necessary to prevent anyone from ever eating pork in order to preserve "religious freedom," we would instantly recognize this as a logical fallacy. Just as the intrusion of religion on legislative decision making threatens democracy, so does the over-politicization of the church threaten its primary purpose of attending to the spiritual needs of its followers. The repercussions of this have been felt in many religious institutions, as many people, particularly younger people who overwhelmingly support equality for LGBT people, have become disillusioned with religious leaders that have been more focused on

influencing politics and promoting discrimination than on true spiritual ministry. I believe that recognition of the sanctity of same-sex relationships is an important religious issue, and hope to see major changes in denominations that currently endorse inequality. However, I also believe that religious concerns should be wholly separated from legislative decisions. Legally, there is no justification for this kind of discrimination. Dear Chair Rhoads, Chair Luke, and members of the House Committees on Judiciary and Finance, Today is my wife's and my 32nd wedding anniversary. The first thing I said this morning, not long after opening my eyes, was "Happy Anniversary." I posted news of my anniversary to my Facebook friends, and by midday I had 60 or so "likes" and congratulations. We are so lucky, my wife and I. Among my friends who are generously sending their best wishes are people who have lost their spouses, people who are divorced, people who never found their life partners and, of course, people who were not allowed to marry. This last category is especially poignant since this 32nd anniversary of mine falls during the special legislative session now convened in Hawaii to consider whether our state should allow gay couples to marry and whether it should recognize the marriages of gay people from other states. Thirty two years ago, in Connecticut, my wife and I made vows to each other in front of our friends and families about how we would spend our lives together and what we would endeavor to be for each other throughout our marriage. We spent an inordinate amount of time crafting those vows to our mutual agreement because we believed they were important. We spoke them out loud, as you do when you get married, because we were proclaiming them to all. The chapel rang its bells at the end of our service to announce to the whole town what had just happened. Marriage is a unique and unusual experience that everyone should have the opportunity to enjoy. My wife and I knew that we were entering a profession in which people move a lot and in which couples often find themselves in different locations for extended periods. It's one of the reasons we decided to marry. In 32 years and counting we never needed to think twice about whether our marriage would still be relevant when we moved to a different state, which it turns out we did often. We never worried when we were in different locations, even living in different states sometimes, because we knew that, if something happened, our friends, families, and even the legal system would endeavor to find our spouse. I think back on the probably hundreds of times that I have written "spouse" down on a form next to my wife's name and thereby taken advantage of mountains of legal and societal favoritism because of our relationship. But legalities aside, there is the special meaning that attaches to the state of marriage as we now view it. Even as non-religious people who were pretty carefree in our youth and who, in fact, were really not that interested in getting married, my wife and I still decided to exchange vows in a chapel in front of a gathering of people. Why? Simply

put, it was because we loved each other and we wanted to celebrate that love with the other important people in our lives in the unique and special way that our society recognizes. We wanted our ohanas, our families broadly defined, to participate in our union, and we wanted the world to agree that we were united in marriage. Once you do that, you're all in it together, and that's the point of marriage. My gay friends who are in committed relationships announce their "anniversaries" from time to time on Facebook. They get a lot of "likes" and congratulations too. But I know they are keenly aware that their anniversaries have quotes around them. They are not real wedding anniversaries, and that matters. Those of us with the privilege of marriage don't celebrate the day we met, the day we moved in together, the day we "knew," or even the day we became engaged. No, we celebrate the day we stood in front of friends and family and vowed to spend our lives together. Gay people want to dream about that day too, and I hope that soon in Hawaii, and then the rest of our country, they will. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

There is a great deal of emotional language - and frank vitriol - surrounding the issue of marriage equality. This is a polarizing issue, to be sure, and many have voiced their own opinions (legal, spiritual, emotional) in this process. I am a student physician, and cannot help but look to an evidence-based perspective. There is a large and growing body of consistent evidence, on the subject of marriage equality / inequality and its ramifications. The vast majority of objective peerreviewed studies on this issue have demonstrated a) that introduction of laws supporting marriage equality does not adversely affect either same-sex or heterosexual individuals. and b) that laws banning same-sex marriage are associated with adverse outcomes. As a representative example, I cite 'The Impact of Institutional Discrimination on Psychiatric Disorders in Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Populations: A Prospective Study' (Hatzenbuehler et al, American Journal of Public Health, 03/2010). This is a large, prospective study which followed >30,000 individuals nationwide between 2001-2005. The authors assessed rates of DSM-IV-defined psychiatric diagnoses and stratified data in well-matched groups on the basis of LGBT orientation and whether the individual lived in a state which passed legislation banning same-sex marriages over this period. "Results: Psychiatric disorders defined by the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, Fourth Edition, increased significantly between waves [2001-2002] and [2004-2005] among LGB respondents living in states that banned gay marriage for the following outcomes; any mood disorder (36.6% increase), generalized anxiety disorder (248.2% increase), any alcohol use disorder (41.9% increase), and psychiatric comorbidity (36.3% increase). These psychiatric disorders did not increase significantly among LGB respondents living in states without constitutional amendments. Additionally, we found no evidence for increases of the same magnitude among heterosexuals living in states with constitutional amendments." The authors conclude that legislation banning same-sex marriage is strongly associated with adverse mental health outcomes among the LGB community. In other words, discrimination is not benign. I emphasize that this is a representative study, and I encourage you all to look further into the supporting body of data. I encourage you to support marriage equality, in the interest of our entire community's current and continued good health. Aloha, and thank you for your time.

One topic that is never discussed when talking about marriage equality is the real financial harm that comes to couples and families who do no have the benefit I marriage. One of my specialties is Domestic Partner Planning. This is a fancy description for the mountains I work required to protect non-married spouses. Marriage provides specific inheritance benefits. One spouse may inherit the IRA or 401k of another spouse without causin a taxable event. But, as we saw in the Windsor case before the Supreme Court, an in married spouse would have to pay taxes on those benefits. Even if the couple has been together for many many years or decades. Domestic Partner Planning includes the additional expense of obtaining additional life insurance policies on both spouses to pay for the additional tax burden of the inherited accounts. This can be costly. It can also be a completely unnecessary expense if both spouses do indeed live for a long time. When children are involved it is even more costly. But simply paying a considerable amount of money over time does not end the conversation. Most tax preparers and CPAs do not even know how to complete a tax return for same sex couples. The defeat of DOMA has confused tax professionals to no end. The train ifs available to them on joint versus individual versus state (if the couple was married in another state that allows marriage equality or where the couple now resides) is a giant mess. In the end most same sex couples will feel that they are not getting fair treatment from these tax professionals because they do not know the full extent of the applicable law. It is too confusing even for the professionals. Many tax pros are simply saying that their software does not allow two spouses of the same gender in Hawaii. They feel it gets them off the hook in an area that is confusing, and the couple discrimination, either willful or not. Please pass SB1! Real people's live are being affected. With this bill passed, those federal benefits are given. Clauses 572-C and 572-D in the S1 bill cover parentage rights, benefits, and protections as well as reliance on federal law for equal treatment. 2. Economic Benefits According to a 2010 study from UCLA conducted by the Williams Institute, same sex couples would spend \$4 to \$9 million on their weddings if allowed to marry in Hawaii. Outof-state guests would spend an additional \$17 to \$40 million. This would create around 193 to 333 new jobs in Hawaii. Hawaii's economy would be gaining rather than losing. 3. Religious Freedom for EVERYONE The bill does not force religious organizations to solemnize same sex marriages if they do not want to. Instead, it allows religious organizations that believe same sex couples deserve the right to marry to solemnize their marriages. Everybody wins! 4. Union of Families A study called "Children of Lesbian and Gay Parents" conducted by Charlotte J. Patterson at the University of Virginia proved numerous times that same sex couples could raise children who had high levels of social competence.
