Chairman Rhoads, Chairwoman Luke and Members of the House Committees on Judiciary and Finance:

This testimony is in strong support of SB 1 Relating to Equal Rights and is submitted by me as a retired teacher, past teacher leader and advocate, and concerned citizen of Hawaii.

It is time for Hawaii to recognize and provide for marriage equality for same gender couples. Our state's history and legacy of inclusion, honor, respect, and ALOHA for all must continue. So, too, must our strong protection of human and civil rights. Past Hawaii Legislatures have consistently demonstrated leadership and courage in this arena. Think back to when Hawaii was the first state to pass the Equal Rights Amendment to protect the rights of women; when Hawaii was one of the first states in the nation to pass the Collective Bargaining Law for the fair treatment of public employees, and when Hawaii established the Office of Hawaiian Affairs to promote and protect our indigenous language and culture. Let's not forget that Hawaii did not wait for the Supreme Court decision in 1967 to deem anti-miscegenation laws unconstitutional. Interracial marriages were accepted and common here because our leaders and our people believed in and protected what was right for all.

SB 1 reflects the growing consensus among our families, friends, and colleagues and especially among our young people that hurtful biases, intolerance and discrimination must be rejected and replaced by mutual respect, caring and trust.

As a teacher I worked with students and parents of diverse backgrounds and one critical component of student success was parental support and involvement in a child's education. Rich or poor, local or non-local, Buddhist or Christian, gay or straight—if parents supported their child's growth and learning and were actively involved in their school work, their children responded positively. And isn't this what really matters? Parents set the foundation of success for their children. They instill the values that children carry with them into adulthood. SB1 does not relieve parents of this responsibility.

As a retired teacher, I am deeply bothered by the misrepresentations and blatant untruths offered in some people's testimony at the hearing held on Monday by the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor. Here is a sampling of the untruths reported to your Senate colleagues as well as disseminated in brochures meant to dissuade support for SB1:

- Untruth: Many claimed that as a result of Massachusetts' passage of same sex marriage, the schools' curriculum was changed to promote and communicate gay marriage.
- Truth: No adjustments to curriculum frameworks were made in Massachusetts based on the same gender marriage laws. In fact, changes to Massachusetts' comprehensive health curriculum were adopted in 1999 five years prior to passage of same gender

marriage. Changes made in 2011 only represented the adoption of the Common Core Curriculum.

- Untruth: Massachusetts required schools to offer Gay Straight Alliance Clubs as a result of passage of gay marriage.
- Truth: These clubs <u>pre-existed</u> the same gender marriage decision in Massachusetts <u>by</u> <u>at least 20 years!</u>
- Untruth: Parents do not and will not have the right to know about sensitive curriculum taught in the classrooms, even if it conflicts with their family and faith values.
- Truth: In Massachusetts control of curriculum resides in the locally-elected School
  Committee. There are no provisions that say parents cannot know about the curriculum a
  school district is offering. Furthermore, in Hawaii parents have had and continue to have
  the right to ask that their child be excluded from school activities that conflict with their
  religious beliefs, etc. It is also important to note that SB1 contains no language that relates
  to education in our schools.

The Supreme Court's recent decision compels Hawaii to move forward to ensure that same-sex couples can benefit from the same federal rights, benefits, protections and responsibilities as those currently enjoyed by other couples. This is a matter of fairness and justice. And I ask all our legislators to live up to the legacy of past legislators by passing SB 1 and ensuring that all citizens regardless of creed, race, gender or sexual orientation are afforded equal rights under the law. I believe it is your duty as a legislator to correct any wrongs and ensure equal protection to all citizens.

Fighting Discrimination with Discrimination is WRONG:

We are certified instructor in Natural Family Planning as well as teachers of Pope John Paul II Theology of the Body.

The way it is written this bill will directly lead to an attack on religious freedom. Other States have implemented much broader provisions to insure that religious organizations who oppose the concepts of this bill will be absolutely exempt from following provisions of this law.

- 1. The Catholic Church which traces its roots back 2000 years has held marriage to be a Sacrament. It requires a man and a woman to vow before God and the Church to make a total, faithful, free and fruitful commitment. The sacrament is not consummated until the one flesh union sanctifies the possibility of new life- fruitful. Aloha,

I know that you have had the opportunity to listen and read thousands of testimonies in the past week but I wanted to voice my opinion as a Christian registered Republican Woman who is in support of SB1. I know that you are going to have much more eloquent and very well thought out testimonies given than this one. I simply want to make a few points I believe that my brothers and sisters of this wonderful state have been leaving out.

First, sexual orientation is not a choice. It may not be linked to a specific gene, yet, but it is absolutely not a "lifestyle choice". For most of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century Homosexuality was considered a mental illness, however in 1974 that was changed. Studies are still being conducted to prove that Homosexuality is not in fact a mental illness. In a recent Washington Times article writer Paul Mountjoy describes the results from a 40 year study on homosexuality performed by the American Psychological Association,

Psychology recognizes people express their sexual orientation through behaviors and these behaviors designed to bond are described as holding hands, kissing and intimacy and affection. Non- affectionate behaviors include deeply felt need for love and attachment, shared goals, and values, mutual support and long term outgoing commitment.

I understand that some people do not wish to view this as scientific fact, however, just because scientists have yet to find the genetic makeup that dictates human behavior does not mean that it does not exist. Until then we are going to have to rely on the highly educated specialists of the American Psychological Association to peer into human behavior.

The second point I would like to make has to do with the issue of child rearing and procreation. Many individuals are arguing that we as humans will not be able to continue procreating if we "allow" Homosexuals to think that they are "normal". According to the Congressional Coolition on Adoption there are 400,540 children living without permanent homes in the United States alone. Once again that number is four hundred thousand five hundred forty children. Homosexual couples not being able to "procreate" can be viewed as a blessing in a world where so many children do not have family. Another argument that I often hear is about the effects on children being raised in a Homosexual home. I am sure that you have all seen Case No. S147999 in the Supreme Court of the State of California, In re Marriage Cases Judicial Council Coordination Proceeding No. 4365(...). It states,

In Colossions, Thesselonians, Philipians, every time Paul warns his brothers and sisters that following the Holy Laws will not lead to salvation. Thank you for receiving my testimony today.

My name is Antonia Alvarez and I'm a Licensed Master of Social Work (LMSW) in the State of

Hawai'i testifying in strong support of the Marriage Equality Bill (SB-01).

I work with youth around the state who are at-risk of bullying and suicidality, and I am the

Director of the GROW A RAINBOW program, to educate service providers in the community

about creating safe, equal spaces for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) youth. I am

also a trainer for the Gay, Lesbian, Straight, Education Network (GLSEN) Hawai'i Chapter, the

local branch of the national educational organization that promotes safety and equality for all

students.

At the Senate hearings on Monday we heard a lot about the "unintended consequences" of

passing the bill—opponents suggested that there would be "curricular reforms" that prevent

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teachers in public schools from mis-informing their students, that there would be mandatory trainings for teachers that would give them more information about gay and lesbian issues, and that teachers would have to refrain from sharing their personal religious beliefs with their students about these issues. I think it is very important to clarify a few things. First, this bill would not interfere in educational outcomes and success for any student. This bill is about marriage equality and the civil rights of gays and lesbians in the state of Hawai'i. Second, it is important to note that teachers in public schools who share their religious beliefs about gays and lesbians are violating the establishment clause which limits a teacher's religious expression due to the separation between church and state (<a href="http://www.firstamendmentcenter.org/teachers-">http://www.firstamendmentcenter.org/teachers-</a> religious-liberties). Third, in 2012 the Hawai'i State Department of Education already agreed to—and, in fact requested resources from GLSEN for their faculty, staff, and administration to raise awareness about LGBT youth and families in order to implement the Department of Education "Strategic Plan Student Priority of "Safety and Well-Being," to promote students' not change that.

Instead, I would like to discuss some of the INTENDED CONSEQUENCES should this bill not pass. By not passing this legislation, the Hawai'i State Legislature signals that it does not believe in marriage equality, but *inequality* and *unequal rights* for the gay and lesbian families, individuals, and couples in our state. The consequences will be the sanctioned discrimination against gay and lesbian families, individuals, youth, and couples all over Hawai'i.

States that failed to legislate equal rights and protections for their citizens have suffered greatly.

Children and youth from communities that promote anti-LGBT, discriminatory policies are at higher risk for bullying, harassment, isolation, and even suicide. Nine children in two years died by suicide in one of the largest school districts in Minnesota as the State Legislature failed to pass anti-bullying legislation or to condemn the homophobic policies in the school district's curriculum<sup>2</sup>,<sup>3</sup>. Research indicates that *all children*—gay, lesbian, straight, or otherwise—who are exposed to high levels of bullying, harassment and isolation face higher rates of depression, absenteeism, truancy, and suicidality<sup>4</sup>,<sup>5</sup>.

GLSEN (www.glsen.org) has fourteen years of research that documents the improved behaviors, attitudes, and actions of youth who attend schools with policies that emphasize safety, equality, and respect for all students. These schools have documented less bullying and less harassment against *all students* than other schools. Teachers, administrators, and service providers in Hawai'i would like to see such positive changes in our schools. In April 2012 the Superintendent of the State of Hawai'i Department of Education, Kathryn Matayoshi distributed GLSEN "Safe Space Kits" to every secondary school in the State to demonstrate Hawai'i's commitment to safer, healthier schools for all youth. Additionally, out of the 800 teachers, administrators, social workers, and principals that I have trained in the last three years about the impact of anti-LGBT bullying and harassment on the youth and families in our state, *not one* has indicated that they wished to see this discrimination continue in their schools and classrooms.

The INTENDED CONSEQUENCES of discrimination against the youth, individuals, couples and families of Hawai'i are unacceptable. We MUST pass this bill.

The children and youth of Hawai`i need to see their law makers take a stand to reduce the discrimination and harassment in our communities. They gay and lesbian youth need to see healthy, respected, equal role models among the adults in our communities—from gays, lesbians, and allies alike. The Family Acceptance Project (<a href="http://familyproject.sfsu.edu/">http://familyproject.sfsu.edu/</a>), the longest running research project on LGBT youth in the country, has shown that the risks facing LGBT youth are *exponentially reduced* when they are accepted by their families. The youth have lower documented rates of drug and alcohol abuse, fewer sexually transmitted diseases, lower rates of depression and lower rates of suicidality. These are the unintended consequences of passing this bill and creating a more equal, just, pono Hawai`i.

We've seen the actions from Superintendent Matayoshi-- our schools are ready. We've heard from the HSTA-- our teachers are ready. We heard from the NASW—our social workers are ready. We've even heard from the youth—marriage equality was the number one priority identified by the young people of Hawai`i who attended the 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Children and Youth Summit hosted by the State Legislature's Keiki Caucus. The youth are ready!

We must be brave enough to join them.

We would like to offer you our perspective on your consideration to again allowing Hawai'i to legally recognize same sex marriage and allow the the State of Hawai'i to again begin issuing marriage licenses. We, Robert Roll and Raphael Moller were married in Brookline Massachusetts in 2009, Robert's hometown, with Robert's parent's by our side. This was after we were denied a marriage license by the San Francisco County clerk a week after Prop 8 passed in California where we were living at the time. This was sad and frustrating since many of our friend's who are same sex couples, had been issued marriage licenses, which had become invalid after Proposition 8 passed in California. We moved to Hawai'i in 2012 and soon after we moved learned Robert's dad was diagnosed with Leukemia. We have been living in Brookline Mass since late 2012 where we helped our dad through his illness and the process of dying and then helped my mom who also fell ill, but is doing fine now. This is not unlike any other married couple who has to share the responsibility to care for aging parents. It has been an honor to live in Massachusetts and to have our marriage both legally and socially recognized by the citizens of Massachusetts. More recently with the overturning of the Defense of Marriage act we received recognition of our marriage and received all of the same rights and benefits as any other married couple on a Federal level. For example, the benefits we would have been denied if one of us passed away would be lengthy. This was evident after my dad passed away relating to Social Security, pension, supplemental medical, the ease of assets passing outside of probate, stepped up valuation of Robert's parents home, and Veteran's benefits. We will return to our home in Hawai'i in January 2014. It feels odd that if the ban on same sex marriage is not repealed that the moment we step off the plane we will no longer be legally married. This is something that no heterosexual couple experiences when they travel anywhere in the entire world. We understand that some people are against same sex marriage because of religious and social beliefs and nobody should be forced to perform a religious marriage service. However, historically churches began performing marriages and eventually governments began recognizing marriages and issuing licenses to acknowledge the marriage. Be Not Afraid; Same Sex Marriage is a Matter of Justice and Righteousness The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King once said, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." It is time to begin to correct the injustices that have been established in law against the LGBT community by approving the same sex marriage bill currently under consideration in the Hawaii State Legislature. While civil unions have been a step in the right direction, only marriage allows the full rights and protections for all consenting adult couples at both the federal and state level. As a Christian pastor, I am convinced that discrimination, even when advocated under the guise of religious obligation, is always wrong - morally, spiritually, and Scripturally. Those who advocate exclusion and inequality have consistently found themselves on the wrong side of history. Throughout time, religious writings and teachings have sometimes been used to oppose the abolition of slavery, the rights of women, and the protection of minority groups. For three hundred years in America, interracial marriage was unlawful. A cursory glance at history demonstrates that the objections to this practice were just as wrong then as objections to equality for gay persons are now. Interracial marriage was called "unbiblical," "unnatural," and "contrary to God's will." We can use religious texts selectively to do all sorts of harm in God's good world. The core values of most faith traditions encourage justice, fairness, equality, compassion and love. As we have come to understand, the majority has been wrong in the past about slavery, the role of women in the workplace and government, the rights of minorities, and interracial marriage. Thankfully, we were able to move forward. Now, people throughout the United States and the world are realizing that we have been just as wrong about gay marriage. It is the Holy Spirit that changes our minds and moves our hearts to be more righteous, just and loving. I believe it is now time to legally treat our LBGT brothers and sisters as full-fledged members of our State. Personally, I know them already to be fully part of the human family and, thankfully, of my faith tradition. I am proud that the Episcopal Church has consistently advocated for equality for all persons, regardless of sexual orientation. I am proud of our Episcopal Bishop of Hawaii, the Rt. Rev. Robert Fitzpatrick, for stating recently, "It is because marriage is a public institution sanctioned by the state and afforded unique legal protection that the extension of the right to same-sex couples is an issue of justice." I am proud of our Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize Laureate and former head of the Anglican Church in South Africa, who recently compared his advocacy for LGBT

persons to his fight against apartheid: "I am as passionate about the 'Free and Equal' Campaign to promote the fair treatment of LBGT persons throughout the world as I ever was about apartheid. For me, it is at the same level." Opponents of equality are now tossing around ugly, divisive rhetoric that is harmful, uninformed and misguided, sowing seeds of fear, misunderstanding and intolerance. As I know the truth, God is love and God loves us all - including gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered persons. I am proud to stand with them and support them on this issue in the name of justice and righteousness and in the name of Jesus Christ whom I serve. For, until we understand and appreciate that diversity is a gift, we will never understand and appreciate the God who created it. The Rev. While I support the rights of others to practice their religions, they also must support my right to make my own choices and practice love the way I choose to. If my community cannot support me, I pray that the government will. After all, the rights of a minority group are rarely won with the backing of the majority. Government is vital at these times when so many people want to hang on to their own privilege. My family and I were at the rally tonight at the Capitol, We were brought to tears. My girlfriend got hit it in the face with someone's sign espousing "traditional values." My daughter, only 8 years old, got glared at by mothers. People yelled in our faces. I did not hear activism. What I heard was hatred, fear, and ignorance. I saw a mob. I will not tolerate my daughter growing up around that sort of mayhem. I will continue fighting every day against it-teaching her love, peace, understanding, but all that she must stand up for what is right. Every morning in my neighborhood, people calling for a people's vote yell at us. They tell us to "go back home." They tell passers by that do not "look" Hawaiian to go back home. But this is our home. My mother's family grew up in Wahiawa. She went to Leilehua High School. My father first took me snorkeling at Kaanapali on Maui. My daughter and I spent mother's day a few years ago on the Big Island. We love to camp on the beach on Molokai. I have kayaked the Na Pali Coast of Kauai. We have so much pride in where we live. We understand that everyone's ancestors have come to Hawaii from someplace else. Marriage equality is not a mainland thing. It is a human race thing. We must set a positive example for other states and for other countries around the globe. This is not just a step forward for the LGBT community here, but for equality everywhere. I have heard many remarks that this law would enable the break-down of the traditional family. Too late! My daughter was adopted out of the child welfare system by my girlfriend and myself. Her birth parents (a heterosexual man

and woman) were unable to raise her. Other couples did not step forward. She spent over two years in foster care before we found her. Like her, she has two sisters that were adopted by another same-sex couple. What luck! Now, all the girls have a relationship with each other. We raise them well. Other same-sex couples have adopted thousands of children that were also not being raised appropriately by heterosexual parents. We may not appear traditional from the outside, but trust me, we are anything but alternative! My family goes all out on Christmas. We go to pumpkin patches. We do Saturday morning activities. We argue. We don't like washing dishes. We love to sleep in. We play at the beach. We spend time with friends. We go to PTA meetings and swim practices. We eat breakfast together and go crazy at homework time and get up every morning and do it all over again. We are just a family. Dear Chair Rhoads, Chair Luke, and members of the House Committees on Judiciary and Finance, I am a long-term resident of Hawaii, having moved here in 1968 to take a position as faculty member in the psychology department at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. For the past 37 years I have been in a committed relationship with my partner, who was born and raised in Honolulu. We are recognized and treated as a married couple by friends. colleagues, and family. When I retired, we registered as domestic partners, and many state benefits have been afforded us under the civil union provisions. However, we are not eligible for the 1,138 federal benefits offered to married couples because of the State's failure to allow us to formally enter into marriage, even though individuals who have entered into same-sex marriage in other states are now able to claim such benefits. Marriage has been established as a fundamental civil right in a number of court cases, beginning with those dealing with marriage between individuals of different races and implied in the recent Supreme Court decision striking down the Defense of Marriage Act. Therefore, it would seem the State needs to show some compelling reason to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples. The recent television commercial opposing same-sex marriage in Hawaii argues that such action would result in "damaging our people," but it is not clear in what way this damage would occur. The American Psychological Association, of which I am a member, has concluded that there is no scientific basis for denying marriage rights to same-sex couples, in terms either of the effects on the same-sex partners themselves or on their children. State civil rights laws forbid discrimination along a number of dimensions, including sexual orientation. Failure to extend the right to marriage to same-sex couples would seem to be in direct violation of this precept, since it discriminates against gay couples with respect to a fundamental civil right. I am respectful of the right of religious groups to define "holy matrimony," but this should have no impact on the right of the legislature to establish the legal definition of marriage for governmental purposes.
