#### Aloha!

At the ripe old age of 47, (cough, sputter) I am now finally a registered voter and concerned citizen. I was never interested in politics until now. Since I am new to all of this, please indulge me for just a moment...

I am an educator with a long history working with thousands of our local keiki over the span of twenty years. I eventually built a hugely successful program at Aikahi Elementary, which then grew into an even larger program called Allegra Performing Arts with a huge commercial studio space in Kailua. I had 25 teachers and reached hundreds of students a year from 3 year olds up through adults and held regular shows at Ron Bright Castle Theater. I dearly loved my students and gave all of my heart and soul to this labor of love. I as well performed music regularly with my husband throughout the community. My name and my program became well known on the Windward side, I owned a beautiful beachfront home, 2 adorable Chihuahuas and my life seemed idyllic. I had built my own little Utopia... but I had a secret. I was secretly gay. Being raised Mormon I was taught that being gay was an abomination and was not "allowed" or even tolerated. I was doomed to suffer eternal damnation if I ever even had such thoughts much less dared act on them. I was ashamed of who I was and spent a lifetime covering up this horrible stain on my spirit and never told a soul.

To make a very long story short, at 40 I had a very important decision to make. I had built this empire with the involvement of my husband. My commercial lease was up for renewal and I could not re-sign without also committing myself to another 10 years of not only remaining married to my beautiful business, but to my sham of a marriage as well. After many months of wrestling with this awful decision I decided that I could no longer throw my own self under the bus for the happiness and comfort of others. Because of my fear that my beloved students and families would find out my dirty little secret, I felt my only recourse was to leave the island in shame and never return. When I announced the tragic closing of my center the local papers ran front-page stories and my students and families were heart broken. I was horrified at the publicity and depressed beyond belief. I was afraid of my husband at the time so I secretly bought a one-way ticket to the mainland. And all of this torment was mine to carry alone as I didn't dare tell anyone about my anguish.

I had to demolish my entire life, business, every relationship I held dear, walk away from my beach front home, business, students and pets just for the right to live my truth. I paid the ultimate price. The cost of my truth ticket was excessively high. What if there had been marriage equality and a prevailing message that it was at least "okay to be gay"? How might my life have been different? How many more students would I have had the ability to reach in the special and powerful way that I have with them? (At the time I actually believed that I could no longer be an educator if people knew I was gay and would have to give it up, which I did.) This kind of thinking was so incredibly damaging to my already fragile spirit. After spending several years on the mainland learning to "live my truth" I have since moved back to Aikahi. I have had to face all my demons and find a way to love myself and accept myself for who and what I am, regardless of the opinions and judgment of others. I am not perfect but I am a really good educator and have touched thousands of lives in a positive and often powerful way. (I often hear from students about how important my program has been in molding and shaping their lives in a significant way.) I started Allegra Performing Arts again this time as a nonprofit that specifically targets at-risk youth in our community. I have found a great number of these special teens that need this program. Some of their stories break my heart. Due to the nature of theater arts, many of these youth happen to be LGBT kids. It is ESSENTIAL that they are allowed to feel confident and love themselves and know there is room for them in this world. They need to be accepted and not be made to feel like pariahs in our society. They need to feel like they are free to live their own truth in whatever manner they see fit and feel like they have hope for a future in a world that needs them.

I am so concerned about the messages our current laws are sending to them. I wasted 40 precious years of my life because of this discriminatory intolerance. I would hate to see a single one of these precious young people waste one more day feeling like they are unacceptable and not worthy of true love and the freedom to express that love and marry whomever they choose.

I do understand every oppositional argument as I grew up hearing and making these same arguments myself. However, at some point someone has to care enough to go against the grain and do what is right rather than what is popular. This is the conclusion I had to come to 7 years ago and have spent the past 7 years becoming a voice for those who do not have one. Does this make me popular? Heck no. I honestly wish I had been born straight and didn't have to carry this burden. Our LGBT teen suicide rates are the highest in the country. What messages will we send to our precious young people this year? Is there room for them in this world?

Aloha Congresspersons, My name is Patricia Villiarimo-Cockett, I am the mother of 7 children, as well as grandmother to 7. I came from Hana, Maui this past Monday to share my story; however I had to return home. For this reason, I am submitting this testimony. On Aug. 21, 2013, my daughter was married under bright skies and the eyes of God. I was able to witness my daughter dressed beautifully in white, walk down the aisle, embraced by her father as he gave her away; and of course, witnessing my husband cry at his daughter's wedding. I had never seen her happier. We celebrated with some 300+ family and friends. Her fiance's, 93 year old, wheel-chair bound, grandmother came all the way from Oklahoma City, along with some 40 others of her family and friends. While her own 86 year old grandparents came from Oahu to bless their union. As in the tradition of Hana, family and friends came together from all over Maui to help in the wedding preparations, to make her day special. It had taken two years in the planning, and some \$20,000 was spent. between airfare, vacation rentals, rent-a-cars, food, cake, formal wear, tents and musicians. We took their wedding pictures, paraded around town honking our joy; then at their reception they cut their cake, danced the dollar dance, had their father daughter dance, and threw the bouquet. It was a beautiful wedding, and it was an honor to find out afterwards that my new daughter-in-law was going to take our name; to be a Villiarimo. They were married that day, under the eyes of God, blessed in their union by their grandparents, parents, brother's, sisters, aunties, uncles and friends. Why is it then that the State of Hawaii, says that they were only civil unionized? They have loved each other for over 6 years, committed that love to each other for the rest of their lives; and yet the State of Hawaii does not want to recognize that commitment as being the same commitment I made to her father. Why is it, of my 7 children, the state will only allow four of them to marry legally, yet for my three of LGBT children, the state will only civil unionize them. What the heck is that? It is discrimination. It is not following our Hawaii or US Bill of Rights. Which state that: "(A.2 Rights of the Individual)- All persons are free by nature and are equal in their inherent and inalienable rights. Among these rights are the enjoyment of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Isn't marriage the pursuit of happiness?" It also states that the "(A.3 Equality of Rights)- Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State on account of sex. " If you take that phrase literally, which you should, that would also include sexual orientation. Under Hawaii state law, if my transgender child is

discriminated against at her work place, she can sue. So why is it then that the state is still discriminating as to whom we call married and whom we call civil unionized. It is wrong, and I will call it like I see it; it is discriminatory and bigoted. One argument that I heard on Monday was "why don't they just go to another state to marry? Then they will get the same federal benefits as a married couple in Hawaii. We don't need to change the law." (Sam Sloan). My statement to this is simple: If they had been married in another state, most of her siblings would not have been able to attend, nor most of her family and friends in Hana, She also would not have been able to have the traditional cultural wedding that she did have, and that is her right. Nor would the state have been able to gain that much money into the state economy. The money would have gone to another state. Finally, someone says, what does it matter. Well as a mother, a grandmother, it does matter. It is the state saying "that my children are not good enough to marry. That they are less of a person. therefore they don't deserve the god given rights to pursue happiness." It matters. My children are as good as anyone else's children, they should not be treated by the state as less than, as 2nd class citizens. It is a matter of what is right, the protection of their inalienable rights. Mahalo for your time, please support SB1 and protects everyone's right to marry who they choose. As a resident of Hawaii, born and raised, I've been proud to call the Aloha State my home for the past 34 years. I've served 12 years on active duty with the U.S. Air Force, after graduating from the U.S. Air Force Academy appointed from the State of Hawaii, and am currently a pilot in the Hawaii Air National Guard. Throughout my time serving with the Air Force at home and abroad, I've noticed that the Aloha Spirit is world-renoun and that Hawaii is undoubtedly the melting pot of culture, acceptance, and the very definition of Aloha -- love. I wish to express my opposition to this Senate Bill as relating to Marriage Equality, or in essence Same Sex Marriage. I am a voting constituent in the McCully / Moili'ili District and I believe that the passing of this bill will forever shape the way our first amendment rights and the way we educate our children will be lived out.

I am a former middle school teacher in California and the Hawaii D.O.E., and current preschool director in downtown Honolulu. ## Johnny Rock Piano: "I Expect being Sued Twice if Gay Marriage is law."

I am a pianist on Oahu, Hawaii who has a passion for music. There was a time, after a car accident years ago, that piano & music was all I could do; it became my therapy and became life-giving not just for me, but for all who listened. Even my supervisor, after listening while eating lunch at the cafeteria, later encouraged students to go, listen & relax- to relieve stress. There was much stress as they were interns in Loma Linda University's Ph.D. clinical psychology program, many seeing clients for the first time.

I never finished the Ph.D. due to his disabling TBI (traumatic brain injury), instead obtaining a 2nd psychology masters degree, and eventually opening private practice in Honolulu. My clients are usually individuals in relationships and with families; after individual therapy, we may at times convert to marital therapy. 'Conform or be sued;' Governor Abercrombie is intending this bill to withstand a Supreme Court challenge. In my profession this is called , 'bullying into submission.' However, as a business owner, I am in double jeopardy because I play piano for events; if a same-sex couple asked me to be a pianist for their wedding reception, and I refuse, I will be twice sued, as the wedding florist. This 'bullying' is inappropriate in a country built on the very foundation of 'freedom of religion;' I am only practicing my religious convictions, held by my ancestors for the past 400 years, and I will be doubly sued, because of imposition of a 'world view' on all of the rest of us. - That = 26% of our population.

In the 2010 election, Governor Abercrombie won with 142,304 votes.

- According to the US census at the time was 1,063,755 people were eligible to vote.

First, it has been reported in the news media that Senator Hee said, "the Senate took into account the concerns expressed by the religious community and gay advocates and tried to 'strike a balance between the two competing interests" (http://www.hawaiinewsnow.com/story/ 23763284/same-sex-marriage-bill-officially-filed-first-public-hearing-scheduled). It seems reasonable, that if they drafters of this bill truly want to "strike a balance between two competing interests" they would bring together the two competing interests to dialogue on the issue. At the very least, they would have spoken with clearly recognized representatives from both interests. To the best of my knowledge, this has not taken place. That being the case, I'm not sure how this bill could strike the needed balance.

Many leading voices in the religious community have already spoken out their concerns of the possible impact this bill would have on our constitutional right of keeping government from establishing laws which impede the free exercise of religion. Their concern is shared by a large majority (if the testimony submitted for the just completed Senate hearing is any indication) of the citizens of Hawaii.

My name is Michael Ganoot. I was born and raised in Waipahu, HI and have lived there up until this past August when I moved to New Jersey to pursue a law degree. I have been openly gay for the past seven years or so after many years of struggling with my identity and even now, I find it hard being constantly judged by everyone for who I am. I would like to submit my testimony on this very significant bill that will change Hawaii for the better.

First, I'd like to give my opinion on the opposition's assertion of the bill's infringement on their Freedom of Religion. The Freedom of Religion, as you know, is a right that guarantees the practice of one's own religion without fear of interference or pressure of another's religion onto him. It is a dual responsibility freedom. Others do not have the right to infringe upon one's own practices, but the individual also is not allowed to bludgeon their beliefs into the practice's of others. This allows for a particular bubble of protection within the private sphere of practice, however, when taken into the public sphere of government, the government must be neutral without imposing any particular religion's set of beliefs onto the populous. However, to deny same-sex marriage, would be endorsing a radical Christian belief system and imposing it on those that practice behaviors that are in conflict with that belief system. This endorsement would be an infringement on my right to be free of religious beliefs imposed on me from the government. You might be wondering though on what moral standard should laws be structured if not for the religious standards. I am not saying that religious standards cannot be used at all or used as inspiration. There are certain standards that should be retained from the religious standard because it makes sense in a civil, orderly society and must be there for the maintenance of a peaceful society (such as laws against murder, theft, physical harm). However, those standards must be scrutinized further than being accepted within a particular religion. They must be scrutinized against biased assumptions and whether those assumptions are

warranted. And in this case, the assumption that marriage is only legitimate between a man and a woman is both antiquated and wholly discriminatory.

The religious view that a marriage must be between a man and a woman due to the natural purpose of procreation is one that is misconceived. First, the institution of marriage is not a natural construct, but rather a human construct. It is a legal institution with particular purposes embedded in the idea of both procreation and stability. However, when one weighs those two particular purposes, it is easy to see that the institution of marriage is based more so on the factor of stability rather than the factor of procreation. If marriage were primarily based on the idea of procreation, women over the age of menopause and infertile persons wouldn't be allowed to marry, couples that conceive would be required to marry, anyone of sexual maturity would be allowed to marry and couples that are no longer capable of birthing children would be required to divorce. Thus, in actuality, the main purpose, and arguably the only purpose, is for stability. To assume that stability in a household is not possible due to same sex parents is an unfounded assumption because the same statement could be made of many opposite sex parents. Stability of the household is not based on the gender of the parents but rather on the maturity of the parents to actually BE parents. This fear that children will be mentally and emotionally confused and stunted can only be explained if one bases their assumptions in the misguided criteria of what constitutes a great parent. Thus there is no logical argument for why marriage should specifically be based on the criteria of procreation.

Second, a greater argument could be made today that a denial of same sex marriage is a violation of the LGBT community's 14th Amendment equal protection and due process. It is true, that the Supreme Court has not recognized the LGBT community as a protected class as that of religion, race and sex. However, there are statutes that lean towards a protection based on the classification of sexual orientation, such as that which classifies physical crimes against the LGBT community, solely because the victim is a member of the LGBT, as a hate crime with harsher punishments. There have been both Congressional actions, such as the hate crime statute, as well as Supreme Court decisions, such as *Lawrence*, which protect the LGBT community in particular ways. The notion that civil unions and marriages are separate but equal is highly suspect now with the advent of *Windsor*. Before, it could be said that civil unions could be justified because granting marriage would still make a gay couple unequal on the federal level. However, that inequality is no longer applicable if the state allows for equality on their level. Thus, the sole reason that gay couples cannot be equal to straight couples is because the state does not allow for gay marriages, a disqualification based solely on the discrimination of sexual orientation. This inequality on the state level that is based solely on their discrimination of sexual orientation cannot be upheld even under rational basis if one agrees that marriage's main purpose is stability.

Now, the reaction that allowing for same-sex marriage will result in the allowance for marriage to animals and other nonsense is unfounded if one bases the definition of marriage in contracts, since that's what a marriage is. A marriage is a contractual agreement that two persons, that both consent, will be at least financially tied to one another. There's an embedded assumption that the relationship of a marriage will go beyond just a financial tie but to explicitly say more in the law will be problematic. And as everyone knows, a couple could still be married and not have any emotional or physical ties to each other. But those lack of ties do not disintegrate the marriage. And therefore, they should not be a requirement for the creation of one either. The element of consent automatically negates claims of marriage to minors or animals or any other ridiculous nonsense out there. There would still be the restriction on familial ties because that conflicts with the purpose of stability and raises red flags in the area of consent. Thus to say that the allowance of marriage to same-sex couples would bring on a slippery slope of ridiculous possibilities is unfounded.

To address concerns on the infringement of Religious Freedom, the current exemptions given in Senate Bill 1 to those working within one's own religious roles (i.e. clergymen), I believe to be sufficient and acceptable. However, exemptions beyond that boundary that extend into the public marketplace is unacceptable. When practicing within their religious roles, as to their protection of religious freedom, churches and clergy should not be required to perform ceremonies that interfere with their practice of their religion. That is an understandable exemption that would be allowed under the First Amendment. However, to extend that exemption into the public marketplace would be completely unacceptable because business with the public cannot discriminate customers. The businesses don't have to be religion-neutral but they can't discriminate their customer base either if they are to be a business in the public marketplace. Because businesses in the marketplace are in the business of selling a service or a product that could be construed as religion neutral, such as a flower caterer, food caterer and are not bound on the practice of religion. Thus they shouldn't have a religious-practice exemption.

This is all of the major points that I wanted to convey. I do thank you for your time if you read this. Thank you for taking the consideration to make this bill a possibility. The passage of this bill would be a great step towards equality and making sexual preference another classification that can no longer be acceptable in the disparate treatment of individuals. The standard of policy should be consistent with the ideals of humanity and the acceptance and respect that we could provide to one another.

" A recent study conducted at the national level found that 21.7% of women and 7.4% of men in traditional heterosexual relationships reported some form of rape, physical assault or stalking within the context of their relationship. (U.S. Department of Justice, "Extent, Nature, and Consequences of Intimate Partner Violence", Office of Justice Programs, July, 2000). " "The same

study on violence just referenced revealed that 39% of women and 23.1% of men in same sex relationships reported the same kinds of abuse. (U.S. Department of Justice, "Extent, Nature, and Consequences of Intimate Partner Violence", Office of Justice Programs, July, 2000). This data obviously reveals that same sex relationships are far more likely to involve abuse and violence. And this data is supported by other surveys and studies. The Bureau of Justice reports that women in traditional heterosexual marriages experience far lower rates of violence than women in any other type of relationship. (Bureau of Justice Statistics Special Report, "Intimate Partner Violence", U.S. Department of Justice, May, 2000). Over and over again, studies reveal that homosexual and lesbian relationships are far more violent than traditional marital relationships. In one study, researchers found that 90% of surveyed lesbians said they had suffered verbal abuse and 31% said they had experienced physical abuse from their same sex partner. (Lettie L. Lockhart et al., "Letting out the Secret: Violence in Lesbian Relationships", Journal of Interpersonal Violence 9, 1994). Another survey found that more than 50% of lesbians reported that they had been abused by their female partner. (Gwat Yong Lie and Sabrina Gentlewarrier, "Intimate Violence in Lesbian Relationships: Discussion of Survey Findings and Practice Implications", Journal of Social Service Research 15, 1991). Additional studies confirm this level of abuse within lesbian relationships. One such study revealed that 54% of lesbian couples report 10 or more incidents of abuse, and 74% reported that the abuse grew worse over time. (William C. Nichols, et al, editors, "Handbook of Family Development and Intervention", New York, John Wiley and Sons, Inc., 2000). And male homosexual couples report similar abuse. One study found that gay men experience nearly two times the amount of violence (in the context of their relationships) than tradition heterosexual couples. (D. Island and P. Letellier, "Men Who Beat the Men Who Love Them: Battered Gay Men and Domestic Violence", New York, Haworth Press, 1991). These studies simply reveal the truth of the matter. Homosexual relationships are far more violent that heterosexual relationships, based on a number of different parameters and measurements." Studies confirm that while some heterosexual partners may have broken their vows of fidelity to their marriage partner, the majority have remained faithful, devoted and monogamous. National surveys have consistently discovered that 75-81% of married men and 85-88% of married women had never broken their marriage vows. (Michael W. Wiederman, "Extramarital Sex: Prevalence and Correlates in a National Survey", Journal of Sex Research 34, 1997; E. O. Laumann et al., "The Social Organization of Sexuality: Sexual Practices in the United States", Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1994; and "Sexual Habits of Americans Have Changed Dramatically in Ten Years: New National Survey Finds Both Men and Women More Committed and Caring", PR Newswire, August 4, 1994). Over and over again, studies reveal that heterosexual marital partnerships are largely stable, devoted and monogamous. A classic homosexual study revealed that 43% of white homosexual men had sex with at least 500 partners and 28% had sex with at least 1000 partners. (A. P. Bell and M. S. Weinberg, "Homosexualities: A Study of Diversity Among Men and Women", New York: Simon and Schuster, 1978, pp. 308, 309; and A. P. Bell, M. S. Weinberg, and S. K. Hammersmith, "Sexual Preference", Bloomington, Indiana University Press, 1981). This survey has been repeatedly confirmed by additional research. The Journal of Sex Research reports that most homosexuals have between 100 and 500 sexual partners in their lifetime. 10.2% reported that they had between 501 and 1,000 sex partners, and 15.7% said they had more than 1000 sex partners. in their lifetime. (Paul Van de Ven et al., "A Comparative Demographic and Sexual Profile of Older Homosexually Active Men", Journal of Sex Research 34, 1997). And studies conducted by homosexual advocate groups agree with these findings, reporting that 24% of those homosexuals who were surveyed reported that they had more than 100 sex partners in their lifetime. Several of those surveyed indicated that they had more than 1000 sex partners. ("Sex Survey Results", Genre, October 1996, as quoted in "Survey Finds 40 percent of Gay Men Have Had More Than 40 Sex Partners", Lambda Report, January 1998) A national study in 2001 revealed that 66% of first marriages last ten years or more, and 50% last twenty years or longer (Matthew D. Bramlett and William D. Mosher, "First Marriage Dissolution, Divorce and Remarriage: United States," Advance Data, National Center for Health Statistics - May 31, 2001). A national study in 2002 revealed that

70.7% of women married between 1970 and 1974 stayed married for at least 10 years and 57.7% stayed married for at least 20 years (Rose M. Kreider and Jason M. Fields, "Number, Timing, and Duration of Marriages and Divorces: 1996" Current Population Reports, P70-80, U.S. Census Bureau, Washington, D.C. February 2002). While heterosexual couples do often divorce, large numbers of opposite sex marriages survive even beyond the 20 year mark, allowing for children to be raised within the context of an intact biological family unit. Same sex relationships are not nearly as durable. In a 2003/2004 survey of homosexual lifestyles conducted by a homosexual organization, only 15% of same sex relationships were reported to last longer than 12 years and only 5% of these relationships lasted more than 20 years ("Largest Gay Study Examines 2004 Relationships," GayWire Latest Breaking Releases, www.glcensus.org). Homosexual men are far less likely to participate in monogamous long term relationships that homosexual women; some European studies have reported that the average length of a homosexual partnership is approximately 1.5 years (Maria Xiridou, et al, "The Contribution of Steady and Casual Partnerships to the Incidence of HIV Infection among Homosexual Men in Amsterdam," AIDS 17 - 2003). And western studies examining the lifestyles of homosexual men in America report similar statistics: University of Chicago Sociologist Edward Laumann "Typical gay city inhabitants spend most of their adult lives in 'transactional' relationships, or short-term commitments of less than six months." (Adrian Brune, "City Gays Skip Long-term Relationships: Study Says", Washington Blade – February 27, 2004) Researcher M. Pollak "Few homosexual relationships last longer than two years, with many men reporting hundreds of lifetime partners." (M. Pollak, "Male Homosexuality in Western Sexuality: Practice and Precept in Past and Present Times", ed. P. Aries and A. Bejin, translated by Anthony Forster, New York, NY: B. Blackwell, 1985) We know, for example, that children raised in two biological parent families are far less likely to become sexually active at a young age compared to every other form of family unit, including stepfamilies. (Dawn Upchurch, et al., "Neighborhood and Family Contexts of Adolescent Sexual Activity", Journal of Marriage and the Family, 61, 1999, 920-930). Children who are not living with both biological parents are 50 to 150% more likely to abuse drugs that kids who are raised in other types of family units, including stepfamilies like those formed in same sex unions. (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, "The Relationship Between Family Structure and Adolescent Substance Use", Rockville, MD, National Clearinghouse for Alcohol and Drug Information, 1996). In a similar way, studies indicate that "children residing in households with adults unrelated to them were 8 times more likely to die of maltreatment than children in households with 2 biological parents. Risk of maltreatment death was elevated for children residing with step, foster, or adoptive parents." (Michael Stiffman, et al., "Household Composition and Risk of Fatal Child Maltreatment," Pediatrics, 109, 2002, pp.615-621). Over and over again, studies confirm the same reality: children do better when raised not only in two parent family units, but in two biological parent family units!" http://pleaseconvinceme.com/2012/should-government-recognize-and-legalize-same-sex-marriage/ "High School Graduation rates Among Children of Same-Sex Households," found that children living with gay and lesbian families in 2006 were about 65% as likely to graduate compared to children living in homes headed by married heterosexual couples.
